

ALTHOUGH the Town battle on in the uphill fight to avoid relegation, manager Joe Kinnear this week made his first announcements about his plans for next season. We can expect a major operation as he changes the squad, and three players have already been told that they will not be here for the new kick-off next August. Free transfers have been given to Nathan Abbey, Gavin McGowan and Friedrich Breitenfelder, and the boss says that there are likely to be more.

Watford are rumoured to want the Town boss as their next manager in succession to Graham Taylor, who is retiring. But Joe Kinnear said that he relished the challenge of rebuilding at Kenilworth Road, and as the chairman and directors shared his ambition and hopes for the future, he was looking forward to helping them achieve suc-

AT THE end of a sad week for football, many connected with Luton Town are mourning the death of Alec Stock, one of the most successful managers we ever had. There will be a minute's silence before today's game in remembrance of him, and also in tribute to Mike North, the referee who collapsed and died during a match at Southend on Monday.

Town statistician Roger Wash writes on page 39 about Alec Stock, and his considerable achievements at Kenilworth Road. He was, quite simply, a lovely man. Like many of his generation who survived active service in the war, he had a true understanding of the real values in life. More than 30 years ago he was unfailingly helpful to a young football reporter who still covers every Luton Town game, and who remembers in particular Alec's invariable way of setting the world straight even after the Town lost - "It's still not a bad old world, is it?" was one of his most often repeat-

John Mitchell, now a Town director, was fated to be in Stock's footballing plans. He was playing for St Albans City, and Stock was trying to sign him for the Town. But financial problems frustrated the manager, and Fulham stepped in to sign the young striker. And a few months later Stock left Kenilworth Road, and took charge of Fulham, so he got Mitchell in his squad after all. Stock, of course, took that team, including former Luton players Alan Slough and Viv Busby, to the 1975 FA Cup final, where they lost 2-0 to West Ham.

Alec Stock's funeral will be on Thursday, 12 noon, at Poole Crematorium. Directors and staff from Kenilworth Road will be represented in memory of a man who did much to set up Luton Town for the success that followed after the foundations he



The Manager Joe Kinnear

ONE point from our two Easter games was a poor return

from a weekend when we knew that much depended on our efforts and results. I suppose overall it was a case of effort not bad, results nowhere near good enough. It was all the more frustrating because the two opposing managers, Andy Ritchie of Oldham and Brian Flynn of Wrexham, thought that in both games the final score-line did not do us justice.

Perhaps not, but it is very little consolation - I would rather have had six points and two rival managers complaining bitterly that they were robbed!

It is obvious that there is a big job to be done here, and that includes in our last five games. We are not down and out, and so long as there is a mathematical chance we must fight hard to preserve our status. The recent run of results has been below par, and while I have been critical of players in the privacy of the dressing room, I have also seen some good things.

In the game against Oldham, for instance, we built some very promising attacks. The trouble is that the promise was not turned into net results. Oldham could hardly believe their luck at going home with a point because they knew we had murdered them except for the all-important matter of getting goals. Creating chances is encouraging. Missing so many is depressing, and we have got to be much more ruthless in front of goal. At Wrexham two late goals gave the home side a flattering result. On the day we were worth a draw, but again you only get what you deserve. At the Racecourse ground a point was within our grasp until the last seven or eight minutes, when we paid a high price for lapses of concentration in defence. We worked hard to get back into the game after conceding the opening goal and our equaliser

was no less than we deserved. But then we shot ourselves in the foot again, and lack of concentration has got to be eradicated. And we did not help our cause by failing to make more of our greater possession, particularly in the first half.

It is ironic that other teams in the lower reaches of the table have also been struggling as the pressure grows in the closing weeks of the season, and that makes our failures all the harder to bear. You can look back on several games in the past month or so, and see where we should have picked up another point here, a couple there, and so on.

The painful fact is that we have not done our jobs as well as we should have, and we now have to bite the bullet and go for broke. The league table is not pleasant reading. But there is still only one club relegated, and the rest cling on and hope.

We have certainly not given up, nor will we while we have the slightest hope of saving ourselves. We have five games to play - 15 points for the taking, and if we get them and take our total to 53 it could well be enough to enable us to stay up.

We will not throw in the towel, and we know just how badly supporters want us to pull off the great escape. Bury will not make it easy for us today, and come to Kenilworth Road with no pressure to worry about. We might find it difficult to be relaxed and patient, but we must work to impose ourselves on the game, and above all do the business where it matters most - in both penalty areas. We know supporters will respond if we give everything, and again our thanks for the way you kept the noise volume turned up in the ground last Saturday. I trust we will reward you by our efforts this afternoon, and that we can all go home knowing that we have enjoyed our football. I mean the result especially, of course!

