Worthington Cup

One Leg Format Introduced

Next season's Worthington Cup will be played over one leg in the first two rounds and not two as it was this season, it has been announced.

Football League Chief Executive David Burns revealed that Lincoln City and Leicester City proposed the change, which was then agreed by the other League clubs at their March divisional meetings.

"It is a positive development that will mean more entertaining football for fans and even more surprise results than ever before," said Burns. "I am certain we can look forward to an exciting and financially rewarding Worthington Cup next season."

The competition will also carry a UEFA Cup place for the winners next season - the Cup's 42nd year and the fourth of the five-year sponsorship with Worthington, made by Bass Brewers.

The Football League also revealed that 1.5 million fans watched the games in this season's Worthington Cup - up nine per cent on the season before - and that II million people saw the final on television when Liverpool beat Birmingham City in a penalty shoot-out at Cardiff.

Next season, the final will be shown free on terrestrial television by ITV.



David Burns, chief executive of the Football League, said: "This new agreement is confirmation that the Football League and its 72 clubs remain at the heart of the nation's favourite game.

"We are delighted to continue with what has been one of the most successful sponsorships in modern sport.

"Nationwide has been good for football and the Football League has been good for

"The sponsorship has been so successful because of the values we share. We both have strong involvement in the community and have a philosophy based on sharing and mutual support."

Burns added: "With almost 14 million people attending league games each year and strong ties with communities the length and breadth of the country, the Football League remains a powerful and attractive vehicle for sponsors.

"The return of our games to free-to-air television further strengthened the package we were able to offer to meet the strategic objectives of Nationwide.

"We are looking forward to three very successful years together and hopefully many

Last summer the Football League concluded a £315m three-year arrangement with ONdigital and ITV, which includes 15 live Sundays of games being shown on ITV as well as the Division One play-off final.

The TV deal proceeds, as well as the sponsorship revenue, will go towards helping the sometimes precarious financial position of Nationwide League clubs.

Stuart Bernau, Nationwide's marketing and commercial director, said: "It's a great deal for both parties.

"Nationwide Building Society is delighted to continue its association as the sponsor of the world's original league football competition.

"The relationship that Nationwide and the Football League have enjoyed over the past five seasons has been one of the best in football. We believe that it will be replicated and built on over the coming three seasons."

Under the deal, which runs from next season to the end of the 2003-2004 campaign, Nationwide will still sponsor the manager and save of the month awards, the man of the match awards for live games and the fair play league.

They are also continuing their 'season of promise' scheme which provides £10,000 to each Football League club to help disadvantaged and minority groups attend matches.

Stewards' Training Presentation

As we announced in the Notts County programme, the club has just received official notification that it has had its application for accreditation under the new Footballing Stewarding Qualification approved by the National Verification Manager.

This award was launched last season in a joint venture between The Football League, The Football Association and the FA Premier League.

The FSQ is designed to measure how effectively stewards' training has been carried out at clubs. The initiative has been developed in consultation with the Football Licensing Authority and the Football Safety Officers' Association, with financial support provided by the Football Foundation.


The Football Stewarding Qualification Scheme was launched in September 1999, when clubs were presented with details of the criteria they would need to satisfy in order to qualify for the award. Applying clubs are visited by a National Verification Manager appointed by the football authorities and the award is given to those clubs whose arrangements for the training and assessment of their stewards best meet the criteria laid down.

Jack Crawford, The League's Security Adviser, who will present the award to Wrexham, said: "This is an important step forward in our efforts to improve the standards of stewarding in throughout football. The football authorities are promoting the highest professional standards in stewards' training, contributing to an even safer environment for spectators at all our football grounds. 

Our opponents today are battling for their lives in the relegation dogfight, so we know that anything we gain out of this afternoon's meeting will be well


Joe Kinnear has recently joined them and he seems to have had an immediate impact with a sequence of results that has given the Kenilworth support some reasons to be hopeful.

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




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The Field of (bad) Dreams

After defeating the Danes from Lyngby, Wrexham were designated a 'seeded' team by UEFA. We thus found ourselves drawn to play the 'unseeded' Manchester United in round two!

ASKING TOO MUCH

It was asking a bit too much for Wrexham, struggling near the foot of Division Four and 85 places below Manchester United in the Football League, to upset the "Red Devils" at their Old Trafford home. Especially as we were also hampered by the 'three foreigner' ruling, which meant we forced to leave out a number of regular first teamers and draft in YTS lads to fill their places.

But, Wrexham were by no means disgraced and can look forward eagerly, if not with too much expectation, to the return leg.

United, who, barring miracles, should progress to the quarter-finals, were kept at bay until the 41st minute before finally breaking down the resistance of Wrexham's stubborn defence.

The Welsh outfit deserved to have gone in at half-time still on level terms. And, had they held out, the anxiety which was starting to creep into the United ranks may have accelerated into desperation. Indeed, United's fans in the 29,405 crowd were not altogether liking the progress (or, lack of it) made by their side. And, whistles of derision were beginning to come from parts of this fine stadium.

GOOD START

For 41 minutes Wrexham were very much in there with a shout. In fact, before the double hammer blow just before half-time, the sort of result we wanted for the second leg looked a possibility.

Brian Flynn's red and white army were very much on the march early on. Only three minutes had gone when Flynn himself had Wrexham fans roaring as he got Chris Armstrong away down the right wing. Armstrong's acceleration took him

past Clayton Blackmore and his cross left United 'keeper, Les Sealey, stranded at the near post. With the goal gaping, Graham Cooper raced in at the far post but just failed to connect.

This scare rocked the home side into life and Lee Sharpe, United's man of the match, broke away from Waynne Phillips only to see his cross blasted over by Brian McClair. The Wrexham defence then allowed Paul Ince room to run at them and his low shot was just wide.

With Brian Flynn and Sean Reck outstanding in midfield, United were finding it hard to set up clear cut chances and looked anything but assertive. They were pensive and edgy with Neil Webb, their midfield maestro, being kept quiet by Reck. He went everywhere with Webb and that unquestionably kept Wrexham in the game.

