Wigan's experienced centre-halves Arjan de Zeeuw, Stuart Balmer and Pat McGibbon were all in imperious form as the visitors enhanced their reputation as the meanest defence in

reputation as the meanest defence in the division and the gulf between the two sides was not only confirmed by a glance at the league table before the game but also by the respective substitutes bench.

The Hatters included largely untested trio Jude Stirling, Friedrich Breitenfelder and Peter Thomson while the visitors dugout boasted former top-flight stars Keith Gillespie, Neil Redfearn and Carl Bradshaw.
Bruce Rioch's men are a Division One team in waiting, as they have proved in their recent close shaves with promotion.

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The whole set-up at the JJB Stadium suggests Wigan can emulate the relative success of Lancashire neighbours Preston and Burnley if they do go up in May.

But Luton could still have made them work harder for their three points at Kenilworth Road.