Captain's Log Marvin Johnson

I GOT through another comeback game in the reserves

on Wednesday, and although we were beaten 3-1 by a good Crystal Palace side I was well pleased to get through the 90 minutes, and still feel good physically afterwards.

It's been a frustrating period for me and for the lads, and if the manager wants me to come back into the first team squad, I am ready to do everything I can to help the cause.

It looks grim, I know, but we are all of one mind - we're not down yet, we have 15 points to play for, and if we can get them we might well pull off a bit of a miracle.

You never know what to expect in football, and Monday's game at Wrexham was a reminder to me about the day they came to Kenilworth Road in October and beat us after we had been three up early in the second half. I am still haunted by that memory - it was one of those days when you look at what should have been, and know it was a case of three points thrown away. On Monday, the lads felt that they had played well enough to earn a draw at least, but once more we were undone by late strikes.

The Oldham game was different - we are still wondering how we failed to win that one, because Oldham never caused us the slightest problem, while we failed to get the goals our approach play deserved. It's typical of your luck when you are up against it that good shots hit the post instead of the net, and if Paul McLaren's effort had brought the opening goal, I think we would have won handsomely. Obviously there is pressure on us, and that is something we have not coped with well enough at home this season. I don't think I can remember such a poor campaign in terms of home results, and that is the main reason for our current problems.

Professional footballers don't play badly on

purpose, and it is frustrating to know that we have compared pretty well with top teams this season but failed to play near top form with real consistently. I may be a bit biased, but I think there is not too much wrong with the defence. Emmerson Boyce has been a revelation in his first full season, and Richard Dryden has done excellently since he joined us. We were fortunate to have Julian Watts ready to return when Macca had to be moved back up into midfield, and much as I would like to reclaim my place in the side, I can understand the boss thinking that that back three is as good as he can field at present. Apart from anything else, he hasn't seen me play, except a very few games in the reserves.

When things are going wrong, defenders will often try to put the blame on strikers, and viceversa. That's normal in professional football, but there is actually a better understanding of the game than that within our dressing room our attitude is that we are all in this together. You defend collectively, you attack collectively, and at the final whistle - and at the end of the season - you take the criticism or the praise as a team.

It hurts to be in the bottom four, and I know supporters share the grief. Whether I play today or not, I will do anything I can to help the team and the club. As professionals, we play for ourselves, our families, Luton Town FC, and for the supporters. While there is still hope, we have to believe that a memorable escape act is possible.

Bury are always difficult to beat, one of those sides who are effective as a team unit which is well organised and disciplined. But we are capable of beating anyone in this division, despite our lowly situation, and we know that today this is a game we simply have to win. We can do it - and then win four more. Difficult, perhaps, but certainly not impossible.

He was taken off mainly as a precaution, also with a hamstring problem. During the week he was put through exercises designed to test his levels of discomfort, and came through them all.


Both players are good professionals in knowing their limits and doing the right things to aid recovery, and it was pleasing to se them both in full training by Thursday.

We were also hoping for good news about Stuart Fraser. He went back to hospital for another check-up on Thursday, and with luck the surgeon would have agreed to remove his plaster cast which he has been wearing since he broke his leg at QPR in January. The decision was up to the specialist, nothing to do with me, but I can admit that I shared the player's optimism.

He faces a lot of hard work, and probably will not be able to have much of a summer holiday, because he will be busy with treatment and exercise from now until the new season kicks off. The hope is that we will get him in good shape before the pre-season games.

Matthew Taylor picked up an ankle injury at Wrexham, but it responded to treatment, and as he was able to take part in a full training session on Thursday I expect him to be available this afternoon. The same might well be true of Keith Rowland, who has got over his groin strain. He played for an hour in the reserves game on Wednesday, and it was then a matter of checking that there were no after-effects. Marvin Johnson also played in that game, and is ready for anything, but we now know that Andrew Fotiadis will not play again this season. His groin strain has been subject to a scan which showed some areas of weakness, and he will be under treatment for a couple of weeks, before seeing the specialist again at the end of the month.

WHILE we are worrying about our immediate future in

football, a moment of quiet in the ground this afternoon will, perhaps, put things into perspective. Before kick-off there will be a minute's silence at all League games in memory of Mike North, the 42-year-old referee who collapsed on the pitch at Southend on Monday, and died in hospital shortly afterwards.

In our case, today's silence will also be to honour the memory of Alec Stock, our former manager, who died at the weekend, aged 84. There is a tribute to him elsewhere in this magazine, and Luton Town had much to thank him for when he was in charge here from 1968 to 1972. He guided us to promotion from the Third Division, and was also instrumental in bringing his friend Harry Haslam to Luton, the original "Happy Harry" who became manager after Alec Stock left.

