A Tom Evan's penalty save was not enough for United as they succumbed to their 14th home defeat of the season against Oldham.

Evans made a brilliant 76th minute penalty save to deny the Latics a two goal cushion at Glanford Park, but at the other end United were Justin Walker, Lee Hodges and Nathan Stanton unable to break through.

Oldham took a fourth minute lead when Shaun Garnett powered home a close range header. Scunthorpe hit back with Brian Quailey going close before hitting the target in the 29th minute.

The Iron were behind again when they failed to clear their lines and the ball fell invitingly for Paul Rickers to drive in an unstoppable 20-yard shot.

#### WREXHAM 3-1 SCUNTHORPE

A goal after only 28 seconds by Robin Gibson set Wrexham on their way to a well-deserved 3-1 victory over relegation troubled Scunthorpe. It was not an ideal start for United and meant they again would have to come from behind top get anything out of the game. The return of Lee Hodges to the starting line-up

was a boost to United and he brought two fine saves from the Wrexham keeper as United looked for an equaliser.

Wrexham though always looked dangerous when they went forward and particularly veteran forward Kevin Russell and it was that man who put the Welsh side2-0 up just before the break when United failed to clear their lines the ball wnt lose in the box and Russell was the first to react firing into the bottom corner past Evans dive.

Brian Quailey gave United some hope just after the interval when he reduced the deficit with a close range shot he beat the Wrexham keeper to a ball on the edge of the box but his resulting header driffed wide of the post.

Darren Ferguson though wrapped up the points for Wrexham with a 65th minute penalty after Richard Logan and had made a rash challenge.

## **BURY 3-0 SCUNTHORPE**

Scunthorpe will feel hard done by to have crashed to a 3-0 defeat at Bury, a result which leaves the Iron in serious relegation trouble. They produced a spirited performance after giving manager Brian Laws a mid-week vote of confidence but nothing went right for them. The Shakers won a disputed penalty after 64 minutes when Iron goalkeeper Tom Evans was adjudged to have tripped Nick Daws.

Andy Preece converted the spot-kick and United were shell-shocked.





## **Justin Walker v Matthew Spring**



Since his arrival from Nottingham Forest, Justin Walker has become an integral part of the Scunthorpe midlfield. After initially joining on loan, his move to Glanford Park was made permanent in May 1997, and the former England youth international has gone on to make 115 league appearances in a Scunthorpe shirt.

Facing him in what on paper looks like an intriguing midfield battle is Luton's Matthew Spring. Spring is another to come through the clubs successful youth ranks, and is one of the hottest prospects in Division Two. Scunthorpe fans may remember him after he

Despite this impressive rate, he has only one assist to his name which would suggest the Scunthorpe forwards aren't taking advantage of his crossing ability. Spring has a crossing completion of 30

goals this season.

With games beginning to run out, the need for three points is crucial in the Iron's bid to avoid an immediate return back to Division Three. Their home form has been disappointing to say the least taking just 18 points from their 20 home games. Luton are safe from relegation and in no position to challenge for a play-off spot. They are also undefeated in their last three games socring eight goals in the process. With the amount of promising youngsters within the squad, next season could see the Hatters making a serious bid for a play-off spot at the least.



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## **Welcome to Luton Town**

SUPPORTERS of Luton Town have every reason to enjoy their football this season, whatever the results. Until 15 hours before the season kicked off, there was a danger that the Hatters would be thrown out of the Football League.

The summer has been traumatic at a club which came into this decade as one of the best in the country - they had ten glorious years in the old First Division, now the Premiership, and won the Littlewoods Cup, now the Worthington Cup, by beating Arsenal in the 1988 final.

Alas, tradition and past glory counts for little in today's big-money football world. Missing the first season of the Premiership was bad enough, through relegation a few months before it was set up. Further relegation, to Division Two, was another blow to the club and its fans.

But even those disappointments started to look insignificant towards the end of last season, when boardroom politics became public knowledge. A dispute escalated until just before deadline day last March director and major creditor Cliff Bassett called in receivers, who were still running the club until the day before the league season kicked off. The club was put up for sale.

Manager Lennie Lawrence, who had guided the Hatters to 12th place in the Second Division last season, was left hamstrung by the impasse. The receiver's job was to draw in money, not spend it, and although Lawrence was allowed to do some deals, the greater pressure was to raise cash in the transfer market.

One of the most experienced bosses in the business, with a CV including running Charlton on a shoestring at the top level, Lawrence had raised £1.4million under receivership by the time goalkeeper Kelvin Davis went to Wimbledon for £600,000 down, with a further £200,000 to come on appearances, and possibly more if Davis is sold on by the Dons. Remarkably, having endured the toughest period of management in a career stretching back two decades, the manager agreed to stay in the job, where the term hot seat really was relevant.

