Hatters' new keeper Carl Emberson only had two saves to make all afternoon, although he was well protected by a defence in which fellow debutant Rusell Perrett enjoyed a solid display. Teenage striker Jonny

Allen was closest to find-ing the net for Carlisle when his 24th-minute curling effort brushed the top of Emberson's net.

Luton's attacking threat was equally as poor before the break. Kinnear's men failed to muster a single goal attempt – on target or off target – in a first-half that was severely lacking in flair.

But the second-half transformation was inst-ant with the Hatters taking the lead just 28 seconds

after the restart.

Matthew Taylor flicked a perfectly-weighted ball over the home defence with the outside of his boot for Lee Mansell to collect

Mansell then drove into the penalty box before sending a firmly-driven low cross into the six-yard where Hughes waiting to open his Hatters account with a simple tap-

Steve Howard forced Luke Weaver into a low save five minutes later before Griffiths doubled the advantage with a goal contrived on the Wimble-don training ground let alone that of Luton.

Taylor, whose set-piece delivery was excellent throughout the match, sent an inswinging free-kick to the far post where Perrett had escaped the attentions of his markers.

The former Portsmouth and Cardiff defender then headed across goal where poacher Griffiths nodded the ball into an open net from close range.

It was an effort remin-iscent of so many Robbie Earle goals from Kinnear's Wimbledon teams down the years and put the game beyond a limited Carlisle

Joe chasing four more

Russell Perrett both impressed on their debuts at Carlisle but Joe Kinnear insists he is still four players

short of his ideal squad. Kinnear signed seven players over the summer and only Adrian Forbes' groin strain prevented the Hatters boss from fielding all his

new players in Saturday's line-up.
But Kinnear's transfer market
activity is not over yet. The Hatters manager said: "I honestly
believe we are 50 or 60 per cent better off than last season but I'm still talking to players and believe we are four players short of an ideal squad. If we stay injury free and I

get the players here that I want then I think we will be as good as anything in Division Three.

"I want two good players in every position but there's already more buzz in a happy dressing room. The place was all over the shop when I came here with not enough people pulling in the right

direction with me."
Perrett and Hughes were both free transfer captures for Kinnear. Ex-Portsmouth defender Perrett has joined the Hatters from Cardiff after turning down Division Two clubs Bournemouth and Wycombe

and has signed a three-year deal. Hughes, who played under

Southampton, has signed a three-month deal after missing the whole of last season through injury.

But Kinnear has not ruled out a permanent deal for the 25-year-old midfielder in November, saying:
"He ripped his groin and was out
for nine months so that's the reason we've given him three months not because of his ability. He's got a good pedigree and in training he's looked fit and well." Ex-Hatter Chris Willmott, now at Wimbledon, is on Kinnear's hit

list and Sunderland striker Michael Reddy is believed to have been targeted.
