

Inside Forward

JOE Kinnear will cross the North Sea in the search for players to help Luton Town mount a championship challenge next season. "If we went into the new season with the same squad as this, we would struggle," he said.

"Good players cost money, but I have a budget agreed with the chairman, and am happy with that. I don't want to bring in journeymen players, and those who come in will be better than those we are losing. Up to a dozen might be leaving, and on wages I could bring in six new men on the higher salaries we would have to pay to get the right men. We have a lot of dead wood running around, and I don't intend to have it here next year. I want quality, not quantity.

"The big need is for wide players, natural wingers, because we don't have one in the club, and I want to be able to field my preferred four at the back formation. I am going to Norway shortly to take in six games over there - I have been going there for ten years with Wimbledon, so I know a lot of players, and I have a hit list of the men I want, including a couple of wingers.

"I also want a striker, at least one who can guarantee you 15 or more goals a season. At Wimbledon I had four or five who could do that. You want to be able to sit down at the start of the season, look at your strikers, and say right, him, him, and him, will knock in 50 goals between them...I would like to think we could build a squad here along those lines."

Free transfers have already been given to Nathan Abbey, Andre Scarlett, Gavin McGowan, Friedrich Breitenfelder and Rocky Baptiste.

Made available for transfer for no fee, but still under contract with the Town, are Dean Brennan, Peter Holmes and Dean Standen, while Peter Thomson is also listed, with the Town asking for a nominal fee, having paid £100,000 for him in September.

Richard Dryden and Stuart Fraser have accepted new contracts. Offers have also been made to Liam George, Paul McLaren and Andrew Fotiadis. Lee Mansell, already signed up as a low-paid scholarship boy, has ben offered a better deal, over three years, as a reward for his progress this season.

The only player known to have attracted interest from elsewhere is McLaren, with Wigan, Cardiff and QPR in contact with his agent.

The manager says he hopes to enthuse McLaren with the vision he and the chairman share, that this club is going places. "Hopefully, he will decide we are the better club for him and for his career," said the boss.

Good-bye - and thanks



ONE OF the important contributors to the club's efforts over the past two decades attends his last match as an employee today. At 75, but looking more like 60, Les Shannon is retiring after nine years as chief scout, having opened up our Schools of Excellence in Luton and Milton Keynes in his capacity as a coach in 1984.

An Everton fan as a boy, Les was devastated when he was rejected at Goodison Park, but Liverpool took a different view, and he joined them as an apprentice in 1944. He made it to the first team, and four years later Burnley, then a top club, bought him for £6,000

- "I think it was quite a lot of money at the time," said Les.

He had nine successful years at Turf Moor, as a wing half or inside forward, and took his coaching badges as the end of his playing career approached.

After coaching in schools, and working as an FA staff coach, Les was head-hunted by Arsenal manager Billy Wright to be his chief coach. "They didn't give us enough time," said Les. "I have thoroughly enjoyed my time at Luton," he said. "I have always kept myself fit, and still do, and I am happy amongst players. I still think of myself as one!" Football has been kind to Les: at Highbury, he and Billy Wright's secretary fell in love, and Les and Maureen have been happily married for over 30 years. "It helps that she's a football fan," he said.

They will both be in the main stand today, and everyone at Kenilworth Road gives thanks for all their efforts for Luton Town. We hope they enjoy a long and happy retirement. Les says he will - watching the Town and cheering them on to promotion next season.

The Manager Joe Kinnear

MY FIRST words today must be to share with support-

ers my deep disappointment at our failure to retain our Second Division status. It has been the most sickening experience of my career in professional football. When I came here three months ago, I really believed I could beat the odds and pull the club out of trouble, and relegation is a blow to professional pride I would rather not have on my CV.

