



MARK Stein wore a black armband on Tuesday, when he returned to the Town team for the game against Reading. It was his very personal tribute to his old friend David Rocastle, whose death from cancer at the age of 33, shocked everyone in football, and underlined once more that Bill Shankly's comment about soccer being more than a matter of life and death was utter nonsense.

A game, a business, a profession to enjoy, sure. But football was put into even greater perspective at Kenilworth Road on Monday. Another tragedy struck closer to home, when Joe Kinnear was given the dreadful news that his 18-year-old niece had been killed in a yachting accident in Australia. Our hearts go out to Joe, and his family. Charlotte Lenas, from Watford, was the daughter of Joe's sister, and only a couple of weeks ago there had been a happy family party before the teenager set off for Australia. She was on a gap year between school and university, and had signed up for a yachting course. An accident six miles off shore led to the boat sinking and Charlotte



We all send our sympathy to Joe and the family, and also pay tribute to his professionalism. Having attended to family responsibilities on Monday, the day news of the tragedy was phoned to his distraught sister, Joe was back at Kenilworth

Road on Tuesday to prepare the team for the difficult match with Reading. Mark Stein knew how the boss felt, because he too was in mourning for the loss of a young life. Many of us remember David Rocastle best when he was at his peak, as a player at Arsenal when we were also in the old First Division. Mark played against him a few times, but became a close friend when he and Rocastle spent three years together at Chelsea.

"He was the best man you could ever meet," said the Town striker. "We had been close for years, and I can't begin to express how bad I felt when he was taken ill, and then died.

"I decided to wear the black armband on Tuesday night out of respect, and I am only sorry I didn't score on the night. I wanted to get a goal for David.

"He kept his illness under wraps, and although I knew it was very serious it was still a tremendous shock when he died. It makes you realise that whatever ups and downs you have in football, it's still a game."

The most famous match involving Rocastle and the Town was the 1988 Littlewoods Cup final, when Brian Stein scored twice and made the other goal for Danny Wilson in a dramatic Town victory.

Brian said: "I was glad I knew David Rocastle. He was a rare talent, and off the field a lovely man, a real gentleman. It's tragic, and perhaps a little frightening,

when you hear that a man like that has died so young, and left three children without their father."

At Chelsea, Rocastle and Mark Stein occasionally talked about their meeting on the pitch at Wembley in April 1988. "He used to say I had helped Luton to steal his winner's medal. But it was said with a laugh, and certainly with no bitterness. He hadn't an ounce of ill-will in his body. I used to say that he dived to win the penalty that Andy Dibble saved when Arsenal might have gone 3-1 up. Not at all, he would reply. But he would say that with a laugh as well. "It is such a tragedy that such a nice man and such a good player should be dead at 33, when you think you are in the prime of life. It makes you think, doesn't it?"

Your reporter flicked through the video of the 1988 final, as he often does when he needs a lift, and for the first time noticed that when the game ended and Ray Harford strode onto the pitch to embrace Steve Foster, the first man to shake hands with them both and offer his congratulations was David Rocastle.



The Manager Joe Kinnear

WELCOME back to Kenilworth Road, and I think my first

words today should be to express my thanks to two important sets of people who are vital to every football club - the players, and the fans. I am s peaking, of course, about the reaction to Tuesday's game against Reading, which was every bit as tough as I expected it to be.

There had been some straight talking between me and the players after the poor display which cost us dear at Colchester, but my parting words were that the game was gone, we could not change the result, and we had to learn the right lessons, and be ready to do a proper job against Reading. I think we did, and it was good to hear the crowd respond to our efforts. It is one of football's enduring mysteries that teams can be brilliant one match, poor the next. Our situation, however, is that we simply cannot afford to be poor in any of our remaining

The league table says it all - we are still adrift of the safety mark, and the two games in hand on Cambridge and Swindon have obviously got to be turned into six points. Achieve that, which is by no means an impossible task with so many of our remaining games at home, and the table will be much more interesting, and more encouraging

I am desperate to see the club remain in this division. Luton Town is looking well set off the field, with the recent good news about Paul Fletcher's appointment in connection with the new stadium development. The directors have a very clear vision of what they want to achieve, and it was because of their ambition that I agreed to come here. Ambition can be as high as you like, and it has two major threads for us: a good team

and a good stadium. I am confident in my ability to play my part, while the directors play theirs, and you, the supporters, can also help.

