He seemed satisfied with the reply.





Five-Year Plan - The Response Continues

There has been a continuing flow of responses from supporters to the five-year plan, reproduced in full on the opposite page, published last month by Argyle's board of directors, with a view to explaining the club's objectives and business strategies. After the consultation period has expired next month the club will publish a statistical analysis of the replies, but in the meantime here is a further selection of the responses received to date...

Keith Whitfield begins a lengthy and wide-ranging response by saying: "I welcome the strategy document and particularly the request for supporters to respond to it."

One of several issues he raises concerns youth development.

"Substantial changes must be made if the club's youth schemes are going to deliver a steady supply of high quality players into the first team squad," he suggests.

"I believe that the club itself needs to become more involved at under-16 level and work alongside Argyle's Youth Development Trust to develop a much more comprehensive feeder system. The big clubs are signing up potential talent at ever-younger ages. They can offer facilities about which Argyle can currently only dream. This is mainly because our system is funded in large part from the generous donations of our loyal fans. All sorts of ingenuous ways have been found to raise the income flow, but there are severe limits on what is possible."

Whitfield also turns his attention to the issue of supporter involvement in decision-making. He writes: "I believe that there is an urgent need for the club and its supporters to communicate more fully and for the supporters to have an established role in club decision-making. With this in mind, I believe that the club should state that there will be a permanent place on the board for a supporters' representative and that it will help develop

communication channels whereby supporters can make constructive input into key decision-making processes, such as the design of the new stadium, the nature of the club kit and the development of the club's commercial activities."

Peter Colbourne writes: "I welcome all of your objectives - especially the way that you are looking at Argyle as a business in a competitive environment." But he adds: "My area of concern is not directly mentioned. The lack of a good-quality professional reserve league is a big hindrance to the footballing education of Argyle's youngsters. Young players learn much quicker when playing with and against senior professionals on a regular basis."

Colbourne goes on to criticise the Football Combination for refusing to re-admit Argyle and to suggest a legal challenge aimed at securing re-entry to England_s southern-based reserve league. "Like any other club/business, Argyle deserve a level playing-field to compete against our competitors," he concludes.

Dudley Tolkien has another area of concern. He writes: "I am very supportive of the club having a five-year plan, so that everyone connected with the club is clear about the club's main objectives. However, there is no mention of the state of the pitch, and I suggest the plan includes a commitment to turn the pitch into a top-quality playing surface, and to maintain it at that level."

Although some temporary measures have been taken, Tolkien adds, "I believe it is accepted that long-term improvements still need to be made. With a manager committed to playing a quality passing game, so much good work and investment in other areas can be undone if home results are compromised by deficiencies in the pitch."

To conclude on what some might regard as a lighter note, Andy Soper-Hall writes: "I would ask, implore, even beg that under no circumstances should "Semper Fidelis" be replaced as the music accompanying the "entry of the

gladiators" (or Santana - see Sidelines Ed). It was tried before with Tina Turner and "Simply The Best". It was abysmal! Argyle should always enter the field to "Semper Fidelis" and wearing green shirts. Some things should never change!"

The Plymouth Argyle Five-Year Plan



Draft Strategic Plan for Discussion

The new board of Plymouth Argyle assumed formal control last month, August 2001.

The directors feel that it is important to define a clear set of objectives for the club, together with a set of strategies to be deployed in the pursuit of those goals, over a set time period.

This brief paper sets out our initial thinking, and covers the period September 2001 to May 2006.

Before we set the plan in stone, we would appreciate comments from anyone with an interest in the club, and a point of view they would like to put forward. We are aiming to finalise the document in early October. Any feedback, therefore, should be submitted by the end of this month.

Start-Point

The lower half of the Third Division is not a good place to be especially for a club such as Plymouth Argyle. Our view is that we need to build the foundations for long-term success. That will take time, and patience.

We do not apologise for adopting an approach that some may interpret as cautious. Indeed, we refuse to over-promise. Our aspirations are high; the objectives we set ourselves must be achievable, and therefore realistic.

And there are already some real positives. The long-awaited stadium redevelopment is now underway, a new Chief Executive is in place, and the football side of the equation is beginning to show real promise again.

Furthermore, Plymouth Argyle continues to enjoy enormous latent goodwill, as evidenced by the support at the '96 Play-off final, and the '98 Derby cup game. That goodwill is there to be activated.

Objectives

Our aim is to establish Plymouth Argyle as the West Country's preeminent football club. The undisputed leader in football terms, and a strong differentiated, customer-focused brand in its own right.

In football terms, our mediumterm aspiration is to reach the first division, and consolidate our position there.

Over the coming five seasons, however, we believe it is prudent to set our sights firmly on promotion to Division Two, and then the establishment of PAFC as a leading side in that league, strongly positioned to challenge for the next step up. That, in and of itself, represents a major task.

Strategies

1. We will look to build a unified team at Plymouth Argyle. One that recognises that each and every member of the staff has a role to play, whether they are working in the club shop, coaching the young players, sitting on the board, manning the catering facilities, or playing on a Saturday afternoon. Successful clubs are characterised by everyone on the payroll working together as an extended integrated team. Plymouth Argyle will be no different.

2. We will do all we can to increase income (whilst maintaining a commitment to providing good value). Better product on the pitch, improved marketing, greater customer focus. In turn, we are committed to investing as high a proportion as possible of our revenues in the playing squad. Our policy will be one of constant improvement.

3. We will work hard to open lines of communications for the fans, who are and always will be the lifeblood of the club. We will seek ways of increasing the supporters' formal opportunities for active participation. Including, ultimately, a share issue (see point six below).

4. We will also increase accessibility to the club -

particularly through enhanced leisure facilities at the stadium, and more initiatives such as an improved Junior Greens, and more one-off events.