You can list a lot of reasons why it has happened, but perhaps now is the time to put it behind us, and look ahead to a brighter future. There are lessons to be learned, and there will be a lot of hard work done during the summer to set us up for the new season. You may have read that I was "threatening to resign" if we did not win promotion in 12 months time. That is not quite what I was trying to say, so let me put the record straight today. If the board is as good as its word in terms of financial backing, I am capable of putting together a squad capable of going straight back into Division Two in 12 months time. If I don't, I deserve to be sacked. So I have set myself the straightforward goal: nothing less than promotion will satisfy me. By going on the record with that statement I have put pressure on myself, and have set myself up to look a complete fool if we don't get there next May. Our players will be under pressure to succeed, and it is only right that the manager and coaches should be as well. Pressure will be brought to bear: I am a perfectionist, and expect my players to be the same. We have endured a season of failure, and now we owe it to marvellous supporters to redress the balance by enjoying a season of success.

Recent performances have been illustrations that our current squad is not good enough we are woefully inconsistent in both penalty areas, and the statistics in the league table tell

the story simply: we haven't scored enough, and not one of our strikers has reached double figures. Defensively, we fall asleep all too easily, and forget the basics.

We have some good players in the club, but not enough. I want more men under pressure for their places. I have rarely experienced the situation I met here, where the team just about picks itself. It won't happen next season, I promise.

Relegation is a shock to the system, but adds to the realisation that we have to make a fresh start. If I can get things around to my way of thinking, I will be a lot happier, and we will put things right. And everyone will know jobs are on the line if we don't produce the goods.

I expect to have a busy summer, and have already identified players I want to bring in. Finance is available, and while that remains the case there will be no excuse for me not delivering.

I believe in my own ability. I will build a new squad, a mixture of new and old, and some of the promising young players we have on their way through the ranks. I am looking forward to the challenge. If we get the rub of the green, I am confident this club will soon be back on track.

Finally, my thanks for the excellent support we have had at home and away. Thank you also for the letters and e-mails, and for the positive attitude they have all shown. And in reply to one young lady who took me to task for calling all supporters "him" let me finish with a properly-worded version of what I meant to say in this column on an earlier occasion - have a good summer, come back next season, and I promise I will try to produce the football and the results to delight every supporter, and put a smile on his or her

Captain's Log Marvin Johnson

THERE has been a very subdued atmosphere about the dressing

room in the last few days as we try to come to turns with the worst moment of our professional lives. Relegation hurts, and we are all bitterly disappointed that we did not do better. Over the season we have not been good enough, and obviously action has to be taken to put things right.

We know changes are going to be made, and we are also thinking about what the next few months holds in store. Some will leave, and some will arrive, and we have to look forward and turn our disappointment into a positive desire to set the record straight.

Despite relegation, I am optimistic about the new season, and already looking forward to it. Events over the past year suggest that better times are ahead.

I have had the feeling for the past five or six years that we were a club not really going anywhere. We dropped out of the First Division, and have been declining slowly ever since.

Now it seems as though we are about to go through a period of major change. It probably needed someone like Joe Kinnear to come in, to look at the club with a fresh pair of eyes, and with the stature to take the bull by the horns to do whatever is necessary.

He has made his intentions very clear, and even if it will be painful for some, changes must be made for the good of the club. Obviously, having just got back into the side after injury, I hope I have a part to play in a general revival of our fortunes.

The new set-up the manager talks about is needed. I remember when David Pleat first came in as a manager. He pulled the squad apart, and at the time some wondered if he had overdone it. But he brought in the right players, and built a team good enough to win promotion and succeed at the highest level.

Those big changes were for the good of the club in the long run, and I am sure if Joe Kinnear can do a similar job no-one will argue about any of

the changes he makes.

It will be hard on some, but players are in no position to complain - we are the ones whose results week in, week out, have not been good enough.

The boss talks about a promotion campaign reaching its conclusion 12 months from now. I honestly believe that is more than wishful thinking. Probably the best chance of returning is in your first season down - remember how close we came when we dropped into Division Two five years ago. In the following season we reached the play-offs, and with just a little more luck would have bounced straight back up.

The aim this time is obvious: get back up at the first attempt, without worrying about play-offs. I know it will be difficult. My experience is that the lower the division, the less good football you see. Physical strength often takes priority over technique. We will have to adapt to that, although I am equally sure that good football as well as muscle will do the job.

