Luton Town 1 Bristol City 2 (HT 0-1)

A ROUSING grandstand finish failed to save a game the Town were unlucky to lose on a wet Tuesday night. Bristol City were fresh from a disappointing and unlucky defeat in the Auto Windscreens Shield final at Wembley two days earlier, and were determined to bounce back in pursuit of a top eight finish in the table.

They looked the more likely side in the first half, with Ben Roberts pulling off a thrilling save to keep out a cracking shot by Paul Holland before Scott Murray chipped him for a clever opening goal.

After the break the Town stirred themselves, took the game to City. only to be caught on the break by a sucker-punch second goal. Gary Doherty replied within a minute, and in the closing stages the Bristol defence took a pounding, surviving by a mixture of luck, desperate defence, and less than brilliant finishing.

"In the second half we probably had more chances than in any other home game," said manager Lennie Lawrence. "We needed a little more anticipation in the box. That sort of result was probably bound to happen sooner or later, but from the number of chances we made we deserved a couple of goals at least. But credit to Bristol City after their disappointment at Wembley. They started very brightly, and the ten-day break has done absolutely nothing for us.

"After three straight wins we were looking for more than that. But Bristol City mugged us, and the second goal was diabolical defending. Gavin McGowan has just come on and the fellow has played it round him and waltzed it into the back of the net."

IT IS a pleasure to welcome Wigan and their supporters to Kenilworth Road for an attractive bank holiday game. Our visitors have been engaged in the promotion battle all season, and as a football club with

good financial backing they have come a long way in a short time since joining the Football League in 1978.

Their experience this season illustrates the standards at the top of this division - they have only recently lost an away game for the first time, and they lost only six of their first 42 matches, yet they were still off the pace for the title, and not even sure of automatic promotion. When the new century dawned, Wigan were the only unbeaten club in the whole of the Premiership and Nationwide League, and it was only this month that they lost away for the first time, at Oldham. Then they were beaten at Gillingham, in a game which I saw.

We were at Priestfield on Saturday, but these notes had to be written before that game, but obviously we were seeking to bounce back after the disappointment of the home match against Bristol City.

We didn't play at the necessary tempo in the first half, but afterwards our approach play was all right, and rarely will a team have created so many chances and lost. We had enough to win three games, but were let down by defensive lapses. I was not totally happy with our performance, but defeat was harsh, and it was a very good advert for Division Two football, with both sides playing with three attackers.

And you have to give credit to Bristol City for being well motivated after the disappointment of losing at Wembley in the Auto Windscreens Shield final. By contrast, we had gone ten days without a game, and in the event it didn't seem to do us much good. Losing at home in such circumstances was all the more disappointing

after managing three consecutive victories for the first time this season.

Today our penultimate home game gives us a golden opportunity to ensure that we end the season on a high note, and it is important that we do exactly that.

We face good quality opposition, and we have a fighting chance to improve our home record against clubs above us - and that is a record that needs improving. In all the big games away from home we have come up to scratch but like several other teams in this division we seem to struggle at home more than we should

We went into Easter with two targets - to reach 60 in points and goals, and it would be a welcome boost to achieve or better those. Today is our last chance to prove we can more than match one of the better teams in the division, and we will need a performance from first whistle to last, not just in short spells.

We want a good performance for other reasons too, not least to continue a reputation for giving decent value in terms of football entertainment. As always, we also need to finish the season well to help put us in the right shape to tackle the next campaign.

We went to Gillingham able to choose from a fully-fit squad, and thinking about team changes as we looked at the demands of three games in six days. There might be more changes today, and for the final two matches, but they will be made in the attempt to get good results.

I want good performances as well in our last two home games, by which time we should be further down the road in sorting out contracts for players who are considering their futures. Given the chance to keep those we want to retain, and add a Bosman or two in the summer, perhaps in 12 months time we could be in the situation our visitors are in today - or better!

WELCOME back Kenilworth Road - and if you are pleased to be at a Bank Holiday football match this afternoon, you can be sure that players are even happier at the prospect, particularly after

what happened in our last home game.