Stay loyal, follow us through thick and thin, and together we can help Luton Town move upwards again in the football world. I want to kick off next season still in Division Two, with an improved squad, and with a realistic chance of mounting a challenge for promotion. Our players are under no illusions about the job I expect them to do. Give every ounce of effort, be thoroughly professional and we can do it.

I look at the remaining fixtures, and see that six of our last nine are at home. We are unbeaten at Kenilworth Road since I arrived, and that record must be maintained. We have to be positive and look for maximum points - just think of what 18 from six home games can do. That alone is incentive enough for us all to strive for a run of victories.

Stoke City will provide another stern test, as Reading did on Tuesday. They are enjoying a good season, with an excellent chance of being in the play-offs. The league table says Reading are a little better than Stoke, and we can take heart from the fact that we might easily have beaten Reading on Tuesday. Mark Stein and Lee Mansell both had very good efforts well saved when we came fighting back after an early reverse.

That fighting spirit was what I demanded after the Colchester match, and if we show it again today we must have every chance of putting on further pressure on the teams just above us in the table. I anticipate the game will be a fascinating contest, and I hope it turns out to be one players and supporters alike enjoy.

Captain's Log Marvin Johnson

I HAVE heard two views of our game against Reading, and

both were reflected in the dressing room afterwards. One was that we were pleased to prove that we could match a very good side. I rate Reading as one of the best in this division, fully deserving to be favourites for promotion. But the other thought was that an honourable draw was less than we required - we all know how important it is for the club to take maximum points from the present run of consecutive home games. If a draw was something of a disappointment, I think we might also bear in mind that earlier this season it was the sort of game we would probably have lost, especially after conceding an early goal.

It was important for us to stand up and hit back quickly, and we did. As a defender I almost - but only almost! - felt sorry for the lad who headed into his own net. But it was down to good technique by Matty Spring. It was a tremendous delivery, whipped in with real pace, and the best of those balls are just about undefendable. The Reading man could not really be blamed - he did well to get near it. The trouble with own goals is that they tend to be remembered for a long time. I still get stick occasionally for one I scored for Aston Villa when Les Sealey missed my back pass - and that was in 1988!

The quick equaliser gave us a lift, and on the first half run of play we might easily have been ahead by the interval. But I also have to admit that Reading shaded the second half, so over the 90 minutes I think the draw was a fair result. It was one of those games where both teams did so well that neither deserved to be beaten.

We made a real fight of it against a very good team, and that must be our policy in every game. We have to make home advantage count, but we know Stoke will be up for it today because they too are battling for promotion.

Our fight, of course, is to stay in the division, and we believe we have the ability to do it. It would be nice to get an overdue double under our belts, but I am sure Stoke come here today having been reminded by their manager that Luton might be down near the bottom of the table, but they were capable of winning 3-1 at the Britannia Stadium in December.

I played in that game, and we were good value for the points. If we are on form this afternoon, we can do it again, and if you look at the squad we are now stronger than we were then.

It was interesting to see Mark Stein and Steve Howard working in tandem on Tuesday. Steve looks a very good acquisition, and Mark has enough experience to be able to read what the big man is planning, and get off the mark early to be in the right place to gather up the flickons and knock-downs. That is no disrespect to Liam George or Stuart Douglas - just a fact of life that they, lucky lads, are not in the over-30s club like some of us!

Probably we enjoy our football all the more as we get older, and I am impatiently awaiting my turn to try to get back into the side after my injury worries. I hope to be considered for a return to the first team squad in two or three weeks. But I realise it could well be a real battle to regain my place. If the back three perform consistently as well as they did against the dangerous Martin Butler and Jamie Cureton, I am likely to be left on the touchline. Frustrating, yes, but if it means Luton Town are winning games and getting out of trouble, I will sit in the dug-out for as long as it takes. All I hope is that we keep it up today, and then, perhaps, add six more points next week,

when we have two more home games, against

Oxford and Oldham.