Meanwhile, in our final game of the season, it is up to all of us to repay your loyalty with a good send-off performance. We have our pride, and you deserve a team that gives 100 per cent, even if it matters little in terms of the league table.

I think the support this season has been fantastic. Fans could have been forgiven if they had given us a lot more stick, and it is all credit to them that they have been understanding and patient in our troubled season.

We went to the supporters player of the year presentation night on Sunday, and were amazed, and a touch embarrassed, at how kind fans were to a team that had let them down so often. The message that came over loud and clear was that supporters have put the season behind them, and are already looking forward to a promotion campaign next time. So am I. Have a good summer, thanks for your backing throughout the season, and come back and shout Luton Town to the title next season!







RONNIE MOORE -MANAGER

DOB - 4/2/49 - Hednesford Brian Horton joined Port Vale as manager in January 1999 after taking over the reins from long-serving manager John Rudge.

He was born in Hednesford in Staffordshire where he

played for Staffordshire schools. On leaving school he played non-League football for Hednesford Town before joining Port Vale as a professional. He played 236 League games for Port Vale and scored 37 goals (13 from the penalty spot) before Peter Taylor signed him for Brighton in March 1976 for £30,000.

For Albion he played 252 games in all competitions and scored 41 goals. He led Albion to promotion from Division Three in 1977 and two years later to Division One.

In the summer of 1981 he was transferred to Luton Town, effectively being exchanged for Tony Grealish. He went on to play 118 games for Luton with whom he again earned promotion as skipper in his first year, taking them to Division One. He became player-manager at Hull City in May and led them to promotion to Division Two in his first season. He was sacked in April 1988 and moved to Oxford United as assistant to Mark Lawrenson. He took over the managerial role there six months later before being appointed to the Manchester City hot-seat in August 1993. He lost that post under Francis Lee in April 1995 and was immediately installed to a similar post at Huddersfield where his tenure ended in 1997. He then moved back to his old club Brighton as manager where he proved to be popular with both fans and players, while getting results on the pitch.

His playing career spanned 689 League and Cup games with a prolific 88 goals from midfield. He has twice been involved as skipper with a team promoted to Division One, at Brighton and Luton. And as manager he took Hull up to Division Two. In his first season back at Port Vale he managed to keep the club in the first division but last season the team were relegated.

NO. 1 - MARK GOODLAD - GOALKEEPER

DOB - 9/9/79 - Barnslev

Height - 6ft 1in Weight -13st 2lbs

Mark was signed on a free transfer after an initial trial period at Vale Park. A young goalkeeper he had already had a loan spell at Scarborough where he had made his league debut and began his career at Nottingham Forest.

Brian Horton was impressed with the youngster and he signed on a free transfer for the rest of the 1999/2000 season. He then made his full debut in the final match versus Wolves and impressed immensely with a dominant display.

With previous first choice keepers Musselwhite and Pilkington both released as a cost cutting measure, Mark signed a two year contract in the summer of 2000 and he is likely to be first choice in the new season.

NO. 12 - DEAN DELANEY - GOALKEEPER

DOB - 15/9/80 - Dublin

Height - 6ft 0in Weight -13st 2lbs The young Dubliner was signed by Brian Horton to add competition to the goalkeeper position at Vale Park and he will be looking to challenge Mark Goodlad for the number one shirt. An Eire U21 International, Dean first came to the Vale Manager's attention when he arrived on trial last season. Firmly down the goalkeeping pecking order at Everton after Gerrard, Myhre and Simonson he was freed at the end of the season and Horton moved quickly to snap him up.

NO. 21 - LIAM BURNS - DEFENDER

DOB - 30/10/78 - Belfast

Height – 6ft 0ins Weight – 13st 3lbs Liam is an Irish central defender who turned professional in July 1997 after he had completed his apprenticeship. A Northern Ireland under-21 international, he made his debut as first team substitute at Sunderland in January 1998 in front of almost 40,000 fans and did well in an unaccustomed left wing back role. Since then he has been given a regular first team place.

