LENNIE Lawrence enjoyed the rare luxury of making his own decisions as transfer deadline day came and went with barely a whimper at Kenilworth Road, in welcome contrast to what had happened 12 months ago.

Then the manager watched helplessly as the receivers got rid of Sean Evers and Graham Alexander, the prelude to the summer disposals of Kelvin Davis, Chris Willmott and

This year the manager was under no pressure to sell, and would not have let anyone go unless the cash offers had

amounted to "silly money."

In the event, the Town had a quiet day, with only two deals concluded. The loan has been extended to the end of the season of Middlesbrough goalkeeper Ben Roberts, while Efe Sodje has left to join Colchester, on a free transfer.

He is expected to be back this afternoon, after an impressive debut at Layer Road a week ago in Colchester's 2-1 win over Gillingham. David Greene, formerly of Luton, is out of action because of a knee injury.

The agreement to keep Roberts at Kenilworth Road nearly hit a snag - at one stage Middlesbrough phoned to say he might be recalled. The Town had agreed to let him go if another club came in for him, but it didn't happen, and Roberts now has five weeks to consider his next career move.

Middlesbrough want him to sign a new contract. He can leave on a Bosman if he wants to. And his agent says several clubs would be interested in him if he did. The goalkeeper is leaving his options open, which means it suits him to stay here, and

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


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The Manager

LOOKING back at events since my last column, I have to say that within the club we are quite pleased with what has happened on and off the pitch alike. Transfer deadline day came and went without the

traditional Luton flurry of sales with or without the coaches' blessing, and that augurs well for our future.

I managed to extend the loan deal for Ben Roberts, which was to our mutual benefit as he considers his options at the end of the season. We also said good-bye to Efe Sodje, who accepted a free transfer move to Colchester United. Things did not work out for him here, but we wish him well with his new club. Fate brings him back to Kenilworth Road quickly, and I trust that this afternoon our attacking ensures he does not have a happy return!

On the pitch, the three games in a week, culminating with the victory at Chesterfield, brought a fair return for our efforts. We had deserved a point at Preston, but lost unluckily. The draw at home to Cambridge was about right from a very difficult game against a team battling for survival.

We enjoyed very little fortune in either of those games, and as we went to Chesterfield I sensed that the players were very determined to get a result. We opened very brightly, scoring within the first minute, and then moving into a threegoal lead by half-time. Although we failed to extend it in the second half, we had to be pleased with the overall performance.

We were by far the better team, despite the fact that Chesterfield have been active in the transfer market, and have invested £1.25million in players in the last 18 months. By contrast, we have been sellers rather than buyers, and our 16 on duty on Saturday cost just £40,000 in total, paid for one player.

We have moved up to 11th place in the table, and while it is disappointing that our hopes of a play-off finish have gone, players are under no illusions that the season is over already. It certainly is not. What happens between now and the final day of this season could well have a major bearing on decisions taken in the summer as we plan for next season.

The Second Division is splitting into three groups. Today's top eight are well clear of the pack, and three of them will be promoted, with Preston the probable champions. At the other end there is a bottom group of six and the relegated four will almost certainly come from within that half-dozen.

We are in the middle group, and if you had asked me last summer, while we were in receivership, if I would have taken that, the answer would have been a very loud "Yes please."

To reach 50 points by March has been no mean achievement. The play-off target may be beyond us, but we now have another goal: I want us to finish top of the middle group - in ninth place. We are one point adrift at the moment, and our remaining fixtures include matches against other "middling" sides, and testing fixtures against Wigan and Gillingham.

I suspect Colchester will be pleased to be in their current position - they have done an excellent job on slender resources and will no doubt fancy their chances today of a win to take them alongside us on 50 points. Their away record is better than ours, and they beat us comprehensively at Layer Road in December.

For our part, there are signs that we are coming out of the bad run that hit us in February. We must maintain the recent improvement, and look to finish the season with a flourish which can then be carried over to the start of the next campaign. Our home form needs to get back to what it was before Christmas, starting with today.

IT'S A long time since Luton Town got a victory at Chesterfield, but Saturday's success gave us a lot of pleasure. I expect supporters were wondering why we did not go on and hit five or six

goals after getting three in the first half, but it was no real surprise to us that Chesterfield came out after the interval in much more determined mood and their performance improved considerably.