"I like this little club, and we have got some super people on the staff," he explained. The Football League became involved as Luton staggered towards the new season still in receivership, and threatened to throw them out if they did not sort out a deal by midnight on the night of August 6, 15 hours before the new season kicked off. The threat did the trick: after five months under the cloud of receivership, the club's majority shareholding passed to director and long-time supporter Cliff Bassett.

One of the oldest football clubs in England - they were the first in the south to turn professional - Luton Town have seen just about everything in football in more than a century of ups and downs.

The club was formed in 1885 when Luton Wanderers and Luton Excelsior decided to merge, at a time when Luton was on the threshold of a boom thanks to the growth of the hat making trade which was to give the club its nickname.

As the town became bigger and more prosperous so did the Football Club, and it started paying its players in 1891. Three years later Luton were founder-members of the Southern League, and in 1897 joined the Football League's Second Division. But patchy results and rising costs led to the Club resigning to return to the Southern League. And there Luton stayed until 1920, when the Southern League became Division Three of the Football League

The Hatters have been in the Football League ever since.

The town narrowly missed promotion from Division Three South in 1936, when centreforward Joe Payne terrorized opposing defenses. A wing-half, his first appearance as leader of the attack was near-unbelievable: he scored ten goals in a 12-0 win over Bristol Rovers at Kenilworth Road. It is a record which is likely to stand forever.

The following year Luton did win promotion, with Payne netting 55 league goals. Luton were comfortable in the Second Division and in 1955 won promotion to the top division what is now the Premiership. It ended in tears after six years. Luton reached the FA Cup final in 1959, but lost 2-1 to Nottingham Forest. It was a team getting too old together, and a slump set in. Within 12 months Luton were relegated, and by the sixth anniversary of their only FA Cup final appearance Luton had tumbled all the way down to the old Fourth Division. In 1967 they were perilously close to having to ask for re-election to stay in the League.

That indignity was narrowly avoided, and a new board injected new life and money into the Club. The Division Four championship was won in 1968 and two years later another promotion was clinched, to the Second Division, with Malcolm Macdonald's goals a major factor.

In 1974 Luton made history again: they won promotion back to the First Division to become the first club ever to drop from top to bottom of the League and then complete the revival in the opposite direction. That joy ended with relegation after only one season, but in 1982, led by David Pleat, Luton were back among the big boys again, despite operating on a shoestring in an antiquated ground.

Miraculously Luton survived for ten seasons, with the first providing one of the game's classic showdowns. On the last day of the 1982/83 campaign Euton travelled to Maine Road needing a win to stay up and to condemn Manchester City to relegation. City had only to draw, and got to within four minutes of success. But then Raddy Antic, a Serb who had gone as a

substitute, struck the winner, and David Pleat was forever famous after that for his televised victory jig of delight across the pitch.

Luton lost in the 1985 FA Cup semi-final to Everton, but in 1988 a major trophy was landed at last, when Arsenal were beaten 3-2 in the final of the Littlewoods Cup. Twelve months later Luton were at Wembley again to defend the trophy, but they lost to Nottingham Forest, to revive memories for older supporters of the 1959 disappointment. Three years later, with Pleat back at the Club for a second spell in charge, Luton were relegated, missing the chance of being founder-members of the Premiership.

Pleat resigned for a second time in 1995 to go to Sheffield Wednesday, and youth coach Terry Westley was given his job at Kenilworth Road. By midseason Luton were in desperate trouble, and although new boss Lenile Lawrence produced a mini-revival, the Hatters went down again. They almost bounced straight back, but lost in the 1997 playoffs. They are hoping to go one better this time.

### THE PLAYERS

### Nathan Abbey

The goalkeeper and his manager agreed at the end of last season that Tanny needed a move to further his career. For two years he had been waiting in the wings, as understudy to England under-21 keeper Kelvin Davis, and for all his potential Abbey had few first-team chances. So he left Luton to join a club in Antwerp, but the deal went wrong. By the time he came back to England Luton had sold Davis to Wimbledon - the receivers thought f5600,000 plus £200,000 more on appearances was too good to turn down - so Abbey returned to Kenilworth Road in the hope of becoming No. 1 five years after joining The Hatters as a YTS boy. Luton record to the start of this season: 8 appearances.

#### James Ayre

One of the many promising young players Luton have had to rely on after financial difficulties last summer forced the club to cut its senior squad and reduce the wages bill. A commanding centre-half, Ayres joined his home town club as a YTS boy in 1996, and two years later skippered their youth team to the championship of the South East Counties League. He made his debut at Oxford in December 1999 in the Auto Windscreens Shield, and did well enough to merit occasional places on the bench for the league side after that. In February he joined neighbours Stevenage Borough on loan, with Luton making it clear it was to continue his football education in the Nationwide Conference, and not a case of putting him in the show indow.

