WE HAD waited a long time for the victory at Scunthorpe, a team we had never previously beaten on their ground. We figure in their history because in April 1965, they ran up their biggest-ever win, 8-1 against us, to condemn us to relegation to the Fourth Division. Last week's trip was our first return since that wretched day. Victory came at the fifth attempt, and the goals were overdue - John O'Rourke's strike in the 1965 humiliation was until Saturday the only one we had ever scored at Scunthorpe.

DEFENDER Ryan Moran, one of the YTS boys released by the Town, has joined Ryman League club St. Albans City. He will be at Clarence Park until the end of the season, when both he and City will consider their options about his future. The move suited his domestic arrangements - the 17-year-old comes from nearby Welwyn Garden City.

JULIAN Watts has become the first out of contract player to sign a new deal, having agreed a contract to run until the end of next season. Negotiations were uncomplicated - Watts, 29, was delighted to join the Town at the start of this season for the chance of regular first team football, while Lennie Lawrence was equally pleased to retain the services of the experienced centre-back who was released by Bristol City last summer.

Phil Gray, Marvin Johnson, Stuart Douglas, Andrew Fotiadis and Alan White are the other first-teamers whose contracts expire at the end of the season.

THE TOWN have been keeping an eye on the progress of Neil Midgley, having given him his league debut while he was on loan from Ipswich in September. There are suggestions that he may be surplus to requirements at Portman Road at the end of the season, when his current contract expires. As he is only 21, Ipswich will be able to ask a fee for him - the Bosman ruling affects only players of 24 and over - but they are not looking at him as current first team material. Midgley, who scored three goals in ten appearances for us, has joined Kidderminster on loan, as they bid for the championship of the Nationwide Conference and promotion to the Football League.

He went on as a sub in their vital 2-0 home win last week over moneybags Rushden and Diamonds, where the assistant manager to Brian Talbot is Terry Westley.

CONGRATULATIONS are due to another former Kenilworth Road man. Richard Money, the elegant left back brought in by David Pleat as part of the 1982 Second Division championship side, is now in charge of the youth academy at Coventry. and has just seen his young charges reach the final of the FA Youth Cup.

PRE-season arrangements are gathering pace, with more first team fixtures now confirmed, away to Grimsby on Monday July 31, and to nearby Hull City on August 2. On Friday August 4 there will be a friendly at Rushden & Diamonds, and the only home friendly will be against Wimbledon on August 7.

TICKETS are still available for the Luton Town Supporters Club's annual player of the season presentation, which will be attended by the Town manager, coaches and players. It is on Sunday April 30, at the Kent Social Club, Tenby Drive, Luton, and tickets are £4 to LTSC members, and £5 to others, and can be bought from the Supporters Club kiosk in Kenilworth Road this evening, or on Town on Tour coaches to the games at Gillingham and Wycombe.

PLAYERS will also be out in force for a Luton Town dinner and dance at the Cloisters, at Whipsnade Wild Animal Park on Friday May 12. Cost, with a three course meal and dancing to live band Aries, will be £29, and dress code will be lounge suits. Ring the commercial department on Luton 411622 for further information or bookings.

YOU will know that we are playing this evening instead of last Saturday because Bristol City were engaged in the Auto Windscreens Shield final on Sunday, and the effects of that on both our clubs

might be interesting.

From our point of view we have had the unusual luxury of ten days to prepare for the match and to recover from our exertions at Scunthorpe. That has helped us in fitness terms, but I am not sure what effect Sunday's occasion at Wembley will have had on Bristol City after their narrow defeat. It must have come as a big disappointment, and their test this evening will be to see how they react. Sunday was the start of a big week for them, with the Bristol derby game coming up next Saturday.

Like us, Bristol City can finish top of the middle group of teams in the table, which has to be the minimum we strive for in the closing weeks of the season. City will want to bounce back from Sunday's disappointment, while we want to win to overtake them in the table.

