WITH a third of this season to play, the Town are already looking ahead to the 2000/01 campaign, with manager Lennie Lawrence keen to retain the services of four of his few experienced players, Marvin Johnson, Phil Gray, Adam Locke and Julian Watts.

He wants them all to stay, and new contracts will be offered. If they decline they will all be due free transfers. First the manager is talking to 29-year-old Locke about extending his current deal through to the summer. The midfielder has had to settle for short-term deals since arriving from Bristol City on a free transfer five months ago, but is now established in the side.

Next month sees the transfer deadline, when Town fans traditionally get nervous about the future, but at least this time new chairman Cliff Bassett has said there will be no enforced sales so long as the club is in with a chance of a play-off place. He has also said he thinks that if we do not make it this year, there must be a good chance of success next season.

By then the manager will know who is staying and who is leaving, and can look for fresh blood, particularly the "Bosmans" who are likely to be on the market in the summer, perhaps 600 or more.

Meanwhile, the latest young player to come through and make a big impression in league football has been given a well-deserved reward - Emmerson Boyce, 20, has accepted an improved contract running through to the summer of 2002.

ALAN White has turned down the chance to join Colchester, preferring to stay where he is happy and try to gain a regular place in the Town side. The decision was left to him: Lennie Lawrence was ready to accept a bid of around £35,000 for a player who cost a touch more when he followed the manager from Middlesbrough to Kenilworth Road in September 1977. If the centre-half wanted to stay, said Lawrence, that was fine by Luton Town.

White had a month on loan at Colchester just before Christmas, and became an instant hit at Layer Road. But after talking to them about what they were offering, he has decided not to accept their offer to return. An early result was his recall to the Town side at Bury, where he was used as a defensive midfielder - "Not my ideal position, but I'll play anywhere just to get a game," he said.

"Luton have been brilliant to me in letting me talk to Colchester because I could not be guaranteed first team football here. I had a word with them, but could not agree terms, so I want to stay here and hopefully help us get into the play-offs. If I can play some small part in that, then I will. I'll play anywhere - in goal if they want me to!"

That ambition may affect White's future. He will be 24 in March, and if he leaves the Town at the end of the season it would be on a free transfer. He might then have a couple of options - Colchester, if they are still interested, and possibly his home town club Darlington, who are looking good for a play-off place at least in Division Three.

But he said: "At the moment I have no desire to leave Luton, so long as I am playing and involved in the team. I have my own house, and have settled really well. The gaffer says if I want to stay there will be a contract for me. If we get promoted I might well want to stay and be a squad player. But if we stay in the Second Division then I will have to look and think if I will get a game. If not then perhaps I will have to go somewhere else, but at the moment I have no desire to do that.

"We think a play-off place is possible, especially with our home form. If we can pull our away results around, then we are capable of doing it easily - we are better than any team in this division on our day."

CENTRAL defender James Ayres, who has been on the fringe of the first team squad, and played in the Auto Windscreens Shield game at Oxford, has gone to Stevenage to further his football education in the Nationwide Conference. He has gone on a month's loan initially, with the Town manager making it very clear that it is not a move to sell the centre-half who skippered the youth team to the South East Counties League championship a year ago.

Born in Luton, the 19-year-old is seen as one of the outstanding young prospects at Kenilworth Road. He earned good reports in making his debut for Stevenage on Saturday in their 2-0 win at Woking.

SUPPORTERS who remember Don Givens as a flying winger who supplied much of the ammunition to Malcolm Macdonald in the early 70s will wish him luck in his latest job. He has just left Arsenal's academy staff to become coach to the Irish under-21 squad. He was already an Irish international when he joined the Town in the summer of 1970 from Manchester United, in a package deal that also brought Jim Ryan and Ken Goodeve. After two years he went on to QPR, Birmingham and then Switzerland, where he ended his playing career and began coaching.

ANOTHER old friend was in the stand to see the Town play at Bury - Danny Bergara, youth coach at Kenilworth Road in the mid-seventies. A colourful coaching and managing career took him on to Sheffield United with Harry Haslam, and then Rochdale, Stockport, Sheffield Wednesday, Rotherham and Doncaster. He is working for his old mate David Pleat, scouting for Spurs in the North of England, and sends his best wishes to all who remember him from his five years at Luton.

