Great Scott! City are back on song in style

NO sooner had the noise, colour and emotion of a packed Wembley Stadium subsided than City and their small but hardy band of followers were stepping into the tight, creaking confines of Kenilworth Road.

Mercifully, neither side believed this was a nothing game upon which little rested. The will to win was there, no doubting, with Luton making noises about wanting to finish the campaign above last night's opponents and City themselves keen to issue a pre-derby warning.

Caretaker boss Tony Fawthrop could have been forgiven for resting a few players ahead of Saturday's derby clash with Rovers

But out trotted 10 of the 11 that began the Wembley final just two days earlier, with only the injured Aaron Brown missing with a knee

In fact, the adventurous Fawthrop decided the time was ripe to inject a little excitement into an evening that couldn't have been further away from the grandeur of Sunday's spectacle.

He went for a three-pronged attack of Peter Beadle, Tony Thorpe and Damian Spencer as City set about their opponents with some neat approach work and intricate patterns.

Paul Holland and Beadle got in early headers and Luton really weren't in the game until a

promising spell around the 17th minute mark when their opponents' midfield temporarily dozed

Holland's slip allowed Paul McLaren to instigate a quick-fire move, which ended with Phil Gray's cross being headed firmly by Gary Doherty but straight at Billy Mercer.

Shortly after, City were again caught napping as Liam George set up Gray, who blazed over under pressure as he looked to wriggle clear.

There were two truly spectacular moments to savour in the half. The first came via Luton's onloan Middlesbrough keeper Ben Roberts, who leapt brilliantly to his right to prevent Holland's ferocious drive from the edge of the box breaking his net. For good measure, Holland followed his effort up from the ensuing corner with another searing strike from distance that flew just over.

The second gem of the half arrived, not for the first time this season, from the boot of the flying Scott Murray. The winger took a long Brian Tinnion pass first time on the run to leave his marker for dead by breezing inside him before clipping a beauty over the head of a stunned

Roberts and in for the opener in the 28th minute. Luton almost managed to steal an equaliser seconds after the interval when Matthew Taylor's low shot took a deflection and was prevented from creeping in by the agile Mercer.

City responded and Bell caught a beauty with his left foot and was unfortunate to see the ball drift

Mercer produced two more important stops, leaping well to collect George's sweet strike, then stooping low to clutch Gray's firm header close to

The visitors made their first change on 64 minutes, Spencer being replaced by Matt Hill, who took up the left-back spot, allowing Bell to push forward and give City a more conventional and balanced look.

And how the game came to light after that. No sooner had Bell managed to get clear of a static defence to score courtesy of Tinnion's splendid pass, than Doherty was pulling one back for Luton with a rampaging run and shot that squeezed past Mercer to set up a thrilling finish.

Verdict

City shook off the Wembley blues to fire a derby warning. It was heartening to see no-one in the mood to coast with the play-offs long gone.