On more mundane matters, our apologies are due for the fact that the scoreboard has been out of action for the last two games. Engineers have had a look at it, and part of the reason is its age. They are trying to obtain the necessary parts to carry out a repair, and I hope it will be done quickly. We are also hopeful that we might have a new scoreboard installed before next season kicks off

I have been asked to pass on the very grateful thanks of the Great Ormond Street Hospital, for whom we held a bucket collection at the game on Easter Saturday. It raised £722, which was a magnificent response by our supporters. Thank you very much for your generosity.

Our youth and reserve teams are having a hectic final few weeks of the season, and we are still working on trying to find new dates for games that have been postponed. One fixture for the youth team has been re-arranged: they will be away to Cardiff City in the Football League Youth Alliance on Monday week, April 30 - we simply did not have a Saturday available.

Our reserves have an extra fixture to fit in, thanks to a good victory at Brache Sparta in the

Bedfordshire Premier Cup. see page 42 for a report. We will be away to Kempston Rovers in the semi-final, but it is impossible to say when that game might be played.

The other semi-final is Bedford Town against Barton Rovers or Wootton Blue Cross, and that remaining quarter-final will not be played until May 8. So Beds FA is considering the possibility that the final should be held over until the beginning of next season.

Beds FA are having big problems in finalising all their cup finals - three have already been postponed because of waterlogged pitches in April, and that has rarely, if ever, happened before. Whatever the decision, I hope to be able to pass it on through this column before the season ends.

We are already planning for next season at all levels, and I am pleased to be able to tell you that we will have another very attractive preseason fixture at Kenilworth Road. Tottenham will provide the opposition on Tuesday August 7 (7.45pm) for a friendly that was arranged as part of the deal that took Gary Doherty to White Hart Lane last year.

The game will be our second at home in the build-up towards the new season - as already announced Norwich City will be here on Saturday August 4 for a friendly kicking off at 3pm.



It is the Club's policy to provide at any activity sufficient and competent staff and management systems to ensure as far as humanly possible the safe admission, accommodation and exiting of spectators attend the stadium. These systems will be subject to continual monitoring, testing and updating where necessary.

EVACUATION PROCEDURE

IN THE event of any emergency in the stadium, Luton Town FC and the emergency services have agreed on an evacuation procedure which is designed to ensure the safe and controlled evacuation of the crowd, and to ensure their safe dispersal from the area, to allow the emergency services to carry out their tasks.

In the event of evacuation from all or part of the stadium, you will receive instructions over the public address system on how you should leave. In an evacuation of the main stand you will be instructed to use the pitch. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available. On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.



NO.1 - GLYNN GARNER - GOALKEEPER

23 year old goalkeeper Glynn was one of the limited number of new arrivals at Gigg Lane during Summer 2000, signing for the Shakers in June from League of Wales club Llanelli, where he had been ever-present for the past three seasons. Despite being handed the number one jersey, Glynn will initially be expected to understudy Paddy Kenny at the club.

NO.2 - MATT BARRASS - FULL BACK

One of a number of young players to be given their first team chance by boss Andy Preece last season, Bury born Matt came up through the club's youth team and had to overcome a particularly nasty injury before eventually battling his way into the professional ranks and first team status. He held down a regular place last season, appearing in 25 Division Two games and, in February, was rewarded for his massive progress with a new two year contract.

NO.3 - DEAN BARRICK - FULL BACK

Previously having given service to Sheffield

Wednesday, Rotherham United, Cambridge united and Preston North End, Dean signed for Bury in Summer 1998. Dean enjoyed a regular first team spot during his early days at the club, but he lost his place under new management of Neil Warnock, and was later transfer listed and loaned out to Ayr United. After a nine month spell of being frozen out of first team contention, Dean finally earned another call up last September and has certainly prospered more under new boss Andy Preece.



NO.4 - NICK DAWS -MIDFIELD

Now the only remaining player at Gigg Lane from the club's 1997 Division Two Championship winning squad, Bury's team captain is entering his ninth season with the club since arriving in a bargain

£10,000 transfer from non-league Altrincham back in August 1992. After playing in his early days as a

sweeper, Nick is now an established and highly rated member of Bury's midfield. Suspension last March ended a run of 218 consecutive League and Cup

NO.5 - SAM COLLINS - CENTRAL DEFENDER

A free transfer signing from Huddersfield Town in September 1999, 23 year old Sam played 47 games for the Terriers before switching across the Pennines. The sturdy defender enjoyed a consistent introduction into the Bury back four in the early weeks of last term but this season was all but ended with a training ground medial ligament injury in September.