In the general welcome to our visitors, it will be a particular pleasure to see Tony Thorpe back at Kenilworth Road. I trust he will not be allowed to demonstrate it tonight, but I am delighted to see him in such good form again. He seems to have recaptured all his old sharpness and appetite for goals, and is probably in his best form since leaving us a couple of years ago.

Thankfully, we too are in a decent little run of form at present, having managed three consecutive victories for the first time in 19 months.

In the last home game, against Colchester, we had some spells where we were excellent, and others where we looked wobbly, and, as always, likely to concede goals. But we are an attacking team, and came back from behind for a win that was very pleasing against a side who were like us, better attacking than defending. At Scunthorpe it was a very physical game, and I thought the ref let too much go. Not too often do we come out on top in games where we have to battle physically, so that result was extremely heartening. It makes me think we are "growing up" as a team.

What is important now is to resist any feeling that our season is over and done with. It is not. I have set a new target: 60 points minimum, and the goals total to be taken to well over 60. The league table shows that no-one in the Second Division has scored more home goals than us. In our total of 41 matches home and away so far we have hit 47 goals, and only the top eight teams have netted more. Our defending is not so good, so the Luton Town philosophy has to be to try to score more goals than we concede.

We are an attacking team, and it is important that we continue our goal output - unless you hit 70 or so in a season you are not likely to do much in the league.

Having enjoyed a ten-day break from games before tonight, we are now at the start of three games in six days, and I was able to take in Gillingham v Wigan on Saturday to have a look at our next two opponents.

Gillingham are in with a play-off chance again, having got there and failed narrowly at Wembley last May. On Saturday they once again demonstrated their uncanny knack of being able to snatch a win at home when it hardly looked likely, and we will have our work cut out to ensure they don't do it to us.

Wigan used a defensive formation, and got within a few minutes of earning a draw that might have suited them. They will be difficult to beat here on Monday, but we should look forward to the chance to test ourselves against a good side. Promotion this season may have passed us by, but we have got to go for it next year, and as I have always stressed it is vital that we end this season on a high to give us the right platform for the new campaign in August.

THREE wins on the bounce, for the first time this season, has put us in a happy mood, and ready to try to make it four at Bristol City's expense this evening.

I suspect they will find it difficult not to see tonight as a case of "after the Lord Mayor's show" following their trip to Wembley on Sunday. We offer them our congratulations on their Auto Windscreens Shield campaign, and look forward to knocking them back in the league - as you probably know we go above City if we beat them.

If we play as well as we have done in our last three games, we are well capable. Against Colchester we were desperate to get our home form going again, and I felt we had the game under control, even when they came back at us and went 2-1 ahead. The way we were playing, we were confident we could get a goal or two, as we did.

Gary "Harry" Doherty did the business again, and what a season he is having. The nickname, incidentally is because we think his ginger thatch makes him look like Happy Harry! Joking aside, Dozza, as he prefers, is having a wonderful season at both ends of the park. For a big lad he is quick, and as well as being strong in the air is pretty nimble with his footwork as well, and I think he will score goals throughout his career. I heard him talk to the press about being a centre-half for Luton and eventually a centre-forward for Ireland, and my personal belief is that he will settle down to be a top class defender.

He scored again at Scunthorpe, and the result there was down to another good all-round team performance. We knew that Scunthorpe would have a right go at us in the opening stages, and so it proved. But we took the wind out of their sales with the first goal and once more I felt that from then on it was a game we would win. It might have been different if they had equalised from a penalty. We were not complaining about the trip being ruled a foul, but we were sure that Guy Ipoua was offside when he received the ball, so his miss from the spot simply put the record straight.

I know that the manager is concerned that we do not keep enough clean sheets, and we will try to do better on that score, but at the same time I don't think we should arumble too much about the goals against in view of the goals for column. We are set up as an attacking team, and we always fancy our chances of scoring goals. I accept that sometimes the defending should be better, and on that subject I thought that during the Colchester game, when we went behind, the shouts for the manager to be sacked were out of order. We were making the mistakes, not him. I have played under a few managers in more than ten years at Luton Town, and I bracket Lennie Lawrence and David Pleat together as being among the best in the game. In terms of tactics and football thinking they are very similar, and in the dressing room our feeling is that the boss and the coaches have done an excellent job. Think back to the situation last summer, and it's wonderful to be sitting in the top half of the table and well clear of the relegation dogfight before Easter. That hasn't happened here too often in my time!