5. We firmly believe that we now have the right manager in Paul Sturrock, and we will give him as much support, and that most precious commodity of all - time - as he needs to bring success on the field. (Indeed, to make this a concrete reality rather than a mere aspiration, we are pleased to announce that we have offered Paul Sturrock an extension to his contract, to last the entirety of the five-year period under discussion, and that he has accepted our offer in principle).

6. We will continue the stadium

redevelopment programme.
7. We will, wherever possible, look to enter into strategic alliances with businesses located in our catchment area, and we will have a preferred supplier policy built on seeking to source products and services locally.

8. We recognise our responsibilities to the community in which we live, and which we represent. We will do all we can to support relevant local initiatives and charities.
9. We will expand our commitment to nurturing young players, with a particular fewer or providing.

to nurturing young players, with a particular focus on providing opportunities to promising young footballers throughout Devon and Cornwall.

10. We will work with the media in

10. We will work with the media ir as transparent and co-operative way as possible. We believe that there is much mutual benefit to be derived from a spirit of maximum accessibility and co-operation.

Next Steps

Once we have received all the feedback, we will refine this five-year plan. It will then be launched formally to the entire team at Home Park, prior to external publication.



Emmerson Boyee.

Born Aylesbury, 24.9.79 One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS boy m the summer of 1995, and made the breakthrough to the League squad at the age of 19 midway through the 1999/2000 season after occasional appearances following a debut in the Auto Windscreens Shield in January 1999. A commanding defensive figure, he was a regular last season, and junior members of Luton Town Supporters Club voted him their player of the year. Luton record to the start of this season: 86 apprentices, 4 goals.

Dean Brennan.

Born 17.6.80, Dublin Previous Luton boss Ricky Hill had worked as a youth coach at Sheffield Wednesday before rejoining Luton for a brief and unsuccessful spell as manager m the summer of 2000, and one of his first actions was to go back to Hillsborough for a midfielder he admired. But Brennan found it difficult to adjust to Second Division football, and is still trying to establish himself. Luton record to the start of this season: 11 appearances.

Stuart Douglas.

Born Enfield, 9.4.78 A striker with excellent pace, Douglas was a 17-year-old trainee when he scored on his league debut for Luton against Oldham m 1995, but a series of injuries delayed his progress before he won a regular place m Luton's league side in

the 1998/99 season. He has flourished both as maker and taker of goals, and Luton will always wonder if relegation might have been avoided last season if Douglas had not suffered more injury problems, which restricted him to only 15 full league appearances. Luton record to the start of this season: 162 appearances, 23 goals.

Richard Dryden.

Born Stroud, 14.6.69 Vastly experienced, the defender has played at all levels of professional football, and accepted his second Luton contract at the end of last season. He had been recruited on a free transfer from Southampton m February 2001. Bristol Rovers gave Dryden his start in football, as a trainee, but after a handful of games he was allowed to move on to Exeter for £10,000. Two years later they cashed m as he was sold to Notts County for £250,000, and further hefty fees were paid as Dryden moved on to Birmingham, Bristol City and Southampton. He also spent some time on loam at Stoke in the 1999-2000 season, during which he helped them win the Auto Windscreens Shield at Wembley. Luton record to the start of this season: 20 appearances.

Carl Emberson.

Born Epsom, 13.7.73 Wanting two players to compete for the first team goalkeeper's spot, Joe Kinnear moved swiftly m the summer of 2001 to persuade Emberson to choose Luton instead of Plymouth, who were also interested, when his contract at Walsall ended. His career began at Millwall s a trainee, but he made his name in a sevenyear spell at Colchester before going to the Bescot Stadium m the summer of 1999. There he was in the squad, which won promotion to Division One, and Kinnear hopes he will enjoy similar success at Luton.

Adrian Forbes.

Born Ealing 23.1.79 After considerable First Division experience, and with an England youth cap to his credit, Forbes was a surprise inclusion on Norwich City's list of players available for transfer in the summer of 2001, and Luton boss Joe Kinnear was delighted to pay £75,000 for a right wringer to add much-needed width to his attacking formation. Forbes is noted for his ability to run at and past defenders, either to deliver crosses from out wide, or to cut in and have a crack at goal. He had been at Carrow

Road for four years, starting as a trainee, before his move to Luton.

Andrew Fotiadis.

Born Hitchin, 6.9.77.

A local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before being a full-time soccer professional. He won England Schools caps at under-15 and under-18 level, and developed a style to delight

Luton fans and worry opposing defences, as an old-fashioned centre forward with good physique, power, and concentrated determination.

Luton record to the start of this season: 112 appearances, 13 goals.

Stuart Fraser.

Born Edinburgh 9.1.80 Stylish defender and former skipper of the Luton youth team who was given his league debut against Carlisle, in a 3-2 win, on the final day of the 1997/98 season. Within a year he was established as a regular member of the Luton squad and the Scottish under-21 team, until he suffered a broken leg playing for Luton at Queens Park Rangers m January 2001. He missed the rest of the season, but made a good recovery and was back in business when Luton began preseason training six months later. Luton record to the start of this season: 63 appearances, I goal.

Liam George.

Born Luton, 2.2 79

Quick and with tricky footwork; the striker came through the ranks after joining Luton as a schoolboy, and became a regular member of the Republic of Ireland squad that progressed to the European youth championships final in the summer of 1998. George had made his league debut m September 1997, but suffered a broken leg soon afterwards and was out of football for nearly a year. He returned in triumph, to become Luton's leading scorer in his first full season, 1999/2000, and also progressed to win Ireland under \$\neq 21\$ honours.

Luton record to the start of this season: 118 appearances, 25 goals.

