Danny Hayzelden and a late goal from Ken Charlery ensured that Garry Hill's men took maximum points and maintain their four-point cushion at the top of the Conference table.

The match started off very evenly. Ken Charlery had the first effort on goal, but shot rather tamely at Nuneaton keeper Chris Mackenzie. At the other end Lee Charles found himself in space in the penalty area, but chipped weakly, and Roberts made a comfortable save. Defences were largely on top for most of the opening half-hour. Mark Stein came as close as anyone to scoring. The 12-goal striker forced Mackenzie into making a low save from a powerful right-footed volley. Mark Rooney had a similar attempt for the home team that was also saved by Boro's keeper. However as the half-hour mark approached, it was the visitors who managed to get a grip on the game. Richard Lavery gave a warning to the Daggers defence when he dragged an 18-yard drive just wide of Roberts' post. Steve Burr's side thought they should have had a penalty when Mark Smith tripped McGregor in the area, only for their protests to be waved away by the referee. Moments before the break, Terry Angus headed a Warren Peyton free kick against Roberts' crossbar.

The second period, much like the first, was very even but it was the league leaders who found the two crucial goals to secure victory. Garry Hill introduced Mark Brennan for Paul Terry early in the second half. The substitution proved to be significant, as the Daggers club skipper exerted some control in the midfield area. Dagenham opened the scoring in the 63rd minutes with what was their best passage of football all afternoon. Jason Broom did very well in finding Ken Charlery with a low pass to feet. The big striker then showed great vision by releasing Steve McGavin with a neat reverse pass, and although Mackenzie saved McGavin's left foot shot, Hayzelden was on hand to slot home the rebound. The Daggers had to wait until the 91st minute before confirming all three points. Before then, Nuneaton pushed forward to look for an equaliser. Dagenham's defence stood firm, and there were very few chances for Nuneaton. The best chance came on the 79th minute when a chipped cross from Lee Charles made its way to substitute Alex Sykes at the far post, whose powerful attempt grazed the crossbar. As Nuneaton's attempts were frustrated, Ken Charlery added Dagenham's second and his first goal at Victoria Road for his new team. Charlery headed home from seven yards following a superb cross from the right corner flag by Danny Shipp. Shipp could have even added a third deep into stoppage time, but Dagenham had to settle for two goals and three more vital points.

Basingstoke Town 2
Dagenham & Redbridge 2

The first ever goal by a goalkeeper in the world's oldest football competition ensured the Daggers lived to fight again on Saturday. The biggest crowd of the season at the Camrose ground, 1089, witnessed Roberts step up three minutes into injury time to slot home the equaliser after the visitors had thrown everything at their hosts in the second half to try to claw back the two goal half-time deficit.

The Daggers started well and began to take control of the game. Their early dominance was rewarded with nothing however as Janney and Charlery both had efforts saved. Basingstoke began come more into the game and a quick free kick was taken to Jason Eaton who squared the ball inside for Mark Davies who beat Ashley Vickers for speed and blasted in an unstoppable shot from 15 yards out. The home side extended the lead eight minutes later when Roberts goal kick only found Mark Davis on the right and his cross was knocked to Tom Sill by Eaton and he stabbed home the second goal despite pressure from Lee Goodwin.

Garry Hill switched to a 3-4-3 format in the second half, replacing Mark Rooney with Junior McDougald and the Daggers dominated from then on. Stein almost pulled a goal back when he was on the end of a Janney pass but he blasted the ball over the bar from only six yards out. The visitors finally pulled a goal back on 56 minutes when Ken Charlery latched on to a long ball and fired a shot at goal which Tarr got a hand to but couldn't prevent the ball entering the net. The Daggers then pressed forward in search of an equaliser and Janney looked certain to get it but, with only Tarr to beat, put his shot into the side netting. Junior McDougald did put the ball into the net from a Paul Terry centre but the referee disallowed the goal for offside. Minutes later, Shipp lobbed the goalkeeper after a Stein knock-down and the ball entered the net but again the celebrating was ruined by an offside decision. Terry was next to have an effort when he broke through the middle but shot wide with only the keeper to beat. With only a minute remaining, Basingstoke broke up the other end for the first time in the second half as Tim Sills ran clear of the visitor's defence. He tried to chip the ball over Roberts but the former Welsh number one just got his finger tips to it and kept the Daggers in with a chance. The Daggers won four more corners in injury time and for each one Roberts came upfield to aid his attackers. With three minutes played, the visitors won their 17th corner of the second half, and from a Danny Shipp knock down, Tony Roberts swung out a right boot and the ball found it's way through a crowd of players into the net to give the Daggers a deserved replay on Tuesday week.

Last Saturday, Daggers goalkeeper Tony Roberts created history when he scored a dramatic equaliser against Basingstoke Town thus becoming the first ever goalkeeper to score in the 130-year history of the FA Cup competition.