Printing schedules dictated that I had to write this column before Saturday's trip to Gillingham, and we will all know by now whether our determination to return to winning ways brought the desired result.

The Easter programme means two matches in three days, and in our case three games in less than a week. I have always preferred games to come thick and fast, because I think that helps players keep sharp and focused.

Players prefer competitive games to training, however much we enjoy our routine work between matches, and I wonder what effect, if any, it had on us when we had a rare ten-day break from league football before the Bristol City fixture.

I don't think it did us much good, in view of the result, even if we were unlucky not to save at least a point for our second-half display.

Bristol City had been involved in the Auto Windscreens Shield final at Wembley two days earlier, and having lost it we wondered if it might be a good time for us to catch them with a bit of a twin towers hang-over. I remember when I was a boy here (!) the depression that fell over Kenilworth Road in the immediate aftermath of our 1988 defeat by Reading in the Simod Cup at Wembley.

By all accounts Bristol City were unlucky on Sunday, losing to a controversial late goal, and to their credit they came to Luton well up for the game against us. We, by contrast started unbelievably slowly. Our plan was to get cracking early and play at a high tempo from the first whistle, but for reasons I still do not understand we could not do it in the first half. That was probably the most lethargic we have been at any time this season. Was it caused by ten days off from league football? I don't know, but it makes you wonder.

We didn't get going until the second half, and in the end City were very grateful to escape with only one goal conceded. The lesson was pretty plain on the night: City accepted the only decent second-half chance they created, and we missed a stack at the other end. It's pleasing to make so many chances. It would be even more satisfying if we had taken more of them.

Tony Thorpe was relieved to get a win on his return, and the fans' warm welcome to him was appreciated. I was glad to keep him off the score-sheet, but he was not too worried about that so long as others were hitting the target!

He is enjoying his football again at Ashton Gate, and we were all pleased for the success he is having now. A change of manager seems to have helped him, and perhaps that was not to our advantage - earlier this season we thought there was a very good chance that Thorpey would re-join us, and I am sure he would have slotted in quickly and effectively.

It wasn't to be, for various reasons, and if that has been our loss, it has been his gain, and he is proving with a vengeance that he is capable of scoring goals for clubs other than Luton. And while we have all been critical of our own performances in the match against Thorpey and his mates, I think they deserve some credit for coming to Luton and being up for the game.

I suspect the same will be true today of Wigan, and we are expecting a tough test against one of the very best teams in the division, and who fully deserve to be promotion favourites.

They beat us by the only goal at their place in October, at a time when we were just beginning to sort ourselves out. On the day we could easily have come home with some reward, so this afternoon is the perfect chance to redress the balance. But to do it, we must start at a decent tempo. We are young - well most of the rest of the lads are - and fit, and we need to try to do damage to the opposition early, Ideally, we want to run them off their feet and finish them off by half-time!

Much easier said than done, of course, and Wigan's need for promotion points will ensure we don't have an easy ride.



TODAY'S date is a historic one in the annals of Luton Town FC. April 24 has twice been something special for us.

It was on that day, back in 1968, that Luton clinched the Fourth Division championship with a marvellous display of attacking football that thumped Crewe 4-0.

For a new generation of Hatters, myself included, this was the first time we had anything

to cheer about after the club's unprecedented fall from the top flight, which began the year after we had been in the FA Cup final.

However, not even the most ardent supporters present at Kenilworth Road on that balmy Wednesday evening would have dreamed that exactly 20 years later, on a

Sunday, they would be at Wembley to watch Luton collect an even bigger prize.

By then, of course, Luton were established members of the old First Division, and the squad which defeated Arsenal in the 1988 Littlewoods Cup final was featured on a set of 175 cards produced by Topps, and endorsed by "Saint and Greavesie" - alias lan St. John and Jimmy Greaves, who hosted a popular Saturday lunch time football programme on ITV.

By co-incidence, today's visitors were the Town's initial opponents in that season's epic cup run. Micky Weir's goal gave us a 1-0 victory at Springfield Park, and Mick Harford claimed a hat-trick in the 4-2 second leg win over Wigan at Kenilworth Road. This was followed by tricky ties being safely negotiated against Coventry, Ipswich and Bradford City before Oxford United,

then also a First Division outfit, were overcome in the two-legged semi-final.