NO.6 - CHRIS SWAILES - CENTRAL DEFENDER

Chris started his career as a trainee with Ipswich Town but played with Peterborough United, Boston United, and Bridlington Town before finally making his Football League debut with Doncaster Rovers. Chris signed for Donny in October 1993 and played so well for them that his first club lpswich paid out a fee of £225,000 to resign their former trainee. In November 1997 though he found himself on the move once again as a £200,000 portion in the player plus cash deal which took striker David Johnson to Ipswich. Chris was voted the supporters Player of the Season in 1998-9.



NO.7 - CHRIS BILLY -DEFENDER/MIDFIELD

A pacy utility player who arrived at Gigg Lane in September 1998 on a free transfer from Notts County, Chris began his career with Huddersfield Town and played over 109 games for them

before moving to Plymouth Argyle - with Neil Warnock also being manager at both clubs. He was signed by Warnock for a third time when he arrived at Bury and over the last two seasons has established a reputation for being able to play in a mixture of defensive or midfield positions. Chris enjoyed a consistent season in 1999-2000.



NO.8 - MARTYN FORREST -MIDFIELD

Another player to emerge from the Shakers' youth team, Bury born Martyn has successfully made the transition from striker to midfield in recent times, and enters his forth season as a professional 2000-01. Stocky

and tigerish. Martyn is another youngster to sign an extended two-year contract with the Shakers last February.

NO.9 - PAUL BARNES - STRIKER

Now approaching veteran stage, proven goalscorer Barnes cost the Shakers £40,000 when he signed from Huddersfield Town in March 1999. His career has also seen him turn out for Notts County, Stoke City, Chesterfield, York City, Birmingham City and Burnley - with his best return being 81 goals in 157 games for York. Paul also assisted on the coaching side last season with the youth team.

NO.10 - ADRIAN LITTLEJOHN - WINGER

Adrian started out as a trainee with WBA before moving on a free transfer to Walsall in May 1989. He went on to play 44 league games for the Saddlers before moving north to Sheffield United in 1991. His spell at Bramall Lane was a most productive one. He played 69 game and scored 12 goals before moving on to Plymouth for £100,000 in September 1995. A firm favourite with the Devon fans as he helped Argyle to clinch promotion through the play-offs. After 3 seasons and 110 games for them he moved on to Oldham but he linked up with manger Neil Warnock for a third time on 12th November 1998 when he signed for Bury. A skillful player with undoubted talent and the pace to run at players.

NO.11 - PAUL REID - MIDFIELD

Paul moved on a 'Bosman' free transfer in July 1999 from Oldham Athletic. A left sided player who began his career as a trainee with Leicester City and played 162 games (12 goals) for them before moving on to

Bradford City in July 1992. He also held down a regular place at Valley Parade before switching to Huddersfield Town in a £70,000 transfer in May 1994. After 70 games for the Terriers, he became a £100,000 capture for Oldham where once again he performed consistently. Paul played 39 League games for Bury last term and won over the fans with his wholehearted style, guaranteed commitment and great tackling ability.

NO.12 - DARREN BULLOCK - MIDFIELD

Tough tackling Darren made a debut with a difference for the Shakers last season following a £250,000 transfer from Swindon Town in February 1999. Stepping out against Norwich at Gigg Lane, he was dismissed after just twelve minutes - creating a new club record for 'quickest dismissal'. A player who is very much in the mould of then Swindon boss Steve McMahon, Darren will be looking to re-establish himself after a loan spell with Rushed & Diamonds.

NO.13 - PAT KENNY - GOALKEEPER

A 22 year old keeper who was plying his trade in the Unibond League with Bradford Park Avenue, Paddy was given a trial with the Shakers in July 1998 and signed a contract the following month following a £10,000 transfer. He was understudy to Dean Kiely during his first season at Gigg Lane but following Kiely's switch to Charlton in Summer 1999, he grasped his chance with style and became the success story of last season. Rewarded with the fans' vote as Player of the Season in Summer 2000, the superstitious Yorkshireman will retain the number 13 jersey at his own request.

NO.15 - BHAICHUNG BHUTIA - STRIKER

The 22 year old captain of the Indian International team became the first Asian player to appear in the Football League when he signed for the Shakers in September 1999. He arrived in a blaze of publicity, being considered the 'Alan Shearer' of his country with 25 goals in 40 Internationals. He made his debut in a 3-2 home win against Cardiff City on October 1999 but took some time to adapt to the English game.

NO.16 - LUTEL JAMES - STRIKER/WINGER

Lutel began his career with Yorkshire Amateurs and Selby Town but attracted interest from Scarborough and joined the then Football League newcomers on trial in March 1993. He appeared as a sub six times for 'Boro' before moving onto Hyde United in June 1996. He moved to Bury in October 1998 and within a week amazingly, after just one reserve outing, made his first team debut in a Worthington Cup game against Manchester United at Old Trafford.