NO. 5 - MICHAEL WALSH - DEFENDER

D.O.B. - 5/8/77 - Rotherham

Height- 6ft 0in Weight - 12st 8lbs A confident and competent right-back who has been tipped for a higher grade of football. He is renowned for his long throw (40 metres - only four metres short of the world record) and signed for Port Vale during 1998 for £100,000. Before joining Port Vale he played at Scunthorpe where he progressed from a trainee to a first team requ-

NO. 3 - ALLEN TANKARD - DEFENDER

DOB - 21/5/69 - Fleet

lar.

Height - 5ft 10in Weight - 13st 4lbs Tankard has established himself as an important part of the experienced Vale defence. Allen started his career at Southampton in May 1987 during the same period Alan Shearer, Matt Le Tissier and Andy Townsend were in the first team. He only managed five appearances for the Saints and moved on to Wigan on a free transfer in the summer of '88. He remained a first team regular at Wigan until his move to Vale in July 1993 for £87,500.

His league debut for the Valiants was in a 2-1 defeat away against Burnley on 14/8/93. He has now played over 300 games for Port Vale and scored three goals.



NO. 2 -MATTHEW **CARRAGHER - DEFENDER**

DOB - 14/1/76 - Liverpool Height - 5ft 9in Weight - 11st 6lbs Matt is one of three players who came to Port Vale during the closed season of 1997. He initially signed a

one-year contract after coming from Wigan on a free transfer. The contract was extended again by a further two years and has just been renewed this Summer to keep the impressive defender at the club. He describes himself as an attacking right back and at just 21 he was Wigan's longest

serving player with more than 100 appearances under his belt. He has slotted into Port Vale's first team squad with ease and has proved to be a mature and experienced defender despite his vouth.

NO. 17 - NEIL BRISCO - DEFENDER

DOB - 26/1/78 - Wigan Height - 5ft 11in Weight - 13st 1lb Defender Neil signed in 1998 after failing to gain a first team place at former club Manchester City. He made just a handful of appearances last season but has worked hard in pre-season and is hoping to have gained himself a place in Brian Horton's plans. He made his debut under the new manager at the first game of last season against newly-relegated Blackburn. He played in the unfamiliar role of right-back and had a cracking game.

NO. 6 - SAGI BURTON - DEFENDER

DOB - 25/11/77 - Birmingham Height - 6ft 2in Weight - 13st 6lb

Or to be exact, Osagyefo Lenin Ernesto Burton-Godwin, Birmingham-born Sagi is a well-built central defender who made his debut as sub against West Brom when Ant Gardner came off injured.

The 6 foot 2 inch player has been at Crystal Palace since he came through their youth team and made his first team debut in 1997/98 season. The 23-year-old is a good solid defender and because of his height is known to dominate in the

After initially signing a short-term deal at the club he earned himself a more permanent contract in close season after suitably impressing Brian Horton.

NO. 20 - PAUL DONNELLY - DEFENDER

DOB - 16/2/81 - Newcastle-under-Lyme Height - 5ft 8in Weight - 11st 10lbs Nineteen-year-old Paul made his debut against Stockport County in February 2000.



The youngster can slot in at right-back or leftback and successfully graduated through Port Vale's School of Excellence and youth team to earn himself a one-year contract.

A week before his debut his contract was extended by a further two years. Paul is very much one to watch in the future and could be the long-term replacement for defender Ant Gardner who was sold to Tottenham Hotspur.

NO. 4 - DAVE BRAMMER - MIDFIELDER

DOB - 28/2/75 - Bromborough Height - 5ft 11in Weight - 12st 0lbs Brian Horton clinched the central midfielder for a fee of £350,000 (rising to £500,000 on appearances) from Wrexham – where he had been since a trainee. He is a strong player who is not afraid to have attempts on goal. He is also a fine passer of the ball and can use both feet equally well.