Tony recalls his goal, "I was on the edge of the box when the ball came over and I screamed at Danny Shipp to lay it back to me when it dropped. The ball rebounded to me, I looked up, and I was falling backwards when I side-footed it. I caught it nicely and, although their 'keeper got a hand to it, it went in the corner."

Unfortunately his goal came eleven months too late to become Dagenham & Redbridge's first goalkeeping scorer. Nicky Rust, making his debut in December last seasons Essex Senior Cup tie at home to Harlow Town, dropkicked the ball over his opposing number one to score the Daggers second goal in the 4-1 victory.

Goalkeepers are 100-odd yards away but have been known to pop-up from time-to-time to score vital goals for their sides. None more so than Paraguayan goalie José Luis Chilavert who regularly scores from the penalty spot for both club and country. In 1998 he captured the attention of the World's sporting press after curling a free kick around the wall and past his opposite number during an International against Argentina in Buenos Aires and in 1999 he became the first goalkeeper to score a hat-trick in the history of the game.

Arguably the most famous goal of all time by a keeper was Pat Jennings' effort in the 1967 Charity Shield while playing for Spurs against Manchester United. His goal clearance flew past opposite Number Alex Stepney after being caught by a gust of wind. Unfortunately for Stepney, the whole incident was caught on camera by Match of the Day.

Probably the most dramatic goal ever scored by a goalkeeper was Jimmy Glass's effort for Carlisle United in May 1999 that saved the club from the ignominy of non-league football. With only ten seconds of the game remaining and with the scores level at 1-1, Glass netted from close range after his opposite number in the Plymouth Argyle goal had parried a header from a United corner. His goal secured Cumbria's last professional side's League status and sent Scarborough down instead. To add salt to the Yorkshire club's wounds, Glass was playing his last game for United having arrived on loan from Swindon Town only three weeks before.

Conceding a goal in the last minute against your promotion rivals can be a bitter pill to swallow at the best of times but imagine how Wycombe Wanderers felt when Colchester United goalie Scott Barrett scored in the dying minutes of injury time during the 1991/92 season. With the game delicately poised at 1-1 Barrett lofted the ball from his own area into the back of the Chairboys' net. Colchester went on to win the Conference title - and promotion back to the Football League - on goal difference after both sides finished level on 92 points.

Arsenal legend Frank Moss found the net in March 1935 while playing against Everton at Goodison Park. Having been injured in the first half going for a corner, Moss returned in the second half, shoulder heavily strapped, and played outside left. He'd already gone close with a couple of chances when in the 75th minute he latched onto a cross from Ted Drake and buried the ball in the back of the Everton net.

Peter Schmeichel headed Manchester United's equaliser from a corner in an UEFA Cup Tie against Rotor Volgograd in 1996. United went out on the Away Goal rule. He followed this up by scoring his first Premiership goal - his 12th career strike - for Aston Villa against Everton in October 2001 but on this occasion his strike came to late to save Villa as they went down 3-2.

One of football's founding fathers, Lord Alfred Kinnaird, has the unique distinction of being the only man ever to play in the FA Cup Final in goal and out and appear on the score sheet on both occasions. He appeared in nine Cup Finals in total, scoring in three of them. Unfortunately, his appearance between the sticks was marred by a bizarre own goal after he managed to carry the ball across his goal line when trying to deal with an awkward back pass.

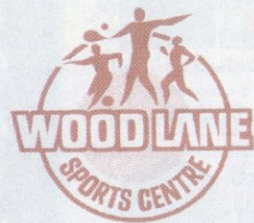

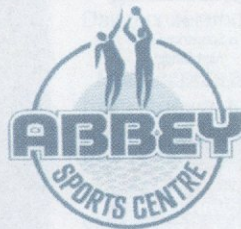

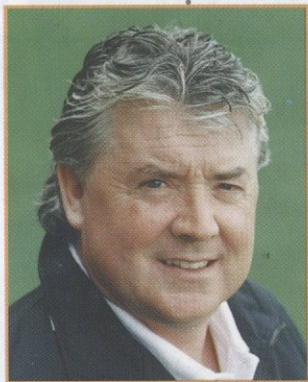

Luton Town Football Club was formed from the merger of Luton Wanderers and Luton Excelsior in April 1885. They were asked to become founder members of the Southern League in 1894 and in the first two years of the competition they finished as runners-up to Millwall. They decided to apply for membership of the Football League in 1896 but were not voted in. Having burnt their boats, they had to make do with a season in the newly formed United League, where they were runners-up to Millwall again, before successfully applying to join the Football League. Coinciding with their entry in 1897 was a move of ground from Dallow Lane to Dunstable Road. A brave decision was eventually taken three years later to resign from the Football League and apply to re-join a now much stronger Southern League and the application was successful. Unfortunately they suffered relegation to Division Two before fighting their way back just before the Great War. After hostilities ceased, the Southern League, en bloc, was asked to form a new Division Three of the Football League and the Town rejoined the Football League.

