Royals left reeling as King George saves the Hatters

A PAIR of majestic Liam George finishes shot down the Royals at Kenilworth Road on Saturday.

The Hatters leading scorer rediscovered his goalscoring touch to send Reading crashing to a 3-1 defeat in a real 'Princes against Paupers' clash.

Reading may have spent a king's ransom on assembling their squad but it was Luton, with only Phil Gray in Saturday's 16 having cost a penny in transfer fees, who completed a league double over their Berkshire rivals.

George, with just one goal from his previous 13 games, struck on 70 and 90 minutes to take his tally to 14 for the season.

Julian Watts had earlier given the Hatters a firsthalf lead before ex-Spurs midfielder Darren Caskey levelled the scores just past the hour.

Saturday's result was the seventh time Lennie Lawrence's men have scored three or more goals at

Kenilworth Road this season and only Burnley have now scored as many goals at home in the division.

Another plus was that the impressive win came in the absence of six players with Andre Scarlett and Gavin McGowan both making their first starts of the season.

Pint-sized Scarlett was Lawrence's unlikely choice to fill the problematic central-midfield spot and responded adequately while McGowan patrolled the left flank well in place of Matthew Taylor.

Phil Gray's return to the side as a target man and the fulcrum of attacking moves is also freeing Stuart Douglas and George to concentrate on their strengths.

Douglas was unlucky not to open the scoring when his looping header produced an athletic fingertip save from Reading keeper

Scott Howie on 12 minutes.
Watts broke the deadlock soon after with his first goal for Luton

Reading enjoyed a lot of first-half possession but their confidence in front of goal is shocking with Nicky Forster and Keith Scott both guilty of squandering good chances.

Moments later, Gray finished of the move of the match, involving both George and Douglas, before seeing his effort controversially ruled out for handball.

But the Hatters did not have to wait too long to go back in front, George displaying immaculate control to bring down Douglas' cross in the six-yard box before swivelling to fire past Howie

Abbey then saved his side by thwarting Scott in another one-onone but as Reading pushed up desperate to avoid a club record 13th game without a win, gaps app eared at the back and Andrew Fotiadis, Douglas and Scarlett were all guilty of dreadful final passes on the break.

George finally put the game beyond doubt, surviving offside appeals to coolly shoot past Howie after a through ball from Gray, who finished the game in midfield.