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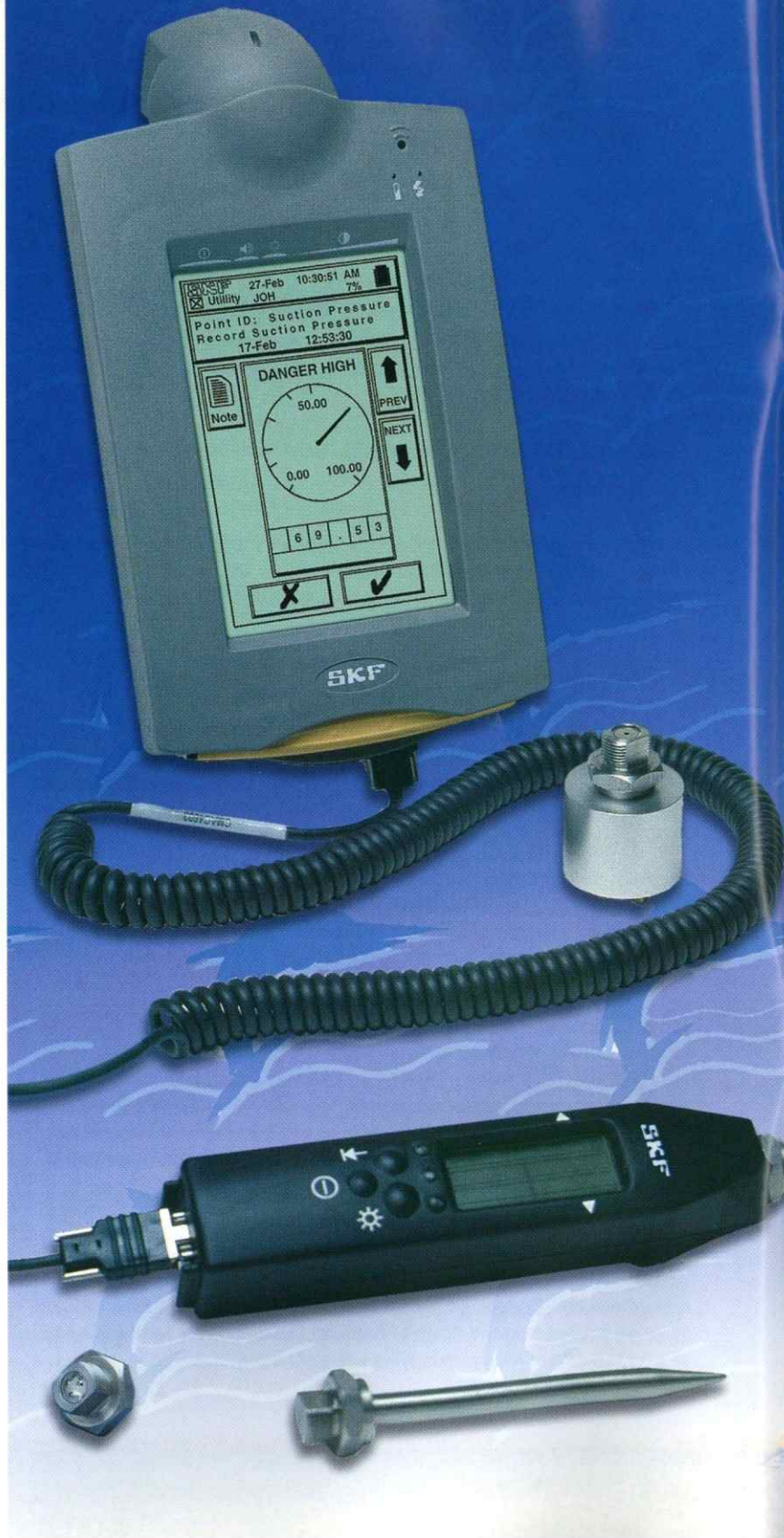
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The Manager

OUR LAST two performances have seen contrasting fortunes, with the latest in a series of exciting home games, with the obvious exception of Bournemouth, producing a stirring second half and victory snatched against Stoke. The manner of it, and the difficulty of it, matched anything we have achieved in the league this season.

The players put in a tremendous effort to get the better of Stoke in both penalty areas after being unlucky to be a goal down at half time.

It buoyed up our confidence for the trip to Bury, where we were presented with a different set of problems, circumstances, and eventually result. It can be a difficult scenario when you get three games in seven days, and a heavy pitch and strong wind did nothing to help our cause.

We battled well, and I would not criticise the players for a defeat that was harsh. Two or three were finding it difficult to maintain the tempo and style we had shown against Stoke. I decided to rest a couple, and alter the system slightly, and it looked a good move at half time.

The first goal is always important, doubly so away from home, and trebly so when you are fielding only two forwards.

We started the second half well until Bury got a goal out of nothing, forcing us to chase the game, and we did that reasonably well. We created two or three chances, but did not take them. I don't criticise strikers or midfielders for that - it was the first time for a while that we had failed to score.

Then came a blatant and deliberate handball which was ignored by the referee. Ball striking hand is always a matter open to debate and conjecture. But this was clear cut. It affected Adam Locke's balance and his ability to strike the ball. The defender slid in and moved it with his hand, and in full view of the referee. It was hard to take, knowing that we should have had a penalty and the chance to take a point. We deserved a draw - we certainly did not deserve to lose.

A draw would have kept the momentum going, and the Bury result means that today's game takes on greater importance. Bristol Rovers are having a very good season, despite limited resources, and I expect them to be in the play-offs at the very least. They have strength, organisation, and goal-power in the shape of Jason Roberts and Jamie Cureton, especially on the break.

We have seen it for ourselves in three games already this season, so we know what to expect. We need to recapture the form we showed against Stoke to maintain our outside chance of a top six finish, and the two consecutive home games starting today will have a major bearing on our hopes. We need four points at least from today and next Saturday, with six the target. If we lose today or against Brentford, it will be extremely difficult to achieve our ambitions.

As always, it calls for a big effort on and off the pitch alike, and backing from the terraces is as important as ever. And finally, thanks to all of you who went to Gigg Lane - we share your disappointment at the result, and will do everything possible to put it right today.

Captain's Log

WE CAME home from Bury puzzling about a result which we still think was unjust as well as unlucky. It was another case of us being up one day, down the next, in terms of matches.

The home defeat against Bournemouth was a nasty shock, and that made us all the more determined to put things right in the next game, against Stoke. I think you will agree that we did - our second half performance was one to remember.

Memories of the Bournemouth game ensured that we got moving right from the early stages against Stoke, and although we were behind at half time we all felt we could still win it. We have confidence in our ability to score goals, and that was one of the occasions when we knew that if we could just get one, another one or two would follow, and so it proved, thanks to a good team performance and Tippy Gray's eye for a chance. In the end we could have won by a bigger margin, and everyone was pleased at the way we had dealt with a top six team.

And so to Bury, and having redressed matters in the midweek game and got back on track, it all went wrong at Gigg Lane. We paid for missing the best chances and being caught out when Bury produced their only worthwhile shot on goal and scored. I was too far away to judge the strength of our penalty appeals late on, but everyone who was close to it was incensed that the referee missed a clear handball when Adam Locke was bearing down on the goal.

If we were Manchester United I suppose we would have mobbed the ref and got our pictures on the back pages of the papers! Instead, we tend to have a quick moan - well in Tippy's case quite a long one - and then get on with the game. The fact is that footballers know the referee will not change his mind, giving or rejecting penalties, and over a season things tend to balance out. We were given a lucky penalty at Stoke, but as things have turned out I wish that one had not been given and that the ref had got it right at Bury.

