

Defender Matt Barrass has been outstanding. He was a different class against Colchester's highly rated striker Lua Lua.


There's also Danny Swailes. His goal last Saturday was unbelievable and thoroughly deserved. And Martyn Forrest, who got a run in the side over Christmas.


The award for the most vocal team of the night had to go to the Tower FM team.

A View From The South Stand

Good afternoon ladies and gentlemen and welcome to Gigg Lane for this afternoon's match with our friends from Luton Town Football Club.

We, naturally, extend a warm Lancastrian welcome to all concerned with the Hatters especially the supporters who have travelled up from Bedfordshire. We hope that you enjoy your visit to Gigg Lane this afternoon - result apart - and that you all have a safe trip back to Bedfordshire.

The Hatters, currently lying in tenth place, no doubt still harbour play off ambitions in the same manner as the Shakers and under the vastly experienced managerial eye of Lennie Lawrence they will probably make it. They have a number of highly talented youngsters in the side such as Matthew Spring and Liam George but they did have something of a hiccup last Saturday when they lost 2-1 at Kenilworth Road to AFC Bournemouth. I'm sure that we are capable of taking all three points today but the Hatters will be no pushovers.

Looking back over our last couple of games and against Bristol City the best you could say is that we should have taken all three points against a fairly poor side in a very dull match. We had by far the better chances and better finishing would have given us the win. My man of the match was Steve Redmond who was as solid as a rock at the heart of the defence. On then to Layer Road, which is now, surely, amongst the worst grounds in the country from a visiting supporters point of view, and our third away win of the season. Despite going a goal down after quarter of a hour we still dominated the game and played some terrific football which was great to see. Danny Swailes, who was my man of the match, capped another outstanding display with a brilliant header for the equaliser. The highly impressive Lutel James put the Shakers in front from close range and Paul Barnes. who ran Danny Swailes close for my man of the match vote, notched the third with a class finish and the Shakers wound their way home from the depths of darkest Essex with our first double of the season and three valuable points.

There has been much talk in the media recently about the number of foreign players, mainly in the Premier (Greed is Good) League it has to be said, and I have got to say that I think there should be a reduction as, in the long run it will be detrimental to the future of British football if the game continues to rely heavily on foreign imports. Of course, under European law an EC


citizen can work anywhere in any member state without the need for a work permit and whilst, in theory, this is a good idea in footballing terms I think it means with the increasing clamour for success and the huge financial rewards available that home grown talent, unless absolutely outstanding, is being ignored in favour of players from the continent and elsewhere. There is an enormous amount of young talent in this country and whilst the likes of Joe Cole, Jody Morris, Stephen Gerrard et al are gradually pushing through into their respective first teams I can't help thinking that there should be many more but the number of expensive imports are denying them the opportunity. I think that there should be a limit of six EC nationals and by EC I mean those born within member states and not those players from South America who take advantage of liberal passport laws in Spain and Portugal to circumvent the rules - to each club and one non EC national per club. There are those who will argue the likes of Bergkamp, Zola, Stam and Ginola improve the game in this country and I agree, they do and our young players can learn much from the very best but they have got to have the opportunity to demonstrate what they have learned. It is the increasing numbers of mediocre players coming to the game in this country that I find disturbing and perhaps the fact that clubs demand ridiculous fees for mediocre players from this country and that said mediocre players demand extortionate wages has something to do with it. Indeed, the Chairman of Swindon Town who went in to administration last week reckons that the blame lies squarely with spiralling wages and whilst I find it hard to blame players for taking home what, to most supporters, are huge salaries (admit it if someone offered you the chance to up your salary by fifty or a hundred percent you take it wouldn't you? I know I would!) I think that the powers that be need to take a long hard look at the way the game is going in this country before we end with more clubs going down the same road as Swindon Town.and finally Esther. Welsby Rovers? Wembley? Major Cup final? There is hope for us all yet. Still, I reckon the only way Welsby's heroes will get into Europe is if John Aldridge writes the winning Eurovision Song contest entry. Envious? Moi? Mais non, but I'll be the one in the pub cheering on Leicester City. As always. Enjoy the match. Enjoy YOUR football. C'mon Bury! (and the Foxes!)

SUPPORTERS of Luton Town have every reason to enjoy their football this season whatever the results. Until 15 hours before the season kicked off, there was a danger that the Hatters would be thrown out of the Football League. The summer has been traumatic at a club which came into this decade as one of the best in the country - they had ten glorious years in the old First Division, now the Premiership, and won the Littlewoods Cup, now the Worthington Cup, by beating Arsenal in the 1988 final

Alas, tradition and past glory counts for little in today's big money. Missing the first season of the Premiership was bad enough, through relegation a few months before it was set up. Further relegation, to Division

Two, was another blow to the club and its fans

But even those disappointments started to look insignificant towards the end of last season, when boardroom politics became knowledge. A dispute escalated until just before deadline day last March director and major creditor Cliff Bassett called in receivers, who were still running the club until the day before the league season kicked off. The club was put up for sale.

Manager Lennie Lawrence, who had guided the Hatters to 12th place in the Second Division last season, was left hamstrung by the impasse. The receiver's job was to draw in money, not spend it, and although Lawrence was allowed to do some deals, the greater pressure was to raise cash in the transfer market.

One of the most experienced bosses in the business, with a CV including running Charlton on a shoestring at the top level, Lawrence had raised £1.4 million under receivership by the time goalkeeper Kelvin Davis went to Wimbledon. Davis left for £600,000, with a further £200,000 to come on appearances, and possibly more if the Dons sell Davis on. Remarkably, having endured the toughest period of management in a career stretching back two decades, the manager agreed to stay in the job, where the term hot seat really was relevant.

"I like this little club, and we have got some super people on the staff," he explained.

The Football League became involved as Luton staggered towards the new season still in receivership, and threatened to them throw out if they did not sort out a deal by midnight on the night of August 6, 15 hours before the new season kicked off. The threat did the trick: after five months under the cloud of receivership, the club's majority shareholding passed to director and long-time supporter Cliff Rassett

One of the oldest football clubs in England - they were the first club in the south to turn professional - Luton Town have seen just about everything in football in more than a century of ups and downs.