It was a crunching Reck tackle on Ince that launched Wrexham's next attack. He set Armstrong free but, as Wrexham fans turned up the volume, Flynn couldn't make the most of the ball when it arrived.

The United faithful were far from happy, although Ince went close with another shot and only a great tackle by Nigel Beaumont denied Mark Hughes.

Back came Wrexham and Flynn received the ball just inside the United half. He evaded Webb's challenge and, from 20 yards, unleashed a fierce shot which Sealy just managed to palm over the bar. This brought the first corner of the game but, unfortunately, it came to nothing.

Reck was then yellow carded for a foul on Lee Sharpe but Wrexham had grown in confidence. Beaumont was having a good game against Mark Hughes and Alan Kennedy's domination of Danny Wallace was such that the United winger was later substituted for Mark Robins.



MINUTES OF MISERY

Another Armstrong cross was again agonisingly close to getting Cooper in, but then United almost scored. Webb's corner was met by Gary Pallister and his header hit the bar.

Hughes then made an opening but volleyed just over as Wrexham refused to lie down. Wrexham held their breath when Phillips clattered into Sharpe as he raced into the area, but Spanish referee, Martin Navarrete, who had a good game, only gave a goal kick.

Wrexham 'keeper Mark Morris then saved a Hughes header under his crossbar before tipping over a header from Pallister.

Then came two minutes which changed the course of the game. Webb's corner was flicked on by Steve Bruce and Brian McClair headed home. To concede a goal at that time was a big blow.

Worse was to follow though. Sharpe seemed to foul Phillips, but the ball fell to Mike Williams so the referee waved play on. However, 'Sparky' whisked the ball away in a flash and went for goal. He wrong footed Beaumont, whose challenge brought Hughes to earth. Bruce took the penalty and though Morris got a hand to the ball, he couldn't keep it out. It was a relieved United side that went in at the break just a minute later!

SECOND HALF

Despite these set-backs, Wrexham began the second period brightly and nearly grabbed a vital away goal. Kennedy advanced down the left and sent over a deep cross. Armstrong climbed well and his powerful, downward header just scraped the wrong side of the post, with Sealy nowhere.

After that, Wrexham were forced to fight a rearguard action as United went looking for a third goal. It came on 59 minutes when we failed to mark properly at a corner.

Webb's kick was initially headed away by Jon Bowden, but it fell to Pallister who blasted home a 25 yarder for 3-0.

Accurate passing and good off the ball running began to drag Wrexham out of shape, but Morris made great saves from Ince, Sharpe and one in particular from a Hughes

downward header.

Wrexham boss, Brian Flynn said his team had worn their shirts with pride and, ever the optimist, commented: "If we get an early goal at home, anything can happen." The dream lives on!

AT THE 'COURSE

Manchester United's arrival must have brought back memories of their last visit in the 1957 FA Cup, when the 'Busby Babes' won 5-0. This time around, the "new" United needed two games to match that scoreline.

Facing the almost impossible task of clawing back a three goal deficit, Wrexham set about their job in a manner which delighted the home fans in the 13,327 crowd. From the start, Wrexham took the game to United and created a few half chances and Les Sealy had to be quickly off his line to deny Graham Cooper.

However, on 30 minutes, Paul Ince repaid some of his £5,000 per match transfer fee. He went on a diagonal run across the edge of the Wrexham penalty area before finding Mark Robins, who accepted the chance.

Shortly after this, Denis Irwin's deep corner kick was met by Gary Pallister's downward header. Mark Morris parried the ball away, but Steve Bruce prodded the ball in from close range for 2-0.

Late on, young Kevin Jones, on in place of Chris Armstrong, chipped a shot, only for Sealy to palm the effort away in acrobatic style.


While we did lose both legs, it was to the eventual competition winners and in no way was this young Wrexham side disgraced. Indeed, it was another fine chapter in our European history.











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





Wales v Armenia

David Roberts looks back at his recent trip to Armenia

Raining Goals in the Land of Noah

When the draw for the 2002 World Cup Qualifying competition was made, I doubt few if any Welsh fans had ever contemplated travelling the 2,500 miles to Armenia.

An Orthodox Christian country, Armenia is dominated by Mount Ararat where Noah's Ark is said to have settled after the great flood. Clearly visible from the capital Yerevan even though it now lies technically in Turkey, Mount Ararat is said to be some 3.5 million years old and at its peak is 5,165 meters above sea level. Indeed according to one of Armenia's many legends, when God created the world he sieved the soil and threw the softest part to one side and the stones to the other, exactly where Armenia now stands.



Throughout its history, the country has long been the subject of conflict and, whilst always retaining its own identity, Armenians have had to endure various rulers. By 1828 Armenia had become incorporated into Russia but border conflicts with Turkey persisted. Then, in 1915, the Turks massacred over 60,000 Armenians, an act which culminated in Armenia becoming part of the USSR in 1920.

Armenian leaders since then have been preoccupied by the conflict with Azerbaijan over Nagorno-Karabakh, a predominantly Armenian-occupied exclave, assigned to Azerbaijan in the 1920's by Moscow. The struggle escalated after both countries gained independence from the Soviet Union in 1991 and the economies of both sides have been hurt

by their inability to make substantial progress towards a peaceful solution.

The former Soviet republic has endured a troubled existence in more recent times, with over 50,000 people killed in two separate earthquakes, followed by the assassination of its head of state some two years ago, shot dead during a parliamentary debate.

The advice on health care for such a trip also made for interesting reading: "A reciprocal agreement for urgent medical treatment exists with the UK, although proof of UK residence is required. Power shortages and disrupted medical supplies have undermined normal health services to such a degree that travellers would be well advised to consider a health insurance policy guaranteeing emergency evacuation in case of serious accident or illness, as medical insurance is not often valid within the country.