I was surprised how little fight there was from them before the interval. Our very early goal seemed to knock the spirit right out of them, and to be honest we found it easy to hold them at the back, and to open them up at the front. I thought all three goals were excellent, for various reasons. Gary Doherty's was a perfect header from a perfect cross by Matty Taylor, Julian Watts deserved his goal for the way he kept charging on after leading a counter-attack and Liam George's strike was top quality.

I would guess that the Chesterfield manager had a few choice words with his players at the interval, and while it was always unlikely that they would pull back three goals, it was pretty certain they would come out as a much better team than they had been in the first half.

I was surprised that they did not fight as hard as Cambridge had done at Kenilworth Road a few days previously. That was a hard game for us, but I rather enjoyed Paul McLaren's late equaliser. Although we scored first, Cambridge were a handful, because they were determined to battle and scrap for every ball from the very first whistle. They made it difficult for us to play our passing football, but we believed we would get something from the game if we stuck to our principles, and Macca's volley eventually proved the point.

It was good to see him back after his injury, and as things have turned out the timing was spot-on because Adam Locke injured a hamstring at Chesterfield and will probably miss today's game.

We should be in the right shape to avenge our defeat at Colchester in December, when we did not do ourselves justice. It will be a little strange to go onto the pitch with Efe Sodje on the other side, and while we wish him well with his new club, we will be doing him no favours this afternoon.

I understood his decision to leave Luton - he was not a regular in our starting 11 and Colchester offered an opportunity for him to get his career moving again. I wish him well - after today's game! We also welcome back Aaron Skelton and Gavin Johnson, while I hope to meet David Greene as well, although he is out through injury.

Colchester want to win to reach 50 points, which is the traditional safety mark. We got there at Chesterfield, and much as I hoped we might make a play-off spot, I was always well aware that we could have had a sticky old season after the events of last summer. The boss wants us to keep pushing on, and get to 60 points as quickly as possible, and with the pressure off there is no reason why we should not answer his call to finish with a good run of results.

We began the season with a lot of young and inexperienced players in the team. They have learned a lot in a comparatively short time, and I believe we are now better equipped to make a realistic promotion challenge next year.

I trust I will still be part of the manager's plans, although at the moment I am one of the players who has not yet signed a new contract to replace the one that runs out at the end of this season. I still have a few more good years left in me yet, but I also have a family - a wife and two youngsters - and my first responsibility has to be to them. I want to stay here, and hopefully the negotiations will result in satisfaction for me, the club, and my family.

Meantime, I can promise I will be giving every ounce of effort possible for the cause between now and the end of the season.



Phil Gray has been out for two games with a groin strain, but was able to resume full training on Thursday, and subject to no adverse reaction should be able to return to the first team this afternoon.

Paul McLaren began his comeback after his toe dislocation as a sub against Cambridge, and played the full 90 minutes at Chesterfield to confirm his full return to fitness, and Stuart Fraser has got over his ankle injury. He played in the reserves game on Wednesday, and came through well.

But I think the season might be over for Andrew Fotiadis, who took a heavy fall against an advertising hoarding during the reserves match. He dislocated and fractured the little finger of his left hand, and he might need surgery to put it right. We will know more in a day or two, after the swelling goes down, but at the very least the injury will take a month or more to heal, and he cannot play in the meantime because you cannot risk the chances of sustaining another knock and making it even worse.

Adam Locke had to come off at Chesterfield with a hamstring and lower back problem, and has no chance of being fit to play today. He probably needs a couple of weeks' treatment at the least.

Also under treatment is Stuart Douglas who has a sore hamstring. It prevented him from training, and he will do well to recover in time to play this afternoon.


Players will be taking part, and the event is being run in conjunction with Luton Town Supporters

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

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
APRIL the first is traditionally a day of merriment, but for Luton Town it has often proved disappointing, with the majority of matches played on this date ending all square.

This was the case in 1961, when Leeds United were entertained in a Second Division fixture which finished 1-1, and that proved to be the

last Hatters outing for George Cummins.

The previous year this brilliant Eire international had appeared on card No. 48 of the annual series of football cards given away by the A & BC Gum Company.