The club was formed in 1885 when Luton Wanderers and Luton Excelsior decided to merge, at a time when Luton was on the threshold of a boom thanks to the growth of the hat making trade, which was to give the club its nickname. As the town became bigger and more prosperous so did the Football Club, and it started paying its players in 1891. Three years later Luton were founder members of the Southern League, and in 1897 joined the Football League's Second Division

But patchy results and rising costs led to the Club resigning to return to the Southern League. And there Luton stayed until 1920, when the Southern League became Division Three of the Football League. The Hatters have been in the Football League ever since.

Town narrowly missed promotion from Division Three South in 1936, when centre forward Joe Payne terrorised opposing defences. A wing-half, his first appearance as leader of the attack was near unbelievable: he scored ten goals in a 12-0 win over Bristol Rovers at Kenilworth Road. It is a record, which is likely to stand forever.

The following year Luton did win promotion, with Payne netting 55 league goals. Luton were comfortable in the Second Division and in 1955 won promotion to the top division - what is now the Premiership. It ended in tears after six years. Luton reached the FA Cup final in 1959, but lost 2-1 to Nottingham Forest. It was a team getting too old together, and a slump set in. Within 12 months Luton were relegated, and by the sixth anniversary of their only FA Cup final appearance Luton had turnibled all the way down to the old Fourth Division.

In 1967 they were perilously close to having to ask for re-election to stay in the league. That indignity was narrowly avoided, and a new board injected new life and money into the club. The Division Four championship was won in 1968 and two years later another promotion was clinched.

to the Second Division, with Malcolm Macdonald's goals a major factor. In 1974 Luton made history again; they won promotion back to the First Division to become the first club ever to drop from top to bottom of the League and then complete the revival in the opposite direction. That joy ended with relegation after only one season, but in 1982, led by David Pleat. Luton were back among the big boys again, despite operating on a shoestring in an antiquated ground. Miraculously Luton survived for ten seasons, with the first providing one of the game's classic showdowns. On the last day of the 1982/83 campaign Luton travelled to Maine Road needing a win to stay up and to condemn Manchester City to relegation. City had only to draw, and got to within four minutes of success. But then Raddy Antic, a Serb who had gone as a substitute, struck the winner, and David Pleat was forever famous after that for his televised victory jig of delight

Luton lost in the 1985 FA Cup semi-final to Everton, but in 1988 a major trophy was landed at last, when Arsenal were beaten 3-2 in the final of the Littlewoods Cup. Twelve months later Luton were at Wembley again to defend the trophy, but they lost to Nottlingham Forest, to revive memories for older supporters of the 1959 disappointment. Three years later, with Pleat back at the Club for a second spell in charge, Luton were relegated, missing the chance of being founder members of the Premiership. Pleat resigned for a second time in 1995 to go to Sheffield Wednesday, and youth coach Terry Westley was given his job at Kenilworth Road.

By mid-season Luton were in desperate trouble, and although new boss Lennie Lawrence produced a mini-revival, the Hatters went down again. They almost bounced straight back, but lost in the 1997 play-offs.

They are hoping to go one better this time although, like Bury, currently occupy a mid-table position.

Liam George is their hot-shot with 14 goals this season but there have been plenty of other players chipping in – Midfleider Matthew Spring, only 21, has scored eight times while Gary Doherty and Stuart Douglas have so far scored four apiece. Speaking before the midweek game against Stoke City, Luton had scored ten goals in four games but suffered a hiccup last week to their play off hopes when they were defeated 2-1 by Bournemouth.




Luton Town

Born Islington, 11-7-78

The goalkeeper and his manager agreed at the end of last season that Tanny needed a move to further his career. For two years he had been waiting in the wings, as understudy to England under-21 keeper Kelvin Davis, and for all his potential Abbey had few first-team chances. So he left Luton to join a club in Antwerp, but the deal went wrong. By the time he came back to England Luton had sold Davis to Wimbledon - the receivers thought £600,000 plus £200,000 more on appearances was too good to turn down. So Abbey returned to Kenilworth Road in the hope of becoming No one five years after joining the

Born Aylesbury, 24-9-79

Luton record to the start of this season: 8 appearances.



One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS boy in the summer of 1995, and graduated to the first team squad after a debut in the Auto Windscreens Shield in January 1999. By the end of the season he was a regular in the squad, but made only one start in the league, and came into this campaign looking for better than a regular place on the sub's bench

Luton record to the start of the season: 2 appearances.

ARY DOHERTY Born Donegal, 31-1-80

Big and brave, Doherty is a centre-half who can also operate as a centre forward. He played in central defence for the Luton team which won the South East Counties League Championship, last season. He became a

temporary striker to help an injury crisis, and did well enough to make the switch permanent. And he is making an impact on a bigger stage too: after being capped at youth level he has already been on the sub's bench for the Republic of Ireland Luton record to the start of the season; 35 appearances, 6 goals,

STUART DOUGLAS

Born London, 9-4-78

A real hotshot in youth and reserve team football, Douglas was a 17-year-old trainee when he made his league debut for Luton against Oldham in 1995, but had to battle to overcome injuries before winning a regular place in Luton's league side last season in which he played

Luton record to the start of this season: 75 appearances, 14 goals.

ANDREW FOTIADIS

Born Hitchin, 6-9-77

Another local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before being a full-time soccer professional. He won England Schools caps at under-15 and under-18 level, and developed a style to delight Luton fans and worry opposing defences, as an oldfashioned centre-forward, with good physique, power, and concentrated determination to score goals

Luton record to the start of the season; 61 appearances, 7 goals,

Born Edinburgh, 9-1-80

Stylish defender and skipper of the Luton youth team which ran away with the South East Countles League Championship last season. Reckoned by the Luton coaching staff to be an outstanding prospect, he was given his league debut against

Carlisle, in a 3-2 win, on the final day of the 1997/98 season and within a year he was competing hard with the redoubtable Mitchell Thomas for the left back spot. Luton record to the start of the season: 10 appearances.