Carl Griffiths.

Born Welshpool, 15.7.71 An impressive scoring record - a goal m every 2.5 starts for seven previous clubs - led to Carl Griffiths becoming a major summer target for Luton after relegation from the Second Division, and they got their man when they signed hum from Leyton Orient for a fee reported to be £65,000. His earlier moves had totted up to well over £1million, starting with a £500,000 transfer from Shrewsbury to Manchester City. Beginning as a trainee at Gay Meadow, Griffiths had set his benchmark by netting 61 goals in 130 starts for the Shrews. He has been knocking them in ever since, for Portsmouth, Peterborough, Leyton Orient, Wrexham, Port Vale and back to Orient for a second time.

Ian Hillier.

Born Neath, 26,12,79 (Loan) No-one was more surprised than the Welsh under-21 international himself when he made his league debut for Luton in the second game of this season. The day before he was training with Spurs, where he was captain of the reserves, and waiting impatiently for the chance to break into the Premiership team. Luton boss Joe Kinnear had Hillier's name on a list of players to watch, and when a crop of injuries decimated his defence he approached Glenn Hoddle to try to buy the young right back. Hoddle was unwilling to sell, but pleased to help out his pal Kinnear and offer the player a taste of regular first team football by a lowing him to join Luton on loan.

Peter Holmes.

Born Bishop Auckland, 18.11.80
This season is probably a make-or-break campaign for a midfielder who once seemed destined for soccer stardom. He is a product of the FA's School of Excellence, in the same year as Michael Owen. Sheffield Wednesday were his first club, but relegation from the Premiership in May 2000 left them desperate to cut the pay-roll and Luton signed the two-footed midfielder for a nominal fee a few months later. But m his first season at Kenilworth Road, he played in barely a third of their league and cup games. Luton record to the start of this season: 22 appearances, I goal.

Steve Howard.

Born Durham, 10.5.76
Joe Kinnear swooped on deadline day in March 2001 to prise the tall striker away from Northampton for a bargain fee of £50,000. The price was down to the Bosman effect - Howard had cost the

Cobblers a then record club fee of £120,000 when they recruited him from Hartlepool two years previously. At Sixfields his height and power as a target man, and a scoring rate of a goal every four games, helped Northampton to won promotion to Division Two. Luton had first-hand experience of his ability - he scored when Northampton achieved their first-ever league wm at Kenilworth Road, 20 in September 2000. Six months later he accepted terms at Luton, with Northampton grudgingly accepting a third of their asking price for a player who would have left for nothing soon afterwards under the Bosman ruling. Luton record to the start of this season: 12 appearances, 3 goals.



Paul Hughes.

Born Hammersmith 19.4.76 A promising career that began at Chelsea was painfully and cruelly interrupted after the gifted midfielder earned the admiration of, among others, Glenn Hoddle, the former England boss. Hughes worked his way up at Stamford Bridge from trainee to Premiership, and Ioe Kinnear was one of several managers who marked hum out as an outstanding prospect. Hughes learned his trade under Hoddle's management, and gained experience on loan to Stockport, Norwich and Crewe. When Hoddle became manager of Southampton he moved swiftly to recruit Hughes, but a serious groin injury put the midfielder out of football for nine months. Southampton, by then under new management, made him available for transfer, and he joined Luton just before this season kicked off- and marked his Luton debut with a goal at Carlisle a couple of days later.

Marvin Jobson.

Born Wembley, 29.10.68.

Longest-serving player at Kenilworth Road, Iohnson is arguably the most popular member of the Kenilworth Road staff with his colleagues and with the fans. Always cheerful, even when recovering from injury setbacks, the defender is in his 14th season as a first-team regular at Luton, his only club, and skipper of the team he joined as a schoolboy. He is desperate to enjoy this season - a serious neck injury restricted him to only 11 games last year as Luton suffered relegation. He is the only member of the playing staff to have appeared in all four divisions for Luton - he made his debut at Goodison Park in 1988. Luton record to the start of this season: 417 appearances, 9

Adam Loeke.

Born 20.8.70, Croydon Well-travelled in football terms, the midfielder joined Luton on a free transfer from Bristol City to add experience to a predominantly young squad in the summer of 1999. He began as a YTS boy with Crystal Palace, his local club, but could not get into the league team at Selhurst, and moved on to Southend, Colchester and Ashton Gate before joining Luton. Luton record to the start of the season: 72 appearances, 5 goals.

Lee Mansell.

Born Gloucester 23.9.82

An injury crisis at Kenilworth Road thrust the young midfielder into a dramatic debut in an FA Cup-tie. He had to make the transition straight from the youth squad to the first team in January 2001, and was an instant success. He was just 58 seconds into his debut against Queens Park Rangers, in a FA Cup third round replay, when he scored his first senior goal Luton had looked after him since he was am 11-year-old, and signed him as a soccer scholar (previously the YTS scheme) as soon as he left school. His dramatic emergence at Loftus Road led to him becoming a regular in the side, and in the summer he was rewarded with a full professional contract.

Luton record to the start of the season: 19 appearances, 6 goals.

Kevin Nicholls. -

Born Newham, 2.1.79

The tough-tackling midfielder began his career as a trainee at Charlton and quickly made an impact after skippering England youth teams at under-18, under-19 and under-20 levels. At the time Joe Kinnear, now manager of Luton, was in charge of Wimbledon, and made a note of the young Nicholls, and just before this season started he was surprised - and well pleased - to hear that Nicholls was available for transfer. Charlton had sold him for £250,000 to Wigan in the summer of 1999, but the move did not work out, and Luton's offer of £150,000 led to him moving to Kenilworth Road.

Mark Ovendale.