"Doctors and hospitals often expect immediate cash payment for health services. Travellers are also advised to take a supply of those medicines that they are likely to require (but check first that they may be legally imported) as there is a severe shortage of even the most basic medical supplies, such as disposable needles, anaesthetics and antibiotics." So, all in all, your typically holiday destination!

Having thus questioned my own sanity and arrived at a worrying conclusion, I decided that I was on my way to Yerevan.

Direct flights to the country's main Zvartnots airport are somewhat scarce and so it was no surprise that the Welsh team decided to charter a plane for the arduous journey with the flight scheduled to leave Cardiff at 10.00 a.m. on the Wednesday morning.

With the Reds in action against Bury the night before, it was a case of having to leave for South Wales at 4.30 a.m. The forecast snow was already falling and the blizzard conditions between Wrexham and Shrewsbury made driving particularly interesting. The thought even crossed my mind that it seemed more difficult to reach South Wales than the borders of Asia!

Thankfully, the weather relented and once past Monmouth the roads became clear and I eventually arrived at Cardiff airport at 8.30 a.m. to meet up with the rest of the Press Party. That said, the radio confirmed the effects the inclement



weather was having on the whole of the UK, with Luton Airport closed and delays across the southern counties.

Having checked in, it soon became apparent that the flight would be delayed. The plane was still at Stanstead Airport and the artic conditions meant that all the planes there had to be de-iced before they could take-off.

After a near three-hour delay, the plane finally arrived in Cardiff and we were on our way buoyed by the news that the strong prevailing winds meant that we would not require a refuelling stop in Bucharest. This meant that the flying time would be just over four-and-a-half hours with a scheduled landing time of circa 9.30 p.m. given the four-hour time difference.

The flight passed reasonably quickly and we were soon being bussed to the airport terminal building in Yerevan. The only slight problem at this was that the automatic doors on the airport buses refused to close, but this didn't seem to worry the driver who then sped off much to the consternation of those close to the doors!

Compared to various Eastern European countries, passport control was relatively efficient and we were soon ushered through to the baggage collection point. In an ideal world, this later process would have taken some 30-40 minutes. However, the Armenian authorities managed to keep us waiting for over 90 minutes before the luggage duly arrived; bearing in mind we were the only plane to land at the airport that evening I dread to think how they would cope with, the Easter Bank Holiday rush.

After a 20-minute coach ride, we arrived at the Hotel Ani Plaza, dropped the bags into the room and headed off to explore down town Yerevan.

The first thing that became apparent was the lack of street lighting. This meant that the search for nightlife was concentrated on the main thoroughfare, Abovian Street. Despite the place being seemingly deserted, we noticed a sign for a Bar and so decided to investigate. The entrance then led to a lift in which no more than three people could fit at any time. Whilst it seemed to be a definite fire hazard, we pressed the button marked 'Bar' and found ourselves in what was most

definitely a local's bar. That said, the hospitality afforded to us was excellent and we enjoyed a couple of hours sampling the local beer, which I have to say was most palatable.

Thursday began brightly, with the weather surprisingly mild. Walking around the main streets in daylight gave one the chance to get one's bearings, with the majority of shops and hotels being based along Abovian Street. This led directly to the Republican Square, a most imposing open plan area around which were situated various Government Buildings, including the National Museum of History.

Turning left off the Republican Square took you down towards the stadium, before which was a large open-air market. The market was dominated by woodcarvings, many of which depicted the Armenian alphabet or the 700th anniversary of Christianity in Armenia. Other store-holders had paintings of Mount Ararat available, or traditional Russian dolls.

On the fringes of the market were people selling all manner of items in a seemingly desperate bid to alleviate the poverty in which they found themselves; such things as television and radio parts, many of which seemed to belong in a museum.

The poverty was quite distressing, particularly as it was so evident in many of the 'properties' in and around the main streets. In part, this was the result of the recent earthquake but the general living conditions in which some people had to exist were quite sobering.

After returning to the Team Hotel for lunch, I along with several other members of the press party decided to watch the senior side train in the afternoon. During the course of the morning, Welsh manager Mark Hughes had visited some seven possible training locations before deciding on what can only be described as a mud-heap of a pitch on the outskirts of the city.


Given that the Armenians had trained there in the morning, it was clear that there was not a great deal of choice available. In all honesty, the pitch was more akin to Sunday League football with the groundsman memorably requesting that the players "only train on the green bits!"

recognising that this was the best that such a poor country could offer.

After the journalists had filed their copy, it was off to a Russian owned restaurant that had been recommended by some Americans staying at the Hotel. Whilst seemingly struggling to cope with such a large party, the food was fine, as was the local Armenian red wine. Next stop was the Hollywood Bar, a more western-style club that became the base for many of the Welsh fans over the course of the trip.

The coach trip to the Under-21 game in Abovian on the Friday gave further food for thought. The extent of the poverty endemic in Armenia became apparent on the roads leading out of Yerevan, with 'shanty' towns built on little more than rock faces. Mainly built of tin sheeting, running water and electricity would be mere pipe dreams for the inhabitants. The lack of infrastructure was also evident in the roads, with potholes every few yards, which made for a very bumpy ride on the

Abovian itself was a typically dour Eastern European city, with the ground surrounded on one side by blocks of flats on the other by a stunning view of Mount Ararat. The contrast was sublime as the temperature dropped quickly to make for a brisk afternoon watching football.

The game itself was a disappointment with Wales controlling possession for long periods but without ever threatening the Armenia goal. A draw seemed to be the likely result before the home side scored with a rare attack inside the last few minutes. Their success prompted wild celebrations at the final whistle and few Welsh fans would begrudge the joy their success meant to the local fans.

Prior to the match, Rob Phillips of BBC Radio Wales had asked whether I would like to be interviewed about the trip and my thoughts on Armenia in general. The prospect of fame and fortune immediately raced through my mind. Then I realised that this was the BBC and so those goals would have to wait until I win the National Lottery!