NO. 14 - RICHARD EYRE - MIDFIELDER

DOB – 15/9/76 - Poynton Height - 5ft 8in Weight - 11st 8lbs A fast moving right winger from Poynton in Cheshire. Turned professional in July 1995 after completing his apprenticeship as a trainee. He has been a regular for the reserves in the Pontins League and had his first taste of senior action when he was a substitute v Ipswich in December 1997. He came on for the last minute. Since Brian Horton took over as manager, Richie has been an integral part of the squad. He is

growing in confidence all the time and his dangerous crosses are capable of tearing up the opposition's defence.

NO. 18 - GEORGE O'CALLAGHAN - MIDFIELDER

DOB – 5/9/79 - Cork, Eire

Height – 6ft 1in Weight – 10st 5lbs George is one of Port Vale's newest professionals. The tall Irish midfielder came successfully through the youth ranks and signed professional terms with the club in April 1998.

He is a free-scoring midfielder who clocked up 15 goals in the 1998 youth team. He has played on the Republic of Ireland U18 squad and has a good touch and a fine sense of anticipation. He made his debut in the 2:1 victory over Wolves in September 1999 and will be hoping to claim a regular place in the first team squad.

NO. 19 - ALEX SMITH - MIDFIELDER

DOB -15/2/76 - Liverpool

Height - 5ft 8in Weight - 10st 6lbs Alex Smith was snapped up by Brian Horton when he scored for Chester against the manager's former team Brighton two years ago.

He sees his £75,000 move from Chester as his ticket back to the higher leagues after starting his career at Everton and moving on to Swindon and Huddersfield. Unfortunately Alex has been dogged by injury since joining the Vale and has made just a handful of appearances. However those that he has made have proved him to be a



flair player with a touch of Premiership class about him. He is a left-sided midfielder who can carve up the opposition's defence and put great crosses into the box.

NO. 11 - TOMMY WIDDRINGTON - MIDFIELDER

DOB - 1/10/71 - Newcastle-upon-Tyne Height - 5ft 9in Weight - 11st 12lbs Tommy has joined Port Vale after spending a couple of months on loan at the end of season 1998/99 from Grimsby Town. The ex-Southampton player is a left-sided midfielder who has also played at Wigan on loan. He is a toughtackling ball-winner who is also comfortable in a

He was voted last season's Player of the Year and he is a player who will give 100 per cent in every game and has proved to be exceptionally committed to Port Vale.

NO. 23 - MICHAEL TWISS - MIDFIELDER

DOB - 18/12/77 - Salford Height - 5ft 11in Weight - 12st 8lbs An exciting, young player who was released by Manchester United in the Summer. Brian Horton snapped him up after an initial trial period and the 22-year-old has been a first team regular since.

NO. 8 - MICHAEL CUMMINS - MIDFIELDER

DOB -1/6/78 - Dublin

full-back or sweeper role.

Height - 6ft 0in Weight - 11st 11lbs A strong but skilful box-to-box midfielder, Michael signed on a free transfer for Vale after a brief trial. An Eire U21 International. Michael has the potential to build a good career in the game. He had made a handful of appearances for Middlesbrough, making his debut as right wing back versus West Ham. He moved to Vale Park in 2000 determined to rebuild his career. He made his first team debut versus Crystal Palace in March and scored on his home debut versus Walsall. He impressed Brian Horton enough to be offered a two-year contract which he signed in



May 2000.

NO. 15 - MARC BRIDGE-**WILKINSON - DEFENDER**

DOB -16/3/79 - Nuneaton Height - 5ft 6in Weight - 11st Olbs Marc was Derby's Young Player of the Year in 1998/9 and was top scorer in the reserves in 1999/2000. He

also spent a period on loan at Carlisle United. However, with competition for first team places tight at Pride Park Marc was released by Derby and snapped up by Brian Horton as his first signing of the new season. A skilful right-sided midfielder he comes with a reputation for scoring goals from midfield.



NO. 10 - TONY NAYLOR -**FORWARD**

DOB - 29/3/68- Manchester Height - 5ft 4in Weight - 10st 7lbs He began his career with non-league Droylsden before moving to Crewe in March 1990 for £20,000. He was bought from Crewe for

£150,000 in July 1994. Due to his small frame he is able to turn defenders inside out and back to front in the box, is very nippy and able to turn sharply in front of goal.