Our target now is to overhaul Bristol City, and to make sure our old pal Tony Thorpe has a pointless return to Kenilworth Road. I speak to him regularly, and am pleased that he had the chance of playing at Wembley. But he was also looking forward to coming back here for tonight's game, even though he knows there is a distinct chance Alan White, Julian Watts and I will be taking it in turns to give him a bit of a going-over!

IT WAS ironic that with no match for the first team on Saturday our squad should be at its fittest for some time. The only player who would have been ruled out was Andrew Fotiadis, and he now has it confirmed

that he will not play again this season.

He dislocated and fractured a little finger when he crashed into a pitchside advert hoarding during a reserve game, and has had to undergo surgery for a pin to be inserted to stabilise the bone, which was knocked badly out of line.

The pin has to stay in for about a month, and there is no way he could risk playing football in the meantime. He is also restricted in his training. He has a splint on his hand which affects his balance, and can take no chances of any sort of contact with it. Tackling to win a ball is out of the question, as is the risk of being hit on the hand by a ball.

Obviously he can still work on general fitness, such as running and pedalling the exercise bike, but he must not do much more than that until the pin is removed.

Our only injury from Scunthorpe was to Matthew Spring, who twisted an ankle. It was swollen and sore, but nothing worse than bad bruising. He was under treatment for a few days, and unable to train in the early part of last week, but he would have been ready for Saturday if required.

My only other "customer" this week has been groundsman Richard Bird, who has been taking a bit of stick from the lads after suffering a knee injury while on duty. The word is that he came off second best when tackled by a lawn mower which was a touch more agile than him... We have Richard under treatment for a medial ligament injury, but I am glad to say it is not career-threatening! And thankfully the lawn mower is OK.

Hallars On Card

APRIL is often the month when vital league and cup issues are decided, and it has been an eventful time for Luton Town over the years. It was certainly so in 1937 when the Hatters were determined to secure promotion from the Third Division (South) after failing narrowly the previous year.

In those days only the champions were rewarded with elevation to Division Town, but as the last lap of the season approached the

Town were handily placed at the top of the chasing pack.

The nucleus of this side were featured on a cigarette card from а huge series produced by Ardath, who in 1936 pictured 700 over professional and amateur teams in "Phototheir cards" which were given away

with the firm's State Express cigarettes. Ironically, Luton's star performer, Joe Payne, was absent from the side when the photograph was taken, early in the campaign.

The following Saturday saw the return with Gillingham, and a slight hiccup for the promotion bandwagon, with a 1-0 defeat. However normal service was resumed at

five, this time with no reply. Payne's hat-trick brought his tally for the month to 13 and his total for the season to an incredible 56.

Promotion was eventually assured the following Saturday when a 2-0 victory over Torquay - both goals scored by Payne - led to jubilant scenes as the two points guaranteed the Town would finish clear of their nearest challengers, Notts County.

Incidentally, George Martin, who played in those early season games in place of Payne, and who later became Luton's manager, can be seen second from the left in the front row. Unfortunately for Luton collectors, the card is part of a sub-series of these photocards that is now rare, and consequently the most expensive, being catalogued at £3.50 each.



Tony's first job in professional football was as Youth Development Officer and Chief Scout at Leeds United back in1979. He stayed at Elland Road for seven years and, after 18 months living in Spain, returned to become Chief Scout

at Huddersfield Town in 1988. A year later Joe Jordan invited him to fill the same post at Bristol City and he has been at Ashton Gate ever since, serving as assistantmanager under Russell Osman in 1993 and 1994. DAVID BURNSIDE (ASSISTANT MANAGER)

He then became regional director to the Football Association and was England youth team manager for ten years before joining City initially as Director of Youth in January 1997.