#### **Emmerson Boyce**

One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS boy in the summer of 1995, and graduated to the first team squad after a debut in the Auto Windscreens Shield in January 1999. By the end of the season he was a regular in the squad, but made only one start in the league, and came into this campaign looking for better than a regular place on the subs' bench. Luton record to the start of thisseason: 2 appearances.

#### Gary Doherty

Big and brave, Doherty is a centre-half who can also operate as a centre-forward. He played in central defence for the Luton team which won the South East Counties League championship last season. He became a temporary striker to help an injury crisis, and did well enough to make the switch permanent. And he is making an impact on a bigger stage too: after being capped at youth level he has already been on the subs' bench for the Republic of Ireland. Luton record to the start of the season: 35 apnearances. 6 foals.

## Stuart Douglas

A real hotshot in youth and reserve team football, Douglas was a 17-year-old trainec when he made his league debut for Luton against Oldham in 1995, but had to battle to overcome injuries before winning a regular place in Luton's league side last season in which he played 50 games. Luton record to the start of this season: 75 appearances, 14 goals.

#### Andrew Fotiadis

Another local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before being a full-time soccer professional. He won England Schools caps at under-15 and under-18 level, and developed a style to delight Luton fans and worry opposing defences, as an old-fashioned centre-forward, with good physique, power, and concentrated determination to score goals. Luton record to the start of this season: 61 appearances, 7 goals.

### Stuart Fraser

Stylish defender and skipper of the Luton youth team which ran away with the South East Counties League championship last season. Reckoned by the Luton coaching staff to be an outstanding prospect, he was given his league debut against Carlisle, in a 3-2 win, on the final day of the 1997/98 season and within a year he was competing hard with the redoubtable Mitchell Thomas for the left back spot. Luton record to the start of this season: 10 appearances.

#### Liam Georg

Full of pace and nimble footwork, striker George was well set a year ago to clinch a league place after impressing as a constant scorer in Luton's youth and reserve teams. A regular member of the Republic of Ireland squad that progressed to the European youth championships final in the summer of 1998, George had made his league debut against Bristol City in September 1997, and started last season as an established first choice. But he broke a leg at Wigan a year ago and the season was nearly over by the time he had recovered. Luton record to the start of this season: 18 appearances, no goals.







Phil Gray

Signed by Luton for the second time in September 1997, the Northern Ireland striker hopes to get in a full season after being hit by a succession of injuries. He was in Spurs reserves when David Pleat, emboss at White Hart Lane, and then in his second spell as Luton manager, splashed out £275,000 for him in August 1991. Two years later he moved on to Premiership foothall with Sunderland, for £800,000 and after three years at Roker went to Nancy in France, and then Fortuna Sittard in Holland. He needed little encouragement to return to Kenilworth Road in exchange for £400,000, and having rediscovered his goal touch was recalled to the Northern Ireland squad in November. Luton record to the start of this season; 62 appearances, 15 goals.

#### Marvin Johnson

Longest-serving player at Kenilworth Road, Johnson is a versatile defender, normally a centre-half but capable of filling in on the flanks or in midfield. Johnson is starting his 12th season as a first-team regular at Luton, his only club. Injuries have been a problem, but he has always bounced back and is now a fixture and skipper of the team he joined as a schoolboy. Luton record to the start of this season: 356 appearances, 9 goals.

#### Adam Locke

Croydon Well-travelled in football terms, and very welcome for the experience he brought into a predominantly young squad, midfielder Locke joined Luton on a free transfer from Bristol City last summer. With the club in receivership, he was offered only a month to start whh, but by the time the administrators moved out Locke had done enough to earn a deal to see him through to the end of the season. He began as a YTS boy with Crystal Palace, his local club, but could not get into the league team at Selhurst, and moved on to Southend, Colchester and Bristol City, and is now an established member of Luton's league squad,

## Gavin McGowan

A right back fighting for a Premiership place against very stiff competition at Arsenal, McGowan signed for Luton for the third time in June 1998. The first two were loan deals, one in March 1997 ending prematurely through injury. He rejoined Luton on loan again for three months, at the start of the 1997/8 season. Lennie Lawrence rated him, but could not afford to make an offer, and was delighted to conclude a quick deal a year later when Arsenal offer the defender a free transfer. Luton record to the start of this season: 50 appearances, no goals.

### Michael McIndoe

Made his debut for Luton's senior side last season when injuries hit three players above him in the pecking order for the wide left midfield slot. He joined Luton as a YTS boy after leaving school, and was part of their youth team which won the South East Counties League championship and the Southern Junior Floodlit Cup in the

1997/98 season. He made his first team debut in the Worthington Cup first round victory over Oxford United a year ago. Luton record to the start of this season: 28 appearances, no goals,

#### Paul McLaren

The midfielder was still a schoolboy when Luton realized that he had enough talent and strength to play regularly in their youth team. A YTS offer was a formality, and he was offered pro terms while still only 17. Forceful and always ready to back up attacks, he soon became a regular after a 1994 debut. Luton record to the start of this season: 123 appearances, 2 goals.