The results of the scan were themselves a tonic for him.

Adam Locke has got over his hamstring strain, and is training again, but Kent Karlsen and Andrew Fotiadis must undergo more treatment before they can start to exert themselves on the training pitch.

Karlsen has worked very hard to get over the knee ligament injury which has kept him out since early December. He is now running at just about full pace, and able to strike a ball at very nearly full power, and I hope that he might be able to resume training before the end of next week.

Andrew Fotiadis is having consultations with a specialist about his groin strain, which is clearing up slowly. He will probably have a scan early next week to help us determine the next stage in his treatment.



EVACUATION PROCEDURE

IN THE event of any emergency in the stadium, Luton Town FC and the emergency services have agreed on an evacuation procedure which is designed to ensure the safe and controlled evacuation of the crowd, and to ensure their safe dispersal from the area, to allow the emergency services to carry out their tasks.

In the event of evacuation from all or part of the stadium, you will receive instructions over the public address system on how you should leave. In an evacuation of the main stand you will be instructed to use the pitch. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available. On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.





GUDJON THORDARSON - MANAGER

November 1999 saw an Icelandic Consortium take over the controlling share of Stoke City Football Club. Their first decision was to appoint Gudjon Thordarson. A manger with great experience of European Football, especially in Iceland, which also included him being national coach. His first season saw him take Stoke City to Wembley in the Autowindscreens trophy and him being the first Icelandic Manager to win a cup final at Wembley. Promotion to Division one was also narrowly missed in his first season in English football.

JOHN RUDGE - FOOTBALL EXECUTIVE

Born in Wolverhampton in October 1944. His playing career saw him released as a schoolboy and he then joined Huddersfield as an apprentice. His playing career took him to Carlisle, Bristol Rovers and Bournemouth. He began coaching at Torquay before being asked to assist John McGrath at port Vale. He then took temporary charge of port Vale in December 1983 and was appointed manager in March 1984. His reign lasted 843 games and he left Port Vale in January 1999.

On Friday 16th July 1999 he was appointed as the new Football Executive at Stoke City.



Son of manager Gudjon Thordarson, he is an Icelandic international and has skippered their under-21 side.



NO.8 - GRAHAM KAVANAGH - MIDFIELD

ONE of the longest serving players at the club following his £500,000 arrival from Middlesbrough four years ago. Graham has been on the fringes of the Republic of Ireland squad

for the past couple of seasons since scoring his first goal for his country on his senior debut against Sweden and remains one of the most complete midfielders in Division Two, highlighted by his selection for the PFA Second Division team.

Undoubtedly talented, with a fierce shot, he is dangerous from free-kicks and open play around the edge of the 18-yard box.

When on-song he can turn a game on its head and few will forget his opening goal against Bristol City at Wembley in the Auto Windscreens Shield final last April, enhancing his reputation as a player for the bigger stage.

trick at Bristol Rovers, and continued his purple patch at Wembley, where he made history by becoming the first Englishman to score for City at the stadium - the winner against Bristol City in the Auto Windscreens Shield final.



NO.10 - RIKHARDUR DADASON - FORWARD

Born: Reykjavik, Iceland - 26/04/72 Height: 6ft 4in Weight: 12st Made a sensational City debut when he scored the winning goal against Barnsley in the Worthington Cup in November seconds from the end of the game and just three minutes after coming on as sub.

Rikhardur is a big striker with an eye for goal. He scored 25 in 25 games for Viking in the Norwegian league last season and attracted interest from SV Hamburg. His link with Gudjon Thordarson, formerly his national coach with Iceland, persuaded him to come to the Potteries instead.



NO.12 - KYLE LIGHTBOURNE - FORWARD

Born: Bermuda - 29/09/68 Height: 6ft 2in Weight: 12st Bermudan international now in his fourth season with the club having been signed by former boss Chris Kamara midway through the 1997/98 season. Kyle has often been the willing workhorse in the shadow of Peter

But he signed a 12-month contract at the Britannia although has made it clear he will consider retiring at the end of the current campaign after a glittering career which has also embraced Aston Villa, Chelsea, Leeds and Italy's Serie A with Torino.