NO.17 - STEVE REDMOND - DEFENDER

Experienced central defender who started his career back in December 1984 when he completed his apprenticeship with Manchester City. Steve went on to play a total of 235 league games for City before moving on to Oldham Athletic. Steve enjoyed Latics Premiership experience between 1992 and 1994, his experience serving them well as he played a further 205 games. He came to Gigg Lane on a 'Bosman' free transfer in summer 1998. His experience has been vital for the Shakers over the past two seasons,

and when Neil Warnock left he was chosen to take on the additional role as Assistant Manager.



NO.18 - ANDY PREECE -PLAYER-MANAGER

Andy left Blackpool after spells with Northampton Town, Wrexham, Stockport County and Premiership Crystal Palace to join Bury on a free transfer in summer 1998. When Neil Warnock departed in

December 1999, it was Preece, as one of the senior players, who was chosen to take over as caretaker manager. He impressed everyone with the way that he went about the task of guiding the Shakers to safety, blooding a number of youngsters yet also remaining fair to the senior players. He also managed to end the season as the Shakers top scorer with 12 goals and was rewarded in Summer 2000 with a permanent appointment as Bury's 22nd post-war Manager.

NO.19 - STEVEN HALFORD - DEFENDER

Another Bury born player that has made his way through the youth ranks at Gigg Lane. Steve has worked hard in the youth and reserve teams to earn his chance, and was given his first team bow in the final fixture of the season as the Shakers drew 2-2 away to Notts County.

NO.20 - NICKY HILL - DEFENDER

Another product of Bury's youth policy. Able to play at either centre half or left back, Nicky made his first team debut as a sub in a 3-2 home win against Blackpool on 22nd April 2000, and was given his full debut two days later in a 2-0 away win at Cardiff City.

NO.21 - LEE CONNELL - MIDFIELD

Another product of the Shakers youth set up and yet another Bury born youngster to appear for his hometown club. Made his full first team debut in the Shakers 2-2 away draw at Notts County.

NO.22 - RYAN SOUTER - DEFENDER

A former Swindon Town apprentice, Ryan is able to play left back, centre back or in midfield. He gained five substitute appearances immediately after signing from Plymouth for the Shakers but has largely found first team opportunities hard to come by.



NO.23 - JASON JARRETT - MIDFIELD

Bury born Jason started his career at Blackpool in July 1998. Played only a handful of games before joining the Shakers in July 2000 on a six month contract, with a carrot of a more long term deal

being dangled by Andy Preece.





Blast from the Past Roger Wash

Clashes with the Shakers

Our first league clash with today's visitors took place in October 1937 following our promotion to the old Division Two, with the two teams locking horns at Kenilworth Road in front of a crowd of 17,650. Bury returned home with both points following a 1-0 victory to make it three defeats in a row for a Luton side battling to come to terms with football at the higher level. By the time of the return, the following February, we had sorted ourselves out on the field and won a thrilling game 4-3. A crowd of only 4,689 watched as Bill Redfern and Joe Payne, who notched a hat trick, took the Bury defence apart. We went even better at Gigg Lane the following season when we ran out convincing 5-2 winners. Payne had by now left Kenilworth Road but his replacement, local lad Hugh Billington, scored two to make it four in only three starts since making his league debut.

We followed this up with a 2-1 home victory with Eddie Connelly on the scoresheet and the same player netted one of the goals in the next fixture between the sides seven years later. Because of the War, competitive football had been put on hold for the duration but both Connelly and Billington were still in the Luton line-up and were on target in the 2-0 win in September 1946 in front of a Kenilworth Road crowd of 17,864, the highest to watch the fix-

Unfortunately our proud unbeaten record at Gigg Lane went out of the window that season when we went down 0-3 in a game marking the debut of Wally Shanks.

Games between the two sides then fell into a pattern of victories for the home team until 1951/52 when a solitary George Stobbart goal secured the points at Gigg Lane with the same man on target in the return which was won 2-1. We achieved the double again in 1953/54 with the 3-2 away win particularly satisfying as it extended a run of nine games unbeaten at that

stage in the campaign. It was goodbye to Bury at the end of the following season with our promotion to the old Division One for the first time in our history and we signed off with a 3-2 home win over the Shakers to avenge an earlier 1-2 defeat at Gigg Lane. Gordon Turner, who was set to become a thorn in the side of all defences the country over during his 14 year Luton career, scored in both games.

It was to be six years before the sides met again, once more in Division Two, and we were slightly flattered by a 4-0 scoreline at Kenilworth Road in October 1961 with Turner and Alec Ashworth scoring two apiece.