Joe Kinnear

Joe joined Luton Town in February 2001 becoming their third manager of a troubled season that ultimately saw the Hatters relegated despite Joe's gallant efforts to avoid the drop. Formerly enjoyed an illustrious career as a full back with Spurs, making more than 280 appearances for them, and collecting 26 Republic of Ireland caps as well as an impressive array of medals - an FA Cup-winner in 1967, League Cup winner in 1971 and 1973 and a UEFA Cup winner in 1972. He then played for Brighton for four years before moving into coaching in



the United Arab Emirates. He then returned to take charge of Wimbledon in 1992 and with no ground of their own, and the smallest fanbase in the Premiership, the Dons did much more than just survive in the Premiership, and the "Crazy Gang" were still there when a heart attack forced him to step down. Fully fit after being sidelined for 18 months, he was ready to get involved again when Luton approached him to take control of all football matters at Kenilworth Road - director of football, manager and coach all rolled into one.

Emmerson Boyce

One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS boy in the summer of 1995, and made the breakthrough to the League squad at the age of 19 midway through the 1999/2000 season after occasional appearances following a debut in the Auto Windscreens Shield in January 1999.

Dean Brennan

Previous Luton boss Ricky Hill had worked as a youth coach at Sheffield Wednesday before re-joining Luton for a brief and unsuccessful spell as manager in the summer of 2000, and one of his first actions was to go back to Hillsborough for a midfielder he admired. But Brennan found it difficult to adjust to Second Division football, and is still trying to establish himself.

Ahmet Brkovic

Believing a move would be good for his career, the midfielder playmaker refused new terms at Leyton Orient in the summer of 2001, to join Luton on a Bosman free transfer. Orient had signed him on a free from HNK Dubrovnik in the autumn of 1999, and he was a regular in their squad last season. He was bitterly disappointed when they failed in the play-offs to win promotion to the Second Division, and thinks he can do it this season

with Luton.

Chris Coyne

The centre-half was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he was selected for the Australian under-17 squad for the 1994 youth World Cup, and came to the notice of Harry Redknapp, then manager of West Ham. An invitation to report to Upton park for trials led to Coyne signing for the Hammers as a teenager. But Premiership chances were few and far between, and after loan spells at Brentford and Southend, Coyne accepted a transfer to Dundee. A £50,000 cheque persuaded Dundee to let the defender move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001.

Dean Crowe

Manager Joe Kinnear moved swiftly to sign Crowe on loan from Stoke City in late September when an injury crisis decimated the Hatters squad. The striker made an immediate impact: he scored on his debut, at Plymouth, then added another goal in his second Luton game. Crowe began his career as a YTS boy at Stoke, but found it difficult to hold down a regular place in their league side after a change of management and an influx of Scandinavian players. He was made available by Stoke in the summer of 2001 after loan spells at Northampton and Bury, and signed for Luton this weekend.

Stuart Douglas

A striker with excellent pace, Douglas was a 17-year-old trainee when he scored on his league debut for Luton against Oldham in 1995, but a series of injuries delayed his progress before he won a regular place in Luton's league side in the 1998/99 season. He has flourished both as maker and taker of goals. Douglas suffered more injury problems last season, which retraced him to only 15 full league appearances.

Andrew Fotiadis

A local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before being a full-time soccer professional. He won England Schools caps at under-15 and under-18 level, and developed a style to delight Luton fans and worry opposing defences, as an

old-fashioned centre-forward, with good physique, power, and concentrated determination.

Liam George

Quick, and with tricky footwork, the striker came through the ranks after joining Luton as a schoolboy, and became a regular member of the Republic of Ireland squad that progressed to the European youth championships final in the summer of 1998. George had made his league debut in September 1997, but suffered a broken leg soon afterwards and was out of football for nearly a year. He returned in triumph, to become Luton's leading scorer in his first full season, 1999/2000, and also progressed to win Ireland under-21 honours.

Ian Hillier

The Welsh under-21 international made his league debut for Luton in the second game of this season. The day before he was training with Spurs, where he was captain of the reserves. Luton boss Joe Kinnear had Hillier's name on a list of players to watch, and when a crop of injuries decimated his defence he approached Glenn Hoddle to try to buy the young right back. Hoddle was pleased to help out his pal Kinnear and offer the player a taste of regular first team football by allowing him to join Luton on loan. He was signed permanently last weekend for £30,000.

Peter Holmes

Peter is a product of the FA's School of Excellence, in the same year as Michael Owen. Sheffield Wednesday were his first club, but relegation from the Premiership in May 2000 left them desperate to cut the pay-roll and Luton signed the two-footed midfielder for a nominal fee a few months later. But in

his first season at Kenilworth Road, he played in barely a third of their league and cup games.

Lee Mansell

An injury crisis at Kenilworth Road thrust the young midfielder into a dramatic debut in an FA Cup-tie. He had to make the transition straight from the youth squad to the first team in January 2001, and was an instant success. He was just 58 seconds into his debut against Queens Park Rangers, in an FA Cup third round replay, when he scored his first senior goal. Luton had looked after him since he was an 11-year-old, and signed him as a soccer scholar as soon as he left school. In the summer he was rewarded with a full professional contract.