Born Leicester, 22.11.73 The arrival of a new board of directors at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2000 enabled Luton to break a mould that had been set over the previous three years. Then, with continuing financial problems, including a spell in receivership, Luton bad been great sellers of players, and very rarely buyers. That changed when Mike Watson-Challis became the chairman, and made cash available to secure goalkeeper Ovendale from Bournemouth for £425,000. He was previously with Wisbech, Northampton and Barry Town Luton record to the start of the season: 33 appearances.

Russ Perrett.

Born Barton on Sea, 18.5.73 Having helped Cardiff City wm promotion to the Second Division in May, 2001, the big central defender was the victim of a huge recruitment drive at Ninian Park. Club owner Sam Hammam launched a spending spree, which included £600,000 for Spencer Prior, and Perrett knew his first team future at Cardiff might be limited. Luton boss Joe Kinnear had a long-standing friendship with Hammam, from the time when they were manager and owner at Wimbledon, and Hammam allowed Perrett to join Luton a few days before this season began. Strong in the air, and with a good frst touch on the ground, Perrett began with non-league Lymington before being snapped up by neighbouring Portsmouth m 1995. He did well in the First Division, and moved to Cardiff four years later.

Aaron Skelton.

Born Welwyn, 22.11.74

It was a case of going "back home" when the defender, born a few miles from Luton. signed for the Hatters for the second time in July 2001. He bad joined the club as a schoolboy, and worked his way up through the ranks to be on the fringe of the league team in 1993, when he was 19. A serious thigh muscle injury struck when he was poised for his senior debut, which was delayed for 12 months as a result. And no sooner had he made the breakthrough than an appalling run of bad luck struck, with back and knee ligament injuries sidelining him for most of the next three years. A change of club, on a free transfer to Colchester m the summer of 1997, brought a much-needed change of luck and Skelton rapidly became a big favourite at Layer Road He was their player of the year when his contract expired in the summer of 2001, and although Colchester wanted him to sign a new deal, the invitation to move back to his first club, on a Bosman, was too good to turn down.

Matthew Spring.

Born Harlow, 17.11.79.

Luton since he was a schoolboy, and was a driving force in the side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997. After a league debut when still only 17, he soon became a regular in Luton's Second Division team, and as he came into this season he had never been dropped. His first 100 appearances were clocked up while he was only 20. Luton record to the start of this season: 170 appearances, 15 goals.

Matthew Taylor.

Born Oxford, 27.11.81

When Luton were in receivership m the summer of 1999, players had to be sold or given away to save money, while severe restrictions were imposed on new recruits. So once more Luton had to look at the young talent coming up through the ranks, and the wing-back, though still only 17, was thrust into the league team. With his pace and fierce shooting ability, he settled in immediately, and has developed into a top class player, a real crowd-pleaser, and a respected professional. At the end of his first season he was named young player of the year by the Luton management and coaching staff. Twelve months later, in May

2001, he swept the board m the player of the year votes - he picked up the prizes from votes by players, Luton Town Supporters Club, and internet fans. He also netted the goal of the season award. Luton record to the start of this season: 101 appearances, 6 goals.

Peter Thomson.

Born 30.6.77, Bury Rejected as a teenager by home-town club Bury, the striker drifted into non-league soccer with Chorley and then Lancaster before a £25,000 move to Dutch club NAC Breda. He got over a broken leg to score goals in the Dutch Premiership, and Luton brought him home for a £ 100,000 fee in September 2000, but he is still trying to make the breakthrough as a regular in the Hatters side. Luton record to the start of this season: 16 appearances, 2 goals.

Chris Coyne.

Born Brisbane, 20.12.78.
The centre half was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he was selected for the Australian under-17 squad for the 1994 youth World Cup, and came to notice of Harry Redknapp, then manager of West Ham. An invitation to report to Upton Park for trials led to Coyne signing for the Hammers as a teenager.

But Premiership chances were few and far between, and after loan spells at Brentford and Southend, Cotne accepted a transfer to Dundee, to play in the Scottish Premier League. Luton boss Joe Kinnear had remembered Coyne from his West Ham days, and a £50,000 cheque persuaded Dundee to let the defender move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001.

Jean Louis Valois.

Born Si Priest, 15.10.73
Rarely can there have been a more explosive league debut than the one made by the midfielder in September 2001, a day after he joined Luton. The left-winger had turned down the chance to stay at Lille Olympique Sporting Club, despite the lure of European Champions League football, because he was desperate to play in England. Luton were one of several clubs interested in a man with a good reputation in French football, and after a brief trial signed him on a Bosman free transfer. Valois became an instant hero at Kenilworth Road, pulling most of the strings on his debut as Luton hammered

Torquay 5-1, with the left-footed midfielder cracking the goal of the game, a stunning 35-yard strike which even the opposition fans applauded.

The Manager

Joe Kinnear.

Born Dublin,27.12.46
DESPERATE for an experienced man to try to halt a slide down the Second Division table, Luton's directors persuaded Joe Kinnear to take on the daunting task in February 2001, as Luton's third manager of the season.

He quickly instilled much-needed confidence, and improved Luton's performances and results, but the leeway was too great to make up, with a squad which he admitted was not good enough, and no-one was more gutted than footballmad Kinnear when the season of struggle ended m the Hatters dropping into Division Three. It was the first relegation he had suffered in a long career which made him a household name as a player and then as a manager.

Born in Dublin, but brought up in Watford, Kinnear was playing non-league football for St. Albans City as a teenager when Tottenham spotted his potential, and signed him m 1965. Joe was a reliable defender who enjoyed ten of the best years m the history of Spurs, making more than 280



appearances for them, and collecting 26 Republic of Ireland caps as well as am impressive array of medals - an FA Cup-winner in 1967, League Cup winner m 1971 and 1973 and a UEFA Cup winner m 1972.