The fact that the home goalkeeper took the man of the match award tells its own story about our overall performance. Alan White came in to do a defensive job in midfield, and for a long time it looked as though we would get at least a point out of a classic away performance - keep it tight at the back, and wait for the chance to strike on the break. On the day, we got it half right, and although the goal was very well struck we were only too well aware that the chance arose after we gave the ball away in midfield.

We have worked hard to become harder to beat away from home, and since the turn of the year are doing reasonably well in that respect. Conceding three goals at Cambridge and Colchester was a shock to the system, and we can't afford to do that again if we are to have a chance of breaking into the top six.

After the Bournemouth match, we were in the right frame of mind to bounce back, as we did against Stoke. Now we have to do it all over again after the Bury result and we are ready to redress the balance once more, this time at the expense of Bristol Rovers.

I suspect this will be our toughest test at Kenilworth Road since Preston were here, and having played Rovers three times already this season we have a good idea of what to expect. They were deserving winners in the Worthington Cup at Kenilworth Road way back in early August, but we have made a lot of progress since then. We drew at their place in the second leg, and were done 3-0 in the league in November, so today we owe it to ourselves, as well as to the supporters, to even things up with another home victory.

We know the menace of Jason Roberts and Jamie Cureton, but we too have a bit of goal power in the team, and I expect that this afternoon we will be reverting to three forwards. We can pack a bit of a punch as well, and we are all looking forward to testing ourselves against a good team, and giving you the right result.

Treatment Room

Clive Goodyear



I WENT to Southend on Wednesday night to see the reserves in action, with a particular interest in how Paul McLaren got on. He had played for an hour a week earlier, at Barnet,

and at Roots Hall he came through a full 90 minutes, with a good goal a welcome bonus. His dislocated toe problems seem to be behind him, and his performance, in terms of fitness, was a big improvement on his first game. He was running a lot easier, and looked much more comfortable.

He is not yet ready for a return to the first team, but is making very good progress. Early next week he will go to a rehabilitation clinic in London for a bio-mechanical examination, which may result in a modification to his football boot to clear up the problem.

Like many players, McLaren tends to run on the outside of his foot, and this injury has exaggerated that. It can cause problems to the lower leg, and to the lower back, and the purpose of next week's trip to London will be to have a full examination and assessment.

The answer might well be to have a special boot insole made, shaped to his foot to give it extra support. Lots of players wear them to cope with various conditions, usually in connection with legs or backs. The insoles help them to run by reducing the discomfort.

I expect that McLaren will need at least one more reserve game to get back to full fitness, but I am very pleased with the way things are going, and with the way he got through the game at Southend, where the pitch became quite hard as frost started to set in.

Michael McIndoe completed the 90 minutes as well, and being a very fit young man, sailed through, proving that there is nothing wrong with his general fitness.

Landry Zahana-Oni is now our only player unable to train, but he too is doing well after a minor cartilage operation. He should be ready to start jogging in a few days, and then perhaps in a fortnight or so we can step up the schedule gradually to something like full training.

All in all, it is good to see the treatment room under very little pressure (touch wood!), and perhaps now it can be disclosed that Julian Watts was near to missing the home match against Stoke. He had an ankle injury earlier this season which caused a little discomfort and pain, but not enough to stop him playing.

The day before the Stoke game, he went over on the ankle during training, and it rapidly became very swollen. At the time I doubted if he would recover in time to play a league match the following evening, but we worked on him for the rest of that day, and overnight the swelling disappeared. He underwent a stringent fitness test on the day of the game, replicating all the running, stopping, jumping and twisting he would expect to do during a match. He came through with flying colours, and was able to declare himself fit and comfortable, and in the event played well in the win over Stoke. I really enjoyed watching that match!

The trip to Bury was a disappointment in terms of the result, but thankfully we picked up no further injuries, so the boss has got his wish of ever-more competition for places from a very fit squad.

IF YOU were at the Bournemouth game, you will know that a safety exercise was conducted at the end of the match, and my thanks to everyone who co-operated. Leaflets from the Luton Borough

Council Safety Advisory Group chairman Robin Holder were distributed at the following game, against Stoke, which went into details about how and why the exercise was carried out.

That asked for any comments or observations to be sent to the Group at the Town Hall, and some have come into my office, and my thanks to all who had constructive comments to make.

The club had no warning before the day that the exercise was to take place, to ensure that our resources and personnel were thoroughly tested - the first they knew of it was during the half-time interval. That was to ensure that it was treated as though it were a genuine emergency.

We know it inconvenienced a lot of people, but the vast majority seemed to understand what it was all about, and why it was happening. It was something that needed to be done, not just to comply with our safety certificate, but also for the good of everyone who comes to football at Kenilworth Road.

We have had a de-brief, with all the agencies involved, and from it we have learned some valuable lessons.

No-one wants a real emergency to happen in this or any other football stadium, but if it did, it is imperative that we are prepared to deal with it. The fire and rescue services and the police were also involved, testing their procedures.

If you were annoyed at the inconvenience, sorry, but it was unavoidable, and for everyone's benefit. As Mr Holder said in his statement afterwards: "Spectator involvement was considered essential in order to truly test the emergency plans devised on the day. Valuable experience was gained, and lessons learned from this exercise will be of enormous

benefit to the club in developing their future emergency evacuation plans."

Fortunately, the charity collectors that day had already done their work, and on behalf of the Hearing Dogs for the Deaf thanks to all who supported their bucket collection. It raised £529.29, which was an excellent result, and the collectors tell me that Happy Harry did his bit to help.

On the subject of thanks to fans, I would like to pass on the appreciation of various student groups and individuals who use the football club when they are carrying out surveys and questionnaires. They usually get a good response, so thank-you if you are one who has taken a little time to help them. As a club, we are pleased to strengthen our links with the local community, students included.