Mark Ovendale

The arrival of a new board of directors at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2000 enabled Luton to break a mould that had been set over the previous three years. Once Mike Watson-Challis became the chairman, he made cash available to secure goalkeeper Ovendale from Bournemouth for £425,000. He was previously with Wisbech, Northampton and Barry Town

Aaron Skelton

Aaron signed for the Hatters for the second time in July 2001. He joined the club as a schoolboy, and worked his way up through the ranks. A thigh muscle injury struck when he was poised for his senior debut and this was delayed for 12 months. No sooner had he made the breakthrough than he suffered back and knee ligament injuries sidelining him for most of the next three years. A change of club in the summer of 1997 to Colchester and he rapidly became a big favourite. When his contract expired in the

summer of 2001 he moved back to his first club, on a Bosman.

Matthew Spring

A competitive midfielder, Spring has been at Luton since he was a schoolboy, and was a driving force in the side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997. After a league debut when still only 17, he soon became a regular in Luton's Second Division team, and as he came into this season he had never been dropped. His first 100 appearances were clocked up while he was only 20.

Peter Thomson

Rejected as a teenager by home town club Bury, the striker drifted into non-league soccer with Chorley and then Lancaster before a £25,000 move to Dutch club NAC Breda. He got over a broken leg to score goals in the Dutch Premiership, and Luton brought him home for a £100,000 fee in September 2000, but he is still trying to make the breakthrough as a regular in the Hatters side.

Jean-Louis Valois

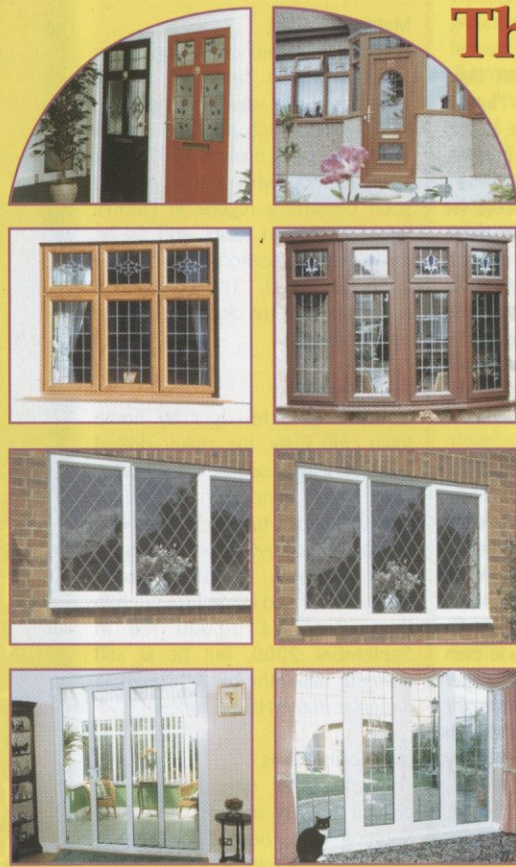
The left-winger turned down the chance to stay at Lille Olympique Sporting Club, despite the lure of European Champions League football, because he was desperate to play in England. Luton were one of several clubs interested in a man with a good reputation in French football, and after a brief trial signed him on a Bosman free transfer. Valois became an instant hero at Kenilworth Road, pulling most of the strings on his debut as Luton hammered Torquay 5-1, with the left-footed midfielder cracking the goal of the game, a stunning 35-yard strike, which even the opposition fans applauded.

BARNET UNVEIL PLANS FOR NEW STADIUM

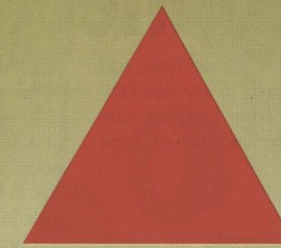
DOOTSON SET TO LEAVE

Connections

Only two players have played for both Luton Town and Dagenham & Redbridge. Both featured in the last LDV Vans Trophy appearance by Luton Town exactly a year ago against Peterborough United. They were Mark Stein and James Ayres.

James Ayres

James Ayres was born in September 1980 and joined Luton straight from school. He progressed through their youth and reserve sides and for two seasons he captained the reserves. He made his first team debut in a 2-0 defeat at Oxford United in the Auto Windscreens Shield in December but it didn't go as well as he would have liked and unfortunately conceded a penalty. In an effort to gain more experience, James was loaned out to Stevenage Borough where he played six games in the Conference and won the Player of the Month award by the Stevenage & Herald newspaper. His contract with the Hatters was terminated by mutual consent in January this year and he joined Dagenham & Redbridge. His Daggers debut came at Nuneaton Borough on 10th February but his career with the Essex side lasted only 20 minutes as he was substituted due to an injury then released by the Club the following week. From there he signed for Kettering Town and remained with the Poppies until the end of last season. During the summer he joined Ryman League side Enfield and recently scored his first goal for the Club in the FA Cup third qualifying round defeat by Yeading.

