Three-mendous Hatters cure travel sickness

LUTON TOWN stayed on the play-off trail with a first league victory on their travels since October.

Goals from Julian Watts, Matthew Spring and Liam George sealed a 3-1 win at Cardiff City on Sunday.

A 1-0 victory at Oxford was the last time Lennie Lawrence's men had taken three away points but, on the evidence of this display, they should not have to wait as long for their next three.

The Hatters are currently hitting the back of the net for fun and Saturday's three-goal blast took their tally to 14 in five games during a goal-happy January. All three efforts were clinical finishes with the Cardiff defence mercilessly punished for minor mistakes.

Victory was also achieved in the absence of seven first team players, with sick captain Marvin Johnson joining the already unavailable Taylor, McLaren, Locke, White, Sodje and McIndoe. Stuart Fraser filled in for Johnson as the left-sided defender in a back three and looked comfortable throughout.

In fact, the Hatters defence, also boasting the unflappable Gary Doherty and dependable Watts, held firm until the final minute of the game when sub Jason Bowen grabbed a neat consolation.

Aside from that aberration, Lawrence and his defenders had clearly done their homework and coped admirably with the aerial bombardment provided by longthrow expert Andy Legg.

At the other end, Luton were ruthless in front of goal. Watts scored his second in as many games on 22 minutes when George tricked his marker on the left-wing and sent in an excellent cross that Doherty headed across goal.

A hesitant home defence was punished by Watts who headed into an unguarded net.

The Hatters doubled their advantage on the stroke of half-time when Spring collected Gray's clever lay-off and used his strength to muscle his way into the box and hold off home challenges before