I mentioned a couple of weeks ago that we are already working on next season's arrangements, and I am now able to confirm that there will be a pre-season friendly at Kenilworth Road. It will be on Monday August 7, when we will entertain Wimbledon, kick-off 7.45pm. We are looking at possible away fixtures as well, but there are no definite arrangements made yet.

I hope to be able to give you another date for your diaries shortly, for an Open Day at the end of the season, when Kenilworth Road will welcome all supporters to come in and have a look round. We are organising it in conjunction with the official Luton Town Supporters Club. The date cannot be fixed at present - we are still hoping that our league season will be extended by a couple of weeks because of the play-offs!

Hatters On Card

IN THE early 1990s there was a host of football "trading card" series on offer from various companies, usually sold in sealed packets of six. They normally featured entire first-team squads of clubs in the top division of the Football League, which meant that full sets could consist of up to 500 cards.

As the Town were then members of the First Division, now the Premiership, they figured prominently in these productions, such as a set of "Shooting Stars" issued by Merlin Publishing in 1991.

Card No. 130 featured Lars Elstrup, Luton's most expensive signing. It was reported that the Town paid around £850,000 to bring in the Danish international striker from OB Odense in August 1989, although there was talk at one time of Raphael Meade going in the opposite direction in part-exchange.

Elstrup was 26 when he came to Luton as the owner of 12 Danish caps. He made his league debut as a sub against eventual champions Liverpool at Kenilworth Road in August, and came off the bench for the following match, at QPR. Both were 0-0 draws. His full debut was against Charlton at Kenilworth Road, when he saw Danny Wilson's penalty give us the only goal of the game.

Although Elstrup scored five times against Mansfield in a two-legged Littlewoods Cup tie, it was not until the end of October that he scored his first league goal, in a 1-1 draw at Millwall.

He struggled to find his form, and further disappointment came on Boxing Day, when he limped off injured in a 1-1 draw with Nottingham Forest at Kenilworth Road. A torn cartilage needed surgery, which meant he did not start another match that season.

Fortunately, despite his absence, the Town just

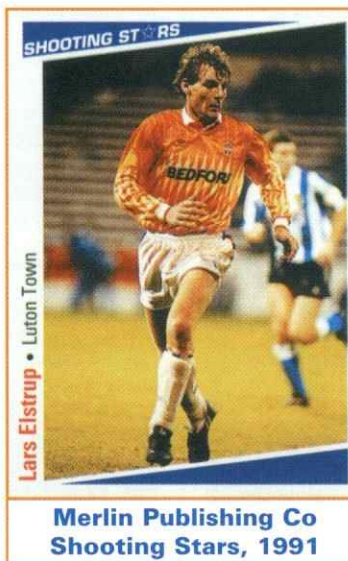
managed to hang on to their top-flight status, and in the following season Elstrup at last found some consistency, missing only one game in the 1990/91 campaign. He scored some valuable goals, reaching double figures by Christmas, including a hat-trick in a memorable 3-1 away win at Norwich in September. But after scoring twice in a 3-1 FA Cup victory against Sheffield United in January, the goals suddenly dried up. But he headed one that was priceless - his 18th of the season and our second against Derby County on the final day in a 2-0 win that ensured safety from relegation yet again.

However, before the next season kicked off Elstrup decided that he wanted to go back to Denmark, and threatened to retire if he did not get his way. He announced he was going anyway, and would play as an amateur if he could not have a transfer. The Town were forced to sell him back to Odense for a cut-price fee, reported to be around £250,000.

On his day Elstrup was strong, fast and skillful - not many forwards beat Des Walker for pace as he did to score against Forest in December 1990 - but most of us felt that we had not got full value overall from his transfer.

The last most of us saw of him was in Denmark's victorious Euro 92 side in Sweden. After that he faded from the scene, reportedly retiring through injury and joining a religious sect in Denmark.

Apart from Elstrup, there are 11 other "Shooting Star" Hatters to look out for in this set, including David Beaumont, Mark Pembroke, John Dreyer, Sean Farrell and Jason Rees, and they can be easily obtained for around 50p each from most leading cigarette card dealers.

**IAN HOLLOWAY
(PLAYER/MANAGER)**

Ian is now in his third spell with his hometown club, having made his senior debut in April 1981. Joined Wimbledon for a £35,000 fee in July 1985 and nine months later, Brentford paid £25,000 to take him to Griffin Park. Had a loan spell at Torquay before the then Rovers manager, Gerry Francis, brought him back to the club in August 1987. The influential midfielder helped Rovers to the 1998/99 play-off final and one year later, was a vital member of the side that clinched the Third Division Championship and reached Wembley for the first time, where they lost to Tranmere in the Leyland Daf Cup. Francis left to take charge of Q.P.R. in 1991 and one of his first signings for the London side was Holloway, for a fee of £230,000. Ian went on to make 147 appearances at the highest level before being given the

opportunity to rejoin Rovers, as player/manager, in May 1996. Although he has said that it is his intention to end his playing career, the fact that he enjoys the involvement as a player so much and remains one of the fittest members of the squad means it is unlikely that he has pulled on a Rovers shirt for the last time.

GARY PENRICE (PLAYER/COACH)

Gary is now back at the club where his career began. He first signed for Rovers, as a part-time professional, in 1983, though it was January 1985 before he made his senior debut. Watford paid £500,000 to take him to Vicarage Road in November 1989 and in March 1991, he moved to Aston Villa for a £1m fee. He was on the move again just seven months later, this time to Q.P.R., where he renewed acquaintances with Francis and his former team mate, Ian Holloway. He was to spend a second spell with Watford before rejoining Rovers in the summer of 1997.

GARRY THOMPSON (COACH)

Garry is the latest recruit to the backroom staff, having joined the club from Northampton in January 1999. His playing career took in nine clubs including Coventry, West Bromwich Albion, Sheffield Wednesday and Q.P.R., where he was a team mate of Ian Holloway and Gary Penrice. He spent just over three years assisting Ian Atkins at Northampton prior to joining Rovers.