BILLY MERCER

First-choice goalkeeper signed from Chesterfield in October '99 for £300,000 and has been in outstanding form since. Having started his career at Liverpool as a YT, Billy moved on to Rotherham United, where he made 104 League appearances before moving on to Sheffield United. After a loan spell at Saltergate, Billy signed for Chesterfield for £93,000 in December '95 where he starred in the Spirerites' 1997 FA Cup run which ended in a semi-final replay with Middlesborough.

MICKEY BELL

Formerly with Northampton Town for whom he made 177 appearances, the stylish defender was snapped up by City in July 1997 for a bargain £150,000 after impressive displays at Wycombe Wanderers. Mickey provides City with a number of options down the left flank. He is the club's main penalty and free-kick specialist and had scored 14 times for the club up to the start of this season.

LOUIS CAREY

Louis progressed through the youth ranks at Ashton Gate and was rewarded with a one-year contract in 1995. After an impressive first season at professional level, making 26 appearances following his debut in the 1-0

win at York in October 1995, he was rewarded with a new contract and is fast establishing himself as a firstteam regular. Gained international recognition last season when he was approached by the Scottish under-21 to attend a training session. Began his first team career as a right-back, but feels more at home in central defence.

GREG GOODRIDGE

A Barbadian international who has captained his country on more than 30 occasions. Played for Barbados side Lambada WI before starting his career in England in 1994 with Torquay United. After some impressive outings for the Devon Club, he made a £100,000 move to QPR, but made just nine substitute appearances for the London Club, scoring once. Moved to Bristol City during the summer of 1996 and immediately won over fans, scoring two on his debut against Luton Town. Since then he has continued to cause trouble to opposition defences with his electric pace and skill and is a regular member of the first team squad.

PAUL HOLLAND



Former England under-21 midfielder who moved to City for £200,000 in September 1999 from Chesterfield. Paul can play in central defence or midfield and began his career at Mansfield where he scored 25 goals in 149 appearances before

moving to Sheffield United in June 1995. His opportunities at United were limited, however, and he signed for Chesterfield in January 1996. Paul starred in the Derbyshire club's 1996/97 Cup run when they reached the FA Cup Semi-Final, and was later made club captain. Scored his first goal for City in the victory over Cheltenham in the Auto Windscreens Shield.

BRIAN TINNION

Started his League career in 1986, making 39 appearances in a three-year spell with Newcastle United before moving to Bradford City for £150,000. Was a virtual ever-present in the Bantams side in his four years there before moving to City for £180,000 in 1993. The cultured left-sided midfielder is seen as one of City's most influential players and has been virtually ever-present in the first-team, clocking up more than 225 appearances, including 14 goals. Will always be remembered for his legendary goal at Anfield that knocked Liverpool out of the FA Cup in a 1994 Third Round replay.

MARK SHAIL

A bargain-buy from non-league Yeovil Town in March 1993 for a fee of £45,000. Mark joined City after gaining representative honours for England at semi-professional level. The commanding centre-back was awarded the captaincy within six months of joining City, and skippered the side to their 1-0 Cup triumph over Liverpool at Anfield in January 1994. Unfortunately, since the end of the 1994/95 season Mark's career has been plagued by knee problems. After several brave attempts at a comeback, Mark finally forced himself back into the first team reckoning under Benny Lennartsson last season, making 22 full appearances.

STEVE PHILLIPS

Joined City in November 1996 from local non-league side Paulton Rovers. He has made steady progress at Ashton Gate under the watchful eye of goalkeeping coach Mike Gibson, which culminated in his first team debut versus Sheffield United in December 1998 when he kept a clean-sheet. He played a total of 16 games in last season's campaign and began this season as first choice before Billy Mercer's arrival.

IVAN TISTIMETANU

A regular in the Moldovan national side, Ivan is a defender who can also operate effectively in a midfield role. Strong in the tackle and a good reader of the game, Ivan signed for City for a fee of £225,000 from FC Zimbru after helping them to four consecutive Moldovan League titles from 1993 to 1996. He made his City debut in the Boxing Day clash at Watford in December 1998 and made eight appearances before being injured in an away game at West Bromwich Albion the following February. Ivan returned to the first team - following major knee surgery - as substitute at Oxford United in October.