#### Ben Roberts

Luton boss Lennie Lawrence went back to one of his old clubs in February to recruit goalkeeper Roberts after 21-year-old Nathan Abbey suffered a loss of form and was subjected to harsh treatment by supporters. Roberts was third choice keeper at Middlesbrough, and grabbed the chance of regular first team football with Luton, signing initially on a month's loan. He had some Premiership experience with Middlesbrough, and is a former England under-21 international. He was in the Middlesbrough team beaten 2-0 by Chelsea in the 1997 FA Cup final, and was back at Wembley in 1999, playing on loan to Millwall as they lost 1-0 against Wigan in the final of the Auto Windscreens Shield. He had other loanspells at Hartlepool, Wycombe and Bradford.

#### Andre Scarlett

It was a Roy of the Rovers story when the 18-year-old made his league debut for Luton last October. Because of injuries the winger was on the subs' bench against Oldham, and got his chance with 20 minutes to go, with the score at 0-0. His trickery tempted an Oldham player into a rash tacide which earned a red card, and Luton went on to win 2-0, with Scarlett netting the clincher in a 2-0 win. Luton record to the start of this season: 8 appearances, 1 goal.

### Efetobore Sodje

It was second time lucky for the defender and Luton Town when he signed at the start of this season, after declining to accept a new contract at Macclesfield, who had just been relegated back to Division Three. British, but qualifying for Nigeria, where he spent much of his boyhood, "Effy" came back to England in 1994 to try his luck in the Football League. Luton were interested, but then manager David Pleat advised the young hopeful to join neighbouring Stevenage Borough, and then comback 12 months later. But Sodje did so well in the Conference that Stevenage declined to let him go. He helped Stevenage to the Conference championship, and then moved to Macclesfield for £30,000, playing a major role as they came up from the Conference and won Third Division promotion in their first season. He signed a year's contract with Luton in August, but started with a three-match suspension, which will keep him out of the squad at Reading.

#### Matthew Spring

A competitive midfielder, Spring was a driving force in the Luton side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997, and it was no surprise when he was called up for a league debut, when still only 17, as a sub against Bristol City-in September 1997. Last season was his best yet - he topped the Hatters' appearance list with 54 games, and scouts from the big clubs gathered in droves to watch him. Luton record to the start of this season: 67 appearance, 3 goals.

#### Matthew Taylor

When Luton were in receivership throughout the summer, players had to be sold or given away to save money, while severe restrictions were imposed on new recruits. So once more Luton had to look at the young talent coming up through the ranks, and midfielder Taylor, though still only 17, was given his chance. Impressive performance in pre-season friendlies saw him leap from youth team to league squad, and after helping Luton win the South East Counties championship last season he started this with a league debut on opening day, at Notts County.

#### Julian Watts

Signed on a month's loan from Bristol City at the start of the season, and keen to get his career moving again after falling out of favour at Ashton Gate. Rotherham gave the defender his first taste of league fostball, and it was ambition achieved when he signed for the home town club he supported, Sheffield Wednesday. Changes in managers have not helped his progress; Trevor Francis bought him for Wednesday, but sew manager David Pleat sold him off to Leicester for £200,000 in 1996. Two years later he left Filbert Street as a Bosman, and John Ward signed him for Bristol City. Three months later, Ward was out, and soon afterwards so was Watts, with neither of the two City managers since Ward wanting to keep him, and Watts jumped at the chance of first-team football with Luton.

#### Alan White

Lennie Lawrence went back to Middlesbrough, one of his old clubs, when an injury crisis robbed him of three of his back four in September 1997. Centre-half White was a prospect Lawrence knew well: Lennie had signed him as a 17-year-old at Ayresome Park. White was unable to force his way into Middlesbrough's Premiership squad after the advent of Bryan Robson and big-money signings, and grabbed the chance to rejoin Lawrence in a £40,000 transfer. Luton record to the start of this season: 71 appearances, 2 goals.

#### Landry Zahana-Oni

Signed by Lennie Lawrence in January 1999, from Bromley, 9-fthe Ryman Premier League, Zahana-Oni had attracted the interest of several other league clubs with his abilities as an old-fashioned left winged A French national, he had six years with Le Havre before crossing the Channel to try to make the grade in British football. He spent eight months at Stirling Albion before joining Bromley, and Luton paid £25,000, with more to follow depending on the player's progress. Luton record to the start of this season: 8 appearances, no goals.