VITALIJS ASTAFJEVS (MIDFIELD)

Rovers had to fight to secure the signature of the most capped player in Latvian history. Astafjevs, who is the current skipper of his national side, was originally refused a work permit. However, the Department of Employment eventually granted one after a successful appeal by the club and he made his league debut as a substitute against Wrexham last month. The left-sided midfielder, strong in the tackle and with an eye for goal, is expected to be a key figure for the remainder of the campaign.



JAMIE CURETON (FORWARD)

A Bristolian who was on Southampton's books as a youngster, though he joined Norwich as a trainee and graduated to the pro ranks at Carrow Road. Scored 6 goals in 29 league appearances for The Canaries and also spent a brief spell on loan at Bournemouth. Returned to Bristol to sign for Rovers, initially on loan, in September 1996 and his strike rate of 4 goals in 6 appearances led to the move being made permanent, with a fee of £250,000 changing hands. The only player to have appeared in all Rovers first team fixtures last season, Jamie is an exciting player who enjoys taking on opponents as well as hitting the back of the net.

NATHAN ELLINGTON (FORWARD)

A number of Premiership clubs expressed an interest in signing Nathan from Ryman League side Walton and Hersham, before manager Ian Holloway persuaded the then 17 year old to join Rovers in February 1999. A highly rated striker who topped the scoring charts for the non-league sides trophy winning youth team in 1997/98, Nathan is also an accomplished athlete, having competed in the high jump, long jump and 100 and 200 metre events as a junior.

DAVID HILLIER (MIDFIELD)

David graduated through the ranks at Highbury and broke into Arsenal's first team during 1990/91, when he also won an England U-21 cap. In 1996, after eight years and 104 league appearances for The Gunners, he moved to Portsmouth for a fee of £250,000, and eventually followed former Pompey team mates Andy Thomson and Robbie Pethick to The Memorial Stadium, in February 1998.

LEE JONES (GOALKEEPER)

A change of club certainly worked wonders for Lee Jones, as he quickly established himself as Rovers' first choice goalkeeper. He joined Swansea as a youngster, but was released before being given a first team opportunity. He played in Welsh non-league football before rejoining The Swans from AFC Rhonda. However, he was understudy to the experienced Roger Freestone and first team chances were limited. He spent a month on loan with Rovers before joining on a permanent basis in March 1998.

STEPHEN FOSTER (DEFENCE)

Joined his hometown club, Mansfield, as a schoolboy and signed a pro contract for them after two years as a trainee. He left Mansfield to team up with his former boss, George Foster, at Telford and gained a reputation as one of the finest central defenders in Conference Football. Signed for Woking for a fee of £9,000 in October 1996. His final appearance for them was at Wembley the following May, as he finished on the winning side in the FA Umbro Trophy. Three days later, he signed for Rovers.



STEPHANE LEONI (DEFENCE)

First came to Rovers attention via his agent, during the summer of 1998. Joined on trial, and later signed a two year pro contract. Born in Metz, he had previously spent his entire career with his hometown club and has over 30 international caps to his name, having represented his country at every age level, from schoolboy through to U-21 level.

RONNIE MAUGE (MIDFIELD)

Although he began his career as a trainee with Charlton, it was another London club Fulham, that

gave Ronnie his first taste of league football. He has since made over 100 league appearances for Bury, and more recently, Plymouth Argyle. He signed a two year deal with Rovers on 1 July 1999.

MICHAEL MEAKER (MIDFIELD)

Another Rovers player with Q.P.R. connections, Michael spent just over a year as a youth team player with Rangers before being offered his first pro contract. He won two Welsh U-21 caps and also played in a Welsh "B" international. He moved to Reading in the summer of 1995 and was valued at £250,000 in an exchange deal with Simon Osborne. Remained with the Berkshire club for three years and on his release, his former Q.P.R. team mates, Ian Holloway and Gary Penrice persuaded him to sign a three year deal with Rovers.

ROBBIE PETHICK (DEFENCE)

Served his apprenticeship with Plymouth, but was released without being offered a pro contract. For the next five years, played non-league football for Saltash and, later, Weymouth before Jim Smith signed him for Portsmouth in October 1993. Made some 200 first team appearances during his time at

Fratton Park, but found himself out of favour midway through last season and eventually followed his former Pompey team mate, Andy.

NIGEL PIERRE (FORWARD)

A twenty year old striker from Trinidad, Nigel signed for the the Rovers on 7th February. He already has four full international caps for Trinidad and Tobago to his name, as well as a host of youth international honours.

DAVID PRITCHARD (DEFENCE)

Dave joined Rovers for a £20,000 fee, from Telford United, in February 1994. Prior to that, he was with West Bromwich Albion. He quickly became a firm favourite with Rovers fans and made the right back position his own. During the 1997/98 season, demonstrated his versatility by playing a number of games in the left back berth and won a Welsh B cap.

JASON ROBERTS (FORWARD)

Joined Wolves for a fee of £250,000 from non-league Hayes in the Autumn of 1997. However, strong competition for places at Molineux saw him sent out on loan to Torquay and Bristol City before

the end of the 1997/98 campaign. Signed for Rovers two days before the start of last season. His partnership with Jamie Cureton last season yielded a total of 52 goals in all competitions, with Jason netting 23 of them. Has ben capped by Grenada.



Robert Trees

ROBERT TREES (MIDFIELD)

Graduated through the ranks at Old Trafford, where he earned his first pro contract. Was unable to make the breakthrough into the first team and he joined Rovers in the summer of 1998.

ANDY THOMSON (DEFENCE)

Swindon born Andy joined his hometown club straight from school and signed his first pro contract on completion of his time as a trainee. Made his first team debut in Swindon's last game in the Premiership at the end of the 1993/94 season. Moved to Portsmouth, for a £75,000 fee in December 1995 and signed for Rovers in January 15 1999.