ROBIN HULBERT

Former England Youth international midfielder snapped up on transfer deadline day in March 2000 for £25,000 from Swindon Town in a two-and-a-half year deal. Began his career at Everton before moving to Swindon on a three-and-a-half year contract, during which time he spent a spell on loan to Newcastle United. Has previously played under City's Director of Academy Dave Burnside for the England Youth side.

PETER BEADLE

Started his career at Gillingham as a YT before moving on to Tottenham Hotspur in a £300,000 deal. With no first-team appearances forthcoming, Peter spent Ioan spells with Bournemouth and Southend before making a permanent move to Watford in September '94. After 12 League appearances at Vicarage Road, Bristol Rovers paid £50,000 for his services in November '95. Following 110 League games and 39 goals, Peter moved on to First Division Port Vale in the summer of '98 for £300,000. After a matter of months at Vale Park, £250,000 took him to Notts County before his arrival at Ashton Gate for £200,000 in November 1999. Has since scored eight times.

TONY THORPE

City's leading scorer this season with six goals started his professional career with Luton Town after moving from Leicester City juniors as an attacking midfield player. He moved up front with devastating effect, scoring 31 goals during the 1996/97 season to become the top scorer in Division Two. Big-spending Fulham captured his signature during February 1998 for

£800,000, before he became City's second millionpound buy the following June. Tony struggled to break into the first team last season, but is City's leading scorer so far this season with 12 goals.

BEN WRIGHT

Promising young striker who was plucked from Conference side Kettering Town on transfer deadline day of the 1998-99 season. Ben was signed by Kettering after making a big impression in the Lincolnshire local leagues. Broke his arm during pre-season, but recovered by late September to score for the reserves in his first game back before making his debut as substitute at Bournemouth in January 2000.

MATT HEWLETT

The Bristol-born midfielder worked his way through the youth team to land a professional contract and made his senior debut in the 3-1 defeat at Wolves on the opening day of the 1993/94 season. He has also served Bath City and Burnley on loan. Matt has clocked up 120 appearances for the first team and represented England at youth level. He made the stand-by squad for the England under-21 fixture against Italy at Ashton Gate in February 1997. Has now recovered from a serious back problem and is back in the first-team squad.

KEVIN LANGAN

Signed a professional contract in July 1998 after developing through City's Centre of Excellence. Kevin can play in a central or wide defensive role. He made three substitute appearances during the 1997/98 season before making his debut at home to Bury under Benny Lennartsson last season.

SCOTT MURRAY

Signed from Aston Villa in December 1997 for an initial fee of £85,000, rising to £150,000 depending on appearances. Originally from Fraserburgh, Scott started his career as a striker at Villa Park before successfully converting to right wing-back/midfield. Scott struggled to win a first-team place at Villa, but has been an important member of City's first team squad for the last two seasons. He has won over City fans with his darting runs down the right flank and has now clocked up more than 70 first team appearances, including eight goals this term.

ANDREW JORDAN

Andrew can boast an impressive footballing pedigree he is son of former Scottish international and ex-City boss Joe Jordan. The strong, combative central defender has progressed through City's youth ranks since signing for the club in 1996. Last season Andrew overcame injury to make his first-team debut in City's final home game, helping to keep a clean sheet in the 1-0 win over Norwich City. This season has brought international recognition with a place in Scotland's Under-21 squad and a first City goal in the 2-1 Worthington Cup defeat at Nottingham Forest.

ALEX MEECHAN

A former Swindon Town trainee, Alex moved to City in July 1998 and made an immediate impact as a member of the Academy side. He made his debut as substitute in the final home game of last season versus Norwich City. One for the future, he has signed for City until the end of the 2000/01 season. Made his full first team debut in this season's Worthington Cup tie at Nottingham Forest.



KEVIN AMANKWAAH




KEITH MILLEN



Town shoot down the Robins



Luton Town manager, Harry Haslam, sat down during the summer of 1973 to draw up his plan of action for the following campaign and decided to do virtually nothing, taking on board the maxim 'If it's not broken do not fix it.'

