## Kandol hot as Hatters make point

NEVER-SAY-DIE Luton Town came away with a point in a memorable 3-3 draw at the Memorial Ground.
Ricky Hill's Hatters have now gone 10 games since their last victory, but if they continue to show the same enterprise and spirit as they did against Bristol Rovers on Saturday-that elusive win will be just around the corner.
Luton trailed 2-0 and 3-1 at Bristol, but two goals from teenage striker Tresor Kandol and a Liam George wonder-strike earned the visitors a share of the spoils.
Remarkably, at the other end, Hatters keeper Mark Ovendale did not make a save during the match. Bristol's first three shots on target hit the back of the net and the fourth—an 89th-minute header by sub Moussa Dagnogo — was cleared from under his own crossbar by Matthew Taylor.
Luton dominated the game for long periods after wobbling for the opening 25 minutes. Rovers took the lead on 14 minutes when Marcus Bignot's cross lured Ovendale off his line and left Steve Foster with the simple task of heading over the Hatters keeper, who was stranded in no-man's-land.
Bignot then wasted two opportunities to increase the home side's lead, failing to

capitalise on a paucity of marking in the Hatters penalty box. But there were also defensive gaps to be exploited in Bristol's back-line and Luton should have pulled at least one goal back with three chances in four

minutes.