### THE MANAGER- LENNIE LAWRENCE

WITH FORMER youth coach Terry Westley struggling in his first experience as a manager, he and Luton Town reluctantly decided to part company as the Hatters slid to the bottom of Division One. Four months in the autumn of 1995 had seen £2million spent, but only four matches won out of 22. Luton decided they needed an experienced hand on the tiller, and Lawrence fitted the bill perfectly. Perhaps more importantly, he knew about running clubs on shoestring budgets, having made his name by taking impoverished Charlton into what is now the Premiership, and keeping them there for four years, when they did not even have a home of their own. Lawrence was a non-league player, with Croydon, Carshalton and Sutton United. His managerial career started as assistant at Plymouth and then Lincoln. He went to Charlton as reserve team coach before landing the hot seat. He had been boss for nine years when he left Charlton in 1991 and took over at Middlesbrough. He led them to promotion to the Premiership a year later, but they were relegated after only one season and was replaced by Bryan Robson. Bradford City offered the next opportunity, but he left after 18 months to return south. A few weeks later he became Luton's 21st manager. The survival task proved too

much, with the December leeway too big a gap to close, but relegation was followed by a thrilling recovery. In their first season back in Division Two, Luton were rarely out of the promotion frame, but it ended in disappointment, with playoff semi-final defeat against Crewe. A season of struggle followed, but Luton were 12th last season, despite their traditional chronic shortage of money, and it has been a difficult summer for the boss - the club went into receivership in the closing weeks of last season, and that left him helpless when he wanted to trade in the early summer transfer market. The manager's record at Luton, to the start of this season: Played 194, won 70, drawn 52, lost 72, goals for 250, goals against 235

#### COACH - JOHN MOORE

A Scotsman who is Luton Town through and through sounds like a contradiction but John Moore has proved it over four decades. He has never lost his Scottish accent, despite spending much more of his life in Luton than in the land of his birth. He first went to Kenilworth Road as a young player, signed from Motherwell in the summer of 1965. A nononsense centre-half, he was in the team which saw Luton make a tremendous recovery after years of failure. In the old First Division for seven years until 1960, Luton had slumped all the way down to the Fourth when Moore arrived. By the time he left, in 1974, to see out his playing career with Northampton, Luton had become the first club ever to sink from top to bottom of the Football League, and then climb all the way back up again. Moore settled for part-time management with local teams in the Luton area before David Pleat took him into Luton Town for the second time, as coach to the reserve and youth teams. Pleat left Luton to go to Spurs in 1986, and Moore was promoted to succeed him. And Moore made history: he g uded Luton to seventh place in the First Division, now the Premiership, their best-ever finishing place. But Moore found it all less than satisfying: a natural coach, and very much at home on the training ground and in the dug-out, he found other parts of the manager's job difficult. A diffident man, he disliked the upfront demands put on managers by, for instance, radio, TV and the newspapers. So after one year of success, he walked away. Ray Harford, his assistant, became manager, and Moore declined offers to stay on as a coach, saying it would be unfair on Harford. But Moore was back in the coaches' room at Luton in January 1990, recruited by new manager Jim Ryan, who had been a playing colleague at Kenilworth Road in the seventies. And Moore has been at Luton ever since, specialising in coaching the younger players, but helping out with the first team as well.


#### COACHED - TREVOR HARTLEY

The wheel turned full circle when Hartley was appointed to the coaching staff at Kenilworth Road at the start of this season – it took him back to the club he first joined as a youth coâch in 1980. A player with West Ham and Bournemouth, Hartley was manager at Dean Court for a spell, and later coached in Singapore. David Pleat was the Luton manager who recruited Hartley to be youth coach, and within four years Hartley was Pleat's right-hand man. They went to Spurs, as manager and assistant, in the summer of 1986, and luckless Hartley was thrown out of work through no fault of his own after Pleat was sacked to allow Terry Venables to become Spurs boss, with his own coaching staff. But with a good reputation secured, Hartley was in international demand and coached in the Far East, USA and Canada, and then for four years was part of the England set-up under Graham Taylor, before returning to league football at Sunderland. He reigined Luton in the Summer of 1998.

### PHYSIO - CLIVE GOODYEAR


Further proof of the pull Luton Town can exert on former players, Goodyear started his career as a teenager at Kenilworth Road, and established himself as a dependable centre-half in the side built by David Pleat which won promotion to the old First Division in 1982. Then, as now always looking to raise cash by player sales, Luton accepted a £40,000 offer from Plymouth for Goodyear in 1984, and the price was £50,000 when he moved on to Wimbledon three years later.

Goodyear is the only man at Kenilworth Road with an FA Cup winner's medal, having been in the Wimbledon side which pulled offa shock Wembley win against Liverpool in 1988. A move to Brentford followed before a knee injury forced his retirement. He became a qualified physio and "signed on" for Luton in that capacity in 1993.