A member of the England squad which reached the 1990 World Cup semi-finals, his track record amounts to over 600 games, mostly at the highest level.

His experience and the respect in which he is held in the dressing room led to him being appointed team captain shortly after his arrival, and although he has not figured in every game this season he has created strong competition with Clive Clarke for the left-back berth.





Blast from the Past

Roger Wash

Town fail to make the Potters crack

After the Town won promotion from the old Division Two as champions in 1982 it was a confident side that took to the field for their first game back in the top flight for seven years.

In front of a White Hart Lane crowd of 39,180 the Hatters' confidence soon took a knock when Garry Mabbutt, making his debut for the F.A.Cup holders, scored an early goal. Worse was to follow with Micky Hazard putting the Spurs two up and Luton supporters could have been forgiven for thinking that perhaps there was a bigger chasm between the top two divisions than had previously been thought. To the players' credit however, they fought back, and when Brian Stein fired home the equaliser in the second half it was Spurs who were rocking, and for a time a famous victory looked on the cards.

An eventual draw was seen as a fair result, but it was back to the drawing board three days later when West Ham, the first visitors to Kenilworth Road, returned to London with all three points following a 2-0 victory and a demonstration of how to punish defensive lapses and take chances.

The next game saw Notts County visit Kenilworth Road to finish 3-5 losers in a rollercoaster match that could have finished ten-all. The only summer signing of note, Paul Walsh, broke his goalscoring duck when netting a hattrick including one sublime effort which was shortlisted for 'Goal of the Season'.

All this good work was undone with a 1-4 defeat at Aston Villa that ably demonstrated the defensive frailties that were beginning to show, and once more sowed seeds of doubt as to our prospects for the remainder of the sea-

Certainly if the Town's forward line was on song then the crowd was in for a goal feast and this was fully demonstrated when the players returned from league champions, Liverpool, with a point after a pulsating 3-3 draw. When travelling back from this game I played over in my mind a match that had everything, ranging from tremendous goals, three different players turning out in goal for the Town and a fortunate late leveller from the Reds. I was then rudely awakened by the radio confirmation of the league table that revealed the loss of two points had dropped the Hatters to 18th posi-

Another day, another game, and all was right in my world the following Saturday when a poor Brighton side was seen off 5-0 at Kenilworth Road, with Brian Stein netting a hat-trick and Wayne Turner scoring with a brilliant overhead kick to send us back into the top half of the table.

With all these goals flying in at both ends at matches featuring the Town it was no surprise that the television companies were beginning to show an interest and the cameras were again present when the Hatters visited the Victoria Ground, Stoke in our next game. The Potters were riding high in fourth place following back to back wins over Swansea and Ipswich and a best of the season crowd of 18,475 turned up to see if they could improve on that position, while we were hoping for the long overdue first away win back in the top flight.

The game turned out to be a cracker but there were no signs of the fireworks to come when Stoke took the lead after ten minutes with George Berry getting on the end of a well rehearsed corner kick routine.

By now the match was bubbling as it swung end to end but then referee, Gilbert Napthine, decided to cause a bit of controversy by sending off Stoke goalkeeper Peter Fox and refusing to play an advantage which would have led to a Luton equaliser.

Walsh was bearing down on goal, and Fox charged out of his area and handled in an attempt to prevent a certain leveller. Walsh won the tussle and netted, but the referee pulled play back, sent off Fox and awarded a free kick that was well saved by replacement goalkeeper, Paul Bracewell.

Brian Stein did eventually equalise for the Town just before half-time to set up a finely poised second period, which saw Bracewell replaced by Derek Parkin in the Potters goal.

It was just as well that Bracewell was taken out of goal as he headed his side into the lead once more, after 50 minutes, only for Stein to level the score again shortly afterwards.

