SECOND Division mistakes were ruthlessly punished by First Division Fulham to smash our dreams of reaching the fourth round of the FA Cup for the first time in five years.

For nearly an hour the Town side, costing precisely nothing, was a match for a visiting squad that has cost around £8million to assemble.

We gave Fulham such a fright in the first match at Craven Cottage that for a long time they seemed wary to open up and have a go. They sat back and waited for their chance to pounce, and we fell into the trap.

The team deserves credit for earning the replay, but the biggest Kenilworth Road crowd of the season was denied the Christmas present we wanted as Fulham showed how a class team will take advantage of midfield slips that you might get away with in a run of the mill Second Division encounter.


With Gary Doherty restored to defence, and Tony Thorpe again unavailable, we settled into a compact 3-5-2 formation, and for the first half we matched Fulham, with neither side looking too potent in attack.

Fulham showed great respect, but stepped up a gear after the break, although they were lucky to stay level when Stuart Douglas collected a wayward back pass by Wayne Collins. His shot was blocked by Maik Taylor, and the goalkeeper did well to regain his feet quickly to catch a drive by Liam George from the rebound.

But Fulham made the most of their breaks when they netted three times in six minutes. Mistakes by Stuart Fraser and Paul McLaren in midfield led to goals being fashioned for Barry Hayles, each clinically accepted, and the defensive wall and goalkeeper Nathan Abbey left a gap for Steve Hayward to hit the third from a free kick.

Town boss Lennie Lawrence said: "We matched Fulham for a game and a half. But the one thing you must not do with Fulham is over-commit going forward and then give the ball away. Hayles and Horsfield are £3million players and they will kill you. They did. We made crass, schoolboy errors in giving the ball





away, and we got punished. The third goal was also sloppy, but that was academic.

"The result was very cruel on several players, and at least half a dozen did what they can do. The back three battled away manfully, and the front two didn't too bad at all. But once Fulham got in front, it was over. Over the two games we didn't deserve that - 3-0 was very harsh on a lot of players. We had ten minutes of madness. It was totally unnecessary.

"Fulham just sat and sat, and thought 'These will make a silly mistake' and we did. Until we stop doing that we cannot move forward.

"Our performance in the first half was very good, and it wasn't that bad either side of the goals, but when it mattered we made ludicrous errors. Fulham did what they had to do."

OUR FA cup run came to an unfortunate end on Tuesday. Having matched Fulham in the first game at Craven Cottage, we continued to do so for nearly an hour at Kenilworth Road. Our game plan was working perfectly,

and indeed until the first goal we were working up a nice head of steam. We had created one or two half chances, but then we self-destructed. Casual and sloppy passing twice led to players conservatively valued at £3million running into acres of space, and it was not surprising that they hit the net. The third goal was also disappointing, but by then it was academic.

Normally, when you lose 3-0, you would criticise the whole team. But not on this occasion. Several individuals played to the best of their ability. Others battled well. But at that level if you make crucial errors you will pay, and we did.

Perhaps the biggest tragedy was that we had the biggest crowd of the season in the ground, and they went from excited anticipation to utter despair in ten minutes.

In the Worthington Cup last season we invariably delivered the goods at home, and it was no disgrace to go out at Sunderland. But that was a far more experienced team than we have now.

Because of the nature of Tuesday's defeat, today's game, which was always going to be important, takes on an even greater significance. Our record in the league in recent weeks has not been good enough, and it is about time we produced a winning performance in front of our own fans. They are bound to feel bitterly disappointed at what they saw in one short, decisive spell against Fulham. It's our responsibility to send them home happy on Boxing Day, and the only way to do that is with a convincing win.

Chesterfield have gone through traumatic times this season after selling several of their better players in recent years, and finding it difficult to replace them.

But they got a good draw at Brentford a fortnight ago, and because their game last Saturday was postponed they come here today having had 16 days without a match, while we played twice in that period.

They are well-organised, but they do not have multi-million pound players to catch us on the break if we make the sort of mistakes we saw against Fulham.

What we need is to get the first goal, and then win well. I am aware that the squad needs strengthening, and talks were still going on this week over the future of Tony Thorpe. His loan ends today, and it will not be extended. Either he signs for us, or he goes back to Bristol. Either way it frees up another loan, and I am working on bringing in fresh blood.