Born Luton, 2-2-79

Full of pace and nimble footwork, striker George was well set a year ago to clinch a league place after impressing as a constant scorer in Luton's youth and reserve teams. A regular member of the Republic of Ireland squad that progressed to the European

youth championships final in the summer of 1998, George had made his league debut against Bristol City in September 1997, and started last season as an established first choice. But he broke a leg at Wigan a year ago and the season was nearly over by the time he had

Luton record to the start of the season: 18 appearances

Born Belfast, 2-10-68

Signed by Luton for the second time in Sentember 1997

the Northern Ireland striker hopes to get in a full season after being hit by a succession of injuries. He was in Spurs reserves when David Pleat, ex-boss at White Hart Lane, and then in his second spell as Luton manager, splashed out 275,000 for him in August 1991. Two years later he moved onto Premiership football with Sunderland, for £800,000 and after three years at Roker went to Nancy in France, and then Fortuna Sittard Holland. He

needed little encouragement to return to Kenilworth Road in exchange for £400,000 and having rediscovered his goal touch was recalled to the Northern Ireland squad in November Luton record to the start of this season: 62 appearances, 15 goals.

MARVIN JOHNSON

Born Wembley, 29-10-68

Longest-serving player at Kenilworth Road, Johnson is a versatile defender, normally a centre-half but capable of filling in on the flanks or in midfield. Johnson is starting his 12th season as a first-team regular at Luton, his only club. Injuries have been a proble but he has always bounced back and is now a fixture and skipper of the team he joined as a schoolboy.

GAVIN MCGOWAI

Born Blackheath, 16-1-76

A right back fighting for a Premiership place against very stiff competition at Arsenal, McGowan signed for Luton for the third time in June 1998. The first two were loan deals one in March 1997 ending prematurely through injury. He re-joined Luton on loan again for three months, at the start of the 1997/98 season. Lennie Lawrence rated him, but could not afford to make an offer, and was delighted to conclude a quick deal a year later when Arsenal offered the defender a free transfer

Born Edinburgh, 2-12-79

Made his debut for Luton's senior side when injuries hit three players above him in the pecking order for the wide left midfield slot. He joined Luton as a YTS boy after leaving school, and was part of their youth team, which won the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup in the 1997/98 season. He made his first team debut in the Worthington Cup first round victory over Oxford United a year ago

Luton record to the start of this season: 28 appearances, no goals

Born High Wycombe, 17-11-76

The midfielder was still a schoolboy when Luton realised that he had enough talent and strength to play regularly in their youth team. A YTS offer was a formality, and he was offered pro teams while still only 17. Forceful and always ready to back up attacks, he soon became a regular after a 1994 debut.

Luton record to the start of this season: 123 appearances, 2 goals.

Born Brent, London, 11-1-80

It was Roy of the Rovers story when the 18-year old made his league debut for Luton last October. Because of injuries he winger was on the sub's bench against Oldham, and got his chance with 20 minutes to go, with the score at 0-0. His trickery tempted an Oldhan player into a rash tackle which earned a red card, and Luton went onto win 2-0, with Scarlett netting the clincher in a 2-0 win.

Luton record to the start of this season: 8 appearances, 1 goal,

It was second time lucky for the defender and Luton Town when he signed at the start of this season, after declining to accept a new contract at Macclesfield, who had just been relegated back to Division Three. British, but qualifying for Nigeria, where he spent much of his boyhood, "Effy" came back to England in 1994 to try his luck in the Football League. Luton were interested, but then manager David Pleat advised the young hopeful to neighbouring Stevenage Borough, and then come back 12 months later. But Sodje did so well in the Conference that Stevenage declined to let him go. He helped Stevenage to the Conference Championship, and then moved to Macclesfield for 30,000, playing a major role as they came up from the Conference and won Third Division promotion in their first season. He signed a year's contract with Luton in August.

Born Harlow, 17-11-79



A competitive midfielder, Spring was a driving force in the Luton side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997 and it was no surprise when he called up for a league lebut, when still only 17, as a sub against Bristol City in September 1997. Last season was his best yet - he topped the Hatters' appearance list with 54 games, and scouts from the big clubs gathered in droves to watch him. Luton record to the start of this season: 67 appearances, 3

Born Oxford, 27-11-81

ership throughout the summ players had to be sold or given away to save money, while severe restrictions were imposed on new recruits. So once more Luton had to look at the young talent coming up through the ranks, and midfielder Taylor, though still only 17, was given his chance. Impressive performance in pre-

season friendlies saw him leap from youth team to league squad, and after helping Luton win the South East Counties championship last season he started this with a league debut on opening day, at Notts County

Signed on a months loan from Bristol City at the start of the season, and keen to get his career moving again after falling out of favour at Ashton Gate. Rotherham gave the defender his first taste of league football, and it was ambition achieved when he signed for the hometown club he supported, Sheffield Wednesday. Changes in managers have not helped his progress, Trevor Francis bought him for Wednesday, but new manager David Pleat sold him off to Leicester for 200,000 in 1996. Two years later he left Filbert Street as a Bosman, and John Ward signed him for Bristol City. Three months later, Ward was out, and soon afterwards so was Watts, with neither of the two City managers since Ward wanting to keep him, and Watts jumped at the chance of first-team football with Luton.

Born Darlington, 23-3-76

Lennie Lawrence went back to Middlesbrough, one of his old clubs, when an injury crisis robbed him of three of his back four in September 1997. Centre-half White was a prospect Lawrence knew well, Lennie had signed him as a 17-year-old at Ayresome Park. White was unable to force his way into Middlesbrough's Premiership squad after the advent of Bryan Robson and big-money signings, and grabbed the chance to rejoin Lawrence in a £40,000 transfer.

LANDRY ZAHANA-ONI.

Born Ivory Coast, 8-8-76

Signed by Lennie Lawrence in January 1999, from Bromley, of the Ryman Premier League Zahana-Oni had attracted the interest of several other league clubs with his abilities as an old-fashioned left winger. A French national, he had six years with Le Havre before crossing the Channel to try to make the grade in British football. He spent eight months at Stirling Albion before joining Bromley, and Luton paid £25,000, with more to follow depending on the players progress

Luton record to the start of this season: 8 appearances, no goals.