In the return at Bury we went down, rather unluckily, 1-2 with the Shakers' winner being scored after the normally reliable Ron Baynham in the Luton goal dropped the ball invitingly for Brian Turner to slot home. This came after full back Brendan McNally, playing on the wing for nuisance value after an injury (this used to happen in the days before substitutes), managed to limp up to score a rare goal.

In the following season we went down to Bury at Gigg Lane on the opening day, with the only goal coming from a disputed penalty ten minutes from the end. By the time of the return we were struggling in the fight to avoid relegation, which we eventually lost, and the 2-1 home win over the Shakers came as a bit of a shock as Bury were making a bid for promotion to the top flight at the time. Goals from Turner, inevitably, and new signing from Chester, Ron Davies, sealed the points.

The next pair of meetings took place in 1969/70 in the old Division Three. Bury had been relegated the previous season, while we had narrowly missed out on promotion. We had continued where we left off, aiming for Division Two, while the Shakers struggled at the wrong end of the table.

Unfortunately, after a very strong start to the

campaign, our promotion push had fallen off the rails over Christmas and we went to Bury in late January on the back of four straight defeats. In contrast, Bury were beginning to get their act together and had scored eight times against luckless Tranmere in their previous home game.

A crowd of 6,893 were present at Gigg Lane, including a train load from Luton, to watch the Town get off to the perfect start when a cross from Graham French was met by a firm header from Malcolm Macdonald after only five minutes. It has subsequently been well recorded that mercurial winger French had

been overdoing it at a party the night before, and had allegedly given firm instructions to his team-mates in the changing room before the game not to give him the ball as he felt rather

Of course, at every opportunity, the players fed him with the ball and he put on one of his best ever performances in a Luton shirt.

French had the beating of Bury full back Ray Parnell every time and I have the vivid memory of the winger pushing the ball through the defenders legs, waiting for him to get up off the grass, before skinning him once more.

The Town went two up after 30 minutes when Matt Tees latched on to a long ball and scored at the second attempt after goalkeeper John Forrest had parried his first effort.

With John Moore carrying out a sound man marking job on Bury dangerman Jimmy Kerr, the Town began to coast a little but were shaken out of their lethargy when Ben Anderson scored with a close range header after 68 minutes. Suitably stung, we stepped up a gear and

regained our two goal advantage through Tees a

few minutes later, a lead we held on to until the end. Our promotion push was now back on target.

The return was played a couple of months later, and on a cold evening a crowd of 12,751 saw a below par performance from the Town forwards bringing about a final score of 0-0. Fortunately the forwards found their shooting boots after that and promotion was eventually won with a match to spare.

The final pair of games took place in 1996/97 when both teams were fighting neck and neck for promotion from Division Two. The Town were the first side that season to escape from Gigg Lane without conceding a goal in a 0-0 draw but the scoreline was identical in the return in a game the Town had to win in a faltering bid to claim an automatic promotion spot. The Shakers were heading the table at the time and were quite content to soak up the pressure as they went on to clinch the championship leaving us to enter the play-off lottery.

Christopher, from Linkfield, Welwyn Garden City, will doubtless enjoy the




chance to talk to Matthew Taylor, because the wing-back is his favourite player.

Hatters on Card

Alan Robinson

LUTON Town and Bury were regular opponents in the old Second Division during the immediate post-war period and the early 1950s. Indeed, Billy Arnison, one of the Hatters stars of that era, played his final league match at Gigg Lane in October

Arnison was included in a large series of unnumbered cards produced on a commercial basis a few years ago by the Portsmouth cigarette card enthusiast, Bill Priddy. The series ran to over 600 subjects, and mainly utilised the caricatures of Mickey

Durling, a leading sports cartoonist of the 1940s and 50s. Joseph William Arnison was born in Johannesburg, South Africa, on June 27, 1924. He first played football as a goalkeeper, then switched to centre-half, before settling down to be a forward. He came to these shores in 1946 when he signed for Glasgow Rangers, but found his first-team opportunities at Ibrox limited. Luton liked the look of this big. bustling centre-forward and in August 1948 persuaded him to come south, for a £7,000 fee. Always known to the football world as Billy, Arnison went straight into the Town's league side for the opening encounter of the new season, at home to QPR. He did not get on the score sheet

that day because the game fin-

ished 0-0, but he opened his account at Cardiff two days later. When the Welsh side came to Luton for the return, the following week, Arnison scored all the goals in the Town's 3-0 win.