Mark Stein

Former England youth international striker, Mark Stein signed for Luton in January 1984 and won his first medal

with the club as a second-half substitute in the 3-2 Littlewoods Cup Final victory at Wembley over Arsenal in 1988. After a loan spell at Aldershot, he was transferred for £300,000 to QPR in August 1988. A year later he moved to Oxford United before being signed by Stoke City in September 1991 for £100,000. He scored 68 goals in 123 games and was snapped up by Chelsea in October 1993 for £1,500,000. In his first season in the Premiership he netted 13 times in 18 matches but then injury struck. He broke his ankle at Old Trafford in March 1994 then, when he was returning to full fitness, he collected a knee ligament injury against Bolton Wanderers in November 1995. Loan spells at former Club, Stoke City, Ipswich Town and Bournemouth followed before he signed permanently for the latter during the 1998 close season. He found again his goalscoring touch scoring 30 goals during his time there. When his two-year contract expired at Dean Court, he decided not to renew it. Mark rejoined Luton during the summer of 2000, becoming manager Ricky Hill's first signing since taking over at Luton. Unfortunately his second spell at Kenilworth Road wasn't as successful as the first and after playing 30 games under three different managers, Ricky Hill, Lil Fuccillo Joe Kinnear, his contract wasn't renewed at the end of the season. During his career he scored 152 goals in 453 appearances in Professional football but the time was right to step down a level and join an ambitious Club. He joined the Daggers during the close season and he hasn't looked back. His current tally of 12 goals leads the way in the Nationwide Conference and he also won the September goalscorer of the month award from Nationwide.

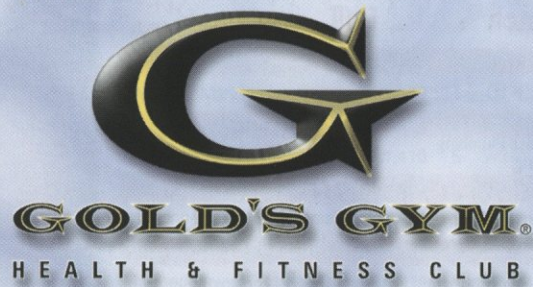

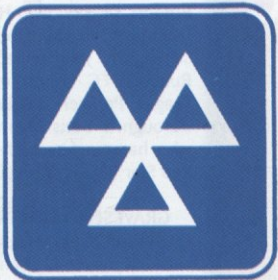

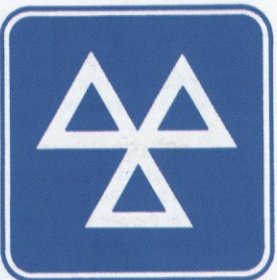

TWO IN AT HARROW

Edwin Stein, manager of Ryman League Premier Division club Harrow Borough, has moved to strengthen the squad by signing Phil Johnson, a midfielder from Runcorn FC Halton of the UniBond League Premier Division. Also joining Borough is Boris Marivat from France, who has most recently played for AS Red Star 93 and FCM Villepinte.

GRAVESEND GO FOR A BURTON

Gravesend & Northfleet manager Andy Ford has moved to strengthen his squad by signing Hampton & Richmond Borough skipper Nick Burton. Burton is a versatile defender who can play in any part of the back four. He has signed for the rest of the season and featured in the home Ryman League Premier Division game with Braintree Town. However, the former Yeovil Town, Aldershot Town and Torquay player was FA Cup-tied, so there was no Burton at Burton!

CHALFONT'S GROUND CLOSED

Chalfont St. Peter have had their ground closed down by the Ryman League and have been forced to play home game in Oxfordshire at Thame United's Windmill ground instead. Ryman League ground-graders shut their Mill Meadow headquarters and ordered them to make improvements before they can stage another third division match there. The ground failed on three counts, it's toilets, it's fencing and it's pathways. Chalfont are hoping to complete the work and pass a second inspection within a fortnight. Until then they will play their home matches at Thame United.

WORCESTER SWOOP FOR BULLOCK

Worcester City manager John Barton has been busy in the transfer market as he swooped to sign midfielder Darren Bullock who has been released by Nationwide Division Two Club Bury, with a host of other clubs chasing his signature. The 32-year-old Worcester-born midfielder made his debut in the Dr Martens League Premier Division clash with Tiverton Town. Bullock was originally a product of Worcester's youth team and first made his debut in 1986/87 - season making 43 appearances and scoring 2 goals in two spells at St. Georges Lane. After a brief spell with Malvern Town he moved on to Nuneaton Borough and then made his breakthrough into League football when Huddersfield Town paid £55,000 in 1993. He made 127 League appearances for the Terriers before joining Swindon Town for £400,000 in 1997. After two years and 57 League appearances at the County Ground he moved on to Bury for £200,000, who are now managed by another former City favourite Andy Preece. Darren made 45 League appearance for Bury and also had loan spells at Rushden & Diamonds and Sheffield United last season.