Cummins was born in Dublin in March, 1931, and crossed the Irish Sea in his teens to join Everton. He broke into the first team at Goodison on Christmas Day, 1951, and went on to make two dozen league appearances at insideforward for them over the next two seasons. On the of the 1953-54 campaign Luton paid what was then a big fee of £12,000 to secure his



Luton missed out on promotion that season, but made no mistake the following year, although Cummins missed the vital run-in due to injury.

Appearing in the top flight for the first time, Cummins and the Town shocked the football world with a series of scintillating displays before Christmas - Newcastle 4-2, Wolves 5-1 and most memorably Sunderland 8-2 were all soundly thrashed at Kenilworth Road.

However, a knee injury sustained while playing for his country proved troublesome to Cummins, and eventually resulted in a cartilage operation. This restricted his progress over the next couple of seasons, and it was not until the 1958-59 campaign that he was back to his best form.


Although he was sometimes criticised for over-elaboration and inconsistency, he is universally acknowledged as one of the finest inside-forwards ever to play for the Town. He could split a defence with one pass, and his ball-playing skills were second to none.

These attributes were instrumental in the Town's epic progress to Wembley that season, but alas Cummins, along with most of his team-mates, could not produce his best against Nottingham Forest. More disappointment followed a year later, with relegation. Cummins stayed on, but once again injury dogged him, and that match against Leeds was



After leaving, he had a spell with Cambridge City in the Southern League before joining Hull City in November 1962. A little over a year later Cummins hung up his boots, and eventually settled on Merseyside.

Also included in this A & BC set are Bob Morton and John Groves. Cards from this company have rapidly gone up in value in recent years, and those from this particular series of 84 subjects are now listed at around £2.50 each for those in top condition.

JAMIE MORALEE (FORWARD)




JOE DUNNE (RIGHT BACK)



Our other picture is not actually from abroad. but as the snapshot brought back happy memories of Steve Foster and April 1988 we thought we might stretch a point and give it



Blast FROM THE Past

Easter Thrillers



When the Town were relegated to the old Division Four for the first time in their history at the end of the 1964-65 season they took some time to settle in to the new surroundings particularly

away from home.

Back to his best, though, was striker John O'Rourke who seemed to get better as the season progressed. O'Rourke had burst on to the scene in 1963-64 following a free transfer from Chelsea, banging in 22 goals in only 23 starts including an amazing four goal haul at Brentford as the Town won 6-2, the first away win for 16 months.

Unfortunately on the opening day of the following season with the Town at Brentford once more, the Bees defenders, and more importantly Peter Gelson, made sure O'Rourke would not be able to make a monkey out of them again with the result that he limped off, his season effectively over hardly before it had begun.

Although O'Rourke made fleeting appearances over the 1964-65 campaign and, in fact, finished as joint leading scorer he was a shadow of his former self as the Town suffered relegation.

Now with a complete close season behind him building up his fitness he was proving a handful to Fourth Division defences and at Kenilworth Road the goals were raining in. Five goals were netted against Barnsley and Notts County while four were hammered in against Doncaster, Crewe and Halifax as Christmas approached but the away record gave cause for concern with only five points being picked up during the first half of the campaign.

After Christmas the Town notched up seven home wins on the trot and even managed a couple of away wins, at Chesterfield and Bradford P.A, but still could not push themselves

up into the top four although they games in hand over the leaders.

Easter was likely to prove a make or break period with Darlington, one place above the Town the visitors to Kenilworth Road sandwiched between two games against table toppers Colchester United.


A good number of Luton supporters travelled to Layer Road on Good Friday to boost the attendance to 10,200, the best in the league for six years. The game was held up for a couple of minutes after Luton goalkeeper George Ramage pointed out that a hole had mysteriously appeared in the middle of his penalty area.

After frenzied efforts by ground staff who shovelled several bucketfuls of sand into the hole it was the Town who started the brighter but we had to wait until the 44th minute before taking the lead through Dick Edwards. O'Rourke then had the ball in the net but the effort was disallowed as the referee had already whistled for half-time.

The game seemed to be over when Ray Whittaker netted from the spot after being fouled by Duncan Forbes but Reg Stratton took advantage of a slip by Luton defender Gordon Riddick to reduce the deficit. As the match drew to a close the Hatters appeared to become over confident and were punished when Stratton narrowly beat the offside trap to run on and send a scuffed shot bouncing over the hands of the diving Ramage.