NO. 9 - VILLE VILJANEN - FORWARD

DOB - 2/2/71- Helsinki

Height - 6ft 2in Weight - 13st 4lbs Finnish international Ville joined the club on a short-term contract at the end of last season. During his short time at the club he impressed enough to earn himself a contract for this season The striker has played in Sweden for the last few years and made his debut as a substitute for Vale against Stockport County in February. He scored a goal on his full debut in a 1:1 draw against local rivals Crewe Alexandra and is a menacing attacker on his day.







Blast from the Past

Roger Wash

Clashes with the Vale

Although both clubs have been in operation for well over a century, the Town from 1885 and the Valiants 1863, the meetings between the sides have been, apart from a five season run in the 1960's, few and far between. In 1898/99 we were enjoying our second season as members of the Football League Division Two and entertained 'new boys' Burslem Port Vale, fresh from the Midland League, at Dunstable Road on November 5th. In front of a crowd of 2,000 we had most of the play but a goal from Richard Evans, two minutes from time, sealed a win for the visitors.

In the return the following March, at the Athletic Ground Cobridge, we went down 1-4 with prolific marksman Hugh Galbraith netting the sole Luton effort. We fared little better the next season, losing 0-1 in the Potteries, where 'the exchanges from the inception were of a spirited nature' and only managed a point following a 1-1 draw at Dunstable Road. We left the Football League at the end of that campaign and it was to be over 50 years before our paths crossed again, and in 1954/55, just as we were about to be promoted to the old Division One for the first time in our history, we fought out a 1-1 draw at Vale Park, the Valiants new home since 1950, with Roy Davies scoring the all important goal. Vale who had won promotion the previous season on the back of a miserly, virtually ever present defence went down 2-4 in the return at Kenilworth Road in front of a crowd of 16,704 with Davies again on the scoresheet. Our next meetings all took place in the 1960's commencing in 1963 following our relegation

from the old Division Two. On October 9th,

1963 we switched on our new £10,000 flood-

lights and welcomed the Valiants who looked

likely to pinch a point after centre-half Gordon Fincham missed a penalty.

Fortunately we managed to snatch only our second victory of the season when Tom McKechnie stabbed home the winner with ten minutes left to play.

The return was played the following week, but this time it was Vale who scored the only goal when the Town's ex-England international goalkeeper, Ron Baynham, was beaten just before the interval by Charles Rawlings, to send the crowd of 11,449 home happy but push us down nearer to the bottom of Division Three.

In 1964/65 both games were again played within days of each other and in the clash at Vale Park the Town were unlucky to go down to an Albert Cheesebrough effort four minutes from the end.

This victory ended a run of eight games without a win for Vale, which included an earlier 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road when David Pleat equalised just before the end with an unstoppable shot.

As can be gathered, both the Town and Port Vale were pretty poor sides at the time and they accompanied each other down into Division Four at the end of that season. As the Town found their feet at this new level we finally managed a win at Vale for the first time when John O'Rourke and Ray Whittaker were on target in a 2-1 win at the end of a six game unbeaten run.

The return was played on the evening of the F.A.Cup final, in an experiment which was surprisingly only repeated once after, as an excellent crowd of 12,054 saw the Town go in at half time five goals to the good with all the strikes coming in the opening 23 minutes. Mindful of a tough game to be played at

Halifax 48 hours later the players quite naturally sat on their lead in the second period but even then had the chance to make it six but ace striker O'Rourke missed from the penalty spot. Season 1966/67 was the lowest point in the club's history as we sunk to eighth from bottom of Division Four and our results against Vale appropriately summed up the campaign.