Along with a fellow Welsh supporter, Huw from Aberdare, we spoke for about ten minutes back to the studio in Cardiff. Huw had only arrived late the previous night but was staying until the following Tuesday. In essence, we both agreed that the beauty of visiting such a country as Armenia was the hospitality you received. The people have so little but are prepared to give so much in return.

Back in Yerevan, I met up with Marcus, a Bristol-based Welsh fan trying to travel around all the various European countries. With him on this trip were two English fans and the three of them were going onto Moscow after the match, before returning to Heathrow to fly back out to Albania for the England match the following Wednesday.

With a Lonely Plant guide book in hand, we decided to

explore a few of the more remote bars around the city, only to get ourselves totally lost in the Asian sector. In Armenia, the custom is for virtually all entertaining to take place in private homes and that was certainly the case where we went, with most of the bars seemingly deserted.

I woke on Saturday morning to find that the weather had taken a decided turn for the worst, with the rain lashing down outside the Hotel window. Therefore, Mark Currie and myself headed for the National History Museum that bore testimony to the various conflicts Armenia has endured, particularly the Turkish massacre of 1915. The astonishing fact was the realisation that many of the buildings which had been built several centuries before were superior to those inhabited in current times.

With the rain now stopped, I ventured down to the Republican Stadium to take some photographs of the new ground, which has been built courtesy of financial assistance from FIFA.

Once again, the contrast of the newly built stadium to the tin shacks on the hills overlooking it was thought provoking. Inside, the ground was a standard bowl shape with a running track around it. The cantilever roof was most impressive save for one thing. The only part that was actually covered was on the main stand side. Therefore, virtually everybody was going to get very wet!

By now the heavens had well and truly opened and I was thankfully able to stop a taxi and get back to the hotel before resembling too much of a drowned water rat!

With having to check out of the rooms by 3.00 p.m. and the senior match not kicking-off at 9.00 p.m. local time, the intervening period was spent chatting in the Hotel Bar, wondering whether Wales could avoid the disasters which had befallen the side in previous trips to Moldova, Georgia and

With the luggage packed onto the coach given that we were heading for the airport straight after the match, we left for the ground some two hours before kick-off. The rain was constant and the thought did cross my mind, of being greeted by Noah's Ark parked at the ground!


The game itself proved to be a thoroughly entertaining affair, with John Hartson's brace of goals securing a point in a 2-2 draw. It was a game Wales could and should have won but the final score-line did, in the land of Noah, have a certain symmetry to it - being two by two!

The flight home took nearly nine hours, including a refuelling stop in Bucharest, and we touched down in Cardiff at 6.30 a.m. Having had barely one hours sleep in 30, I felt surprisingly fresh and so decided to drive home to Wrexham. I finally got back in the house at 10.00 a.m. and went straight to bed for a long and well deserved rest.

Oh, the joys of watching Wales.

Ask any Luton fan what they want from their football club these days, and they will probably reply in one word, "stability". Over a long period of time now Luton have struggled both on and off the field, as the modern game has squeezed the life out of the smaller clubs, and into that category Luton have fallen.

We at Wrexham know the limits of ambition these days more than most, but for a follower of Luton, reality these days is a far cry from the time only nine years ago when they were a top flight club. It probably pains them still to think that they were relegated from the top division, at the point of inception of the Premier League, and given all the riches that it brings these days, if Luton could have survived a season longer, maybe their situation would now be very different.

Things almost came to a head at the start of last season, when the club, then in receivership, had doubts about actually participating that year. Just fifteen hours before the season's start matters off the field were finally resolved and maybe that was a turning point for the club.

Having finished in a creditable mid-table position last term, further changes this time have seen the side struggle once more. Another new owner came forward, in the shape of Mike Watson-Challis, rejoining the club he once served as a director back in the old First Division. Ricky Hill, a former favourite on the pitch, was charged with taking the side towards Division One once again, but events this season have not gone quite according to plan.

Having struggled in the bottom four since the end of September, the team had seen its confidence sapped over the first months of the campaign, and by then the writing was on the wall. Their sensational defeat at home to ourselves, after being three goals to the good, was just one of a series of poor results which finally ended in the departure of Hill just two days before an FA Cup tie against Rushden and Diamonds. Sky TV, of course, smelled a shock, but Luton, guided by Lil Fuccillo, sent the upstarts on their way with a 1-0 defeat.

Fuccillo was still in a state of shock: "I only joined the club two weeks ago and now here I am as manager, it's unbelievable!.

"I was saddened to see Ricky leaving, both in terms of football and as a friend. But we are a professional football club, and we have to go about the game in the right way. We need to get moving in the right direction, and I have told the board that there have been too many staff changes recently, and that's why we've had no stability."


Back on the field results did improve initially, but with the club still second from bottom of the table in early February, the board looked again at the manager's position. Fuccillo was called and told that former Wimbledon boss, Joe Kinnear, had been installed as Director of Football with charge over team affairs. Effectively the manager, Kinnear was at pains on his arrival to see that Fuccillo stayed on.

"I'm the manager, full stop. I'm in charge of anything to do with football. Lil has not left the club, his role at the moment is helping me out, as everyone else is at the club. I know that the job is not going to be easy, but I never run away from a fight. I haven't got a magic wand, but I've still got plenty to offer."

Kinnear has been at doomed Oxford earlier this season, but had left citing 'family' reasons for his departure. That saw the Oxford fans less than happy, but at least the Hatters faithful had something to pin their faith on.

Chairman Watson-Ellis was happy to have got his man: "I am delighted that loe has decided to join us, and I'm confident that his vast experience and energy will assist the club to regain some of its past glories."

Judging by how events have gone since, that may take a little while longer, but Kinnear has at least brought some structure back to the club. Fuccillo



still remains, assisted by John Moore on the coaching side. Kinnear set about achieving some realistic goals upon his arrival, and avoiding defeat, especially at home, was a first step. Victories over Swansea and Cambridge, plus draws against Bristol Rovers and high flying Reading showed a new resolve. He pointed out that under his tenure, the side had picked up as many points in the last ten games as it had in the first 26, which showed vast improvement, but was still going to be tough to

That unbeaten home run was ended by Stoke, just over a week ago, and Kinnear now had to re-assess the situation: "We still need to win six games to stay up. I think that we did enough to have won that game today, never mind get a draw out of it. The referee made an astronomical mistake, when he did not award us a penalty for the foul on Stuart Douglas, and it has cost us. They even admitted it afterwards.