No supporter who was at Wembley on that gloriously sunny afternoon in April 1988 will ever forget the roller-coaster second half of that game against Arsenal. We led by Brian Stein's 14th-minute goal, missed chances early in the second half, and then found ourselves 2-1 down. Andy Dibble performed heroics in goal, but all seemed lost when a harsh penalty was

awarded against us. I remember looking up at that lovely blue sky and praying for a miracle. It came! Dibble himself into the history Luton books by saving Nigel Winterburn's spot kick and the game swung back towards the Town.

No-one there will need reminding how Gus Caesar of Arsenal himself into a

tangle leading up to Danny Wilson's equaliser, nor of how Ashley Grimes produced an astonishing left foot cross from the right wing for Stein's winner 14 seconds from time.

Incidentally, card No. 4 from this series shows Stein in the act of netting that goal, and other cards depict his brother Mark, Mick Harford and Mal Donaghy. To say it was a day to remember is an understatement, and I have already made a note to keep April 24 2008 free, just in case!

Collectors may find it a little difficult to identify these cards, as there is no clue to the manufacturer or series title to be found on them. The backs are what is known as "sectional" meaning that they form part of a large picture, like a jig-saw puzzle. When they appear on dealers' lists, it is usually for around 25p each.

Wycombe v Luton Town

Saturday April 29nd, kick-off 3pm

THE away season that began in the August sunshine at Nottingham comes to an end next Saturday, when we go to Adams Park to meet Wycombe Wanderers.

We can claim a proud record against the Chairboys - they have never beaten us in the league, on their ground or ours. It's not quite as good as it sounds, of course - Saturday's visit will be only our fourth to meet a team who came into the Football League in 1993, when they replaced Halifax.

Our record so far at Adams Park is two wins and a draw. Our first-ever visit was in September 1996. Andrew Fotiadis made his debut and David Oldfield netted the only goal of the game.

In 1997/98 it was 2-2, with Oldfield and Tony Thorpe on target for us, and when we went in August for the opening day of the 1998/99 campaign Steve Davis's goal gave us a 1-0 win. Matthew Spring might recall the other game against Wycombe that season with pride - be scored his first-ever league goal in our 3-1 victory at Kenilworth Road.

Wycombe's first two visits to Luton were 0-0 draws, and Stuart Douglas got our goal in October when the result was 1-1.

As usual the Bobbers Travel Club and Town on Tour will be operating services to Saturday's game. Town on Tour, an offshoot of the Luton Town Supporters Club, will set off from Maple Road at 12.30 and the fare is £7 for adult members of LTSC, £6 for junior and senior citizen members, and £8 for others.

The Bobbers Travel Club leave Cranfield at 11am and Kenilworth Road an hour later, and their fare is £6.50 for adults and £5.50 for pensioners and under-16s.

Stewarded car parking is available for all coach travellers at Maple Road, price £3.

The game is an all-ticket match for Luton supporters, and tickets have to be purchased from the Kenilworth Road ticket office by 4pm on Friday.

DIY Travellers

THE road journey to Wycombe is one of the easiest and quickest of the season, although it can be frustrating trying to leave the ground after the match because of the limited access to the main roads from the industrial area in which Adams Park stands. There is only one way in and out.

You can do the journey from Luton in an hour comfortably. Leave town on the M1 going south, and then take the M25 heading west, signposted towards Heathrow. Leave M25 at junction 16, to join the M40, taking care to head west, signposted towards Birmingham, and not towards London. Leave M40 at junction 4. Follow the signs towards Aylesbury A4010 for 2.3 miles, over three roundabouts. After going down a long hill you come to a mini-roundabout where you turn left into Lane End Road. After half a mile turn right at a roundabout, signposted to the industrial estate, into Hillbottom Road, and that leads you to the ground.