ANDY TILLSON (DEFENCE)

Andy joined Grimsby from non-league Kettering in July 1988 and made over 100 league appearances for The Mariners before being transferred to Q.P.R. for a fee of £500,000 in December 1990. First team opportunities were limited at Loftus Road and in November 1992, he became Rovers record signing, as the club paid £370,000 to secure his signature. Led Rovers out at Wembley for the 1995 play-off final and continued to perform consistently at the heart of the defence over the next few seasons.

MARK WALTERS (MIDFIELD)

Mark joined Rovers, from Swindon in November. He began his career with Aston Villa and moved to Glasgow Rangers for a £500,000 fee in 1987. Whilst in Scotland, he won Premiership medals in 1989, 1990 and 1991 and picked up Scottish League Cup medals in 1989 and 1991. Liverpool paid £1.25m to secure his signature in 1991 and whilst at Anfield he won an FA Cup winners medal in 1992. Loan spells at Stoke and Wolves were followed by moves to Southampton and Swindon. Today's Carling Opta statistics compare two of the defensive strong men in opposition at Kenilworth Road - the Town's Julian Watts v Andy Tillson of Bristol Rovers

JULIAN Watts has proved to be a shrewd addition to the Hatters' ranks since his free transfer move from Bristol City following his loan spell during the summer.

Andy Tillson has been a rock for Rovers, forming a resilient defensive trio alongside Andy Thomson and Steve Foster that has allowed wing-backs Robbie Pethick and new signing Mark Walters to attack at every opportunity.

Watts is better in front of the opposition's goal, having scored twice to Tillson's single strike. Watts scored his first for the club against Reading in the 3-1 home win on the 22nd January and followed this with Luton's first against Cardiff at Ninian Park. He completed his electric spell in front of goal with an effort in Town's home fixture against Bournemouth - beating Nathan Abbey with an own goal!

Both centre backs have passed with a similar degree of accuracy and have dribbled out of defence with near perfect completion rates.

Tillson has attempted more tackles for the Pirates, and has been alert to cutting out the loose ball with 23 interceptions to his name. Due to Luton's mid-table position Watts has been under more pressure, hence his 89 blocks, while Tillson has been keen to get rid of the loose ball having made 50 more clearances than his opponent, despite his fewer minutes on the pitch.

The stats suggest that Watts and Tillson are similar sorts of players, but they will have to be at their best this afternoon as Watts has to cope with the dual threat of Jason Roberts and Jamie Cureton. Tillson may have to deal with Liam George, who will be keen to prove a point to Lennie Lawrence having been omitted from the starting line-up in the disappointing 1-0 defeat against Bury.

For once, the close season was quiet on the transfer front with the only departure of note that of much travelled striker Bob Hatton who never liked to dwell at one place for more than a couple of seasons. Pleat had no choice but to let him go but felt that he had achieved his major aim in getting the old master to train, coerce and coach his young pupil Brian Stein. Stein was now regarded as the finished article and ready to assume the goalscoring mantle aided by the fully fit again David Moss.

The season opened gloriously with a 2-1 win at West Ham where the home players had paraded the F.A.Cup, which they had won after beating Arsenal at Wembley a few short months before, before the kick-off. This was unfortunately to prove a false dawn as, by the middle of October, the Town had slipped to 19th position in the table following a string of less than convincing performances.

A gutsy display at Cambridge, where a 3-1 victory was achieved with only ten men including a makeshift goalkeeper when Jake Findlay retired hurt after the substitute had already been used, seemed to be the turning point in the Town's season.

Gradually the players managed to haul themselves up the table once more and by Christmas were challenging for a top three spot. A Boxing Day victory over fellow promotion chasers Chelsea at Kenilworth Road set the Town up nicely for a trip to Eastville to take on Bristol Rovers the following day.

The Pirates were struggling. A fire which destroyed the South Stand at Eastville in August

After the narrow miss of 1979/80 most Luton supporters were hoping that David Pleat's young side would go that little bit further in the new campaign and win promotion back to a top flight it had left six

meant that several early season games had to be switched to Ashton Gate and from then on the campaign went from bad to worse. Only one win had been achieved (against Watford!) by the time of the Town's visit and quite naturally the Rovers were propping up the rest of the division.

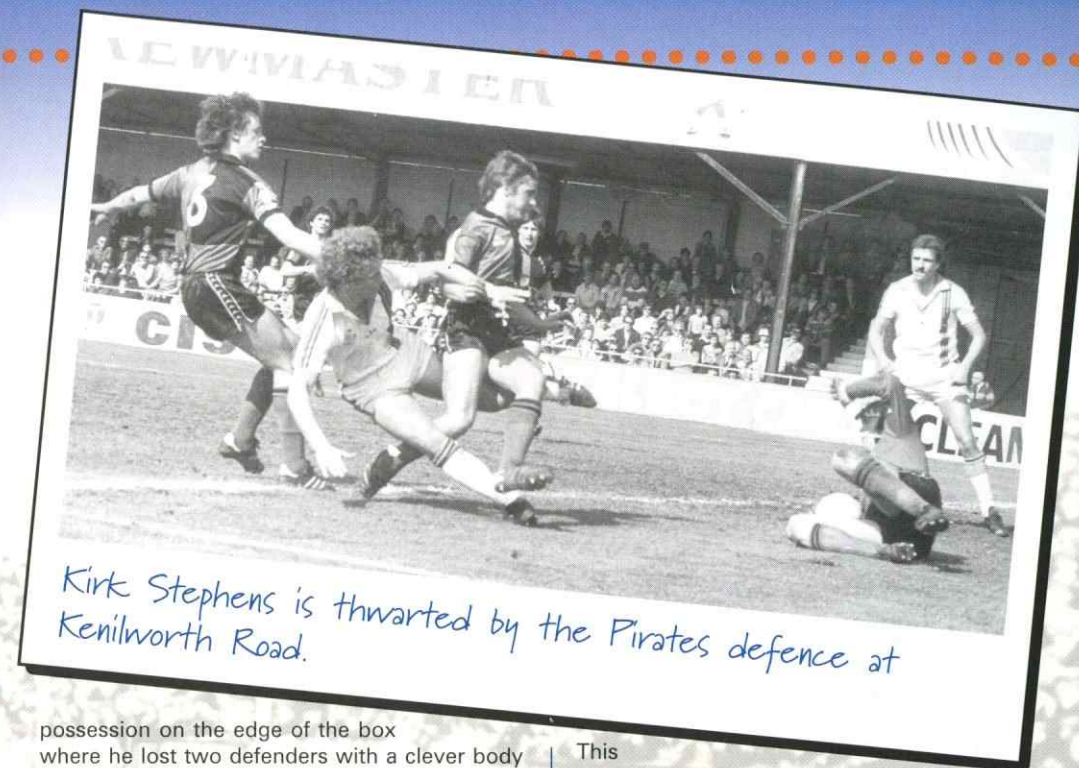
The Town had the worst possible start to the match when full-back, Kirk Stephens, carrying an ankle injury from the previous day's battle with Chelsea, limped off after only five minutes. Before the Hatters had chance to bring on substitute Raddy Antic, Rovers went into the lead when a cross from Mike Barrett was converted by Stewart Barrowclough.