"I feel sorry for the lads, but in our situation we cannot feel sorry for ourselves. We know its getting tougher and tougher for us, but while there is still a chance, you have got to be hopeful. We're running out of games now, so we must be

"When you look at a team in this division like Stoke, they have a half-decent side out there, and an expensive one. Our side cost £50,000 at most to assemble, so the gulf is huge. We must get into the same sort of bracket next season, irrespective of what league we are in. We have to be able to compete."

That may be a reminder to the Hatters board to look at the exploits of the likes at Cardiff and their spending, as they have surely achieved promotion, albeit at a cost.

Should Luton get relegated, to the bottom division for the first time since 1968, Kinnear obviously feels funds need to be made available to him to strengthen the squad. With a new stadium near the MI motorway finally on the horizon, Luton may well have to start a new period of stability in Division Three. Getting The Hatters back to their former glories, could present Kinnear with his biggest challenge yet.



Phil Boersma

The Nomadic Scouser ...



Wrexham manager John Neal signed Phil Boersma on loan in 1970 from Liverpool, to help boost the club's final push for promotion to the Third Division following an injury to lan Moir. Phil was to make seven League appearances, without scoring, as Wrexham went on to clinch promotion.

However, at the end of the season the young Liverpudlian returned to the Anfield club, whom he had joined straight from school having represented both Kirkby and Lancashire schoolboys before joining the apprentice ranks.

Phil had made his first team debut prior to joining Wrexham, in a League Cup tie at Manchester City in September 1969, coming on as a sub for Alun Evans in a 3-2 defeat. Following his loan spell at the Racecourse, he went on to clock up almost 100 appearances for Liverpool, winning a League Championship medal in 1973 and playing in the UEFA Cup final that same season, when he came on as substitute for Steve Heighway in the second leg of the match with Borussia Monchengladbach.

Boersma turned his back on Liverpool after he was left out of the 1974 FA Cup Final side against Newcastle, but he returned to collect a winners' medal in the infamous 'Bremner/Keegan' Charity Shield match prior to the start of the following season. He then scored six goals in the opening eight games of the new campaign, but this type of form never lasted, and in December 1975 he was transferred to First Division Middlesbrough for £72,000.

Phil spent almost two years at Ayresome Park, where he switched to play more of a midfield role alongside the emerging talents of Graeme Souness. It was here that they became firm friends, a factor which proved significant for Phil later in his career. He scored three goals in 47 League appearances at Ayresome Park, before being transferred to Second Division Luton Town in August 1977 for £35,000.

His stay at Kenilworth Road lasted for just over a season, scoring eight goals in 36 League games, before he joined up with his former Anfield playing colleague John Toshack, then player/manager at Third Division Swansea City, in September 1978.

He helped the 'Swans' to promotion to the Second Division in his first season at the Vetch, but that joy was oversha'dowed by a compound fracture and dislocation of the right ankle during a match against Swindon Town in April 1979.

Having retired from playing, he set out on a coaching career that has seen him coach at the Vetch, Lincoln City and Doncaster Rovers before linking up with his former team-mate from his Middlesbrough days, Graeme Souness, who had just been appointed manager of Glasgow Rangers.

He later followed Souness to Liverpool, a spell with Oldham Athletic was followed by a call from his old mate at Galatasary, then Southampton, Torino in Italy, Portuguese side Benfica and currently he is with Blackburn Royers.

Billy Vaughan

And The Nomadic Midlander ...

Best described as a football nomad, Billy Vaughan had turned out for a number of clubs, including Bristol Rovers, Stafford Rangers, Merthyr Town and Shrewsbury Town before joining Wrexham in August 1924.

He spent one season at the Racecourse, scoring twice in eleven league games, before going on his travels again with Bilston United, Burton Town, Exeter City, Merthyr Town (again), and then to Kenilworth Road with Luton Town in February 1929.

A Third Division South side then, he made his debut for the 'Hatters' in a 2-2 home draw with local rivals Watford, with Billy scoring one of the goals.

That strike, despite being against Luton's staunch enemies, was not enough for him to keep his place, and it wasn't until four weeks later that he made his second appearance for the 'Hatters'. This time Billy scored yet again, in a 3-0 home win over promotion rivals Charlton Athletic, but he was to make just one more appearance for Luton in the following game, a 2-2 draw at Torquay United.

Having scored twice in three matches, Billy was to return to

his native Midlands and joined Brierley Hill Alliance later that summer.

It's a funny old game!

A Game to Remember



Today's match goes back to the old Second Division days and our second season in that league. Luton Town arrived at the Racecourse on 15th December 1979 on a crest of a wave, as they were lying second in the table to Newcastle United - just one point behind the leaders, while Wrexham were not doing so bad themselves at the time, in ninth place and just five points behind the 'Hatters'.

The Wrexham side for this game consisted of: Dai Davies, Terry Darracott, Alan Dwyer, Gareth Davies (Mel Sutton), Joey Jones, Steve Fox, Mick Vinter, Frank Carrodus, Ian Edwards,

Dixie McNeil and Les Cartwright.

The Luton Town line-up was: Jake Findlay, Kirk Stephens, Mal Donaghy, Tony Grealish, Mike Saxby (Mark Aizlewood), Paul Price, Ricky Hill, Alan West, Brian Stein, Bob Hatton and David Moss.

In front of a crowd of 9,145, the 'Robins', who were parading there newest arrival, Frank Carrodus, who had signed a few days earlier for £90,000 from Aston Villa. However, it wasn't Carrodus who was to shine that afternoon, but the delightfully skilful Steve Fox, whose second-half goal must rank high on the list of best goals ever seen on the Racecourse.