ILLINGWORTH SWITCH

Jeremy Illingworth, who signed for Altrincham from Ashton United in June, has moved on to UniBond League First Division side Stocksbridge Park Steels. Illingworth was captain of Ashton prior to his summer move and had spells at Huddersfield Town and Cambridge United, having previously been at Wisbech Town. He made 12 appearances and scored one goal for Altrincham during his short time at Moss Lane and joins Steels just as former Stoke and Manchester City star Wayne Biggins takes over from Mick Horne in a managerial switch-round at Bracken Moor Lane.

BOYD QUITS ALBION

UniBond League First Division club Witton Albion continue to feel the backlash from their disastrous Cheshire Senior Cup tie at Woodley Sports in September. In the aftermath of manager Eddie Bishop's departure, his erstwhile assistant Charlie Boyd has now also quit the club. The 32-year-old, who has played over 150 games for Albion since signing in 1998 from Lancaster City, was suspended for his part in the fracas and has now said he has decided to seek pastures new. Albion will, however, retain his UniBond registration.

MACKENZIE TO HANG UP HIS BOOTS

Steve Mackenzie, the former England under-23 and 'B' international once famed for being a big-money signing by Malcolm Allison in 1979, has decided to hang up his boots - at the age of 40. Mackenzie, who made over 300 League appearances for Crystal Palace, Manchester City and West Brom, is currently managing Dr Martens League Western Division side Atherstone United and has been filling in up front for the Adders this season following a striker injury crisis at Sheepy Road.

RUGGLES REMAINS AT HENDON

Hendon have extended the loan period of Woking striker Phil Ruggles for a further month after his impressive performances for the first team. He has scored twice for the club, once in the 2-0 win over Kingstonian and claimed the only goal in the 1-0 victory over Heybridge Swifts.

BEAVERS CASH CRISIS

Ryman League Premier Division club Hampton & Richmond Borough have released five players in a bid to stave off the cash crisis threatening the club. Tony Houghton, Darren Deegan and Martin Carter were the first to be released and then club captain Nick Burton and 18-year-old centre back Anthony Howard left to join Gravesend & Northfleet and Slough Town respectively. With gates down almost a third on last year and the club exiting the FA Cup at the hands of Hitchin Town, chairman Vic Searle explained how reducing the clubs playing staff was the only way to ensure survival. Manager Steve Cordery was unhappy about having to let the players go, but

realises the measures are needed to allow the club to survive. Nick Burton was the club's longest serving player having joined in December 1997 in Hampton's promotion season, playing over 160 games for the club. A very popular player, Burton will be sadly missed.

BUTLER COMEBACK

Former England semi-professional international Steve Butler is set to make a comeback at the age of 39 with his old club Maidstone United. Butler, sacked by Premiership Leicester City as coach along with manager Peter Taylor last month, will rejoin the Stones providing he does not receive a job offer from new Brighton & Hove Albion boss Taylor, although Brighton chairman Dick Knight has insisted there will be no changes to the club's backroom.

WORCESTER GROUND HOPES

Dr Martens League Premier Division club Worcester City are approaching a crucial stage in their bid to move to a new stadium at Nunnery Way, adjacent to the M5 motorway. To be able to finance the development of a new stadium up to Football League standard on the Nunnery Way site, it is well documented and accepted by planners, planning committee and the land owners that enabling development is essential for the scheme to go ahead. The proposed stadium will be a state-of-the-art ground with a minimum criteria of a 7,000 capacity and 2,000 seats, a stadium that everybody in Worcester will be rightly proud of, but this will only happen with the enabling development. After many years of work, the new ground development project team has identified a B & Q store as the only possible development on site that will provide sufficient finance for the scheme to proceed. A presentation for support in principal for the scheme to go forward for a new stadium and a B & Q store at the Nunnery Way site, was submitted on Monday and will be heard at a planning committee meeting of Worcester City Council on 1st November. All political parties support the proposed new stadium, but the club need to persuade the planning committee members to support the proposed B & Q, because without B & Q the scheme will not go ahead.

SATHAM JOINS CITY

Former Tottenham Hotspur player Brian Statham has been signed by Dr Martens League Premier Division club Chelmsford City and was drafted straight into the squad that played against Newport Isle of Wight last week. Statham, a Zimbabwean native, has turned out for several other League clubs including Brentford and Gillingham. The 32-year-old joins City after being released by Ryman League Premier Division outfit Chesham United where he registered an impressive 7 goals in 40 appearances from midfield last term.

Lee Goodwin

One of the most consistent players at Victoria Road over the past three seasons has been Lee Goodwin. Whether it be at left back where he began his Daggers career under Ted Hardy, centre half or his more accustomed right back role, Lee has always gone about his business efficiently. In just over 100 appearances, Lee has also scored 17 goals for the club. This is an impressive contribution, although his last strike, the golden goal winner against Leyton Orient is subject to much debate within the dressing room banter.

"I'm claiming it," says Lee with a wry smile. "Actually, I think Ashley got a touch on the line, but it was on its way in." The adjudication panel chaired by Mr Gothard may have the final say!

