Stuart stings the Bees as he nets first ever double

STUART DOUGLAS staged a comeback to rival Lazarus as he helped lift the

gloom at Kenilworth Road.

The 22-year-old striker was thrust into the action after just one reserve match and four training sessions since picking up a pre-season hamstring injury.

But he resympted in devectation

But he responded in devastating fashion, scoring twice as the Hatters stormed to a 3-1 victory – their first win in 14 attempts!

Remarkably, the double-strike ended a 17-game barren spell for Douglas whose last goal was the Hatters first of the new millennium.

The London-born forward managed four goals in 48 matches last season but took just 29 minutes to net his first ever brace on Saturday.

Douglas terrorised Brentford's sluggish centre-half pairing of Scott Marshall and Ivar Ingimarsson from the start and he should have opened the scoring after 12 minutes.

An excellently-timed run saw him burst clear of the Bees defence to collect Matthew Spring's perfect pass.

Douglas then delicately lifted the ball over onrushing away keeper Olafur Gottskalksson only to see his effort bounce agonisingly wide.

Moments later, Liam George's inventive back heel was ruled out by an offside flag but the two strikers combined on 17 minutes to give their side a deserved lead.

Brentford markers to race onto George's through ball and beat Gottskalksson with a low drive across the Icelandic keeper that pinged in off a post.

Twelve minutes later, Douglas started and finished a move to net the Hatters second goal.

His headed flick-on found Mark Stein who jostled for possession with two Brentford defenders before the ball broke loose

before the ball broke loose in the visitors' penalty

before the ball broke loose in the visitors' penalty box. An alert Douglas used his pace and power to pounce and sidefoot under the body of Gottskalksson. Six minutes later, Stein collected Matthew Taylor's pass into the penalty box before tumbling under a challenge from Ingimarson. Referee Steve Dums a challenge from Ingimar-sson. Referee Steve Dunn pointed to the spot and Spring placed the penalty into Gottskalksson's bot-tom right-hand corner. Luton's fans were in raptures as their team, brimming with new-found