The game itself was played in ghastly gale conditions, and it was the 'Robins' who were to break the deadlock on 15 minutes when Dixie McNeil, playing in a unfamiliar midfield role, burst forward as the extra man in the attack and followed in to put the finishing touch to an Alan Dwyer-shot that the Luton 'Keeper, Jake Findlay, failed to hold.

This goal was enough to separate the teams at half-time, but the second-half was to see Wrexham extend their lead with THAT goal by Steve Fox. He got position on the edge of the penalty area, and with a mass of bodies in front of him, shifts the ball to his right, this takes one body out of the line of fire, and then he delightfully chips the ball to perfection over the heads of the helpless Luton defence and goalkeeper into the roof of the net.


By this time Carrodus had revealed all the skills and vision that manager Arfon Griffiths knew would make him a bargain

It can be difficult settling down in a new side, but Frank looked at home considering he had only been with us a few days. He will give us more balance and experience in midfield, an area where we have had a few problems this season."

Maintaining a six point gap over those teams in the relegation zone was of paramount importance to Wrexham and this victory proved to be only the 'Robins' third back-to-back win of the season. Luton had their chances in the first half with Andrew Fotiadis (twice), Emmerson Boyce and Phil Gray all being disappointed that they didn't do better in good situations, while Karl Connolly could also reflect on a headed chance in the 43rd minute. The encouragement given by the 'Robins' faithful fans was finally rewarded in the 55th minute when Gareth Owen threaded a lovely ball through the centre of the 'Hatters' defence, and loan signing Danny Allsopp smashed an angled shot through the legs of Ben Roberts to score the decisive goal. As Luton pressed forward for an equaliser, Wrexham had several more chances to put the game beyond their visitors, with a Brian Carey header and a Kevin Russell pile-driver that Roberts tipped over the bar, but thankfully Allsopp's one strike was enough to give the 'Robins' three important points in their bid to pull away from the relegation pack.

Brian Flynn was a relieved man after the game, and admitted: "I thought the first half was a good one with both teams attacking and creating chances at both ends. But we had to hang on a little in the end when they threw bodies forward in search of an equaliser." Luton boss, Lennie Lawrence, was a disappointed after the game: "We had a lot of pressure, and I can remember standing here three years ago and experiencing the same thing."

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

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

Welsh Sporting Theatre Provokes Debate

Former much respected Welsh football internationalists Dai Davies and Leighton James were brought up not far from each other in South Wales, and neither is short of a word or two on all football topics Welsh, in their respective vocations as pundits.

The pair are the media and football journalists dream, always guaranteed to supply plenty of copy, with forthright and thought provoking discussion never a million miles away!

The most recent 'debate' has seen Dai lending his support to an argument that Wales should play the rest of their World Cup games at the Racecourse Ground in Wrexham. Believing the team has a better chance of qualification at an intimate club venue, as is the home of the Robins.

Dai argues that Wales have yet to win a football match at the magnificent Millennium Stadium, losing two and drawing two of their four games to date in the arena. He makes the point that the opposition love to play there, and it is as much of an inspiration to the away side as to the Welsh players.

This is in many was what the England side have had to put with over the years with teams giving their all to impress at Wembley Stadium, which had been a Mecca of world football (without looking too closely in recent years, of course). Now the English players will be playing on the provincial grounds like Anfield, Villa Park, Old Trafford and Pride Park, which is our situation on the past, with the likes of Ninian Park, the Racecourse and Vetch Field our home venues and with relatively more success.

In all probability, England will eventually find a permanent home at the rebuild Wembley, their situation now, is ours in

Dai goes on to say that many fans will disagree with him, as the FAW's pricing policy of £5.00 children and £10.00 adults attracted an attendance of 46,750 (unheard of in recent years) for a midweek fixture with the Ukraine, but he was critical of the atmosphere. This, by the way, has also been a grievance by the rugby fraternity in their internationals at the stadium.

He added: "Wales should take the games to Wrexham, where fans know their football." Who could disagree with that

Leighton, however, disagrees with his former Welsh team mate, pointing out that the state-of-the-art venue is the only option for the FAW: "The atmosphere against the Ukraine was a bit diluted, but nearly 47,000 (and only Greece against Germany had a better attendance during the week of the latest group games) is still a fantastic turn out. The Racecourse holds 15,000, but that would be reduce to about 10,000 as UEFA demands terraced areas be closed for internationals.

"I understand what Dai is aiming at, but how much will tickets cost if the games are taken to the Vetch, Ninian Park or the Racecourse?

"Last year the FAW signed a 15-year contract with the Millennium Stadium PLC to play all international matches there and until a 25,000 all-seater ground is built, every game including the smaller nations should be there.

The former winger also feels that we must give our players the best opportunity to play in front of the biggest crowd and was confident that the Poland encounter in June will attract a 70,000 full house: "Where else in Wales could you hold that number of people for a football match?"

The Western Mail also entered into the spirit of the discussion by asking its readers for their views on whether the FAW had got it right by turning the Millennium Stadium into the home of Welsh football

Most people will agree that both sides of the issue have their merits. It has to be said, however, that we must move with the times, the stadium giving Welsh football a profile it has never experienced in it's 125 year live span and in these days the marketing of the game is all-important.

Nevertheless the 'North' must not keep quiet and there should be no stumbling block in the Racecourse being allowed a to stage certain friendly internationals, especially since the club eventually plan to make the 'Kop' all-seater like the rest of the ground.

After all, with Wrexham being the official birthplace of the game in Wales, home is where the heart is!

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


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In the interest of Spectator Safety the following conditions apply at the Racecourse Ground and will be enforced by the Club's stewards, with the full support of North **Wales Police:**

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This Is Turning Into Quite A Season

Back in January we reviewed the progress made by the Reds' reserve side in the opening five months of this season's Avon Insurance League campaign.



At the time we sat handily placed in fourth place in the table, four points off then leaders Walsall. Since then though, a further ten games have been played (9 League & (Cup) including last Wednesday's game against Stoke City here at the Racecourse.