Although the Town would have been happy with a point before the start, the nature of the events leading up to the equaliser had manager George Martin spitting feathers although he decided to make no changes to the side for the visit of Darlington the following day.

Darlington had not played on Good Friday and had watched the Town in action at Layer Road and for the first 20 minutes were all over us as they sprayed the ball about on the muddy



surface. Gradually the Hatters forced Darlington back and we then saw another side to the Quakers who were, to put it politely, uncompromising in the tackle.

O'Rourke was on the receiving end of several scything tackles but would not be put off and produced the right wing centre which was converted by Whittaker to open the scoring.

Back came Darlington but they could not find a way past Ramage who put in probably his best performance in a Luton shirt. It was left to O'Rourke to cap an important victory when, with his back to goal, he flicked home a Whittaker free kick past a bemused Quakers goalkeeper Tony Moor.

The Town supporters could now see that promotion was very much on and a crowd of 15,309, the best in the league for two years, turned up at Kenilworth Road on Easter Monday for the return with Colchester. Ex-Hatter, Ted Phillips was missing from the 'U's line-up probably due to the fact that he had been completely shut out by John Moore three days earlier while the Town recalled winger Graham French in place of Billy Harber.

The Hatters got off to the worst possible start,

conceding a goal after only 90 seconds. The normally dependable Matt Woods completely missed a through ball leaving Stratton with a simple opportunity and it was only an acrobatic goal-line clearance from Fred Jardine that prevented the same player from scoring again three minutes later.

Again the Town gradually fought back but found the Colchester defence in no mood to cave in and as the game drew towards a close an air of desperation crept in. The match seemed to be over when O'Rourke had to limp out to the wing after receiving a kick on the foot and with the substitute already on he was left as a passenger.

A dramatic reprieve did arrive, however, when with eight minutes left substitute Tom McKechnie put over a cross that was headed home by Riddick who had been moved upfield following the injury to O'Rourke. The point was enthusiastically received by the big Luton crowd but ultimately proved useless as Colchester won promotion, inching the Town out on goal average.




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


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






Today's Carling Opta Head to Head features the Town's Marvin Johnson and Colchester United's David Greene.

Johnson Greene

IN A football world dominated by agents, money and greed, many of the game's traditionalists will claim it is losing its appeal. Gone is the pride in playing the beautiful game. Players are wandering from club to club in search of the big lucrative contract before drifting into obscurity, back pockets bulging with sizable wage slips. Going are the Twin Towers, the focal point of the English game that we gave the world. And going is the loyalty, the one club man.

But in Marvin Johnson, Luton have someone who is just that. After signing professional terms with the Hatters in 1986, he is still here, and now club

Today, he will be up against David Greene, a former Hatter who moved to Layer Road in June 1996 after a brief loan spell with Brentford. Greene himself can be proud of playing over 154 games for the U's.

Our exclusive statistics, supplied by Opta Index, the official statisticians of the Nationwide Football League, show the presence Johnson has at the heart of the Luton defence. The no-nonsense defender has been a virtual ever present for the Hatters this season, but is yet to get on the scoresheet. In fact, he has had only five attempts on goal all season, while Greene has one goal to his name from 26 attempts at goal.

Johnson has the better tackling statistics with 58 per cent of his 69 tackles being successful, while Greene has won just 39 per cent of his. Greene has more yellow cards this season, and has conceded more fouls, 73 to Johnson's 34.

After beginning his career at Kenilworth Road, Greene will be looking for a victory against his old club, but the Layer Road outfit will be pleased to have avoided a relegation dogfight, which they had to endure last season. After finishing in 12th place last time out, the Hatters are looking to improve on that performance and with a rock like Marvin Johnson at the back, they stand every chance of doing so.

Luton Town 2 Cambridge Utd 2 (HT 1-1)

A WONDERFUL goal by Paul McLaren, his first for 18 months, saved a point for the Town deep into stoppage time. It was no less than they deserved for a tremendous effort made in the closing stages against a team desperate to hold on to Second Division status.