He continued in fine form, and two goals in the 3-1 home win over Plymouth on Christmas Day brought his total up to 16. However, in the new year the first of a series of knee injuries which was to plague the remainder of his time at Kenilworth Road restricted his output to three more goals that

Arnison started 1949/50 as the Town's first choice for the No. 9 shirt, and he scored in early season encounters with Coventry City and Sheffield

United. But these proved to be his only goals that season, for it was not long before the knee was giving him trouble again. He had to undergo two operations for the removal of cartilage, and did not figure during the second half of the campaign. Everyone hoped that the surgery had done the trick, and that he would be fully fit to lead the attack the following season, but sadly this did not prove to be the case. In October 1950 he played at Bury, in a match which the Shakers won 4-1, and it was his only outing that year, and it turned out

> also to be his last senior match. Further operations followed, but eventually, in the summer of 1951, and aged only 27, this cheerful, likeable player was advised to pack in the game. Not only was it a blow to Arnison, but also to Luton Town, who lost a talented forward, possessing a good football brain and a powerful shot in both feet. He played only 46 league and cup games for the Town, scoring 21 goals, yet is well remembered by everyone who saw him.

A benefit game was staged for him in September 1951, against an All-Star XI, and Arnison then returned to South Africa with his wife and young family. He had studied physiotherapy during his playing days, and was able to set up in this line on his return home.

He came back here for periodic visits, and always retained a great affection for the Hatters, who, he said, had always done right by him through his injury problems. He died in 1996.

These cards were not produced in great numbers, and despite being printed comparatively recently are difficult to get hold of now. As they have plain backs, and the only wording on them is the player's name and club, future identification will obviously be a problem. Among the other Town players featured in the series that I have come across are Ron Baynham, Doug Gardiner, Les Hall, George Stobbart and Bernard Streten.

AWHEN rival managers Joe Kinnear and Andy Ritchie met after Saturday's game, the visitors' boss admitted: "I don't know how you didn't win that one."

"I do," replied the Town manager. "We didn't score any goals."

A few seconds of conversation summed up 90 minutes of frustration for the Town and their supporters, as we clung on to the hope that an overdue home win would brighten the chances of avoiding relegation. The crowd was the smallest since Mr Kinnear took over, but the noise volume was wonderful, testament to the hunger hard core fans feel for success.

In the event, the fourth consecutive home game in 12 days, from which so much had been expected, became another anti-climax as Oldham set out their stall to avoid defeat, and got away with it. Ritchie, once a consistent goal scorer, confessed that while he was happy enough to take home a point, his team's attacking efforts had been very disappointing.

He had not planned it that way, he said - he knew the Town were bound to give it a go, but was surprised at how little attacking his side could muster.

He added that he had been looking a touch nervously over his shoulder as Oldham hovered six points above 20th place. He figured one more, taking their total to 52, would end the annual worry, so the trip to Kenilworth Road could be counted a success.

For the Town it was frustration all the way, most notably when Paul McLaren shot against a post in the first half, and Liam George missed a sitter shortly afterwards, miss-hitting a side-foot shot into the goalkeeper's arms after Stuart Douglas set up an open goal.

Douglas used his pace and persistence to terrorise Oldham's five-man defence, and Steve Howard's ability in the air ensured that the Town had options going forward.

With Matthew Spring out with hamstring trouble, the boss made three changes. Douglas returned as a third attacker, with George floating around behind the front two, and Petri Helin and Nathan Abbey were demoted to the bench, with Paul Shepherd making a steady debut on the right of defence and Mark Ovendale returning in goal.

The new formation looked potent, threatened a lot, but eventually achieved nothing in terms of goals on a day when one would have changed the game and almost certainly would have led to others.

The manager said he could not fault the way the Town went about their business - outplaying the opposition, and never looking in any danger at the back - except for the major matter of turning possession into goals. Some of the stats, he said, told the story - nine clear chances created, not one taken... five strikers on the books, but without 20 goals between them... 11 games played since the last striker's goal in open play... a leading scorer with only seven to his name... and an 18-year-old midfielder next in the goals chart. Whatever the last few weeks of the season held, he said, he knew he had a specific job to do in the summer: he is determined Luton Town will have a more potent side next campaign.



Hatters Chatter

Death of Alec Stock

Alec Stock 1917-2001

All at Kenilworth Road were saddened to learn of the death last weekend, at a Bournemouth nursing home, of former Hatters manager Alec Stock. Dapper, smart, fastidious and much loved by his players Stock came to Luton in December 1968 shortly after being discarded by Q.P.R who he had taken from Division Three to Division One in successive seasons.

Presiding over a Luton side that narrowly failed to win promotion from Division Three at the end of the 1968/69 season, he made no mistake in the following campaign and then saw the Hatters almost gain a top flight spot in 1971.

A master in the transfer market, Stock sold local boy Bruce Rioch to Aston Villa for a then divisional record fee and invested the money wisely in buying a little known full back from Fulham by the name of Malcolm Macdonald as well as future stars Chris Nicholl, Don Givens and Peter Anderson.

