# Jones is mystified

GET down the bookies now and put some money on Rovers to grab a flukey winner at Northampton tomorrow.

Because there seems to be a distinct pattern of bad luck followed by good luck emerging from the Pirates' recent away games.

Their previous 0-0 draw on enemy soil came at Wigan last month when the referee later admitted he made a howler in not awarding the visitors a clear-cut penalty.

But at Bournemouth last week, Garry Thompson's battling troops had luck on their side when they nailed down a vital 2-1 win over the

Lady Luck was again definitely dealing cards from the bottom of the deck at Kenilworth Road, with defender Scott Jones admitting he was as puzzled as everyone as to why his second-half header from a Marcus Bignot corner was ruled

"I've no idea," admitted the Yorkshireman. "There were bodies everywhere and I'm sure Luton had people on the posts.

"The referee was only five yards away, the linesman was 25 yards away but he's given no goal. He said it was offside, but I can't see how."

Thompson too was bemused, saying: "The referee said he thought Ansah Owusu was interfering with play, although I don't know how as Scott headed the ball straight in.

"But the official has made a decision and there is nothing we can do - apart from get on with it."

Rovers have indeed been getting on with it quite nicely over the past five games, and could be

forgiven for feeling slightly aggrieved that they did not take all three points on the balance of play -especially after the break.

The early signs had been ominous as Luton made by far the better start and had Rovers on the back foot in the opening minutes, Paul McLaren clipping the angle of post and bar with a sixthminute floater from 25 yards.

But Rovers then began to settle and impose themselves, stifling the Hatters' front men as they strengthened their grip in midfield.

Much of that was due to the impressive efforts of Dwayne Plummer, who had clearly been busting a gut to return to action after his dismissal at Millwall a month ago - and marked his reappearance with an outstanding display.

Things looked bad for his midfield colleague Simon Bryant when he was caught by an ugly challenge by McLaren late in the half and left the field on a stretcher, and it was something of a mystery how the Luton man escaped with just a lengthy talking-to from referee Paul Danson.

But Rovers gave a hint of what was to come shortly before the break when Nathan Ellington rose to meet a Che Wilson cross and saw the ball bounce off the crossbar via a deflection from Julian Watts.

It was Watts who squandered one of Luton's few clear openings early in the second half when he was badly off target with a free header from a

But the impetus then started to go firmly Rovers' way as the home side spent long spells trapped inside their own half, angering their fans by frequently giving the ball away.

Apart from another misdirected header by Liam George, the remaining openings belonged to the visitors with Mark McKeever seeing a left-foot volley bounce a foot wide and the rock solid Steve Foster having a close-range chance blocked by the grounded Watts, who had also taken the full force of a stinging strike from substitute Vitalijs Astafjevs.

"We're looking like a side again and the fact we're on a bit of a roll has given us more confidence," reflected Jones.

"Perhaps we could have been a bit more direct because we had the ball a lot in the middle of the field without creating too many shots on goal, but that's something we can work on.

'We were delighted with the clean sheet. Steve Foster came off with his eye split open and that sums up what we are doing at the moment throwing our bodies in the way and making it hard for teams.

'We knew it was a six-pointer coming into the game and feel we could have won it. But we stopped Luton making any ground on catching us up, so we're happy with that."

#### **Post Verdict**

ANOTHER useful point for Rovers, who looked the likelier of the two sides to grab all three. It's a result that stands them in good stead to Sixfields.