Finally today, I want to make an appeal to supporters. We came through a difficult year in 1999, and eventually came through a lot of uncertainty, but everyone pulled together. Football is a passionate game, and occasionally things are said and done in the heat of the moment that are a touch out of character, on the field and off it.

We hope we rewarded great support with decent performances at home in the league, but recently we have been disappointing in front of our own crowd. On Tuesday, the first voices of dissension were heard in the ground. As paying customers you have every right to express your views.

My plea is that supporters should try to continue to create a good atmosphere, with some understanding of the difficulties we still face. I know that at the start of the season a lot of people feared the worst after seeing the changes in the squad. For them, results so far have exceeded expectation. For others, expectation has risen higher, and perhaps we are finding it difficult to cope with that.

One thing is sure: the development of this young team will not be assisted by hostility to anyone. So in wishing everyone a happy Christmas and a peaceful new year, I would like to leave this thought with you: whether we deserve it or not, we need all the help we can get to achieve the objectives we all share. Everyone at the club craves success just as much as the fans.

THE good news after a bad night at Kenilworth Road on Tuesday was that we came through the Fulham cup-tie with no physical injuries. And there was more good news after Wednesday's

reserve match, even though that ended in defeat against Peterborough's first team.

Four players coming back from long-term injury were involved in the game, and I was happy to see each of them come through an important stage on the road to full recovery.

I was watching them closely to see how they reacted to the physical demands of the game, and the fact that it was a difficult match was no bad thing, because it ensured they went through a thorough testing on a very soft pitch.

We were ready to withdraw any of them if need be, but in the event only Gavin McGowan did not stay on for the full 90 minutes. He has been out longer than anyone else after a serious knee problem in the summer, and we thought 75 minutes was enough to ease him back into competitive football.

He probably could have done 90 minutes, but it was a sensible precaution to take him off when we did. He was looking a little tired, which is hardly surprising after so long on the injured list. Professional footballers have a high degree of fitness, but there is an extra peak to be reach to be match fit for league games.

Phil Gray is champing at the bit for a return to Second Division action, and he sailed through Wednesday's game, showing every sign that his niggling back and hamstring injury has cleared up. As was to be expected, he felt a little muscle soreness

after the match, but we were well pleased with the way he came through.

The same goes for Andrew Fotiadis, who was playing his first match for three months.

His hard work during the treatment period seems to have paid off, because he looked very good on Wednesday. He took a few knocks, and that will do him no harm. None caused a problem, and he now knows for sure that he is fully recovered from the injury, and because his general fitness is excellent he will be expecting the chance of first team action in the near future.

Landry Zahana-Oni also got through the 90 minutes, although in his case he did not have to take as much physical pressure as the others. His has made good progress, however, although obviously he is still some way short of match fitness.

The clean bill of health from the Fulham game means that we were in pretty good shape as we approached the busy Christmas and New Year spell, which will be a testing time. Players enjoy games more than training, but the problem can be that if they do collect knocks the recovery time is somewhat restricted, and that is where the importance of diet and general fitness comes in.

Our players all understand the value of selfdiscipline and treating their bodies sensibly, and while they are all welcome to the traditional Christmas fare of turkey and plum pudding, they also know that we believe in the old adage that it is a little of what fancy that does you good, not a lot!

They have earned their Christmas treat, but they were not likely to over-indulge themselves over Christmas day lunch - they were in for a training session at 6pm on Christmas day.

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

TWO of the Second Division's best attacking wing-backs are on view at Kenilworth Road this afternoon. Stuart Fraser's attacking prowess for the Town has already brought his first senior goal, while Chesterfield's Jamie Hewitt has had four efforts saved by opposing 'keepers.

They both excel at going around opponents and exploit any width they might be given to get a cross in as we can see from Hewitt's impressive 72 crosses to Fraser's effective 45.

They have impressive pass completion stats, even if at times their defences have been under severe pressure. They are very well matched in terms of passing skill - both have a 62 per cent success rate in finding their men.

Hewitt is the better dribbler having completed 97 per cent of his runs. While Fraser is confident going forward, he could improve his game by passing with greater frequency, rather than trying to do it all himself - that sometimes leads to him being caught out of position, and exposes a gap on the right-hand side of the Luton defence.