The sale of Macdonald, for another record fee, broke his heart but was forced on him due to financial problems behind the scenes in the wake of the Vehicle and General crash. He left Kenilworth Road in 1972 citing the strain of travelling daily to and from his Epsom home.

Born in Somerset in 1917 Stock played for both

Charlton and Q.P.R in the late 1930's before a distinguished war service in the Royal Armoured Corps saw him rise to the rank of major as well as suffer severe injuries caused by an exploding bazooka. The legacy of the injuries brought on asthma and partial deafness.

After the war, Stock was appointed player manager of non-league Yeovil where he masterminded one of the all time F.A.Cup upsets when Division One 'team of all the talents', Sunderland, were beaten 2-1 at The Huish in 1949.

This achievement pushed Stock into the limelight and he joined Leyton Orient, where he won the Division Three (South) championship, for the first of three spells interspersed with short appointments at Arsenal and A.S.Roma.

A move to Q.P.R. then followed and with it a glorious era for the West London club who became the first Division Three side to win a final at Wembley when they lifted the League Cup in 1967 as well as the previously mentioned promotions.

After leaving the Hatters, Stock linked up with Fulham, who by that time must have forgiven him for poaching Macdonald as well as Rodney Marsh, who he had signed for a giveaway £15,000 for Q.P.R. Stock rewarded the Cottagers by leading them to the 1975 F.A.Cup final when they lost 0-2 to West Ham.

After joining the board at Q.P.R, Stock returned to management at Bournemouth before moving upstairs to become general manager and then a director at Dean Court until eventual retirement in 1986.

Those who worked with him at Kenilworth Road will remember his philosophy. "At Luton, we have three basic rules- train, play and laugh. We never let them mix and everyone here is happy."

Also remembered will be his leading of the team sing-song on the way home on the coach from an away victory when he even insisted that the directors join in!






WE had a player sent off and, I am sad to report, the coach also received a red card before our ten men clinched a very satisfying victory on Saturday. I am not proud of my action which brought the second sending-off of my career - the first was 20 years ago when I had a bit of a scuffle with Alvin Martin of West Ham.

At Swansea, on a wet and windy day, and on a poor pitch, we were tested in many ways. Because of the long journey we had travelled the day before, and stayed in a hotel overnight, giving the lads an idea of what it is like to be a professional footballer. It seemed to hype them up, and they so much wanted to do well that at times they seemed to be trying too hard, which is not entirely a bad thing. Some of the shouting to the home team from the touch-line was not in the best traditions of sportsmanship, and the referee had a difficult time. The flash point came after 38 minutes, when James Osborn was fouled by a man going in with a twofooted tackle. We were surprised that play was allowed to go on, but then pulled back because the Swansea player was on the ground injured. The ref then decided that Osborn had fouled the man, and that it was serious enough to send him off. We were amazed, and I remonstrated with the ref, and he gave me a red card too. I have to apologise, because I know it sets the wrong example, whatever the provocation at the time.

We were drawing 2-2 when that happened, and had been playing so well that I thought we would win by a street. Being reduced to ten men might have changed the game, but all credit to our lads for the way they responded. We went into a 4-3-2 formation, and the half-time instruction was to get the ball down and play it, and we would probably win. Swansea kept us out until 12 minutes from time, thanks to a mixture of luck and desperate defence. We played with great self-belief, and created a lot of

FIFTEEN points to play for, and a ten-point gap to close. That is the size

of the task facing the Town today as the relegation scrap effectively becomes a matter of five teams trying to avoid three places.

With 50 points the minimum target. Town boss loe Kinnear wants a winning surge to take the Town to 53, and insists we stay positive and go for it after an Easter that yielded one point out of six.

The holiday programme did no favours to any of the clubs involved in the dogfight. Oxford, already relegated, failed to collect a single point. The best news for us was that the same fate befell Andy King's Swindon. the Swans 1-0 on Monday to leave the Welshmen bottom but one and 15 points adrift of the safety mark. There is every chance they will be relegated today - even if they beat Oldham and carry on to win their last four they are doomed if Cambridge or Swindon collect just one draw from their remaining

Bristol Rovers and Cambridge were the most successful strugglers over the bank holiday weekend, each taking three points. Rovers beat Colchester at home before losing at Oldham, and Cambridge won 2-0 at Northampton but were then smashed 5-1 by Millwall at The Abbey on Tuesday.

Bury, today's visitors, will be looking to make amends for a miserable holiday weekend. They were thumped 4-1 at Reading, where Colin Cramb gave them an early lead, but was later sent off. On Monday, they were beaten 1-0 at home by play-off contenders Wigan, and suffered another red card. Paul Dalglish of Wigan, and Adrian Littlejohn, who scored in the 1-1 draw against us at Gigg Lane in November, were both sent off after a massed handbags tantrum late in the game. 