THE MANAGER - LENNIE LAWRENCE

Born Brighton, 14-12-47

With former youth coach Terry Westley struggling in his first experience as a manager, he and Luton Town reluctantly decided to part company as the Hatters slid to the bottom of Division One. Four months in the autumn of 1995 had seen £2 million spent, but only four matches won out of 22. Luton decided they needed an experienced hand on the tiller, and Lawrence fitted the bill perfectly. Perhaps more importantly, he knew about running clubs on shoestring budgets, having made his name by taking impoverished Charlton into what is now the Premiership, and keeping them there for four years, when they did not even have a home of their own

Lawrence was a non-league player, with Croyden, Carshalton and Sutton United. His managerial career started as assistant at Plymouth and then Lincoln. He went to Charlton as reserve team coach before landing the hot seat. He had been boss for nine years when he left Charlton in 1991 and took over Middlesbrough. He led them to promotion to the Premiership a year later, but they were relegated after only one season and was replaced by Bryan Robson. Bradford City offered the next opportunity, but he left after 18 months to return south. A few weeks later he became Luton's 21st manager. The survival task proved too much, with the December leeway too big a gap to close, but relegation was followed by a thrilling recovery.

In their first season back in Division Two, Luton were rarely out of the promotion frame, but it ended in disappointment, with play-off semi-final defeat against Crewe. A season of struggle followed, but Luton finished 12t, despite their traditional chronic

shortage of money, and it has been a difficult summer for the boss. The club went into receivership in the closing weeks of last season, and that left him helpless when he wanted to trade in the early summer transfer market.

The manager's record at Luton, to the start of this season: Played 194, won 70, drawn 52, and lost 72, goals for 250, goals against 235.

Born Harthill, 21-12-43

A Scotsman who is Luton Town through and through sounds like a contradiction, but John Moore has proved it over the four decades. He has never lost his Scottish accent, despite spending much more of his life in Luton than in the land of his birth. He first went to Kenilworth Road as a young player, signed from Motherwell in the summer of 1965. A nononsense centre-half, he was in the team, which saw Luton make a tremendous recovery after years of failure. In the old First Division for seven years until 1960, Luton had slumped all the way down to the Fourth when Moore arrived. By the time he left, in 1974, to see out his playing career with Northampton, Luton had become the first club ever to sink from top to bottom of the Football League, and then climb all the way back up again. Moore settled for part-time management with local teams in the Luton area before David Pleat took him into Luton Town for the second time, as coach to the reserve and youth teams, Pleat left Luton to go to Spurs in 1986, and Moore was promoted to succeed him And Moore made history: he guided Luton to seventh place in the First Division, now the Premiership, their best-ever-finishing place. But Moore found it all less than satisfying: a natural coach, and very much at home on the

training ground and in the dugout, he found other part's of the manager's job difficult. A diffident man, he disliked the up front demands put on managers by, for instance, radio, TV and the newspapers. So after one year of success, he walked away. Ray Harford, his assistant, became manager, and Moore declined offers to stay on as a coach, saying it would be unfair on Harford. But Moore was back in the coaches' room at Luton in January 1990, recruited by new manager Jim Ryan, who had been a playing colleague at Kenilworth Road in the seventies. And Moore has been at Luton ever since, specialising in coaching the younger players, but helping out with the first team as well.

COACH - TREVOR HARTLEY

Born Doncaster, 16-3-47

The wheel turned full circle when Hartley was appointed to the coaching staff at Kenilworth Road at the start of this season - it took him back to the club he first joined as a youth

coach in 1980. A player with West Ham and Bournemouth, Hartley was manager at Dean Court for a spell, and later coached in Singapore. David Pleat was the Luton manager who

Hartley to be youth coach, and within four years Hartley was Pleat's right-hand man. They went to Spurs, as manager and assistant, in the summer of 1986, and luckless Hartley was thrown out of work through no fault of his own after Pleat was sacked to allow Terry Venables to become Spurs boss, with his own coaching staff.

But with a good reputation secured, Hartley was in international demand and coached in the Far East, USA and Canada, and then for four years was part of the England set-up under Graham Taylor, before returning to league football at Sunderland. He rejoined Luton in the summer of 1998.

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SUPPORTING BURY FOOTBALL CLUB

Kenilworth**Road**



It is no secret that Luton Town Football Club has seemingly been trying abandon their traditional roots at Kenilworth Road and relocate to a new purpose built stadium for the past couple of decades, probably even longer. Despite valiant attempts to patch up the 95 year old ground, it is obvious to everyone that Kenilworth Road is a completely inappropriate location for a modern day football stadium. It is hemmed in on all four sides by either housing or a railway-line, probably more so than any current Football League ground. Finances have perhaps not allowed the Hatters to keep a new stadium at the top of their priorities over the past year or two - when their very existence has been threatened - but you can bet that it will become a priority once more when the club is back on an even keel. It is said that the site – previously known as lvy Road – was fairly congested even back in 1905, and the club has certainly paid a heavy price in recent times for the apparent lack of foresight by their Directors at the time.

The nearside of the photograph in particular demonstrates Kenilworth Road's lack of room, with the railway line and a main road running directly behind the ground, which prevents the Main Stand from running the full length of the pitch.

Instead, the stand – the central part of which dates back to the 1920s – runs only for three-quarters of the length of the pitch, with two lines of posts and a converted former paddock along the front, meaning that it does not provide the ideal vantage point.

To the right hand corner of the Main Stand on the photograph is the New Stand – so called because it was added in 1991. Raised up and set back, this stand is wedged right up against the railway line and adds an extra 700 seats to Kenilworth Road's capacity. These new seats probably offer the least restricted view in the ground. Opposite the Main Stand is one of the strangest stands at a Football League ground. A roof was first built along this side

in 1933 and for many years it was the preferred place for Luton fans to stand. Then in 1977, the club chose to convert this stand into seats holding around 1,500. Eight years later Luton's officials decided to remove those seats and replace them with executive Boxes capable of holding just 210 people, presumably being desperately short of room to incorporate this new source of revenue elsewhere in the ground.

Even so, it looked strange as Luton survived for several seasons in the top flight, with this sparsely populated stand being seem by millions each week on television.