He then played for Brighton - Brian Clough signed him - for four years before moving into coaching. For six years he was the national team coach m the United Arab Emirates, working alongside his old Spurs pal Dave MacKay but his major impact m this country came after taking charge of Wimbledon in 1992. With no ground of their own, and the smallest fan base m the

Premiership, the Dons did much more than just survive m the Premiership, and the "crazy Gang" were still there when a heart attack forced him to step down. His time with Wimbledon brought him more accolades - two Premiership manager of the year awards, another as Carlton TV manager of the year, and yet another voted by Sky TV viewers.

Fully fit after being sidelined for 18 months, he was ready to get involved again when Luton approached him, relishing the chance to take control of all football matters at Kenilworth Road - director of football, manager and coach all rolled into one.

His return to soccer, however, had no fairytale ending, and having taken a hard look at the Luton squad he inherited Joe set about a major rebuilding job in the summer, promising that if the board backed him and his judgement, he could take Luton back into division Two at the first attempt.

First Team Coach

Mick Harford.

Born Sunderland 12.2.59

'The Legend Returns'' was the way Luton announced the appointment of then new first team coach in July 2001. And every supporter knew exactly who it was, because Mick Harford is part of Hatters' folklore and revered as pehaps the best striker the club has ever had.

He played for Luton m two spells, during a league career which started at Lincoln in 1977 and continued, mostly at the top level, for the next 20 years.

His boyhood dream was to play for his

home-town club, Sunderland, but he failed to achieve that ambition as a school-leaver, and had to go to Lincoln City to learn his trade. Big and brave, powerful in the air, and with two good feet, he gave sterling service to nine other clubs after that, including, eventually, Sunderland.

Harford's itinery through football, which brought him two England caps, went from Lincoln to Newcastle, Bristol City, Birmingham, Luton from 1984 to 1989, Derby, Luton again from 1991 to 1992, Chelsea, Sunderland, Coventry and finally Wimbledon in 1994.

It was there that he began coaching, under then manager Joe Kinnear, who took Harford back to Kenilworth Road for the third tume nn July 2000 to work as his right hand man.

When we met before by Leigh Edwards

The game we turn our attention to today was played on February 1st 1947.

Argyle beat The Hatters on that occasion 4-3 at Kenilworth Road with Thomas (D) scoring two, Thomas (R) and Rawlings claiming the other goals. A crowd of 16,000 watched as Argyle completed the double over Luton, they had beaten them 2-1 at Home Park at the end of the previous September.

Despite the results against Luton Argyle ended the season in 19th in Division Two, just two places above relegation. Luton finished 6

places higher so the seven-goal thriller of a game at Luton in the February must have been the highlight of the season.

The game took place during a terrible period of winter weather with bad snow throughout the country.

The Evening
Herald of

3rd carried a
report, from
which we carry

describe how the goals were scored):

Plymouth Argyle produced more team work at Luton on Saturday than during the season so far, which instead of those individual efforts so prevalent of late was a material contribution to a deserved victory.

From the opening 26 minutes of the game, which produced four goals, it was evident that defence would come off second best, and the crowd of 16,000 were anticipating a heavy crop of scoring.

On ten occasions the ball was in the net, but only seven of them counted. Boyd twice had efforts nullified, and Connelly was similarly treated in an attempt for Luton. In the last 20 minutes, with Argyle seemingly tired after their great display in such conditions and playing up the slope, Luton made a determined effort to save their face, but their football was more thrustfull than skilful,

Not one of the Luton goals that counted could be attributed to a mistake by an individual, and all were the result of the Town taking their chances.....

Argyle's victory would have been greater but for the goalkeepeing of Bywater and the first half display of centre-half Gager while at the

WHATEVER HAPPENED TO PLYMOUTH'S TEAM?

BILL SHORTT: Welsh international goalkeeper who made 342 League appearances for Plymouth prior to briefly joining Tavistock Town in July 1956, where he ran the 'Duke of York' pub for three years. He was then mine host at the 'Golden Hind' pub in Plymouth until retiring in October 1985 and still lives locally.

ROY ROYSTON: Toughtackling right-back who made 39 League appearances for Plymouth until a recurring back injury ended his playing career in May 1947. He subsequently ran a grocer's shop and then a country club in the Portsmouth area before living near his son in Norfolk until his death in February 1997.

GEORGE SILK: Experienced leftback who scored once in 86 League outings for Plymouth before joining Newquay as player-manager in July 1951. He became landlord of the 'Farmers Arms' pub in St Columb Minor, then was steward at the Stewart Social Club in Plymouth and died locally in February 1969.

LEN JONES: Right-half who netted three goals in 71 League outings before moving to Southend United in August 1949, then played for Colchester United, Ipswich Town and Clacton Town where he became trainer. He ran the Hythe Coffee House in Colchester for 28 years and died in Chelmsford in April 1998.

STAN DIXON: Experienced centre-half who scored once in 60 League outings for Plymouth prior to joining Bideford in July 1951, then played for Poole Town. He subsequently became a builder in

the Bournemouth area but suffered from health problems in later life and committed suicide in July 1996.

ALEC DYER: Versatile left-sided player who netted three goals in 53 Second Division games while at Home Park before retiring in May 1947 to enter business, rejecting an invitation to rejoin his former club Crewe Alexandra. He subsequently resided in his native Crewe until his death in August 1984.

SID RAWLINGS: The son of former England international Bill Rawlings, this much-travelled outside-right scored 20 times in 56 Second Division outings for Argyle until leaving Home Park in June 1948 and was subsequently player-manager of Tavistock Town. He remained local until his tragic death in July 1956.