With Antic on as substitute, midfield ballwinner Tony Grealish had to move to right-back and Luton supporters felt that with less bite in the middle of the park that area might be conceded to desperate opponents. They need not have worried as Alan West won an important tackle with Pirates' player-manager Terry Cooper and put Stein through to equalise.

Back came Rovers in the 17th minute with Barrett providing another cross with this time Gary Mabbutt converting, but from then on the Hatters seemed to get a firm hold of the game and settled down to play controlled football.

In the 35th minute a sweeping move which carried the ball the length of the pitch finished with Godfrey Ingram seeing his shot blocked only for Stein to rifle in the rebound. Two minutes later Ingram was fouled on the right flank and Ricky Hill made scoring look easy as he timed his forward run perfectly to sweep the Town into the lead from Moss's free-kick.

The Hatters seemed to stroll through the second half with Rovers offering little threat although Mal Donaghy did find time to wander upfield to hit the bar, as he had done in the first period. The game was eventually put completely beyond Rovers reach ten minutes from time when the Town strung together a dozen passes to make gentle progress down the left wing. Mark Aizlewood's final pass put Stein in

possession on the edge of the box where he lost two defenders with a clever body swerve before planting the ball into the corner of the net for the first hat-trick of his career.

By Easter the Town seemed to have failed in their bid to make a top three spot (no play-offs in those days) but a superb 3-0 home win over Q.P.R. had pushed them back into the frame. Easter had invariably proved to be the graveyard of the Town's ambitions in the past but surely they would be good enough to overcome a Bristol Rovers side which would be relegated if they suffered defeat at Kenilworth Road.

On a bone-hard, bumpy pitch the Town had difficulty in controlling the ball and struggled to put together the flowing movements that had been the trademark of their season. Only a flying save from Findlay prevented Paul Randall from putting Rovers into the lead and as the Town became more nervous and frustrated it took an eagle eyed referee, Michael Taylor, to break the deadlock.

As Stein tried to wriggle his way past Pirates' Mark Hughes in the area he tumbled over. At best it appeared obstruction but the official saw it as a penalty and although Moss watched his spot-kick saved by Tom McAllister it was ordered to be retaken as the goalkeeper had moved early.

This time Moss made no mistake, sending the keeper the wrong way, and the Town were on their way to very fortunate two points.

At the end Rovers' boss Terry Cooper said, 'We didn't look like a relegation team and Luton didn't look good enough for promotion.' This confirmed the thoughts of everyone in the Kenilworth Road crowd of 9,009!

Luton Town 2 Stoke City 1 (HT 0-1)

A MATCH we dare not lose was in danger of slipping away as one of the Second Division's top six teams went in at the interval a goal to the good, without looking the better side. Stoke had scored from one of their two first-half shots on target, and all they had to do was to hold on and we would be left 11 points adrift of the nearest play-off spot which Stoke held.

Three days earlier, we had been unable to overturn a half-time deficit against Bournemouth, but this time the Town came roaring back. Phil Gray struck twice to avenge the unlucky defeat a month previously at the Britannia Stadium.

The second half became one of the most rousing contests we have seen for some time, and left the visiting manager complaining that Stoke threw it away, having deserved a point at the very least. Gudjon Thordarson blamed his forwards, particularly for wasting a wonderful chance to make it 2-0, and his defence for slackness at the goals.

That did less than justice to the Town, who showed the spirit, pace, perseverance and sharpness to turn it round. Lennie Lawrence said: "We felt unfortunate to be one down at half time. We had controlled the game but weren't cute or bright enough in their box, which was our only criticism after the first 45 minutes.

"It was going to take a big physical effort, but the players provided it. The game became like a cup-tie, and I am well pleased with the players. It became end to end, and when that happens we usually win."

James O'Connor grabbed the lead with a quality goal after the Town's right flank was pierced by O'Connor's best mate and fellow Irish under-21 international Clive Clarke.

The Town had plenty of possession, without bringing goalkeeper Gavin Ward into serious action, but it was a different story after the break. Stoke were forced back, defending in numbers, and a close offside call rubbed out a header by Julian Watts which looked like a 54th-minute equaliser.

The turning point came on the hour: after a lot of Town pressure, Stoke broke crisply, and Paul Connor put Graham Kavanagh clear down the middle. A golden chance to make it 2-0 vanished as he shot wide with only Nathan Abbey between him and the target.

Two minutes later Gray forced his way through a

mass of bodies at the far post to head the equaliser from a far post corner by Matthew Taylor, and then it really was game on. Both sides needed to win, and both went for it. Frode Kippe put a header inches over the bar, and sub Kyle Lightbourne, scourge of the Town no matter what shirt he is wearing, was denied by Taylor's clearance off the line, hard up against a post.