Lee began his career in the same West Ham United youth and reserve teams as Rio Ferdinand and Frank Lampard. Lee showed much promise until ironically, in a reserve team match at Victoria Road, Lee ruptured a cartilage and from then on, things went downhill.

"I was sidelined for 21 months, during which time I needed three operations. Obviously I lost my fitness and then my contract ran out. Having fallen by the way side, I just had to pick myself up and start again."

Nevertheless, Lee holds fond, albeit brief memories of playing under his boyhood icon.

"As a kid, Billy Bonds was my idol. When I signed for West

Ham, he was the manager. Unfortunately for me, soon after, he parted with the club. I admired the way he maintained his fitness. If there's one part of his game I could adopt, it would be that."

This season, Lee has again been on the treatment table following an unfortunate run of injuries.

"I picked up a knock early in the season, tried to play through it and then sustained a further injury. I came back and then picked up a third knock which on the top of the others finished me off."

Lee has since strung together an impressive run of performances in an unfamiliar looking defence.

"Last year, most of us played over 30 games. It's easier to bond with each other, learn how to push up as a unit and provide cover when you play that many matches together. This season, it's more of a case of adjusting to different roles. The lads that have joined the squad have been magnificent though and deserve a lot of credit."

Lee's association with the club goes further than just playing as he explains, "I started coming over here from about the age of 11. I liked watching players like Steve Conner and Tony Pamphlett. To go from being a supporter to actually playing for them is fantastic."

Lee adds, "I also help out with the coaching courses we run in the school holidays for the kids. Initially, we had

around 35 turning up, but now we're getting over 120 and unfortunately have to turn some away. Thankfully, I have "The Whiffin" to assist me and would like to thank her for all her help."

Apart from the natural desire to establish a professional career, Lee is also keen to build on his coaching skills.

"I've got my Preliminary F.A. badge and would like to eventually progress to a UEFA qualification. Ultimately, I'd love to be a manager. I know it's a long way off, but it's something to aim for."

Lee's ambitions can only be helped by working with such talented people as Garry Hill and Terry Harris. In training however, Lee is grateful that the attack versus defence routine is avoided by the Daggers' coaching staff.

"Thankfully, we play pups versus the oldies and we always slaughter them," Lee jokes. "I'd hate to have to defend against our strikers in a normal game. Ken and Shippy are very strong, whilst Steiny and Junior would be a nightmare to mark, because their movement is so good."

In the meantime, Lee who has only just turned 23 is studying The Knowledge and aims to become one of London's infamous black cab drivers.

Despite sustaining the serious injury that stunted his pro career at West Ham, Lee is delighted to be playing for the Daggers and retains no bitterness.

"I've been very lucky since I came here. We've gone from strength to strength and we can still improve. It's a privilege to play for the club in all honesty. I really enjoy playing football here. It's great to be involved, everybody is down to earth and everyone works so hard. We love mixing with the supporters and promoting the good name this club

possesses. Last week, Junior and I popped down to the local hospital to see a young lad who was involved in a terrible road accident. Its important to remember that support works both ways."

Apart from being one of the many injury victims at Victoria Road this season, Lee has also been targeted by the practical

jokers within the club.

"Recently, my new trainers were tampered with and I was walking round with no laces because someone cut them up. At the moment, the chief suspects are Dickie Harper plus an unknown accomplice. Although, it is rumoured that he's a little guy that plays out on the wing."

**Dagenham & Redbridge v Kettering Town
Bob Lord Trophy - Semi Final 1st leg
Tuesday 21st February 1995
At Rockingham Road**

12 pages for 60p

Today we look at another Cup Semi-Final programme for the Daggers, this time it's the Bob Lord Trophy 1st leg against Kettering Town. The game itself was screened on live on the cable channel, Wire TV. Mark Webster now Channel 5's American Football, Baseball and Ice Hockey presenter was the presenter for live show at the time.

The programme was only a small production as they only anticipated a small attendance. Of the 12 pages it had 4 pages of advertising which left only 8 pages including the front and back cover. The front cover had a black and white action picture, which took up the whole of the page. The back page had the line-ups, matchball sponsor and the referee. Pages 2 and three were



devoted to the officials and club honours along with the programme editors words and a guest writer, Tim Ogelthorpe. Tim's page has items on all kinds of football both on the playing side and the media. The middle pages had the usual statistics, fixtures, results, appearances and the Conference table. Something unusual was seeing the goalscorers on a separate line and the player listed in bold was the man of the match.

The Daggers had one page which included a black and white team picture and a brief history. Finally the penultimate page was a "Looking Back" article on the club from Rockingham Road.

In the match the Daggers won 2-0 with Ian Richardson and Kelly Haag on the scoresheet and the attendance was 1,033. Unfortunately the Daggers lost the second leg 2-4 and went out of the competition on away goals. In the final Kettering were trounced in both legs by Bromsgrove Rovers, currently in the Midland Alliance after three relegation's in four years.