When we went to the Potteries on November 5th, 1966 we had gained one point and scored two goals on our travels that season and new manager Allan Brown, taking charge for the first time would only say "I have a lot of work to do," following a dismal 0-1 defeat. In the return, in April 1967, a rare goal from John Moore secured a point, after three straight defeats, as the Town struggled to avoid the need to apply for re-election. By the following season some of manager Brown's hard work was beginning to bear fruit and a hard earned point at Vale Park in a 0-0 draw in January was followed by a comfortable 2-0 home win in March- courtesy of goals from Ian Buxton and Bruce Rioch- as we consolidated our position at the top of Division Four on the way to the championship. Our next meetings took place after a long gap of 26 years with the Town in Division One facing the newly promoted Valiants at Vale Park where they had remained unbeaten for a year. The Town had started the 1994/95 campaign poorly but upset the formbook by winning 1-0 with Dwight Marshall heading his first league goal in a Luton shirt.

The Town eased into a two goal lead through Paul Telfer and Kerry Dixon in the return against relegation threatened Vale, with a late effort from Andy Porter not enough to prevent all three points remaining at Kenilworth Road. The final pair of matches came within a week of each other towards the end of the 1995/96 season at the finish of which the Town were relegated to Division Two.

On 23rd April a solitary strike from Vale's Lee Mills settled a game which finished unhappily for the Town with Graeme Tomlinson, on loan from Manchester United and making his full Luton debut, breaking a leg.

The return, a week later, was coincidentally the last home game of the season with the Town already relegated! With nothing to play for apart from a bit of pride a goal from Tony Thorpe with eight minutes left moved the Town into a 3-1 lead. A Mills effort at the death mattered little in a match marking the league debuts of both Sean Evers and Ben Chenery.

TV All Stars (1979)

ALL HATTERS fans could do with a bit of cheering up now that relegation has unfortunately become a reality. Had he been alive today, Eric Morecambe would surely have done just that, for not only was he an ardent Luton Town fan, but one of the top comedians of modern times.

It's not often that a supporter is better-known than any of the club's players, but there was a time that the very mention of Luton Town would always trigger his name. Hardly a Morecambe & Wise show went by without some reference to Luton.

and even today people instinctively

associate him with the club. Eric appeared on a set of 24 cards produced by Golden Wonder Crisps in 1979. Born as Eric Bartholomew on May 14, 1926, he adopted the name of his home town when he started his showbusiness career as a teenager. He and his young friend Ernest Wiseman, whom he met at a seaside talent contest, toured the northern clubs and music-halls with a comedy act, and gradually moved up the bill. By the early 1960s they had their own show on television, and when Eric moved to Harpenden later in that decade he and Ernie were already household


Luton or another team down the road, but I like to think there was more reasoning than that. He became a season-ticket holder, with a seat near the directors box, and in March 1970, shortly before the Town's promotion to the old Second Division, he became a member of the board. Eric became a familiar figure at Town matches, and often travelled to away games on the chartered trains that carried officials, players and supporters around the country. I well remember meeting the great man a few times on those trips, and believe that he did not have to act where comedy was concerned. Making people laugh came naturally to him, and he was just as funny off-stage

talking to supporters as he was when performing. One of Morecambe & Wise's greatest attributes was their timing, and the fact that, unlike a lot of modern comedians, they never had to resort to being crude or offensive to raise laughs. In 1974, with Happy Harry Haslam as manager. and Eric in the boardroom, Luton laughed all the way to promotion to the top flight. After a tense clincher at West Brom, on the day Manchester United were relegated from what is now the Premiership, the "tall one with the glasses" was

thrown into the bath at the Hawthorns by a very happy bunch of players.

That was to be the highlight of Eric's time as a director. The following season ended in relegation and by October 1975 the club's existence was threatened by a financial crisis. Dogged by heart trouble, Eric felt he could not jeopardise his health with these added pressures, and resigned from the board. He continued to support the team, and was made a Life President of the club, and was thrilled when, on his 57th birthday, the Town won that epic match at Maine Road to avoid relegation at Manchester City's expense. Tragically, just over a year later, Eric Morecambe was dead, claimed by a heart attack on stage on May 28, 1984.

