JOE KINNEAR will run the rule over two former European under-21 internationals this week.

The Hatters boss has planned a behind-closeddoors friendly against a London club to have a look at a Dutch defender and a Danish striker.

Both men are unnamed because Kinnear does not want to alert other clubs of

their availability. Kinnear said: "I'm looking forward to seeing both players and, if they are as good as their records suggest, there's every chance we'll sign them. The Dutch defender is 6ft 2in and has nine international caps at

being on the subs bench for the full team. He's turned down a new three-year deal at Antwerp.
"The Danish striker has

eight under-21 caps. Both are young lads under 24."
Kinnear is also taking

another look this week at four trialists who played in the reserves' 1-0 win against Millwall. Wolves m

Wolves midfielder Simon Osborn is the most likely target after becoming surplus to requirements at Molineux.

Ghanaian international Eugene Ofori, Norwegian defender Tor Olve Iagnastol and Israeli Eyal Birkovic are the other players

hoping to impress.
Transfer-listed Dean Brennan scored a penalty against Millwall and the watching Kinnear had special words of praise for 17-year-old youth team player Rob Gillman, saying: "We played Gillman at centreback and he did exceptionally well. He's tall and both his distribution and positional sense were very

"He was arguably the best player on the pitch and never gave Giovanni Savarese a kick. He scored a hattrick for Swansea against us last season, so it was a good test for the lad.

Fotty feels wrath of Joe

ANDREW FOTIADIS felt the fury of Hatters boss Joe Kinnear on Saturday when he was substituted just 14 minutes after replacing Stuart Douglas.

Kinnear was left fuming by the ease in which Fotiadis was brushed aside in the build-up to Exeter's equaliser in-the 2-2

draw. And the former England Schoolboy striker was hauled off shortly afterwards. The Hatters boss later said: "I took him off because he did not show enough enthusiasm and cost us for the second goal. Their player went straight past him. "He could have done much better. In

fact, I could have gone round him with that defending and I told him so. He got beaten

The last time Kinnear substituted a substitute was at Notts County in just his

second match in charge.

Tresor Kandol lasted 19 second-half minutes on that occasion and never pulled on a Hatters' first team shirt again.

Ironically, Fotiadis replaced Kandol that evening and went on to score the Hatters' third goal in a 3-1 win at Meadow

Kandol, 20, made his debut for new club Cambridge United on Saturday.

Hot-shot Taylor earns 10-man Hatters a point

MATTHEW TAYLOR enhanced his reputation as one of the lower divisions' hottest properties by bagging a point-saving brace at Exeter.

Joe Kinnear last season described Taylor as one of the best full-backs he has worked with and this cam-paign he is proving an equally useful left-sided mid-

The Hatters boss has been so far thwarted in his attempts to sign a natural left-winger but Taylor, who is currently playing in front of the experienced Marvin Johnson, could prove more than an emergency stop-gap. His two goals earned the visitors a 2-2 draw at bottom club Exeter despite Paul Hughes' harsh sending off on 46 minutes

ing off on 46 minutes.

Hughes was given his marching order for two minor bookable offences, leaving the Hatters with just 10 men

for almost the entire second-half.

Lee Mansell was also no more than a passenger for the last 15 minutes after tearing a calf muscle but being forced to continue because Kinnear had made all three of his substitutions. Those replacements included Andrew Fotiadis, who an angry Kinnear

withdrew after just 14 minutes as a substitute because of his lack of a challenge in the build-up to Exeter's second-half equaliser.

The Hatters started the game quite slowly but could have gone ahead on 18 minutes when home keeper Arjan van Heusden kept out a close range header from former Exeter defender Richard Dryden after Taylor's left-wing free-kick.

Exeter took the lead 11 minutes later when lone target man Steve Flack capitalised on a misjudg-ment by fit-again Russell Perrett. The Hatters centre-back failed to make contact with an attempted

header and Flack collected the ball before bearing down on goal and rifling into the bottom corner.

Luton levelled the scores on 35 minutes when Taylor drilled a low left-footed effort from 15 yards inside van Heusden's near post after Matthew Spring and Carl Griffiths both had shots blocked.