Gary Doherty, switched into the attack again to replace injured Phil Gray, was man of the match by some way, but, said Lennie Lawrence afterwards, the worrying problems at the other end of the pitch were a reminder of how good Doherty is as a central defender.

The boss spoke of his concern at the way veteran John Taylor and powerful Trevor Benjamin had been allowed to "run the show" in the approaches to our penalty area.

Liam George was back in the starting line-up, with Andrew Fotiadis preferred to Stuart Douglas as partner for Doherty. Alan White, a defensive midfielder previously, became a back three man again, but the major problem was that for much of the match Cambridge, a team stuffed with sixfooters, shaded the midfield.

The Town shone in the first and last 20 minutes. with Doherty shooting his fifth goal of the season to take advantage of the early dominance. Cambridge refused to fold, and came back strongly, with the Town grateful for Ben Roberts. He made outstanding saves from Tom Youngs and Paul Wanless either side of the equaliser headed in by Benjamin.

Cambridge scrapped hard, and went ahead early in the second half through lan Ashbee, and as the clock wound down they looked capable of holding out for the points they wanted to aid their survival fight. But the Town came back in the last 20 minutes, and even Cambridge boss Roy McFarland admitted that although the equaliser was very late - in the fourth minute of stoppage time - it was no less than justice. George had volleyed a good chance over the bar, goalkeeper van Heusden saved well from Doherty, and the crossbar came to his rescue from another header by the Irishman.

Cambridge contributed to their undoing by timewasting tactics which led to nearly seven minutes of play beyond the 90 and in the fourth of those White crossed into a crowded penalty area, the reliable and redoubtable Doherty rose highest for the headed knock-down, and McLaren swivelled

on his left foot and hit a volley with his right for an equaliser that brought the house down.

For Lennie Lawrence, the night's disappointment was the inconsistencies and contrasting performances within the 90 minutes.

"We had a bright start," he said. "But I was not happy about some indifferent defending either side of half time. But then we found a high tempo finish. We could easily have won, but it looked as though we might lose. It was a great goal by McLaren. It was the only time in the whole of the second half with all those balls we put into their box that someone showed real anticipation. Doherty knocked it back in and McLaren flew across the front to volley it in - a terrific goal."

ONE UP in less than a minute, the Town had their fifth away win of the season wrapped up before half-time, and then left some of us disappointed when no further goals were added after the break. Chesterfield pulled a goal back without ever looking capable of saving a game in which they were second best in every department.

They had a bit of fighting spirit about them in a draw at Kenilworth Road on Boxing Day, but now that seems to have evaporated as Chesterfield plunge towards relegation. Since the draw at Luton Chesterfield have managed just one win in 12 league outings - seven points out of 36.

So confidence was sagging before kick-off, and it was blown away completely within 48 seconds of the start. The Town went straight onto the attack, and won a left wing corner. Matthew Taylor's kick was part cleared, but the ball was returned to him, and this time the delivery was waspishly accurate, and Gary Doherty rose imperiously to head his sixth goal of the season.

With Paul McLaren and Adam Locke teaming up well in midfield, the Town were able to enjoy the luxury of exerting complete control. Julian Watts charged upfield to start the move that led to his goal on 17 minutes, and three minutes before the break it was 3-0 thanks to Liam George's clinical finish.

With leading scorer David Reeves suspended, Chesterfield had very little to offer in attack, and their supporters hardly raised their voices except when they were calling for the manager to be sacked.

Locke had to be subbed just before the interval, allowing Matthew Spring to return, but it was probably inevitable that the second half should be something of an anti-climax. Chesterfield were already well beaten, and knew it just as surely as did the Town and their fans.

The home side tried hard to step up a gear, and perhaps questions should be asked about why Jon Howard was allowed time and space to fire in a 76th-minute consolation for Chesterfield. You would expect that to be the spark to ignite a desperate bid to save the game. It was never allowed to be, with the Town once more closing it up at the back, without turning on the earlier style in attack.

Lennie Lawrence, like all the visiting fans, was beaming when he talked about the first 45 minutes, when Chesterfield were swept aside. "The second half was a different story," he said. "We were a little disappointed with it because we would have liked more goals. But the job was done in the first half. Chesterfield had a little bit of a flurry when they scored, and there were a few tired legs in our team. But for us to win our third game in seven days, and away from home, was excellent."