DAVE THOMAS: Big centreforward who was leading marksman in 1947-48 and netted 29 goals in 74 League games prior to joining Watford in February 1948. He then played for Gillingham, Sittingbourne and Chatham before becoming Gravesend & Northfleet's trainer and died in Dovercourt in March 1991.



BOB THOMAS: The younger brother of Dave, this inside-forward scored 17 times in 41 League games before moving to Fulham in June 1947. He then played for Crystal Palace, Tunbridge Wells, Gravesend & Northfleet and Clacton Town prior to becoming Bexley United's trainer and died in Sutton in March 1990.

LEN BOYD: Highly-rated insideforward who netted five goals in 78 League games before being sold to Birmingham City for £17,500 in January 1949. Skippering them to promotion in 1954-55 and the FA Cup final in 1955-56, he became a publican, then worked for Royal Mail and now lives in Melton Mowbray.

LOU TINKLER: Little outsideleft who netted four goals in 24 Second Division games for Plymouth prior to joining Walsall in June 1948, then played for Chingford Town, Kidderminster Harriers, Nuneaton Borough, Lye Town and Cradley Heath. He subsequently settled in the Midlands and died in April 1995.

Former Player Profile by Andy Riddle

MIKE HARRISON

Born in Ilford on 18th April 1940, Mike was an outstanding young player winning England Schoolboy honours and was snapped up by Chelsea. Another young player from Essex by the name of Jimmy Greaves also joined the club on the same day as Mike.

Mike made his debut for the Blues in April 1957, five days short of his 17th birthday, at Blackpool, where amongst his opponents was the legendary Stanley Matthews.

An outside left, Mike soon gained a reputation of possessing one of the hardest shots in the game with his powerful left foot often testing goalkeepers from long range. One particularly memorable strike came against Arsenal in March 1962 when his 30 yard swerving shot left opposing 'keeper, Jack Kelsey totally flat footed.

Mike made 64 appearances for Chelsea, scoring 9 goals and also won 3 England under 23 caps against Germany, Scotland and Turkey before fierce competition for the number eleven shirt from Frank Blunstone forced him to move to seek more regular first team action. In September 1962, he moved to Blackburn where his direct style of play soon made him a firm favourite with the Ewood Park crowd. He remained at the club for five years during which time he played in sides containing


international players of the calibre of Bryan Douglas, Ronnie Clayton, Mike England and Keith Newton.

Having scored 40 goals for Blackburn in 160 games, Mike joined Argyle in September 1967, making his debut in a 2-1 home defeat by Preston. The Pilgrims had started the season in disastrous fashion, winning only 2 of their first eight games when Mike became one of three new signings along with former West Ham star, Alan Sealey and ex England forward, Alan Peacock, who were brought in by manager Derek Ufton in an effort to climb the Second Division table. Sadly the plan backfired. The trio managed only 31 appearances between them as all three suffered injuries with both Sealey's and Peacock's proving to be career ending. Mike's season was also curtailed and Ufton was replaced by Billy Bingham who was unable to prevent the side finishing bottom of the division.

At the end of the season, Mike joined today's visitors, Luton Town, where one of his team mates was another Argyle favourite of the past, Keith Allen. Mike played 28 league games plus 3 as substitute for Luton, scoring 6 times before he finished his playing career with non league Dover.

He returned to live in the Westcountry some years ago and now lives in Plymouth and works as a medical sales representative.

The Word on the Web by Matthew Banwell



P@SOTI

Being on the Internet means there are some things you can do that you couldn't elsewhere. Amongst the usual opinions and arguments at P@SOTI are plenty of people helping one another out with tickets, travel arrangements and so on - all good stuff! And sometimes, you find things that are just plain unusual. Six-O-Six would be more fun with comments like those that often appear at P@SOTI - often late and night, and often by way of Union Street!

Argyle's own official website - www.pafc.co.uk - has had a facelift for the new season. As well as looking a lot smarter, a number of new features (and bugs!) have been introduced. One particularly novel innovation is the Player Comparison where members of the upcoming opposition can be rated against Argyle players in terms of goals scored, tackles made, and - as happened for the Exeter game - number of pies eaten etc.. Another good idea is the WebCam that automatically posts pictures of Home Park's ongoing development to the website every thirty seconds.

The new Argyle website uses a common platform shared amongst other league teams in a collective deal similar to that in which television rights are sold. This approach allows the individual clubs to spread their internet investment between them, combine their power to attract advertisers and also means clubs can pool the overheads of dealing with any technical problems and issues. So, all of a club's effort can be put into concentrating upon content, rather than worrying about getting one's gigabytes confused with one's gigaflops.

Hatters on the Web

Proof positive of this common approach is Luton's own official website - www.lutontown.co.uk - which shares the same technical platform with Argyle. As a result, the structure of the site is pretty much the same, only there's a lot less green, and a lot more orange.

Trawling through the Search Engines to find out about other Luton websites reveals that there were, up until recently, many independently-run fans' sites out there. However, the recent dotcom crash has also managed to affect Third Division football supporters too, it seems! What appears to be the biggest and best site - www.lutonfc.com - is still going strong. Looking uncannily like the official site at first glance, it is up-to-date, well-intentioned and smartly presented. Rather than being centered around a messageboard, the site adopts more of an article-based approached. Refreshingly, the stories are all well written, such that even the neutral - or opposition fan! - will find them interesting.

As well as surfing the web, Luton fans can also use the internet to keep in touch by e-mail, thanks to 'Worldwide Hatters on the Super Highway' - or 'Whosh' for short. Details on how to sign up to the 600-strong mailing list can be found here -www.whosh.net.



This coming week will seem a little unusual as we have no midweek match! Shock horror, what will we do?