His first full season in charge had seen wholesale changes to the playing staff and a new formation on the pitch which resulted in an incredible away record but at the cost of less than convincing performances at home. Haslam reckoned that minor tweaking here and there would result in a major push for a place in Division One.

Unfortunately all the planning and scheming was undone on the opening day of the new season when the Town went down 0-4 to an average Nottingham Forest side at the City Ground. There was not a single player in the Luton side that did himself justice in one of the most lifeless performances ever seen from the Hatters.

It was now back to the drawing board for Haslam and his backroom staff and the close season had, in effect, to be crammed into the seven days before the next game, at home to Carlisle.

No-one really knows what was said by Haslam following the Forest debacle but I would imagine that the normally genial manager had more than a few harsh words to throw at his players. Carlisle therefore took the backlash and the difference in the Town's performance was amazing to those of us that suffered at Nottingham.

Shots and headers from all angles rained in on the luckless Carlisle goalkeeper, and ex-Hatter, Alan Ross and when the players went off at the interval to a standing ovation the Town were 6-0 up. Quite understandably the players could not keep up the same tempo in the second half but we all knew that the season had now well and truly started.

28

Next up for the resurgent Town were Bristol City at Ashton Gate. The Robins, who were beginning to put together a side that would go on to greater things within a couple of years, had started the season in sparkling form and boasted a 100% record with no goals conceded.

The sun-soaked crowd of 12,208 looked on in amazement as the Town shattered their proud record within three minutes. Firstly wily winger John Aston beat two City defenders on the left and hit a low cross into the goalmouth. Tom Finney, the Town's only pre-season signing of note, dummied over the ball sending City goalkeeper Ray Cashley diving the wrong way and Aston's 'shot' crossed the line unmolested.

A minute later, Luton striker Barry Butlin ploughed through the middle leaving City defenders in his wake before squaring the ball to John Ryan who blasted home from inside the area.

City had been badly stung and fought back with a purpose but as the intense heat began to take its toll tempers flared and the referee had cause to book both Tom Ritchie of City and the Town's Alan Garner for fouls. Bobby Gould, normally reliable in front of goal, missed a glorious opportunity to put the Robins back into contention but eventually found the net, converting a spot kick just before the interval after being brought down by Hatters full back Don Shanks.

Luton supporters felt that City would come out for the second half with all guns blazing but it was the Town who made the game safe when Finney netted in the 47th minute leaving the rest of the match to be played out at barely quarter pace as the players gasped for breath in the fierce heat.

The weather was decidedly different when the return match took place in late December and so was the Town's form. Although we were still clinging on to third spot in the table we were one of a cluster of clubs behind runaway leaders Middlesbrough who were all intent on throwing away promotion due to inconsistency. Seven teams were within three points of each other with Reter Anderson heads the only goal of the game against Bristol City at Kenilworth Road in December 1973.

Peter Anderson, who on his day was one of the best midfield players in the country, ran the show that afternoon but all his promptings came to nothing as the forwards were thwarted time and time again by Bond. Frustrated by the

failure to break through, Anderson decided to show his team mates how to score and netted with a brilliant looping header after getting on the end of a long free kick from Bobby Thomson.

City came into the game late on and Don Gillies had a couple of half chances well saved by Graham Horn in the Luton goal but the points were always destined for the Hatters as they stuttered and stumbled on their way to eventual promotion.

SUPPORTERS were put through the mill before the Town gained revenge for a drubbing at Layer Road, thanks to two goals in the last 15 minutes.

By then each team had held the lead, with the Town failing to cash in when they had the visitors on the run in the first half.

Stuart Douglas, Andrew Fotiadis and Adam Locke were sidelined by injuries, with Phil Gray returning to attack to partner Gary Doherty and Matthew Spring recalled in midfield and Alan White in defence.

Gavin Johnson gave us an early fright on his return to Kenilworth Road, with a third-minute drive which came back off a post, but the nerves were settled after nine minutes when Julian Watts went upfield for a set piece and was ignored by the Colchester defence as he headed in a free kick by Spring.