The two players have similar tackling statistics, with Hewitt just shading it with a higher percentage. Neither player has conceded a lot of fouls, but Fraser will face a suspension if he is booked on a further two occasions, while Hewitt has already served a ban following his red card in the home match against Cambridge in August. Both players are a credit to their clubs, with Hewitt scoring the equaliser against Middlesbrough in the 1997 FA Cup semi-finals, while Fraser is one of the hottest properties in Division Two, with numerous scouts watching his progress. It is certain to be an interesting Boxing Day clash between the two full-backs as they aim to gobble up their opponents.

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



During his playing career John was a top class striker. He played at the highest level for both Tottenham and Derby

County scoring a goal in every other game.

His managerial career began at Scunthorpe in 1981 before arriving at Saltergate in 1983 via a brief spell at Hartlepool. He guided the Spireites to the Fourth Division Championship in 1985 before moving onto Ipswich the following season. After three

seasons as Portman Road John dropped out of the game to take up a teaching post arriving back at Saltergate in February 1993. During his present spell at Saltergate, John has guided Chesterfield to promotion and has seen the Spireites just miss out on the Division Two Play-offs over the last two seasons. The highlight though has to be the FA Cup run in 1997 when the Blues reached the Semi-final before going out to Middlesborough in a replay. Recently signed a new 3 year contract which will keep him at Saltergate until 2002.

KEVIN RANDALL (ASSISTANT MANAGER)

A former player and manager of Chesterfield FC, Ashton born Kevin resumed his association with the Spireites, which is now in its 34th year, upon the re-appointment of John Duncan. As a striker he hit 181 goals in 556 league appearances with Bury, Chesterfield, Notts County, Mansfield and York City. Kevin was a member of the 1969/70 Fourth Division Championship winning side and number two to John Duncan when the feat was repeated 15 years later. He completed a unique hat trick of promotions with the club four seasons ago. During the summer Kevin also signed a new contract until 2002.

MARK GAYLE (GOALKEEPER)

A three-month loan signing earlier this season due to the injury to 'keeper Billy Mercer. Mark, an electrician by trade, joined Chesterfield from Rushden and Diamonds. He started his career at Leicester City. He is in his second spell at Saltergate.

ANDY LEANING (GOALKEEPER)

Andy, now 36, is the Goalkeeper coach at Saltergate but also operates as cover for first choice Bill Mercer. Previous clubs include York, Sheffield Utd, Bristol City and Lincoln City.

IAN BRECKIN (DEFENCE)

lan, aged 24, has been in superb form since joining for £100,000 from Rotherham two seasons ago. Tall centre half who forged a tremendous partnership with Mark Williams at the heart of the Spireites defence.

JAMIE HEWITT (DEFENCE)

A versatile defender who has made almost 500 appearances for the Spireites. Jamie had

a successful testimonial season last year and will always be remembered for his last gasp equaliser against Middlesborough in the FA Cup Semi-final two years ago.

GREGG PEARCE (DEFENCE)

Local lad who has come through the junior ranks at Saltergate. Gregg suffered a few injuries last season, which limited his progress. Due to injuries to key senior players Gregg got his chance in the first team in November 1999.

STEVE BLATHERWICK (DEFENCE)

Steve signed for £50,000 from Burnley after a successful loan spell. A tough tackling centre-half who made several apperances for Nottingham Forest in the Premiership.



STEVE WOODS (DEFENCE)

Close season signing from Stoke City under the Bosman ruling. Primarily a left back brought in to replace Shane Nicholson

but can operate anywhere along the back four.

STEVE PAYNE (DEFENCE)

Powerful centre half signed in the close season from Macclesfield. Last season's 'Player of the Year' for the Silkmen. Steve will hopefully fill the void left by the departure of Mark Williams.

CHRIS PERKINS (DEFENCE)

Chris joined the Spireites from Mansfield Town in the summer of 1994 and went on to make 165 appearances by the end of last season. Despite being offered a further contract Chris felt that for personal reasons it

was time to make a move so he left the club during the summer, but re-signed again from Hartlepool after a months loan spell in November 1999.

TOM CURTIS (MIDFIELD)

Born in Exeter. Tom spent two years with Derby County before impressing John Duncan during a trial spell. The midfield

dynamo has clocked up more than 250 appearances for the Spireites despite missing a large part of last season through injury.

MARCUS EBDON (MIDFIELD)

Classy midfielder signed from Peterborough United for £100,000 in March 1997. A former

Welsh Under-21 International who on his day is as good as anything in the Second Division.