With the seats coming out of the Bobbers

With the seats coming out of the Bobbers Stand, Luton then converted the Oak Road End of the ground (left hand side of photo) into seating for around 2,100. With a roof dating back to 1935, various posts and cramped seating, it is not the best of stands to say the least. The roof is a strange affair, being built in three steps, sloping up towards

the Main Stand side. And the entrance to the stand – which is now allocated to away supporters – is via turnstiles that are situated in the middle of a row of terraced houses, with first floor flats being sited above the actual turnstiles. Unique indeed!

To the right hand side of the photograph is the Kenilworth Road End, which for many, many years was an uncovered terrace. The large impressive looking roof was added in 1985 when it became the 'home end' after the fans were turfed out of the Bobbers Stand. Seats were added at the same time, with the stand holding around 2,500. Kenilworth Road doesn't even have sufficient room to house the traditional corner pylon floodlights, and instead has four sets of lights along the top of the Executive Boxes and three more on the Main Stand side.

Although Kenilworth Road once housed a record crowd of 30,069 for an FA Cup sixth round tie against Blackpool back in March 1959, the current capacity of the ground is now set at 9.975.



OnReflection

Bury v Luton Town **Division Two** February 24, 1962

Having seen his side lose their last four League games, Bury player-manager Bob Stokoe shuffled his squad yet again in an attempt to come up with the elusive winning formula. He opted, on this occasion, for the more experienced line up. From the last game, a 2-0 defeat at Rotherham United, out went Les Riggs, Tony Moulden, and 16-year-old striker

Back into the side came left winger Tony Bartley, having recovered from an ankle injury, inside forward Frank Beaumont and 32-year-old former Everton and Liverpool centre forward Dave Hickson.

Stokoe also released Brian Turner from defensive duties. pushing him up into a more creative midfield role. The boss himself had only returned to the side in the previous game after being injured at the beginning of October ironically at Kenilworth Road when Luton thrashed Bury 4-0.

The visitors had in their line up four players who has played for them in their 1959 2-1 FA Cup final defeat against Notts Forest, They were goalkeeper Ron Baynham, full back Brendan McNally and midfielders John Groves and David Pacey, who scored the Luton goal in the final. The full teams were:

BURY: Harker, Gallagher, Eastham, Turner, Stokoe, May, Calder, Beaumont, Hickson, Jackson, Bartley. LUTON: Baynham, McNally, Bramwell, Groves, Cope, Pacey, Fleming, Turner, McKechnie, Lowndes, Walden,. The referee was E Crawford of Doncaster.

Luton keeper Baynham was a busy man in the first half, saving well from a Hickson header and a Turner shot and generally keeping his side in the game.

He could do nothing but watch though in the 44th minute when left winter Bartley's fierce shot flew past him but hit the underside of the bar and bounced away to safety. Bury finally made the breakthrough their enterprise deserved on the hour when Hickson met a cross from Bartley with a downward header that fell at the feet of Beaumont who turned quickly and shot low and wide of

Hickson set up Beaumont again soon afterwards but this time fired the ball over the bar from close range when it should have been his second goal.

There was a shock for Bury on 82 minutes when from a corner by Harold Walden, Chris Harker, making just his fourth appearance in goal for the Shakers, came for the ball. He failed to collect and it fell to visiting right back McNally, who had earlier injured his shoulder and had been playing out the game on the wing, and the Luton player joyfully lashed in the equaliser.

Two minutes later before the disappointed home fans in the 6.123 crowd had a chance to start to shuffle towards the exits; Bury won a free kick on the right.

Brian Gallagher lifted the ball into the danger area and Hickson and Beaumont jumped with keeper Baynham, who

could not gather the ball. It dropped to the feet of Turner who poked the loose ball into the net from about five yards to restore Bury's lead which they comfortably held onto for the last six minutes.

ONE Year ago this week...In Division One, Bury lost 2-1 at Portsmouth whose goals came from Matt Robinson and Guy Whittingham. Bury sub Kemo Avdiu got a late consolation goal.....Luton were beaten at home 1-2 by Wrexham in Division Two. Gary Doherty scored their goal with Jake Edwards and Carl Griffiths on the mark for Wrexham.

TEN years ago this week...Bury lost 1-0 at Mansfield Town in Division Three to a Steve Wilkinson goal. Three days later the Shakers travelled to Springfield Park where they played out a goalless draw with Wigan Athletic...Luton, in Division One, won 2-1 at Wimbledon, with goals from Karl Nogan and lain Dowie, while Dennis Wise got the Dons goal.

TWENTY years ago this week... Bury lost 1-2 at home to Oxford United in Division Three. Jimmy McIlwraith got the Shakers goal. They then travelled to Anfield to play the mighty Liverpool in the FA Cup fifth round where two late strikes from super sub David Fairclough won the game 2-0 for Liverpool...Luton lost 2-1 at Oldham Athletic in Division Two. Vic Halom got both goals for the Latics with David Moss on the mark for the Hatters.



I would like all the disabled supporters to start thinking about who their player of the season will be. In the coming weeks, forms will be available for you to cast your yetes.






Saturday January 25 1975

Third Division Bury had reached the fourth round of the FA Cup after beating Second Division Millwall in a neutral second replay at The Hawthorns. In so doing, they became the only club in the Greater Manchester area still left in the competition with City, United and Bolton all making early exits and a bumper crowd of 16,623 turned up to see Bury take on Fourth Division runaway leaders Mansfield. After conceding an early goal, things looked bad for Bury, but this 71st minute strike from George Hamstead brought the Shakers level and raised hopes once more. It was the Stags who stole the tie five minutes from time though, with Colin Foster hitting the winner to disappoint the big crowd.

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The A-Z of Post War Shakers



ALAN TINSLEY

Born Fleetwood: 1.1.51

An inside-forward who started his career as an apprentice with Preston North End in January 1967 and turned professional with the Lilywhites upon becoming eighteen in January 1969. He made his Football League debut for PNE in 1969 but after just nine games and one goal for Preston, his opportunities dried up when Alan Ball Senior became Deepdale Manager. The

teenager then signed for the Shakers in August 1970, with a £6,000 fee changing hands.

The youngster played 29 games in a struggling Bury side during the 1970/71 season and he continued to be in and out of the side over the next three seasons. Alan was struck by illness though and entered hospital in December 1973 when it was confirmed that he had contracted Tuberculosis and, seriously ill, spent the next ten months overcoming the illness.