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## A trip down Memory Lane

WN GOAL There is no greater gift in football than an own goal, particularly if it comes from a former player. The most event of this type was when Alan Knill scored in a 4-3 victory for the Iron whilst wearing a Rotherham United shirt in the 1998-99 season. The most number of own goals credited to Scunthorpe in one campaign is four. This happened twice in both the Second Division years of 1958-59 and 1962-63. United never lost one of what were eight metches in which own goals featured on the goalscoring list. Only two of the games would not have seen the points division altered had not the gifts from the opposition been given. These were each won 2-0. When it comes to the FA Cup it is probable that an unfortunate own goal by Hartlepool Defender Bawes, in the First Round, Second Replay at Roker Park in 1972 was one of Scunthorpe's most gratefully received presents. Hartlepool were leading 1-0 as time ran out on them. Then came the own goal as the ball was sliced into the net and a North East Cup victory turned into extra time during which Steve Deere gave the Iron a winner. One of the most spectacular own goals scored at Glanford Park was netted by Steve Lister against Tranmere. This proved to be the only goal of a Fourth Division match on New Years Eve 1988. Steve had no one around him when he flicked the ball back gently to Paul Musselwhite. Unfortunately he lofted the ball too high and well out of the reach of the unsuspecting

goalkeeper. Whoops!

During the working life of the Old Showground there were two notable fires which destroyed the superstructure of the stands. In 1924 the west side of the ground was extensively damaged, along the length of Henderson Avenue, with the loss of the kit, dressing rooms and seating. Another catastrophe happened in 1958 when the old wooden stand-was lost on the west side of the pitch. This was replaced by the Cantilever Stand. However, when the Old Showground was finished in 1988 and the contractors had moved in, vandals set fire to the Henderson Avenue Stand, probably in the early hours of the morning.

The end of the Old Showground was a time for groundsman Ronnie Barnes to secure as much of the club property as possible. His first job immediately after the last match against Torquay United in the play-offs finished was to dismantle all of the goal posts ready for transportation to Glanford Park. He also had to be in early the next day to stop the contractors taking off with all of United's grass cutting equipment.

## **UNCOMMON SCORE**

The most common score in football is said to be 2-1, but in the late 1950's it was a winning score that Scunthorpe could just not manage. They actually won 2-1 at Hartlepool in their 1957-58 Championship season during their penultimate game on the 28th April. It was not until the 16th January 1960 on a cold and snow covered Old Showground pitch that the team beat Rotherham United by that result. Even FA Cup games failed to break the sequence: it meant the whole of the 1958-59 season, unusually, failed to throw—up a 2-1 score. However, it must be noted that during this sequence that five matches did see United lose 1-2.

### PLAY-OFF STATISTICS

It is a fact that to date Scunthorpe United have been involved in twelve play-off games over a period of time from 1988 until 1999. This has seen the club enter the play-off lottery on five occasions and they have, of course, only been successful once. Of all the players to appear for the Iron, two players appeared on as many as nine times. These were Paul Longden and Tony Daws. The interval between each of our Wembley visits means that no player could bridge the gap to make all twelve appearances, although Paul comes closest. There again it could be argued that it is not prudent

to choose the steward out of the bar to prop up the defence for a visit to the Twin Towers! As regards to goalscoring only two men have registered as many as two goals in play-off matches. During the 1991-92 campaign Ian Helliwell was on target with both goals at Gresty Road against Crewe Alexandra in the first leg of the semi-final. Ian was the Iron's most costly player at £80,000 when he signed from York City in 1991. Later he went to his hometown club of Rotherham United. The second player to score twice in the play-offs was Gareth Sheldon, whose pair of goals is fresher in the mind when he notched the brace against

Swansea City and saw United through to Wembley. For Gareth the question must be, what was the most exciting moment... Those two strikes or winning at Wembley in the final itself. 6areth earned his place in Scunthorpe United folklore in those pulsating first fifteen minutes of extra time, after coming on as a substitute. Finally each of the Wembley visits brought out the Scunthorpe supporters in numbers far in excess of what might be expected in view of average gate figures. At the Blackpool match nine thousand local supporters made up the 22,741 attendance, while the Leyton Orient encounter had between twelve and fifteen thousand supporters on the figure of 36,985.

## A SETTLED SIDE


They say a settled team leads to success and that certainly was the case with the 1957-58 Championship side. During that season as many as six players made over forty of the forty-six appearances. Of these Ken Flardwick, Barry Horstead, Frank Marshall and Jack Brownsword were ever present. Another four men were seen to play over thirty games. Obviously in this case the familiarity of the team paid off. Twelve months later United were rubbing shoulders with some of footballs elite, and although the school of 1958-59 had O far tougher time in Division Two, the promotion side more or less kept together. Brownsword was the only ever present, but again nine players ran out of the Old Showground tunnel on thirty or more times for the forty . o match maximum. It is also interesting to note that United's team that year survived on thirtythree points, five ahead of the drop zone. Against teams higher up the League they had little joy at all and only managed four points - all from draws - when in opposition to each of the top seven

### EX PLAYERS IN CHARGE

At the start of the last season quite a number of our former players were managirs Football League clubs and throughout the campaign their fortunes varied. At Fulham Kevin Keegan had the Midas touch, and not only did he guide the Craven Cottage club to Second Division Championship but he seems to have aspired to the pinnacle of the job taking on England. Everyone wishes him every success.