Unfortunately, printing deadlines mean that this result was not known at the time of penning this article and therefore the situation at the top of the table may have changed slightly as a result.

Happily, can we say the situation at the top - for in the first nine games since the turn of the year the Reds had won seven and lost just two.

What all this meant is that the Reds sit proudly on top of the table, with even the outside chance that promotion might have been gained against Stoke, assuming two other results went our way, but if not then very much a possibility on Wednesday evening against Darlington (7.00) at the Racecourse.

With two promotion places available things are certainly looking good at the moment, especially as at the time you read this there will only be two games left

However, the first game of the New Year brought a home defeat by next-to-bottom Scunthorpe United. After impressive wins over Shrewsbury Town and Wigan Athletic the visit of the struggling Iron gave the Reds an ideal opportunity to continue their push for promotion, but in this League nothing is ever that simple. Teams change from one week to the next, with the result that continuity is something rarely achieved. But this was still a disappointing defeat with Mark Anderson grabbing the decisive winning goal for the visitors on 59 minutes after Darryn Stamp had dispossessed Adrian Moody near the touchline.

Maybe that reverse was just the fillip the Reds needed

for in their next match they completed a double over local rivals Shrewsbury with an emphatic 3-1 success at the Gay Meadow.

Andy Morrell opened the scoring on 16 minutes and Hector Sam doubled the lead six minutes into the second half.

Morrell added a third on 58 minutes before Chris Freestone grabbed a late, late consolation for the home

A week later brought a superb 2-1 victory at 'bogey' side Stoke City when Morrell continued his rich vein of form with two penalties at Newcastle Town's Lyme Valley Parkway Stadium.

After a 4-0 success at Bloomfield Road in September a rampant Wrexham side, including a certain trialist by the name of Lee Trundle, repeated the trick with a similar scoreline in the Racecourse return.

Lee quickly showed his potential with a well-taken brace, with Morrell once again adding a double of his

A quick respite from League action followed when, after numerous postponements, the League Cup-tie against Premier Division West Bromwich Albion took place at the Racecourse. Yet again Morrell grabbed two goals - bringing his tally for the season to 16 - with Trundle weighing in with the other.

On the back of the way the twin strike force of Morrell and Trundle had combined in the impressive defeats of Blackpool and WBA they were given the responsibility of leading the first team's attack at Walsall the following weekend. Both distinguished themselves, with Lee scoring a superb overhead kick to bring the Reds back into the game and later setting up substitute Craig Faulconbridge for the dramatic injury time winner. The rest, as they say, is history!

Back to the Avon Insurance League and a late Craig Faulconbridge goal saw off Lincoln City 1-0 in a disappointing performance at the Racecourse on February 28th to maintain the Reds' promotion push.

Bramall Lane hasn't been a happy hunting ground for the Reds in recent season's, indeed some of us still have 'happy' memories of a snowbound 7-1 Cup semi-final defeat there a couple of years ago.

The occasion of March 14th proved no exception as the Blades ran out comfortable 2-0 winners.

Then came the important clash with Walsall at Bromsgrove Rovers' Victoria Ground 12 days ago.

A win for the home side would have put them above us but a last-gasp Andy Morrell strike (his 17th AIL goal of the season) gave us a superb 1-0 victory to put a little bit of daylight between us and the chasing pack.

Then came last Monday's key clash with York City at Bootham Crescent, a game that brought us a superb 3-1 victory (unfortunately, just like the Stoke result, the scorers weren't known at the time of writing). The win meant that the Minstermen, with only three games remaining, can't catch us, leaving only Lincoln City, Walsall and Sheffield United able to deny us promotion - let

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alone the championship!

So there you have it - two games to go and all to play for. There is even the possibility of a championship heading for the Racecourse by a week on Wednesday.

With the club's Academy status secured for next season, subject of course to satisfying certain criteria for future development within the deadline of July 20th, there is every cause for optimism in the years ahead. Promotion to the Premier Division of the AIL would mean games against the likes of Birmingham City, Wolves, Bolton Wanderers, Barnsley and Preston North End amongst others, so the benefits of playing at a higher level of reserve football are there for all to see.

Similarly, the progress of the club's juniors has only been enhanced by the opportunity of playing in what is, effectively, the Premier League in terms of youth football.

The under-19s may have struggled results-wise but the progress of individuals such as Shaun Pejic and Adrian Moody into the first team, and Paul Whitfield's selection for the Wales under-21 squad to face Ukraine last month, are evidence of its success.

It will be a gradual process, for the club operates teams from under-16s down to under-9s in Academy football - not just the under-19s. It will take time for them to come through the system but early signs are encouraging, especially with Kevin Russell's successful under-14 side.

Also, a special word of praise should go to Simon Spender and Craig Morgan who play for the under-16s. Both played key roles in Wales Schoolboys' Victory Shield campaign - featuring live on SKY in games against England, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

Remember, the Reserves' next outing is this Wednesday when Darlington visit the Racecourse, kickoff 7.00pm. So if you have the chance of giving them your support it would be greatly appreciated.






Sheridan has proved to be an astute signing by Oldham, bringing composure and experience to the club's midfield. He has been back on top form since returning from a knee injury sustained earlier in the campaign.

WIGAN ATHLETIC

With the club in severe danger of actually missing the play-offs altogether, former Norwich, Birmingham and Manchester United defender Steve Bruce has been appointed as The Latics new manager.

The 40 year-old was obviously keen to get back involved in the day to day running of a Nationwide League club: "I am looking forward to the challenge of cementing our play-off position and achieving Wigan's aim of First Division status."

The ex-Huddersfield Town and Sheffield United boss has plenty of invaluable experience from both his playing days in the top flight and his time in management with the Yorkshire duo, and could well prove to be an astute appointment by Athletic.