CHRIS BEAUMONT (MIDFIELD)

Sheffield born Chris guaranteed himself a place in local folklore by scoring the winning goal against Wrexham in the 1997 FA Cup quarterfinal. £22,500 signing form Stockport County the previous summer, the right-side midfielder made over 300 appearances in his seven years at Edgeley Park after out with Rochdale.

TONY CARSS (MIDFIELD)

Signed on the free from Cardiff City. A versatile left-sided player who missed the majority of last season after breaking his leg. Previously with Blackburn and Darlington.

Chesterfield's record signing, he cost the Spireites £250,000 from Watford in August 1998. The 6' 4" striker began his career with Nottingham





WITH the new millennium only days away, there have been countless lists of the "best ever" and "greatest achievement" in all kinds of subjects, especially in sport and entertainment.

Opinions are one thing, but facts speak for themselves when we look at those two categories in Luton Town's 20th-

century story.

In the history of the Football League, only one man has managed to score ten goals in a game, and we are justly proud that he was wearing a Hatters shirt at the time. The player was of course Joe Payne, who set his record at Kenilworth Road on April 13, 1936, in a Division Three fixture against Bristol Rovers.

Surprisingly, after hitting the headlines so spectacularly, Payne did not figure prominently on the football cards of that era. The card reproduced here is No. 84 from a series of 110 manufactured by the London confectionery firm of Barratt & Co in 1937. It is one of only two cards I have seen

depicting Payne in his Luton days, the other being a postcard from Sherman's Pools.

Payne was born in Brinnington Common, Derbyshire, in January 1914, and joined the Town 20 years later from his local club, Bolsover Colliery. There has been much made of the fact that his record-breaking performance was from his first game as a centre-forward, but Payne was actually signed to play in that position.

However, initially at Luton he did not live up to expectations and was tried in a variety of roles while on loan to Biggleswade, and in the Town reserves. Eventually, he settled down at winghalf, and that was his position when he made his league debut against Southend in December 1934.

It has never really been established who decided to play Payne in attack on that bitterly cold Easter Monday in 1936 as Luton were without a manager at the time. An injury crisis probably contributed to the decision.

Payne had a quiet start, but by half-time had

notched a hat-trick, before netting seven times after the break. The 12-0 victory remains our record win. The crowd was under 14,000, but more than 23,000 turned up for the following game a week later, for a 1-1 draw with Coventry. Payne, naturally, got the Town goal.

He went on to score 55 times in the following season's championship triumph, another record that still stands.

International recognition followed, and he scored twice to help England beat Finland 8-1 before moving to Chelsea in March 1938. The ridiculously low fee of £2,000 may have had something to do with the fact that Payne did not enjoy the best of health. That, coupled with a badly-broken ankle in a

war-time match, caused his premature retirement after brief spells with West Ham and Millwall. But his strike rate was phenomenal: 110 league goals in 116 appearances.

After retiring from football, Payne continued to live and work in Luton and at one time had a greengrocery business near the ground. He was an accomplished cricketer and turned out for Bedfordshire in the Minor Counties Championship for several years. Unfortunately his health did not improve, and in April 1975 he passed away, aged only 61. But the memory of "Ten Goal Payne" will live for ever, and it is very doubtful if his record will ever be broken.


This card, published more than 60 years ago, is now very scarce, and on the rare occasions when one does turn up you will not get much change out of a tenner if you want to buy it.


THE Town play their final game of 1999 on Tuesday, away to Bristol City. The kick-off, down on the early season schedules as 7.45, is now 3pm.

He will also be pleased to enrol you into the Bobbers Travel Club - membership is obligatory to use the service, but life membership costs only £1. Luxury executive coaches run by Town on Tour, an offshoot of the Luton Town Supporters Club, will leave Maple Road at 11am. The fare is £11.50 for adult members of LTSC, £9.50 for concessions, and £13.00 for all others. You can book at the LTSC kiosk in Kenilworth Road before or after today's game, or through the club shop at other times. You might find it worthwhile joining the Supporters Club - it's £6 for adults, £5 for concessions, or £12 for families of up to two adults and two children, and they all get discounts on Town on Tour.