Looking back, I don't think Luton realised at the time just how valuable his TV plugs and other promotional activities were to the club. They were instrumental in putting a small club firmly in the minds of millions, and enhanced its reputation as a friendly and progressive outfit. The introduction of an Eric Morecambe Suite at Kenilworth Road keeps alive his memory, and his support for Luton Town. This series of cards, which also contained the late Ernie Wise, can still be obtained easily from most dealers for the very reasonable price of around £2

Action Replay

IT WAS cruelly ironic that one of the Town's better performances of the season should end in defeat and confirmation of relegation. Disappointed though they were, supporters gave the team a sympathetic reception as they trooped off after putting up a fighting display. Most of the other club record total of 12 home defeats were deserved much more than this one, against a side which was on a roll, and clinched promotion a few days later and might finish the season as Second Division champions.

Marvin Johnson returned after his long lay-off, to enable Joe Kinnear to go with his preferred 4-4-2 formation for the first time, with Stuart Douglas on the right of midfield. Lee Mansell was missing because of a knee injury. The Town always seem to look better against higher quality opposition, and with a touch more calmness in front of goal might have snatched the win needed to keep hope alive.

The decisive goal was controversial, with the Town manager and his defence sure that Mark Robins was offside in the build-up. The manager made his point so forcibly he was sent off, with Johnson and Richard Dryden booked for their milder words of complaints.

Football in the Community

LINKS between Luton Town and the local community are to be strengthened as part of a new initiative announced this week.

The club has completed negotiations to re-enter the national Football in the Community programme, which is sponsored by the Football Association, Premier League, Football League and the Professional Footballers

With land now purchased for the new stadium, the club believes it is important to expand links with communities in the surrounding areas.

"I'm delighted the community programme will now enjoy the additional resources and support which the national scheme offers," said chairman Mike Watson-Challis.






Next Season's Challenge Brian Swain

THE TOWN'S itinerary next season, as they chase the championship

of the Third Division, is almost complete, with just a few Third Division promotion issues still to be decided. Bristol Rovers unwillingly claimed the fourth Second Division relegation spot this week, with two home defeats, to Port Vale on Monday and Wycombe on Wednesday.

Town anoraks might take a little comfort - but not much - from the fact that relegation means a lot of fans will be able to complete the full set of seeing the Hatters play all the other 91 clubs in the Premiership and Nationwide League.

For some, the set will be completed by games against recent additions to the Third Division, Cheltenham, Kidderminster, and newly promoted Rushden & Diamonds. For others some games will be long Memory Lane trips - unless Rochdale win promotion through the play-offs, we will be meeting them in the league for the first time since 1969/70, while we have not met Exeter City, except in a pre-season friendly a few years ago, since our Fourth Division championship campaign in

Darlington, Hartlepool, Torquay and Halifax are among others we have not met for many years, except for cupties, although we may yet be denied trips to play-off contenders Rochdale and certainties Hartlepool, and relegation-threatened Torquay and Barnet.


We have yet to meet Barnet in the Football League. although they have been regular opponents for preseason friendlies since coming out of the Conference in 1991. Underhill might see some drama this afternoon -Barnet are at home to Torquay, and must win to avoid dropping out of the League, into the Conference. Torquay's survival would please bucket and spade supporters, because there will be plenty of seaside trips: possibly to Blackpool and Torquay, and certainly to Swansea, Southend, Plymouth, Exeter and Hartlepool. Sadly, we will not be able to see Brighton's new home, unless we draw them in a cup, because the Seagulls have at last emerged from years of struggle as Division Three champions. Chesterfield and Cardiff are also promoted from Division Three, subject to Chesterfield's financial transgressions not costing more than the nine points deduction proposed by a disciplinary panel With Hartlepool claiming one play-off place, the other three are between Hull, Leyton Orient, Rochdale and Blackpool.

Carlisle will be our longest trip next season, well over 540 miles there and back. The other long hauls will be to Plymouth and Hartlepool, both 250 miles each way, and Swansea, 230 miles away.

Swansea and Oxford suffer the drop with us, which means our anoraks will chalk up another new ground next season - Oxford move into their new stadium during the summer.