Scunthorpe 1 Luton Town 2 (HT 0-2)

THE last time Luton Town went to Scunthorpe for a league match an 8-1 mauling confirmed our relegation to the old Fourth Division, in April 1965, so perhaps fate decreed that on our first trip back it would be to just about kill off Scunthorpe's hopes of avoiding the same drop. Victory was achieved with a little difficulty, and with some help from the home side's poor finishing - Scunthorpe even wasted a penalty.

We had the rare pleasure of three wins on the trot, for the first time since August 1998, but Scunthorpe made a real fight of it, even if their physical effort was sometimes considerably greater than their footballing skill.

The Scunthorpe fans gave their bunch of brave losers an ovation at the end of the game even though relegation is near-certain. On the day the visitors had been a touch too clever for their battling spirit.

The Town retained the starting line-up that had seen off Colchester, and the first concerted attack by either side brought an opening goal for Phil Gray on 13 minutes, with a crisp drive to end a smart passing move involving Matthew Taylor, Emmerson Boyce and Matthew Spring.

After that you got the feeling that the Town were comfortably in control without looking terribly lethal. Scunthorpe had billed the day as one on which they dare not lose, which perhaps added to their nervous tension. Guy Ipoua, who failed to persuade the Town to take him when he came here on trial early in the season, should have had the last laugh, but he shot wide when he was clean through two minutes after the goal, and then failed with a dubious penalty. The Town thought Ipoua was offside when he went down the left wing, then tumbled over a challenge by Boyce. There was no flag, just a whistle for a penalty, and Lennie Lawrence said it was poetic justice when Ipoua struck it against an upright.

Just before that Gary Doherty had been denied by a point-blank save, and two minutes before the break the Town were grateful to Ben Roberts, for blocking a 25-yard thunderbolt by Richard Logan, and reacting quickly to save bravely at the feet of Steve Torpey from the rebound.

And the Town got the break at the other end in stoppage time at the end of the first half, with a couple of rebounds falling nicely. It started with a cross played in by Liam George and Phil Gray heading the ball back. Taylor's shot was deflected onto a post by the keeper and the rebound fell to Doherty, who snapped up his eighth goal of the season, and his fourth in four games.

The game became a battle with Scunthorpe giving their all and threatening to score more often than the Town. But threat was all it amounted to, until Andy Dawson drove home from the edge of the box with 19 minutes to go. The Town rarely looked like allowing Scunthorpe's huffing and puffing to get the better of them, although Ipoua put a halfdecent lob onto the top of the bar and brought another good save out of Roberts. Alan White and Paul McLaren were just as close at the other end the home goalkeeper won the local sponsors' man of the match award which tells you something about the general pattern of the game.





The top and bottom of the table seem to be sorted out already, with Preston close to the championship and Chesterfield having little hope of avoiding relegation.

It began with their 2-0 success at Kenilworth Road a month ago.

Burnley are another team who have got it together after a meeting with Luton Town. After our 2-0 win at Turf Moor last month they have gone eight games without defeat to stay in the play-off zone, and to retain a chance of automatic promotion.

They left it late at Oxford, where the relegationthreatened home team led until the last five minutes, when Steve Davis equalised with his sixth goal of the season and Paul Weller grabbed a last-minute winner. Tonight Burnley use up their game in hand on the teams above them, at home to Gillingham, and will go second if they win.

Another former Luton man on target at the weekend was John Taylor, who got a hat-trick for Cambridge in their 4-0 win in a six-pointer at Cardiff. Chesterfield and Blackpool are as good as relegated, with Cardiff needing a miraculous revival to avoid going down with them.

Fans who were calling for Chesterfield manager John Duncan to be sacked on the day the Town won at Saltergate finally got their wish a week ago following a run of three more defeats. The Spirerites scraped a 1-1 draw at Bury on Saturday.

Scunthorpe have not given up hope yet - they bounced back from their home defeat by us with a win at Blackpool, and the fourth relegation spot looks like a battle between them and Oxford.
