Better late than never for Luton against 10 men

IT WAS a case of better late than never as Luton eventually overcame 10-man Southend United at Kenilworth Road on Monday.

Late goals from Carl Griffiths and substitute Andrew Fotiadis secured a 2-0 win against a Southend side who had Mark Rawle sent off after just 19 min-

The visitors also missed a 28thminute penalty when Kevin Maher's woeful spot-kick was easily saved by Hatters keeper Carl Emberson

It was a somewhat laboured victory for Joe Kinnear's men, who struggled to break down a wellorganised defence before the introductions of Stuart Douglas and Andrew Fotiadis added more mobility to the Hatters' front line.

Fotiadis staked his claim for a starting place with the Hatters' second goal after Griffiths had scored his third for the club, all of which have come from inside the

It was not a vintage display but maximum points moved Luton up to second in the table with crocked quartet Matthew Spring, Russell Perrett, Aaron Skelton and Liam George among others all to come back, as well as more new signings on the horizon.

The defensive deficiencies that had seen the side concede seven goals in the previous two matches were also less evident with Emmerson Boyce enjoying an improved display alongside the recalled Richard Dryden as Kinnear switched back to a flat back four.

Steve Howard went close to opening the scoring on 15 minutes when his header was cleared off the line by Southend midfielder Start Thurgood.

But the opening stages were dominated by some eccentric ref-

Southend had more reason to feel aggrieved on 27 minutes when Emberson escaped an early bath after hauling down Daniel Webb in the penalty box.

Webb had intercepted Taylor's poor back pass and rounded Emberson before having his legs whipped from under him by the Hatters keeper.

Emberson escaped with a booking to the fury of the visitors fans and then rubbed salt in their wounds by comfortably saving Maher's dreadful penalty.

Marvin Johnson, who enjoyed an immaculate display at left-back, went close to breaking the deadlock on 31 minutes when his edgeof-the-area volley whistled over the

Webb tested Emberson twice with second-half long-range efforts and skipper Phil Whelan also sidefooted wide from a corner.

But the visitors' legs tired in the energy-sapping heaf and Luton den began to get on top during the last quarter of the match after Kinn-

ear switched to a three-pronged attack

Taylor's inswinging free-kick hit the bar and Fotiadis' follow-up was cleared off the line by Leon Johnson on 75 minutes.

Shortly afterwards, a header from Luton's Johnson caused confusion in the visitors' penalty box and Griffiths pounced to force the ball over the line from two yards.

The 30-year-old striker then turned provider, laving the ball off to Fotiadis who fired a low leftfooted effort into Darryl Flahavan's bottom corner.

Kevin Nicholls almost added a flattering third goal in injury time but his powerful drive went wide.

Afterwards, Hatters boss Kinnear said: "We were reckless again in giving away the penalty and we seem to have got a mistake in the bag for each game but we did not get punished today.

"I would not have been surprised if Carl Emberson had been given a red card to level things up after their player was sent off.

"The referee would probably say their striker was going away from goal so what bit of luck was going around we had.

"We could have found ourselves 1-0 down but that still might not have been enough for them.

We always looked like we had a goal threat with three up front. We also had five of our best players missing which proves the squad is