With the Stoke rearguard reeling, defender Mal Donaghy finally put the Town into the lead for the first time with a rare goal soon after the hour mark. Stoke, however, refused to give up and Brendan O'Callaghan brought the score to

an incredible 4-4 with just seven minutes left on the clock.

The match still had one final twist for, with the final seconds ticking away, Stoke's ten men were caught stretched and Stein was tripped from behind when he looked certain to score. From the resulting spot kick the normally reliable David Moss hit the post and the final chance of winning all three points was gone. In retrospect Stoke deserved a point for their fighting display with only ten men. If we had won then we would not have needed to endure the drama of the final showdown of the season at Maine Road, Manchester. But that is another story!

Hatters on Card

STOKE City are one of the League's oldest clubs, and it is not surprising that guite a lot of men have played for the Potters and the Hatters over the years. One was striker Viv Busby, who was featured in a series of cards given away by Tiger comic - famous for its "Roy of the Rovers" stories - in 1971. Busby joined Luton in the 1969/70 season from his home town outfit Wycombe Wanderers, who were then still an amateur club. He made his debut on Good Friday, 1970, starring in a home victory over Rotherham. He kept his place for the vital promotion

clash with Reading the following day, a game which saw the Town run out 5-0 winners, with Busby scoring his first league goal. He figured in all the remaining games that season, which ended in Luton securing runners-up spot in the old Third Division. He played an important part in the run-in, scoring three times, including a superb solo effort against Southport at Kenilworth Road which made promotion virtually certain.

In the higher company Busby played in the opening fixture at Bolton, but then appeared only sporadically, often having to be content with a place on the subs'

However, as the Town threatened to go all the way to a second consecutive promotion, the young

inside-forward was recalled for the last dozen matches. Once again he made a positive impression, and formed a potent striking partnership with Malcolm Macdonald.

Thirty years ago, on the first Saturday in April, highflying Birmingham City were the visitors to Kenilworth Road, with their teenage sensation Trevor Francis never having been on the losing side thus far in his short career. It looked as though the run would continue as City took an early two-goal lead, but then Busby stole the headlines, netting twice before Alan Slough hit the winner. That was in front of a crowd of over 25,000, but the following week the promotion bid all but disappeared with a disastrous Easter which saw three games lost in four days.

The Town eventually finished sixth, and there was more disappointment for Hatters fans that summer when their hero, Macdonald, was sold to Newcastle. Much was expected of Busby in the following season, but he struggled without Macdonald, and soon lost his place in the side. Newcastle took him on loan that December, re-uniting him with SuperMac, but his spell there co-incided with Newcastle's FA Cup defeat at non-league Hereford and Busby was soon sent back to Luton. He had lost his shooting boots, managing just two goals from 21 appear-

ances for the Town. Near-identical figures the following season resulted in Harry Haslam accepting a £35,000 bid from Fulham in the summer of 1973. Slough made the same journey, for £45,000. It was former Town boss Alec Stock who took them to Craven Cottage, and this may have had something to do with Busby's return to form. Whatever the reason, Busby was a success at Fulham and was instrumental in their progress to the FA Cup final in 1975. He and Slough picked up runners-up medals after West Ham won 2-0.

Busby's next move was to topflight Norwich City in 1976, and it was from the Canaries that he moved to Stoke in November 1977. The following season Stoke

gained promotion to the First Division - now the Premiership - and Busby contributed five goals from 18 league outings. He then went to America, before finishing his playing career with spells at Blackburn and York. In total he clocked up 73 goals in 301 Football League outings. He then embarked on a coaching career which embraced several clubs, including Sunderland, Hartlepool, Sheffield Utd,

Action Replay

Colchester Utd 3 Luton Town 1 (HT 3-0)

THE EXCELLENT performance by the Town on Tuesday evening, when they held promotion contenders Reading to a draw, was in stark contrast to the poor display we saw at Colchester on Saturday.

A game to forget, said Joe Kinnear, after the chance to move closer to safety was thrown away by failure to meet a tactic he had warned his men to expect.

The manager had spent some time looking at the video of Colchester's 3-0 victory at Kenilworth Road in December, and as a result spent much of his team talk reminding the players that they had been caught out all too easily on that day by not picking up runners from deep positions.

