Gall's 75th-minute strike, curled home from just inside the box, handed Rovers a crucial after they had failed to fully capitalise on a string of earlier chances

Once the home side got on top after an even opening spell, they carved ou enough opportunities to have been four or five goals clear by the interval.

Although Ellington's performance was at times irresistible, he had chances either side of the opening strike of the game, which came just after the half-hour

It was the product of a well-executed move which saw Gall cut in from the right to feed Ellington, who had got ahead of his marker to steer the ball on at the near

"We've been working in training on getting in front of defenders at the near post and it paid off here," said Ellington

The youngster twice saw the combined efforts of keeper Carl Emberson and the Hatters' defenders foil him as he latched on to through balls from David Hillier and Andy Thomson

But it was Martin Cameron who was left rueing his luck from the two clearest openings of the first half, pulling one shot across goal from eight yards before rolleying another attempt off target from similar distance By then, Luton were back in the gam