He fought his way back though and returned to the first team briefly during the 1974-75 season when he took his appearances for the Shakers up to 94 league games, and had scored 15 goals. In March 1975 he crossed the Atlantic to play on loan for Miami Toros –later known as Fort Lauderdale - but he was then given a free transfer by Bury in May 1975 and signed for non-league Mossley. He became player-manager of his hometown club Fleetwood in 1978, which was to be the beginning of a long and highly successful career in non-league management. He later managed Mossley, Lancaster City (several spells) and Blackpool Mechanics, amongst others.

GEOFF TONGE

Born Manchester: 5.5.42

An outside-right who started his playing career with non-league Droylsden, Geoff Tonge was just seventeen years old when he was snapped up by Shakers boss Dave Russell for the princely sum of £200 – plus a further £200 after the completion of ten Central League games.

Droylsden should also have picked up a further £200 after ten first team games, but unfortunately for both Tonge and Droylsden, he was never to reach that target with Bury.

Indeed his only first team opportunity for Bury came in a 1-1 draw at home to Grimsby Town in the final fixture of the 1959/60 season when he replaced Bill Calder in the number seven shirt. He then returned to Central League action throughout the 1960/61 season, unable to even get near contention as a consistent Shakers outfit sailed to the Division Three Championship.

In April 1961, it was perhaps not unexpected that Tonge should be handed a free transfer and although it is thought that the teenager then returned to the non-league game-probably with Droylsden once again- this has never been confirmed.



IAN TOWERS

Born Consett: 11.10.40
A former Durham County schoolboy, striker lan Towers joined Burnley as an amateur in July 1956, turning professional in October 1957.
He then remained at Turf Moor for a further nine years but had to wait until 27th April 1961 to make his Football League debut – in a 1-0 Clarets away win at Birmingham. He generally found his first team opportunities severely

restricted – 21 games during 1964-5 season being his best showing.

In all he played 44 League games for Burnley and scored 12 goals before moving on to Oldham Athletic for £20,000 on 1st January 1966.

Towers enjoyed a very successful time at Boundary Park, ending the 1965/6 (nine goals) and 1966/7 (27 goals) seasons as top scorer. In all, lan played 95 games for Oldham and scored 45 goals – a very good average indeed.

If Towers cut the ice at Division Three level, then he certainly seemed to struggle to make the leap up to Division Two when he signed for Bury for £10,000 in July 1968. The 5' 6" right winger largely failed to impress in a variety of forward positions during his three seasons at Gigg Lane and a lack of goals from Towers was a chief factor as the Shakers slipped from Division Two to Division Four during that time.

The Bury Times commented that he "continuously disappointed" and after 49 games and just seven goals, he was allowed to move in March 1971 on a free transfer to Cape Town FC in South Africa, where several ex-Shakers were playing at the time. He still lives in South Africa and runs a sports shop.



JACK TRAINER

Born Glasgow: 14.7.52 A no-nonsense hard-man central defender, Scotsman Trainer began his career playing in Ireland with Cork Hibernian before joining Halifax Town in August 1976.

His time at The Shay was to be the only settled period during the whole of Trainer's career as he remained in Yorkshire for three seasons and clocked up 105 games and five goals

for the Fourth Division club.

He then went playing in Hong Kong before returning to these shores in September 1980 at around the same time that Bury boss Jim Iley was still looking to solve the problematic centre-half position in the face of several injuries.

He was given a trial by lley and, on 11th October 1980 found himself somewhat unexpectedly named in the starting line-up for Bury's Fourth Division home game against Torquay United. That game proved to be Trainer's only League outing for the Shakers during a one month trial at Gigg Lane, but he opened the scoring that particular day against Torquay in a 3-0 win. He also later played for Bury in an Anglo-Scottish Cup game at

He also later played for Bury in an Anglo-Scottish Cup game at home to Airdrie, but was released in October and went back to Ireland playing for Waterford.

In Summer 1982 he was back in Lancashire when Rochdale offered him a short-term contract but after playing in the opening seven games of the 1982/3 season he was on his travels once again, signing for non-league Morecambe.



What has your season been like so far? It hasn't been too bad. Obviously there have been some big shake-ups with then manager Neil Warnock leaving, but the lads have all pulled together and we still have high hopes for this season.

Were you urprised when manager Neil Warnock left – as ou seem to have followed him around from lymouth, to Oldham, to Bury?

wouldn't say surprised, especially with the rowd reaction to him. For me, it was just a ase of getting on with it, it has happened efore.

ou now seem to be getting a airly regular run out in the eam?

es, last season was isappointing. After I signed, then Bury were in the First ivision, I seemed to spend nost of my time on the bench, thich is frustrating. This time I eem to be more or less a egular starter and of course nat helps. I would just like to acrease my goal tally for Bury.

/hat is your highest tally in ne season?

scored 19 for Plymouth and byiously you always want to


beat that. I have got six this season and want to increase it. It is frustrating we have been creating a lot of chances and just not putting them away but as long as we keep creating opportunities, there is always the chance of a goal. It's when we stop getting around the area that there could be a problem.

This is handed out for the worst person in training that morning and I am proud to say it is very very rare that I have had to wear it – in fact I don't think I have.


What games are you especially looking forward to in the second half of the season?

Lee Richardson's second half goal gave Bury a 1-1 Second Division draw at Luton Town five months ago. Bury were held to a goalless draw on Luton's last visit to Gigg Lane on September 21, 1996. Bury's last League win at home to Luton was 1-0 in August 1962 with a penalty by Derek Mayers, while the Hatters last triumphed here 3-1 in January 1970, with goals from Malcolm Macdonald (2) and Matt Tees.



TITLE TRIUMPH

Former Luton Town winger Rob Matthews made a significant contribution to Bury's 1996/97 Second Division title triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Notts County for £85,000 in March 1995. the ex-England Schoolboy international made 11 First Division appearances for Luton before being sold to York City for £90,000 in September 1995. He joined Bury for £100,000 in January 1996, and

helped to clinch promotion that season, scoring 11 goals in 74 League outings for the Shakers prior to joining Stockport County for £120,000 in November 1998.