So the boss was not too pleased to see the Town go two down in the first 37 minutes on Saturday... by not picking up runners from deep positions.

Veteran midfielder Micky Stockwell profited both times, with former Town men playing important roles.

It was a bit of a haunting experience against a team containing three players who used to be at Kenilworth Road - Gavin Johnson, Aaron Skelton and Alan White all made telling contributions, with White's the only one we almost enjoyed, when he gave away a late penalty for a consolation goal.

The Town display was a disappointment as once more over a thousand optimistic supporters took to the road to back the team.

The manager admitted: "It wasn't a particularly good performance and the players are aware of that. But prior to that they had done exceptionally well so it was not a case of getting on the players' backs, but to get them in the right frame of mind for Tuesday, and Reading."

For the second half, with the game all but over as Colchester led 3-0, the Town took off midfielder Keith Rowland and sent on Stuart Douglas to become the third attacker, alongside Steve Howard and Liam George.

They looked more likely as an attacking force, although Colchester were by then content to take it easy. In terms of attempts at goal, the Town were more impressive, but it was the home side who showed how to make the best of their opportunities. The opening goal, in the 16th minute, was a case in point: Petri Helin set up George for a run in the inside right position. George chose to shoot rather than cross, and the keeper made the save from the angled drive, and launched the counter-attack which had the ball in the net at the other end seconds later. A free kick led to Stockwell netting again on 37 minutes.

The Town thought the penalty that led to the third Colchester goal was harsh, but the one awarded against White in the closing minutes balanced it out.

Matthew Spring, who had missed with his last attempt from the spot, at Northampton, was ready to take responsibility again, but Howard grabbed the ball and then struck a real striker's effort into the roof of the net to register his first Luton Town goal.





The under-16s have played only five matches so far, and are second, with Vicky Moody scoring nine of their 43 goals to date.




AMY GRAY scoring against Kempton for the Under 14 squad.



FOR the second time in four days the Town entertain promotion

hopefuls this afternoon, a Stoke side with an away record not guite as impressive as Reading's, but still highly respectable.

Our need for points is as great as Stoke's, who are clinging on to a play-off position after missing the chance to move up into fifth place on Tuesday when they were beaten 2-0 by Millwall at the New Den. At the other end of the table, Oxford, who come here on Tuesday, were beaten 4-3 at Bournemouth, despite two more goals by Phil Gray.

Our hopes that Bristol City would do us a favour by beating Bristol Rovers at the Memorial Ground did not quite materialise as the game ended 1-1, leaving Rovers three points above the Town, and with a game in hand.

Swansea lost again, at Colchester, who are now just about safe, and the Town's ability to collect plenty of points from three home games in eight days will go a long way to showing if the drop is to be avoided. It's still a difficult, but not impossible task. The need is to overcome an eight-point deficit on Cambridge

Port Vale, in trouble at the turn of the year, have eased their worries considerably, and Brian Horton has been named Division Two manager of the month for his team's exploits in March - played 4, drawn 2, lost 0 in the league, and beat Stoke and Lincoln to reach the LDV Vans Trophy final at Cardiff. One place above the relegation zone just over a month ago, Port Vale consolidated 17th place on Tuesday with a 1-1 draw at home to Wrexham.

Reading boss Alan Pardew left Kenilworth Road on Tuesday night reasonably content with the draw, but adding that he expected more from his side against teams at the lower end of the table, and promising they would go all out for three points today, at Cambridge. We wish him well in his endeavours! Likewise, a Northampton victory over Andy King's Swindon would be handy, provided, of course, we can see off Stoke's challenge.

Their away record in the league shows seven wins, eight draws and only five defeats. They took maximum points from Bristol City, Colchester, Wrexham, Swindon, Bristol Rovers, Peterborough and Wycombe. The draws were at Reading, Port Vale, Cambridge, Northampton, Wigan, Notts County, Oxford and Brentford, and Stoke's away defeats were at Swansea, Walsall, Rotherham, Bury and Millwall.