Like the team the fans that travel will need a deserved rest until next Saturday. Then we make our first visit to the new Kassam Stadium where Oxford United have now, eventually, taken up residence.

To find out more about the stadium I checked the official Oxford United web site, which did not give a lot away but they obviously have a sense of humour when they deal with "How to get there" - see below.

The rest of the information provided by:

www.footballgroundguide.dial.pipex.c om - where you can go to find out about all the grounds we will visit this season.

The club have now moved from the Manor Ground to a new purpose built stadium on the outskirts of Oxford. The Kassam Stadium (named after Oxford Chairman Firoz Kassam), has been built at a cost of £15m. The ground has only three sides, with one end remaining unused. Each of the stands are of a good size, are all seated, covered and are roughly of the same height. The South Stand on one side of the pitch is a two-tiered stand that has a row of executive boxes running across it. This is a particularly impressive looking standard that has police control and press boxes situated at the back of it. Opposite is the North Stand, which is a single tiered stand that is primarily given to away supporters. This has a number of strange looking floodlights protruding from its roof. At the one end is the Oxford Mail Stand, which

is also single tiered. There is also a special type of pitch, one of the first to have artificial grass woven into the live turf. One disappointment is that there are quite large gaps, in the corners of the stadium, which may mean that some strong cold winds will 'whistle' through it and that the stands are setback somewhat from the playing surface.

The official web site adds this bit of information about getting to the stadium:

By Helicopter
Fly in. Land. Walk (remembering to keep your head down in an undignified manner for the first few steps. Best hold on to your hat too.)

Seriously: To get to the Kassam Stadium head up the A38 and onto the M5, at Bristol move onto the M4 and head for London.

Stay on the M4 until Junction 15 (A346/A419) where you leave the Motorway (signposted Swindon E) and at roundabout take 1st exit A419. At the Commonhead Roundabout take 2nd exit (signposted Cirencester, M5). At the junction with A420/A4312 (White Hart) branch left (signposted Oxford A420) then at roundabout take 2nd exit In 0.3 mile at roundabout take 3rd exit A420. Stay on the A420 towards Oxford then join the ring road (A423).

The stadium is quite well signposted from the main routes into Oxford, with brown football signs pointing the way.

The stadium can be found in between the Oxford Science Park & Blackbird Leys Estate. From the A423 Ring Road, take the A4074 towards Reading. After the roundabout with



Kassam Stadium

Sainsbury's on one corner, take the left turning sign posted Cowley/Wallington/Oxford Science Park you will eventually come to the ground on your left.

There are 1,100 car parking spaces at the stadium, so with crowds in the region of 6,000, parking is going to be at a premium. However, at least at the moment the car park is free. Chris Stillwell adds; 'If you decide to go to the new stadium by car, beware - the car park tends to fill up very quickly and if you arrive much after 1:45 for a Saturday match you may be out of luck. Considering that street parking around the stadium is virtually nonexistent, you may well be inconvenienced'. On my visit 'inconvenienced' meant parking on a grass verge, up to half a mile away from the ground.

Pubs

'The Priory' behind the open end of the ground. The nearest Public House is 'The Priory' which is just behind the car park at the open end of the ground. The pub which is owned by club chairman Firoz Kassam, is quite an historic looking building. On my visit the pub seemed fine for away fans, but as you would expect, it can get quite crowded. The pub also

The Future

Foundations have been put in place for the future construction of a fourth stand, at the West End of the stadium. However it is unlikely that this will be built for at least a couple of years.

"What Is It Like For Visiting Supporters?"

Away fans are housed on one side of the North Stand, towards the open end of the ground. This stand may be shared with home supporters, or as was the case on my visit, the whole stand was given to the away support. There is little around the ground in terms of pubs and eating establishments, so you may well find having to find such comforts within the ground itself. The refreshments on offer are okay, with a range of hot dogs and pies on offer. Bottles of Carlsberg Lager are also available at £2.20.

However, it seems to take an eternity to get served, but this should improve as the staff becomes more experienced. Please note that you are not allowed to smoke within the ground, apart from the concourses where the refreshment areas are located.


As it is to be expected, the new ground is light years away from the old Manor Ground. The facilities within the ground are excellent, as well as the view of the playing action. There is also good legroom, between the rows of seats. The public address

system within the ground is pretty good, although I noticed that no music was played. I don't know whether this is because of a local council restriction. However, the atmosphere within the ground is not bad, with the Oxford fans in the Daily Mail Stand doing their best to raise it. Although I did notice that they hadn't quite got used to their new home, still chanting the London Road End chant from the Manor Ground. With the one end of the ground being open, there is always the remark 'of watch my car' as another wayward shot, flies into the car park behind. On the whole I found the Kassam Stadium to an enjoyable and a largely friendly day





Football Programmes Down The Years



A series of articles by the Editor of PROGRAMME MONTHLY & FOOTBALL COLLECTABLE magazine describing how programmes have changed over a century and a quarter of Association

5. More substantial issues before the Great War

Football

The fund-raising potential of football programmes became widely appreciated by clubs in the years which followed the turn of the century, and by the outbreak of the Great War, clubs had become polarised into those who published multi-page, advertising-included recognisable match programmes, and those who published nothing at all. Few, if any, remained with the half-way house of a simple team sheet.

Some of these early programmes were substantial affairs, providing a comprehensive coverage of club matters, commentary on football topics and description of visiting clubs. "The Villa News and Record", for instance, comprised 20 pages and was arguably superior to the club's programmes some 50 years later. Birmingham City (or just plain Birmingham as they were then known) favoured a very large page size, with a cover of blue paper and white internal pages.