Cardiff City had the firm hand of Frank Burrows to see the Welsh club to automatic promotion from Division Three. Frank had been the key to United's defence in the mid 1960's. Scarborough started off the season with Mick Wadsworth in the hot seat, but that became too warm when results did not go his way during the early part of the year. Unfortunately he was dismissed. Mick had been a winder at the Old Showground Halfway through the 1970's. Bury began the 1998-99 season in Division One with Neil Warnock as their boss, bespite playing beyond their resources they could not avoid relegation, even though they put up a gallant effort. Neil Warnock joined the Iron during the old Third Division season of 1972-73. Over in Derbyshire John Duncan, a former player manager at the Old Showground from 1981, continued his love of Chesterfield. Always a strong competitor, Duncan once again saw the Sprites through to at least a comfortable mid-table position, if not better. Duncan's great achievement at Saltergate was, of course, an FA Cup semi-final place a couple of years ago.





## **IN RESERVE**

## Football Historian Leigh Edwards focuses on links with our visitors

Two goals by Matthew Spring plus others from Stuart Douglas and Phil Gray gave Luton Town a 4-1 Second Division win at home to Scunthorpe United three months ago. Scunthorpe stormed to a record 8-1 victory on Luton's last League visit on 24th April 1965 with five goals by Barrie Thomas plus others from Andy Wilson, Barry Mahy and Stuart Bramley. The Hatters have yet to win a League match at Scunthorpe.

## PROMOTION PLAY-OFFS

Former Luton Town winger Graham Alexander featured prominently as Scunthorpe United qualified for the Fourth Division play-offs in 1991/92. Signing professional for Scunthorpe in March 1990, he made his Fourth Division debut as substitute at home to Chesterfield in April 1991 and scored 18 times in 159 League games before being sold to Luton for £100,000 in July 1995. He starred as the Hatters reached the Second Division play-offs in 1996-97 and netted 15 goals in 150 League outings prior to joining Preston NE for £50,000 in March 1999.

1965. He joined Luton in October 1968 and partnered the likes of Max Dougan and John Ryan in their defence, playing 83 League games for today's opponents before moving to Cambridge United in May 1971.

## RECORD VICTORY

Five goals by ace marksman Barrie Thomas plus others from Andy Wilson, Barry Mahy and Stuart Bramley gave the following Scunthorpe United team a thrilling 8-1 Third Division win over Luton Town in front of 2,755 at the Old Showground on 24th April 1965: Geoff Sidebottom, Barry Horstead, Derek Hemstead, Bobby Smith, Peter Neale, Barry Lindsey, Stuart Bramley, Dick Scott, Barrie Thomas, Barry Mahy, Andy Wilson. It remains Scunthorpe's record League victory and Luton were relegated that season.

## IRISH INTERNATIONAL

Scunthorpe United's former loanee midfielder Danny Wilson was capped 15 times by Northern Ireland while at

Luton Town. Moving to Scunthorpe on loan from Nottingham Forest in October 1983,

he netted three goals in six

consecutive Third Division games while at the Old Showground. He joined Luton from Brighton for £150,000 in July 1987 and scored in their 1988

Littlewoods Cup final triumph at Wembley, netting 24 goals in 110 First Division outings for today's visitors prior to joining Sheffield Wednesday for £200,000 in August 1990.

TWO SPELLS Ex-Luton Town central defender Richard Money had two spells with Scunthorpe United. Initially joining Scunthorpe from Lowestoft Town in July 1973, he scored four

times in 173 Fourth

Division games before being sold to Fulham for £50,000 in December 1977. He joined Luton from Liverpool for £100,000 in March 1982 and netted once in 44 League outings for today's visitors prior to joining Portsmouth in August 1983. Returning to Scunthorpe in October 1985, he made a further 106 League appearances and was manager from January 1993 until March 1994.

## TITLE TRIUMPH

Former Oldham Athletic centre-forward Eric Davis featured prominently in Scunthorpe United's 1957/58 Third Division (North) title campaign, also scoring twice in that season's FA Cup fourth round win at Newcastle United. Moving to Scunthorpe from Plymouth Argyle in July 1957, he netted 29 goals in 63 League games prior to joining Chester in February 1959. He joined Latics in September 1960 and his solitary goal in two consecutive Fourth Division outings came in the 2-1 defeat at Crewe Alexandra a month later, moving to Falmouth Town as a player-manager.