Boger Wash FROM THE COST

How football has changed



'Nowadays the game is to cut out the fancy stuff and use the most direct methods possible. Psychology is playing a big part now, and the aim of every player is to be that split second quicker than the other fellow.' These words could have

been written today but were actually penned over 60 years ago by newly appointed coach at Kenilworth Road, George Martin!

Just before the outbreak of the last War the 'Beds and Herts Evening Telegraph' ran a series of articles featuring the staff at Kenilworth Road. All the players of the time were highlighted but one intriguing piece gave Martin the chance to have his say under the title, 'How football has changed.'

George had always wanted to be a professional footballer in his native Scotland but his father was strongly against it and fought hard to prevent him from playing at all and he had to wait until his 16th birthday before he finally got his own way.

Motherwell wanted to sign him but to keep his father half happy he played junior amateur football for Cadzow St Annes who went on to win every competition they entered. Finally bowing to the inevitable, father gave in and George, spoilt for choice, opted to sign for Hamilton.

Playing at centre forward for Hamilton, George scored his first league goal against the mighty Celtic and never looked back until an outbreak of boils forced him out of the side. After regaining full fitness he was loaned out to Bo'ness and from there he moved south of the border to Hull where manager Bill McCracken converted him to insideleft after saying that he was too clever to play at centre-forward!

It was during his time at Anlaby Road that George came to the attention of Everton after a couple of stirring F.A.Cup ties that saw the young Scot net the winner in a replay against the men from

Goodison. It was not long after that Everton got their way and George moved to Merseyside just as the Toffees were about to win the championship of the old Division Two.

George was a regular in the side that won the Division One championship in 1928 and set up a fair number of goals for Dixie Dean who broke the League scoring record with 60, a record that is unlikely to be beaten. Two seasons later Everton were relegated but bounced straight back up, although just before the end of that campaign George was transferred to Middlesbrough where, for the first time in his career, he was dropped and ended up spending a miserable year on Teesside.

The chance to come to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1933 was therefore grabbed with both hands and he joined a Luton side that was slowly being built up for a tilt at promotion to the old Division Two. Enjoying playing alongside such centre-forwards as Andy Rennie, Jack Ball and Tom Tait the goals flowed as the Hatters moved nearer and nearer to promotion.

Having played alongside the record breaking Dixie Dean, George was about to partner another legend in Joe Payne who exploded onto the football map over Easter 1936 in devastating fashion. Playing his first game at centre-forward, Payne destroyed luckless Bristol Rovers at Kenilworth Road and after the dust had settled, following an amazing 12-0 win, it was found that he had netted a record ten times.

George Martin played no little part in the victory and seeing that Payne could do no wrong played the ball to him at every opportunity leaving the centre-forward to do the rest. Unfortunately the following campaign, during which Payne broke the Division Three scoring record when banging in 55 goals, was to be George's last in league football but such was his great knowledge of the game that he was appointed coach just before War broke out followed by the role of team manager during the hostilities.



It was a difficult job to be a football club manager in that period when, quite naturally, the minds of the vast majority of the population were fixed on other things. George Martin therefore earned much credit for building a strong youth set up of mainly local talent that was to form the backbone of a promising Luton Town side that featured strongly in Division Two once

the War ended.

One of George Martin's early games in charge during the 1946/47 season saw the Hatters turn a 0-3 interval deficit against a powerful Newcastle outfit into a 4-3 victory. It was probably this performance that alerted the board at St James' Park to turn to George when they were seeking a new manager during the following close season and it was on Tyneside that, aided by a seemingly bottomless pit of money, he forged a side that won promotion in front of average home crowds of over 56,000.

Newcastle at the time were controlled by powerful chairman Stan Seymour who it would appear dabbled in team affairs too much for George's liking and he decided to take the opportunity to move to Aston Villa in 1950. His Birmingham

was not a success and he left the game altogether and concentrated on his business interests which took him to Liverpool and then back to Luton.

On returning to Luton he accepted the part-time post of chief scout in 1960 which allowed him to keep his eye in but five years later, against his better judgement, he came back into management at Kenilworth Road at a time when we were going through the worst playing period in our history.

