Abbey thwarts the Quakers!

NATHAN ABBEY was the Hatters' FA Cup hero at Darlington on Saturday as Lil Fuccillo's men forced a second round replay.

The 22-year-old keeper made three excellent saves to keep his side in the tie before a late rally from Luton could have seen the visitors snatch victory

Abbey thwarted home striker Richard Hodgson twice in one-on-one situations during the first-half and then pulled off a brilliant diving save to prevent Gary Himsworth's 35-yard piledriver from rocketing into the top corner

That save left Fuccillo purring at the final whistle and full of praise for Abbey, who continues to keep £425,000 summer signing Mark Ovendale on the bench.

The Hatters boss said: "Nathan Abbey's last save was fantastic. I thought it was in from the touchline and am still not convinced he saved it.

"I think there was a brick wall there. He's keeping an expensive keeper out of the team, but the team picks itself on merit and I can't drop Nathan Abbey because

of the way he's currently playing. "He won the Save of the Month award in October and he might get it again for this month. It's all credit to him because he works very hard. He was down in the dumps last season, but he's been seeing more of the Ipswich Town goalkeeping coach Malcolm Webster and I think that's making him a much better keeper.

"It gives everybody in the side great confidence to have him making such good saves and knowing that it's got to be one hell of a goal to beat us.'

But if Fuccillo was delighted with Abbey's display he was less enamoured with Peter Thomson's performance against the Quakers.

Thomson, the recent two-goal hero at Stoke, missed an 86thminute sitter to settle the tie at Darlington and an unimpressed Fuccillo said: "Matthew Taylor put a good cross on Thomson's head and, for some unknown reason, he did not score. It was the best chance of the game.

The keeper was beaten by the cross but, incredibly, Thomson headed it over from five yards. I matchfacts