### PROMOTION WINNER

Former Scunthorpe United defender Jack Bannister was an influential figure in Luton Town's 1968/70 promotion success. Moving to Scunthorpe from West Brom in June 1964, he made nine consecutive Third Division appearances at the start of that campaign prior to reuniting with Dick Graham at Crystal Palace in July

## **CUP HERO**

Former Luton Town inside-forward Sid Ottewell was an experienced figure as scunthorpe United took First Division high-fliers Sunderland to an FA Cup third round replay in 1952/53. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Birmingham City in December 1947, he scored four times in 15 Second Division games for Luton prior to joining Nottingham Forest in July 1948. He joined Scunthorpe form Mansfield Town in March 1952 and netted 12 goals in 30 League outings for the Iron before moving to Whitstable Town in July 1953.

## MUCH-TRAVELLED

Much-travelled striker Imre Varadi played for both Luton Town and Scunthorpe United during his career. Moving to Luton on loan from Leeds United in March 1992, he scored once in six consecutive First Division games while at Kenilworth Road. He joined Scunthorpe from Boston United on a non-contract basis in September 1995 and made two substitute appearances in the Third Divison. Former Luton striker Marc North netted twice in five League outings for Scunthorpe while on loan from the Hatters in January 1987.

# **MASTERS**

Versatile winger Graham Alexander featured prominently as Scunthorpe United qualified for the Fourth Division play-offs in 1991/92.

Signing professional for Scunthorpe in March 1990, he made his Fourth Division debut as substitute in the 3-0 win at home to Chesterfield in April 1991. He created numerous goalscoring opportunities for the likes of Jason White and Ian Helliwell, netting 18 goals in 159 League games for the Iron before being sold to Luton Town for £100,000 in July 1995.

Starring as the Hatters reached the Second Division play-offs in

1996/97 and Worthington Cup fifth round in 1998/99, he scored 15 goals in 150 League outings for today's opponents prior to joining Preston NE for £50,000 in March 1999. He remains an influential member of David Moyes' squad seeking to clinch promotion to the First Division this

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
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


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## ONE TO ONE WITH...


7. What do you think is the best system for the club to play?

## UNITED vs. STOKE CITY

## WE WELCOME STOKE CITY TO GLANFORD PARK FOR OUR NEXT HOME FIXTURE.

Stoke City Football Club is the second oldest league club in existence, formed in 1863 by former pupils of the Charterhouse School.

In the early days Stoke played a number of friendly games against local sides, and it was in one of these matches they recorded a 26-0 victory over local side

Prior to 1875 Stoke played on Sweetings Field, a strip of land owned by Alderman Sweeting (the Lord Mayor of Stoke). In March, 1878, they merged with Stoke Victoria Athletic Club, and matches from then on were played on the Athletic club's ground, part of which was used as a running track.

The ground was oval shaped, with uncovered banking at either end, with one small wooden stand on the East Side (Boothen Stand).

Stoke's first games at the Victoria's Ground was a friendly against Talke Rangers on March 28, 1878, which Stoke won 1-0 in front of a crowd of approx

Stokes first official game after the name the Victoria Ground was adopted was against Great Lever Club from Manchester on September 24th, 1883.

Stoke turned professional in 1885 and three years later in 1888 they were invited to be one of the 12 clubs that were to form the Inaugural 'Football

On May 4th, 1997, after 119 years at the Victoria Ground, Stoke played their final match, before moving in the summer to the new purpose-built Britannia Stadium, so beginning a new era in their long history.

However, performances on the field did not match the impressive new surroundings and for the 1998/99 season the club found itself in Division Two. Optimism returned with the appointment of a new manager, Brian Little,

formerly of Aston Villa, and the team made a tremendous start to the seaswinning the first six league games, a club record.

But it all went horribly wrong in the second half of the season when Stoke's atrocious form saw them sink down to eighth by the end of the season.

Rumours were rife that Little would guit but it wasn't until he returned from holiday - five weeks into the close season - that he announced his decision to


Stoke took a month to finally unearth his replacement, unveiling former Stockport, Blackpool and Norwich manager Gary Megson

More intriguingly, however former Vale manager John Rudge joined soon afterwards and was given the title of Football Executive to oversee all aspects

Megson was the boss, though, and it wasn't long before he was trying to wheel and deal to revamp the side which had collapsed so dramatically the season

Events took a new turn in November 1999 when a consortium of Icelandic businessmen paid £5.5 million for a 66 per cent stake in the club. Megson became one of the first casualties, being replaced by Gudion Thordarson, the former Icelandic national team manager, Rudge and first team coach Nigel Pearson remained at the club under the new regime.

City have had a good run of late and they have a Wembley appearance to look forward to as they are in the final of the Autowindscreens Shield.