LOAN SPELL

Former Bury left wing-back Brian Small had a loan spell at Luton town during their 1997/98 campaign. He moved to struggling Luton on loan from Bolton Wanderers in September 1997. The England under 21 international made 15 consecutive Second Division appearances while at Kenilworth Road. He joined Bury on a free transfer in January 1998 and helped the Shakers to consolidate their First Division status. scoring once in 18 League outings while at Gigg Lane before reuniting with Brian Little at Stoke City in July 1998.

Ace marksman Joe Payne's hat-trick plus a goal from Billy Redfern gave the following Luton Town team a thrilling 4-3 Second Division win over Bury. There were 4,689 at Gigg Lane on February 16, 1938: Joe Coen, Robert Carte, Bert Lutterloch, John Finlayson, Jack Nelson, Bill Fellowes, Charlie Ferguson, Billy Redfern, Joe Payne, Bert Dawes, George Stpehenson. The Shakers had triumphed 1-0 at Luton with a goal from George Bargh on their first-ever League visit to Kenilworth Road four months earlier.

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

Former Scottish international inside-forward Allan Brown achieved managerial success at both Luton Town and Bury.



Initially moving to Luton from Blackpool for £8,000 in February 1957, he was an FA Cup finalist in 1959 and netted 51 goals in 151 League outings for today's visitors prior to joining Portsmouth in March 1961. He rejoined Luton as manager for two years in November 1966, and plotted their 1967/68 Fourth Division title triumph. He was then manager of Bury from April 1972 until November 1973.

HIGH FIVES

Dave Massart's hat-trick, plus Harold Bodle's strike and Syd Owen's own goal, gave the following Bury team an exciting 5-2 Second Division win over Luton Town. This was in front of 17,651 at Gigg Lane on October 15, 1949; Don Clegg, Cyril Gairclough, George Griffiths, Harry Whitworth, Bill Griffiths, Les Bardsley, George Hazlett, Fred Worthington, Dave Massart, Harold Brodle, Alf Bellis. The Hatters had triumphed 5-2 at Bury in November 1938 with goals from Hugh Billington (2), George Stephenson 92) and Billy Redfern.



TOP-FLIGHT

One time Bury striker Steve Elliottt sampled top-flight soccer with Luton Town. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Preston North End in July 1984, he partnered Mark Stein in Luton's attack and scored three times in 12 First Division games proir to joining Walsall in a £150,000 exchange deal involving David Preece in December 1984. He joined Bury from Bolton Wanderers for £16,000 in

September 1988 and netted 11 goals in 31 League outings before moving to Rochdale in October 1989.

Two goals by Ken Plant plus others from Les Hart and Bill Griffiths gave the following Bury team a 4-1 Second Division win over Luton Town in front of 13, 468 at Gigg Lane on October 28, 1950. They were: Lew Goram, Cyril Fairclough, George Griffiths, Les Hart, Bill Griffiths, Les Bardsley, George Hazlett, Johnny Walton, Ken Plant, Harold Brodle, Joe Steele. The Hatters triumphed 4-2 against Bury in the return fixture at Kenilworth Road five months later with goals from Bernard Moore (2), Charlie Watkins and Pat McAuley.

The likes of Stewart Imlach and Danny Wilson have also played for both clubs.

Stewart Imlach

SCOTTISH outside-left Stewart Imlach was a young member of John McNeil's squad at Gigg Lane. Initially with Lossiemouth, he joined Bury in August 1952 and made his league debut at Plymouth Argyle a month later. He quickly impressed and featured prominently in successive relegation escapes, netting 14 goals in 71 Second Division games for the Shakers before moving to Derby County in an exchange deal involving Cecil Law and Norman Nielson in May 1954.

Sold to Nottingham Forest for 5,000 in July 1955, he was an FA Cup winner in 1959 and gained four Scottish International caps prior to joining Luton Town for 8,000 in June 1960.

He moved to Coventry City for a similar fee four months

ioined Crystal Palace in July 1962 and had

spells with Dover and Chelmsford City before returning to Palace as playercoach in February 1966. Subsequently trainer/coach at Notts County, Everton, Blackpool

and Bury, he now lives in Formby and worked

at Littlewoods Sports and Social Club in Liverpool until retiring in December 1996.

Danny Wilson


Highly-rated young midfielder Danny Wilson was everpresent for Bury in 1978/79.

Initially with home town Wigan Athletic, he joined Bury in September 1977 and made his League debut as substitute in that months 3-0 defeat at Cambridge United. He scored eight times in 90 Third Division games for the Shakers before being sold to Chesterfield for 100,000 in July 1980, helping to win the Anglo-Scottish Cup in 1980/81.

Moving to Nottingham Forest in an exchange deal involving Calvin Plummer and Steve Kendal in January 1983, he had a loan spell at Scunthorpe United prior to joining Brighton for 45,000 in December 1983. He gained the first of his 24 Northern Ireland Caps before being sold to Luton Town for 150,000 in July 1987 and scored in their 1988 League Cup Final triumph.

also playing in the 1989 final. Moving to Sheffield Wednesday

for 200,000 in August 1990, he starred in their 1990/91 promotion & League Cup' double' triumph. and was also an FA Cup & League Cup finalist in 1992/93. He joined Barnsley in August 1993 and was player-boss as they won promotion in 1996/97, returning to Sheffield Wednesday as manager in July 1998

In the meantime we have to be positive in the way we carry on the everyday running of Bury Football Club. We have to prove to would be investors that we all care enough to keep the club alive. This kind of unity will frighten off any person who thinks they can walk in and put bungalows on the ground. We have got to keep generating money and many supporters and people within the town are helping us to do that via Sponsorship, Advertising, Treasureline and our Appeal. There is no unique simple way to raise the money we need other than hard work. I do appreciate that £1000 and £150 is a lot of money to a lot of people but there are many other ways to help.

Watch out for fireworks in both Sheffield and Northwich!



Layer Road only seats 2000 and the capacity being no more than 6000, with the stands amounting to seven sheds. Other than that, without knowing the outcome of the match, we were in for a fantastic day and one of the best performances of the season.