A curiosity amongst programmes from the early decades of this century was the "Everton and Liverpool Official Football Programme" "the only programme issued by Authority of the Everton and Liverpool Clubs." This was a substantial, 16 large page edition, which covered both

city clubs, featuring the first team match of one, and the reserve team fixture of the other, both played on opposite sides of Stanley Park on the same afternoon. This, apparently, happy collaborative arrangement persisted for many years on Merseyside, before the clubs reverted to their 19th century habit of issuing separate match programmes.

The Sheffield clubs were early and prolific programme issuers, with Wednesday being one of the last clubs to feature team selections on the front page. Their 16 page productions from the early 1900's were arguably before their time. It was not only League clubs who were beginning to make their programmes bigger and better. Hartlepool United, who did not join the League until after the Great War, had "Martin's Key Card and Official Programme" issued on their behalf as early as 1909/10. This consisted of 12 pages, only three of which were given over to advertisements.

By the outbreak of the Great War, those clubs who regularly issued programmes were publishing multi-page issues which we would recognise today - minus the gloss, colour and photography of course. Universal programme production across the country did not happen until the 1920's.

The Future - Longer Than Five Years

With the new Millennium now well into it's second year, it would finally appear that with the publication of their Five Year Plan Discussion Document, Plymouth Argyle Football Club have finally woken up to the realities of life as a professional football club in the 21st Century.

In general the initiative would appear to have been very positively received by both the media and fans alike, and I too join in congratulating the Board on producing this document. But we must all realise that the creation of such a strategic plan is merely the first step upon a long path that will hopefully lead to a sustained, and may I add, long overdue period of success for the club. The real key to the plan will lie in it's execution, and it is by this that the courage and convictions of the new Board will ultimately be tested and judged. Which is probably why one local journalist, whilst essentially welcoming the club's initiative, stated that he didn't actually like Five Year Plan's as they so rarely worked!

That said, such a strategic plan has been long overdue at the club. As I recall, way back in 1992, having just received the sack as manager, David Kemp publicly bemoaned the fact that the club lacked any form of long term plan or direction and that his

dismissal would ultimately prove counter-productive. A view largely endorsed many years later by his sacker, Dan McCauley, who went on record as saying he should never have succumbed to pressure from the rest of the Board in handing Kemp his P45. A little less than a decade later, and with Argyle two divisions lower than when Kemp left the club, it doesn't take a genius to see that the club's ex-manager would by and large seem to have been proven right.

So what of the actual strategies put forward for discussion? It has to be said that the majority are nothing more than common business sense, yet should not be derided as they patently identify certain areas in which opportunities exist for the club to move forward and improve. Others give a clear indication that the new Board have taken the time to identify certain key factors that have brought success to other clubs, and which they now wish to replicate at Home Park.

All the strategies, however, clearly indicate the Board's intentions to improve the club as a whole, not just in terms of on the pitch, which suggests to me that the Directors clearly understand that success on the pitch cannot be divorced from the performance of the club off it. As such, if Argyle are to realise the Board's stated football related ambitions, all aspects of the club must function to their optimum potential

and effectiveness, if these goals are to

As for the specific strategies themselves, two in particular caught me eye. Firstly, and arguably the most important of all in my opinion, is the Board's commitment to provide stability for the club by ensuring that manager Paul Sturrock is given that all-too rare component of time. After all you only have to look at the achievements of long serving managers such as Sir Alex Ferguson, George Burley and Alan Curbishley to see that continuity in a football club, counts. However, whilst the announcement of an extension to his contract is commendable, agreeing a contract and honoring one is two different things, as the world of professional football repeatedly demonstrates. I would therefore take issue with the Board's claim that as a result of this extended contract offer their guarantee of time is a "concrete reality." After all, even concrete can crumble.

The second strategy of interest, relates to the club's desire to build strategic alliances with local businesses. I recently watched a documentary on the return of Ipswich Town to the Premiership, detailing not only the effect their first season back in the top flight had had upon the club itself, but also it's effect on the local community. I was fascinated to learn that the club's return to the Premiership was not only worth many millions of pounds to the club itself, but also to the town of Ipswich and the surrounding region as a whole.

For example, their promotion had led to a higher profile for the town in it's own right, particularly abroad, which in turn had led to a marked increase in tourism to the area. Furthermore, the feel-good factor brought about by the club's success had also led to an

be achieved.

increased retail spend in the town's shops and also increased productivity in local industries. Finally, the simple fact that club's annual turnover had shot up from some £5 million to in excess of £30 million, meant the club pumped much larger sums of money directly back into the local economy through such things as the purchase of goods and the employment of more

staff.

Having seen how Ipswich's success had brought increased prosperity to the town as a whole, it didn't take long for me to conclude that if I were a local businessman in the Plymouth area, I'd now be jumping at the chance to secure a strategic alliance with Argyle. After all, if I were to approach my business with the same long-term vision that the Directors of PAFC appear to be exhibiting to theirs, I'd soon realise that success for the club could only be good for my business. If I could therefore help support the club in achieving that success, then I'd be furthering the interests of my own business at the

Finally, the most essential thing about the production of this document, lies not within it's content, but rather in the fact that it has been produced as a draft document specifically for discussion by the club's fans. By opening up this plan for debate and by encouraging fans to put forward their views, the club has cleverly provided each and every one of us with the opportunity to have our say in determining how best to take our beloved club forward. The end result

of which is we will all hopefully endorse and support the final plan with far greater enthusiasm than if it had purely been written by the Board, as we will have all had the opportunity to contribute towards it construction.

So in conclusion then, if you haven't already had your say on the matter, then what are you waiting for? After all, it's your club so why not do something about it? And if you don't, then just remember not to come moaning to me if you fail to agree with the final draft!