IF YOU want to drive yourself to Bristol, the journey is easy. Leave Luton on the M1 south, then make a right turn onto the M25 west. Near Heathrow leave M25 to turn right onto the M4 heading west. Leave M4 at junction 19, turning left onto the M32. At the end of the motorway, after nearly five miles, turn left to follow the signs to Broadmead and Temple Meads, and then get into the right hand lane to follow signs towards Bristol Airport. At the next two roundabouts go left to follow the signs towards Taunton A38. After leaving the second roundabout stay in the left hand lane, still following the A38 signs, into Brunel Way, the A3029. This swings left into Winterstoke Road, and Ashton Gate is on your left. Mileage from Luton: 150.

Dougan masters the Spireites

When Allan Brown took over as manager at Kenilworth Road in early November 1966, replacing the tired George Martin, it

was not long before he came to the conclusion that he had a major job on his hands.

A run of eight games without a victory, two goals and only one point from eight away matches at that stage in the season and a mix of virtually untried youngsters and old pro's past their best was a recipe for disaster.

Only seven short years before the Town had played in the F.A.Cup final at Wembley but now looked likely to have to suffer the shame of applying for re-election to the league, which came about if you finished in the bottom four places in the old Division Four.

Brown's first game in charge saw an uncharacteristic Luton display with high flying Crewe seen off 2-1 at Kenilworth Road. The players were obviously out to impress their new boss who said afterwards, "I called for maximum effort and I am sure I got it". Indeed, in the first 25 minutes the Hatters put on their highest powered display of the campaign but managed to score only once through Gordon Riddick. Graham Matthews equaliser for Crewe would normally have been a sign for the Town to throw in the towel but they rolled up their sleeves and were fully worthy of their eventual victory when Riddick knocked in the all-important second goal mid-way through the second half.

Unfortunately the honeymoon period was over as soon as the Town went back on their travels. Next up was Bradford City at Valley Parade and the Hatters shocked the home side when Bruce Rioch netted early on but that turned out to be the only bright spot in the match.

The Bantams attacked with a will for the remainder of the game and after Ken Leek equalised there was only one likely winner. City's pressure eventually paid off with Steve Ingle snapping up the second goal towards the end after the Luton defence got into a tangle.


Although Barrow were in the top four in the division they had only one home victory to their credit. With the Holker Street side obviously suffering a crisis of confidence at home, now was the ideal opportunity for the Town to break their away duck.

Allan Brown watched with his head in his hands as the Hatters were swept aside by a Tony Field inspired Barrow. Field scored twice in the opening half, to make it five goals from five starts, narrowly missed out on a hat-trick with a brilliant header and was then brought down for a penalty which was converted by Jim Mulholland.

Allan Brown needed to do something to halt the abysmal away record but now had time to experiment with his formation when the Town's next game took them to Exeter in the F.A.Cup first round. Without pressure for points on them the players earned a fighting draw with the Grecians to bring them back to Kenilworth Road for a replay.

In front of the biggest home crowd of the season of 7,078, the Town put in a brave performance on a mud heap of a pitch and eventually won through 2-0 to set up a second round tie at Bristol Rovers. The victory, however came at a great cost due to the over physical play of Exeter. Alan Slough, Ray Whittaker and Tony Read were all injured during the game and several more players suffered bumps, strains and bruises.

As the replay took place on a Thursday evening, Allan Brown had little chance to get players fit before the Saturday where the Town were due to play at bottom placed Lincoln.



It was therefore a patched up side of walking wounded that took to the field at

Sincil Bank on what was to become the blackest day in the club's history. With Lincoln bottom and the Town just above them, to lose was extremely worrying but to go down 1-8 was absolutely disastrous. The Hatters were simply overpowered by an Imps side that could not believe its good fortune to be playing against such a tired, unfit and ultimately demoralised side.

This time the directors realised that Brown was trying to manage with both arms tied behind his back and immediately made some money available to him. He wasted no time in spending it when he enticed no nonsense defender, Max Dougan, away from Leicester in exchange for a princely £7,000.

Dougan, who was an ex-Scottish amateur international, had difficulty in winning a regular place in the Leicester defence such was the form of Ian King and John Sjoberg and jumped at the chance of a move and made his debut in the Town's next game, at Kenilworth Road against Chesterfield.

Even though the Town had been hit for eight the previous week a respectable crowd of

5,096 turned up on a miserable afternoon to see the new man who did not disappoint as he helped hold the Town defence together.

The Hatters took the lead after 19 minutes through Whittaker and then saw Riddick leave a muddy mark on the crossbar with a brave header, but were pegged back when ex-Luton forward Billy Stark levelled on the stroke of half

Rioch then headed the Town back into the lead on the hour only for Stark to level once more shortly afterwards. It was left to 19 year old Rioch to make the game safe when he expertly slid the ball past Spireites goalkeeper John Osborne to seal a truly important victory.

