LUTON TOWN failed to give a demoralising 3-2 defeat at Bournemouth on Monday.

Lil Fuccillo's men were leading 2-1 with just seven minutes left to play thanks to goals from Andrew Fotiadis and Adam Locke.

But the Hatters pressed the selfdestruct button when Jude Stirling conceded a penalty that was converted by Richard Hughes and impressive on-loan West Ham striker Jermain Defoe went on to net the 86th-minute winner.

Matthew Taylor's red card for swearing at referee Paul Alcock then completed a very painful end to a game that had just minutes earlier promised a priceless three points towards the Hatters' desperate fight against promotion.

The game's opening exchanges were played in a curiously morgue-like atmosphere before bursting into life on 39 minutes.

Hatters boss Fuccillo retained the same starting line-up that lost 2-0 to Wigan on Saturday but lost Julian Watts with a recurrence of his hamstring injury.

Physio Bruce Sewell signalled immediately to the bench that Watts was unfit to continue but the visitors were unable to make the substitution because, staggeringly. Stirling had left his shirt in the dressing room.

But puzzling second-half tactics saw the visitors hand the initiative back to Bournemouth.

The visitors chose to defend their slender advantage by putting 11 men behind the ball and looked to catch their opponents on the break instead of pressing forward for a third goal to kill the game off.

A hard-working Fotiadis was left alone up front with his striking partner Nogan switched to a more withdrawn midfield role.

It seemed a baffling approach, considering Luton's recent defen-sive record but almost paid off when Taylor's 54th-minute header was tipped over brilliantly by Stewart after more good work from Fotiadis and Nogan.


A bobble then caused Spring to slice wide with only Stewart to beat before Bournemouth began to take advantage of the possession given them and apply pressure at the other end.