The winner came on 78 minutes. Stoke defenders hesitated because they thought they heard a whistle in the build-up after Andrew Fotiadis closed down a clearance attempt to send perpetual motion man Stuart Douglas haring down the right wing. Douglas also stopped for a moment, but quickly resumed his chase for the ball, pulled it across the back line of the penalty area, and Gray clinically dispatched a low drive for the winner, his sixth goal of the season.

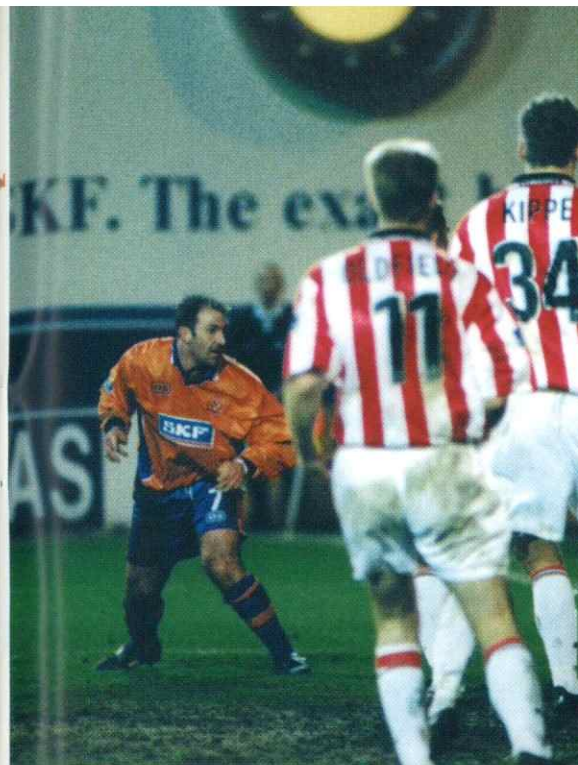

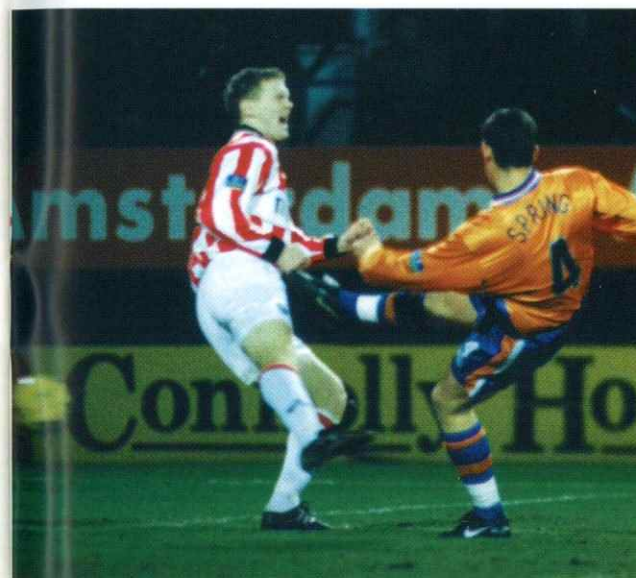

DEFEAT at Gigg Lane was hard to take for the Town and their supporters, on a day when the team deserved at least a point, and would have got it but for two crucial moments. The game's best chance went begging early on, and later a clear penalty that might have brought a deserved equaliser was not given.

So a tremendous amount of hard work, thoughtful football, and organised determination counted for nothing as Bury's exhausted players trooped off to the sounds of cheers of relief from their fans.

Their player-manager, Andy Preece, admitted that his men had been forced to give every last ounce of effort to get the result, and had heeded his demand to work till they dropped against a team for which he had much respect. We were left to curse our luck, and the astonishing mistake by referee Paul Robinson in an incident when even Preece expected a penalty to be awarded.

The Town set out their stall to do a specific job: Alan White was recalled for a midfield defensive job which he carried out perfectly. The plan was to ensure no goal was conceded, and then cash in when the inevitable dip in Bury's form occurred.

It was going smoothly for an hour, with Bury becoming more and more frustrated as the Town smothered their attacks, with Nathan Abbey making decent saves when he had to. Conditions were awful - a blustery icy wind, with rain, snow and sunshine chasing each other around Lancashire. The pitch, used for Rugby League as well as soccer, cut up, not helped by a kids' five-a-side tournament taking place on it before kick-off and during half time. For most of the first half Bury pressed forward without looking lethal, and the best opening of that 45 minutes was created by the Town. Phil Gray won the ball in midfield, and sent Stuart Douglas on a run for goal. He did well to muscle his way past Danny Swailes, but Paddy Kenny saved Bury in the one-on-one confrontation, saving with his leg as he spread himself.

Town counter-attacks always looked sharp and promising, and at the start of the second half Bury duly went through the bad patch Lennie Lawrence had forecast. But Kenny made one of

several good saves that earned him the man of the match award to frustrate Adam Locke, and just as the Town seemed to be ready to take full command, a mistake by Douglas in midfield gave Bury the chance to counter-attack. They showed how it should be done: Preece took the ball from Douglas, and set up Adrian Littlejohn for a run down the left wing. He evaded Gavin McGowan, who got the nod ahead of Emmerson Boyce in the Town side, and expertly curled a shot into the far corner of the net.

The Town responded by putting on the subs to revert to three attackers, with plenty of support to make it four or five on occasions.

Bury were on the ropes for the last 25 minutes, but 14 minutes from time they had an amazing let-off. Locke worked his way deep into their penalty area with the ball, and left defender Paul Williams turned inside out so comprehensively that he fell over. On the ground he scooped the ball away with his hand, and few could believe that referee Johnson, a school groundsman, had not seen it.

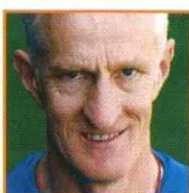

THE thrilling home win over Stoke used up the Town's game in hand over Brentford, and edged them above the Londoners in the Second Division table to ninth, on goal difference. But we dropped back to tenth on Saturday, because while we were losing at Bury Brentford were collecting a 1-1 draw at Cardiff, who dropped into the bottom four as a result.