"I like Dougan. He will do us a power of good." said manager Brown afterwards, and so it proved as the Town gradually edged their way up the table.

By the time of the return with Chesterfield, on the penultimate Saturday of the campaign, the Town were safe and managed to pick up their sixth away point of the season in a 0-0 draw. The trials and tribulations of the previous November and December were now, thankfully, distant memories!



OUR first red card of the season led to the Town falling apart at Layer Road, with skipper Marvin Johnson among others acknowledging that the team's performance was probably the worst we have seen this season. There could be few complaints about our eighth away defeat of the season, and the continued enigma of a team that can play well against top sides and struggle against lower ones.

But one man was complaining: Efe Sodje, who became the first Town man to be sent off this season. Referee Lee Cable, of Woking, adjudged that he handled a 34th-minute shot, awarded a penalty, and dismissed Sodje for denying a goalscoring opportunity.

The defender, just establishing himself in the team, was horrified. "It was not a handball. The player struck the shot and it hit my chest," he said.

But he still had to go, and with him went Town hopes in a game which until then looked as though it were heading for a 0-0 draw. We reorganised to play with a back four, with Stuart Fraser and Matthew Taylor dropping back alongside Johnson and Julian Watts, but the four-man defence was nowhere near as solid as the three-man variety. The attack, with Tony Thorpe replacing the sick Stuart Douglas, was shot-shy.

David Greene did his old mates a favour by smashing the penalty onto and over the bar, but Colchester scored early in the second half, and from then on were the only team in it.

Lennie Lawrence was not happy with the red card decision, nor with a few others made by the ref, but was more concerned with the build-up. Jason Dozzell was allowed to get to the by-line and cut back a pass for Tresor Lua Lua (our Tresor Kandol's cousin) to get in the only worthwhile shot of the game until then. The Town had coped comfortably with early threats, although Matthew Spring had to clear a header by Greene off the line.

We saw little of the Town attack, and for entertainment the game was no Christmas cracker, but the home fans were not bothered by that as Colchester were allowed to walk all over

us after the break. Greene was one of three former Town men who enjoyed the evening more than we did, Aaron Skelton and Gavin Johnson being the others.

Johnson's cross led to a lay-off by Dozzell for the first goal, three minutes after the break, and we never looked like getting back into contention.

"The sending-off changed the whole course of the game," said the Town manager. "I am not saying we would have won - the defending was very, very poor, the worst we have seen this season. But the goals were not down to us having ten men - we had enough bodies in defence at the time, but the defending against crosses was poor. It was a classic Second Division match against a side battling to stay up. If we're not careful, it will be us battling..."







OH WELL, at least we got further in the FA Cup than Manchester United and Watford. But the danger as we go into Christmas and the New Year is that unless we go on a good run in the league our season will fizzle out long

before it should.

The switch of FA Cup schedules, putting the third round into December instead of the traditional first Saturday of January, has left a lot of clubs in a similar position, but the Second Division will have at least one club in round five after the fourth round is played on January 8 because Wrexham have been drawn at home to Cambridge.

And while we mutter about concentrating on the league now, we can console ourselves with the knowledge that we did a little better than the average Second Division club in the FA Cup. Some of the top teams were dumped out before us: Brentford, Bristol Rovers, Millwall, Notts County, Stoke, Chesterfield and Colchester were all beaten in the first round.

Millwall's response to defeat at Hartlepool was to embark on a major success run, starting with a win over us, and they have shot up the table with six victories on the bounce.

By contrast Chesterfield, today's visitors, were beaten at home by non-league Enfield, and their Second Division record since then is six defeats and two draws - 0-0 at home to Oxford and 1-1 at Brentford and they have netted only one goal in their last five outings.

Second Division teams who went out in the second round of the cup were Bournemouth, Bury and Wycombe.

Definitely through to the fourth round are Burnley, Cambridge, Preston and Wrexham. Postponed replays will decide if they are to be joined by Oxford, at home to Nottingham Forest, and Gillingham, at home to Walsall.

In Tuesday's cup-ties, Cardiff were unluckily beaten 1-0 at Bolton and Reading lost away to Third Division Plymouth, Mick Heathcote netting the only goal two minutes from time.