Colin Greenall had been in temporary charge of team affairs following the acrimonious and surprising departure of Bruce Rioch back in February. Greenall will, however, remain at The JJB Stadium, along with fellow ex-Springfield Park hero Brendan O'Connell, to work alongside Bruce while the club's Director of Football John Benson will now take responsibility for

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SWANSEA CITY

It appears that The Swans may be set to join Oxford in playing Third Division football next term, just twelve months after securing promotion from the bottom level. This comes after a torrid season at the higher level for The Swans, even allowing for the skills of experienced manager John Hollins.

A section of the Vetch Field faithful have been calling for the former Arsenal favourite to be replaced in charge, but Hollins looks likely to be allowed to see the season out. There appears to be little chance of him being sacked at this late stage in proceedings, and he has already gone on record as saying that he will not leave

"I'm not a quitter. I've never walked out on a job before, either in football or in business, and I will not start at Swansea," he

Former Welsh under-21 international Jonathan Coates has admitted that the club has little chance of retaining their Second Division status, but vowed that they would fight until it becomes mathematically impossible: "If we end up dropping to the Third Division, then we'll want to restore a bit of pride and show the supporters that we went down fighting.

"We cannot make any excuses, we just haven't played well enough," he continued. "We now need to stay positive and try to get three points from every game."

Bruce did not have the best of starts to life at Wigan, as his side suffered a 3-1 home defeat to Brentford. This result leaves The Latics with a real possibility of missing out on the play-offs and was described by the new boss as: "A huge disappointment for all concerned at the club."

WYCOMBE WANDERERS

They came, they saw and they so nearly conquered. The Wycombe FA Cup bandwagon finally came off it's wheels at Villa Park, but a spirited display saw the Second Division giantkillers give Liverpool a real run for their money.

The Chairboys central defensive trio of Paul McCarthy, Jamie Bates and Jason Cousins, ably backed up by experienced goalkeeper Martin Taylor, held out for 78 minutes. That was until Emile Heskey was allowed to roam free to head home unchallenged, following the very first corner of the match had only been partially cleared.

Just five minutes later, Robbie Fowler added a second for the Merseysiders with a precision free-kick into the top corner of the net, and all appeared over for the minnows.

A late strike from stalwart midfielder Keith Ryan, who has been with the club since their non-league days, with just two minutes remaining gave the Chairboys, and their near 20,000 strong band of supporters, a glimmer of hope. Unfortunately, the Liverpool rearguard held firm until the end to secure a meeting with Arsenal at the Millennium Stadium on 12th May.

Not surprisingly, Wanderers boss Lawrie Sanchez was upbeat about his side's showing: "We did all that we could and that is all you can ever ask of a team. I am pleased that we got a goal and pleased that 'Rhino' scored it.

"They [Liverpool] are a different class. You've got to appreciate that. The free-kick from Robbie Fowler showed that. However, for 75 minutes were in the game."

I suppose if he had been offered a semi-final meeting with Liverpool as his side faced up to Ryman League side Harrow Borough in the first round all them months ago, Sanchez would probably have taken it. Especially with a club that had never previously been beyond the Third Round.

Sanchez now needs to ensure that his side amass the points required to pull themselves away from the relegation zone, otherwise it could be a bitter end to a memorable season for the club.

"It's been a big thing the semi and our level of performance [in the League] has dropped. We can now get down to the league games and put the season to bed," was the boss' honest assessment.

THE FINAL ACT FOR THE HIGHFIELD ROAD HOUDINIS?

Since their promotion into the top flight at the end of the Sixties, Coventry City have flirted with relegation on at least half of the seasons that they have been in the top division. On many occasions they have stayed up by the skin of their teeth.

This season, though, could it be that the Houdini act played out repeatedly before the Highfield Road faithful is about to end in tragedy?

It has to be said that they have left it very late to stage any kind of break for safety, so could they be going down after 34 years at the top (albeit usually floundering)? And yet, the Sky Blues' obituary has been written so many times before, and then the writers have had the words stuffed down their

The most recent narrow squeak came five seasons ago, when Coventry really did look doomed. Having lost their penultimate game of the season at home to Derby; they had to go and win at White Hart Lane and even then rely on Sunderland losing at Wimbledon and Middlesbrough failing to beat Leeds at Elland Road. Needless to say the Highfield Road Houdinis pulled it off with a victory over Spurs, while the gods (who are all obviously Sky Blue season-ticket holders) guaranteed that Wimbledon beat Sunderland (smile Peter Read?) and Middlesbrough failed to beat Leeds.

Boro must have been feeling particularly sore as they had three points deducted for failing to fulfil a mid-season fixture at Ewood Park. Needless to say without that penalty, Boro would have stayed up, but...

If you go back a bit further to the mid-eighties (when, believe it or not, Everton were a good side), you will no doubt remember a particular Houdini act by Coventry that outshone even their escape at White Hart Lane five seasons ago.

What made it even more difficult for the Sky Blues was that their final game was against Champions, FA Cup finalists and ECWC Winners Everton. Amazingly Coventry won three on the trot and then the ultra-miracle: managed to beat Everton 4-1! I wonder what odds you'd have got on that?

If that turn of events had the bookies scratching their heads, no doubt they were jumping up and down with fury back in 1977. Then Coventry were in free-fall, but, could, once again, stay up if the results elsewhere went their way. The final match of the season involved the visit of fellow relegation battlers Bristol City, while the other side involved, Sunderland, had to draw at Everton to send either Bristol City or Coventry down.

A (Jimmy Hill) delayed kick-off at Highfield Road meant that the game at Goodison finished beforehand. Sunderland lost 2-0, but defeat for either Coventry or Bristol City would keep them up. The furore arose because the result of the game at Goodison was broadcast over the tannoy at Highfield Road! As the score was 2-2 and thus meant that both sides stayed up, it is fair to assume that the final quarter hour or so of the game was played out in a very friendly spirit!

There were calls for an investigation by the League (not least from Sunderland), but nothing came of it, because no collusion could be proved.

So that's why, basically, I am as certain as I can be that Coventry will be in the Premiership next season!