Bury got off to a shaky start when conceding an early goal, although we could have taken the lead minutes earlier. The stand-in keeper Andy Walker fumbled Paul Reid's half-hit, tame shot, and Paul Barnes was foiled on the follow-up by an opposing defender.

Shortly before the goal Colchester came close with two fine headers from central defender David Greene to the dismay of the home fans being cleared off the line.

The ball rebounded to Lutel James who clinically finished from the edge of the six-yard box to give Bury the lead.

It didn't take long for Lutel to destroy the U's defence again as he skilfully skipped past two players and laid it off to Paul Barness. Barnesy took his time but sealed a vital win with a calmly slotted shot beyond the reach of Walker. It was the lively Lutel James who could have put the game beyond Colchester's reach and were it not for a magnificent save from the otherwise awful Andy Walker, Lutel would have bagged his second of the game and cap a fine performance.

When the final whistle went it was amazing to know that such a fine performance had been rewarded with a great victory. In contrast to the previous week against Bristol City, we had managed to turn our domination and possession into goals. Maybe this is the inspiring result that Bury need to push for a respectable position. Bury Supporters Association contacted Tamworth FC and Staffordshire Police after the throwing of a firework by the home fans in the FA Cup tie at Tamworth. These were the replies.

Staffordshire Police

Thank you for your letter dated November 16, concerning the unfortunate incident at Tamworth v Bury game on October 20, 1999. I was on duty that day and was called into the ground following the incident that happened shortly after 3pm. The letter outlines three issues, which have been raised by one of your supporters:

- The club will, hopefully answer the first point of whether or not the fans were searched prior to entry. The gates were all staffed by club stewards and as you know that are independent of the police service.
- 2. I have spoken to the two female officers on duty that day inside the ground, both of who were present at the incident. The firework being thrown obviously caused a lot of anger and confusion and had a potential for getting out of control. The officers have stated they tried to calm the situation and asked for assistance, which was provided within a short space of time. At no time did anyone point out the perpetrator to the officers or else action would have been taken, the only comments made to the officers were that people could have been injured.
- 3. This is hopefully a one-off incident and there are normally no problems at the ground. This day obviously attracted a lot of locals who are not normally Tamworth supporters but came for the occasion. Thankfully no one was injured that day and we hope that everyone enjoyed the day despite the unfortunate incident.
- I hope this has answered your questions and if I can be of anymore assistance please do not hesitate to contact me.

On behalf of Tamworth Football Club, will you please accept my apologies for the delay in replaying to your letter dated Nov 16, 1999. We were waiting for a copy of the Police's reply before we

replied but it appears they have not sent us a courtesy copy therefore I will try and answer your queries.

It is not physically possible to search everyone entering the ground. We have no history of any problems, it was the time of year when fireworks are readily available and idiots in any walk of life will attempt to spoil things for the majority.

I am sure that none of our supporters were searched when entering Gigg Lane and that wherever you have travelled you have not seen a 100 per cent search of every supporter entering the ground. We were horrified by the incident and have attempted to put names to the idiot who threw the firework. We have obtained one name but all we can do is ensure that they are unable to purchase a ticket in the future. The major problem is with fireworks being readily available to purchase and it is one for the politicians to resolve. I, for one, would vote for anyone who would abolish the sale of fireworks

We are unable to answer this point as it was only a matter that only the police can answer. However we are concerned that no arrests were made especially when the offenders were clearly identified. The stewards would have been over-ruled by the Police and by their comments afterwards they were clearly frustrated no action had been taken.

The day went perfectly except for this one unfortunate incident and without the gift of hindsight it was a problem which was not foreseen. We have learned that in the event of another segregated crowd around Bonfire Night, that we will be increasing the space between the supporters and that stewards will be located at the rear of our Terracing stand.

We hope that the lady involved in the incident has overcome the shock and that she is still enjoying watching Bury Football Club. Again apologies for the delay in replying.

DIVINE INTERVENTION

When my wife was first a teacher in Salford, one of the school cleaners used to say to her every year at Christmas: "It will be your husbands busy time coming up soon Ms Kelly." She is not alone in thinking Vicars only work on Sundays and at Christmas. Reality of course is rather different.

One of my tasks as football club chaplain here at Bury has been to meet the players on a Friday after training. Putting faces and personalities to the people seen out on the pitch has been very exciting for me, a Bury fan since I was five. It has also been fascinating to see how a football club operates as an organisation and as a group of people.

We supporters sometimes forget that the club is a place of work, a place where people's livelihood is at stake, so some of the issues which arise in any area of work can happen here too.

One of the things that has struck me at Bury is both what long hours and hard work is demanded of a whole host of people just to keep the show on the road.

Like Vicars and churches, football clubs don't shut down over Christmas, in fact they are even busier. A whole host of people, in the offices, in the financial department, in ground maintenance and in the club laundry had to work long and hard over the holiday period just gone in order for you to watch a game or two.

For you and I as supporters, seeing a misplaced pass or an easy chance in front of goal missed often sees us vent our frustration on the player concerned. As a South Stand regular I too have my favourite players and the ones who frustrate me beyond measure. It's easy to forget that behind the numbers on the shirts are real

men with many of the day to day problems that you and I have. I have been struck as to how precarious being a professional footballer can be. For many of us it may be a dream profession but the reality is that it has its ups and downs like any job.

The disruption to relationships and family life; you could be transferred to Torquay tomorrow! The knowledge that one injury could finish it all. Football is often about opinions, so who decides which of two equally talented youngsters gets the pro contract, and what happens to the youngster who doesn't? This need for security goes on throughout a player's career. After all your next contract might be your last one, and Bury like most clubs don't pay Premiership wages or anything like it, so what do you do at the end of your next contract?

I'll probably still vent my anger at the next woeful pass or missed sitter from six yards, but it has been a real privilege to meet many of the people whose hard work and dedication give you and I such enjoyment (and frustration) come 3'o clock on Saturday. The world of professional football is tough and reality is often grittier and less comfortable than dreams.

I would like to thank the Directors, all the club staff at Gigg Lane and the management training staff and players for their unfailing courtesy in their dealings with me as the new club chaplain. Sometimes having a Vicar around the place can seem a bit unreal, but real life is never easy and not always straightforward, sometimes there is more to it meets the eye!