Frankly, George was too old for the job having turned 66 and although he almost led the side to promotion from Division Four in his first full season in charge he was glad to be relieved of his duties in November 1966 when Allan Brown took over.

Still retaining an interest in goings on at Kenilworth Road right up until his death in 1972, George Martin holds down a big place in the clubs history as player, coach, scout and manager as well as being instrumental in bringing John Moore to Kenilworth Road!







The Carling Opta stat-attack compares two of today's top midfielders



PAUL McLaren has come back into the Luton side in recent weeks and shown some nice touches to suggest that he is over the injury that kept him out for a period of the season. His only goal so far this season was an important one - the dramatic late equaliser against Cambridge United in the 2-2 draw at Kenilworth Road in March.

Neil Redfearn will be up against McLaren this afternoon, keen to get back to winning ways following Wigan's 2-1 defeat at the hands of play-off chasing Gillingham at Priestfield and the defeat at Boundary Park against Oldham by the same scoreline. Wigan were at home to Reading on Saturday, but Easter holiday printing deadlines mean we cannot include Saturday's matches in these stats.

Redfearn has been a big hit at the JJB Stadium since his switch from Bradford City. He has scored four times, and has distributed the ball accurately from

McLaren has been the better crosser of the ball, which indicates that Redfearn stays in the middle of the park to spray his passes rather than going wide on to the flanks.

Redfern has perfect dribbling statistics, suggesting that his experience helps him avoid trouble so that he only runs with the ball when he knows that he is going to be able to retain possession for his team.

McLaren has not been afraid to get stuck in and has won just over half of the tackles he has attempted. Redfearn has the higher success percentage but this will reduce as he makes more challenges as the season comes to a close.

Lennie Lawrence will hope that McLaren avoids another booking this season as he is due a suspension if he receives another caution during the campaign.

Redfearn will need to be on top form as there is a great deal of competition for places in the Wigan midfield, especially now Alan McLoughlin is fit after a long spell out of the side with a back injury.

"In the photo, on a rather wet day, are Dora, Peter, Paul, Melvin, John and his children Daniel and Kaylegh, and myself."







It was a real showdown day, with City needing only to draw to survive and send us down instead. City had not even been in the bottom three before that final day of the season, so their pain was all the greater after 17 years in the top flight. Mr Benson lost his job as a result of the Town's heroics. Today he is manager of Wigan, poised to right the record to some degree as they look like going up,

Preston are all but there, set for promotion as champions, while Wigan, Millwall, Bristol Rovers and Burnley lead the fight for the other automatic promotion place.

Printing schedules because of the Easter holiday mean that we are unable to report on games on Friday and Saturday, when Wigan were at home to Reading while Deepdale hosted Scunthorpe. The big crunch game was Burnley v Millwall, all the more important for Burnley because on Tuesday they went down to defeat in another six-pointer, 3-0 at home to Gillingham.

As Lennie Lawrence commented, it has been astonishing this season how often top teams, with the exception of Preston, have failed to win important home games. We can be grateful the same is true of other middling teams - while we were losing to Bristol City on Tuesday Oldham, our final opponents of the season, missed the chance to overtake us by losing 2-1 at home to bottom club Chesterfield. It was only their second away win of the season and ended a run of nine games without a win.

We are still highly unlikely to play them next season. but we might have a re-union with an old Hatters hero, if he keeps his job. Brian Horton is manager of Port Vale, who look like being relegated from the First Division. If they are, it will be the first time it has happened to Horton as a manager. He has also been in charge at Hull, Oxford, Manchester City, Huddersfield and Brighton.

For many of us, he will for ever be revered for skippering the 1982 Second Division championship side. John Benson might remember him too - Horton was our captain at Maine Road on May 14, 1983. doing his bit towards getting Mr Benson sacked.

Incidentally, two current Town staff were also involved that day, Trevor Hartley as a coach, and Clive Goodyear, physio now but then a centre-half who helped to keep one of the most important clean sheets in our history. John Sheridan was the sponge man at Maine Road, furiously polluting the atmosphere with his pipe in the dug-out, and is still connected with the Town, as consultant physio.