War Time Finals and Representative Matches

Part 11 of a 24 part Evolution of Programmes series by John Litster

Just as clubs were subject to severe paper-rationing, and had to reduce their programmes to single or folded sheets, so were the football authorities, despite being encouraged by the Government to keep football operating for the purposes of the nation's morale. Most Cup Finals and representative matches played during the war years were of this style, and it was little short of scandalous that the authorities saw fit to charge 3d or 6d for these flimsy pieces of paper.

Scotland published a series of attractive little programmes which, although single sheets, were folded twice into narrow 8-page issues. One or two colours added a splash of good cheer to these items. For England internationals and War-time finals at Wembley, the chosen colours were invariably patriotic red and blue, on white paper. The 1943 Football League (South) War Cup Final between Arsenal and Charlton Athletic at Wembley was a simple 4 page production with a sketch of one of Wembley's towers on the front. Printed blue on white, it was somewhat pricey at 6d. Characteristic of these programmes was the "Air Raid Precautions" warning printed on the front cover.

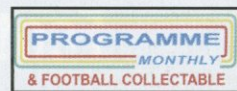
When England played Wales at Anfield in September 1944, the host club issued a 4 page, small sized folded sheet, printed blue on white paper with flags in full colour on the front cover. Price for this was a more reasonable 2d.

The problem of paper supply was illustrated by a notice in the England v Scotland match at Wembley in February 1944, headed: "Waste Paper Salvage". It read: "If you do not wish to retain this programme, or the part of your ticket

you retain after entering the Stadium, please place them in any one of the many receptacles provided for clean waste paper as you leave the ground."

As with club football, normal international football was suspended, albeit the home international countries continued to play one another in "Red Cross" internationals, with the gate proceeds going to war charities. There was a plethora of other Representative games, mostly involving the various sections of the armed forces and small, single sheet programmes were invariably produced for these games. The R.A.F. played Scotland at Hillsborough in November 1944 and a small 4 page (folded sheet) programme was issued with a blue and white striped cover, priced 1d. Pen pictures of both teams were included - the R.A.F. forward line was Matthews, Carter, Drake, Mortensen and Smith (Brentford) while Scotland included the Liverpool pair Matt Busby and Billy Liddell. This illustrates the fascination of team lines in war-time programmes, with famous players popping up in the unlikeliest of fixtures.

The ingenuity of British forces abroad stretched to programme production, and there are many instances of Forces matches in Egypt and India which had brief match programmes produced, featuring little more than the team lines.

The weather played it's part in no uncertain terms to the result of this local derby with the game in doubt for much of the morning. The Daggers new striker Elisha Downer, was the first player to test Raiders keeper C.Jones inside five minutes of the kck-off, but her low rasping right foot shot shaved the outside right post after a great build up involving Maria Barker from midfield.

Daggers, still without last season's top scorer Sara Sinclair (suspended), were hoping that the inspirational Makeda Lee and rookie Gemma Phipps could provide them with enough fire power up front. Downer was astonished to find herself in the referee's book for speaking after no foul was given for a blatant push and was subsequently replaced by Phipps. Apart from that the half was dominated by the Daggers who created chances via Leanne Darby, when the midfielder shot just wide from defender Becky Allen's perfectly weighted 40-yard pass. Lee was again displaying dribbling wizardry, that had the Raiders defence reeling, but it was Darby's crossing ability in the 15th minutes that finally led to the games first error.

Raiders defender Kingsbury inadvertently sliced the ball into her own net. The petit defender got so upset, she proceeded to walk off the pitch and had to be restrained by her teammates from asking a self-substitution. Lee's appetite for the game grew, and when she slotted a pass into the path of Lindsay Morgan after another sizzling right sided dribble



past two Raiders defenders, Morgan was dismayed to see her shot come back off the right post. It wasn't until the 39th minute when the Daggers captain Laura Watson cut through the middle from defence with one of her trademark runs, to release a well struck low 22yard right foot shot that registered her second Premier League goal and left Raiders keeper Jones rooted to the spot.

Raiders forward Page was ruled off side when she thought her goal stood in the 63rd minute, but the visitors only had to wait a couple of minutes later for a penalty that was conceded by Allen for a clumsy challenge. Raiders captain, Pavett stepped up but smashed her spot kick well wide of the goal. It was at this time that Raiders were at their most threatening, as the home side took their foot off the gas and allowed the visitors back into the game.

Daggers keeper Louise Spelling was finally called upon to make three brave notable saves and was forced to play safe by punching the ball on occasions to clear the danger. Daggers petite defender Jackie Mason did an excellent job to nullify the threat of returnee, Keely Pohl now back in a Raiders shirt, but unable to get

a clean sot on goal throughout the 90. Once again the referee Townsend somehow found several minutes of injury time to play and Raiders did well to exploit this, when Page out on the left crossed the ball in the 95th minute, that was dropped by Spelling and Watson's efforts to swipe the ball clear of the soggy goal mouth, saw her momentum result in a unfortunate own goal.

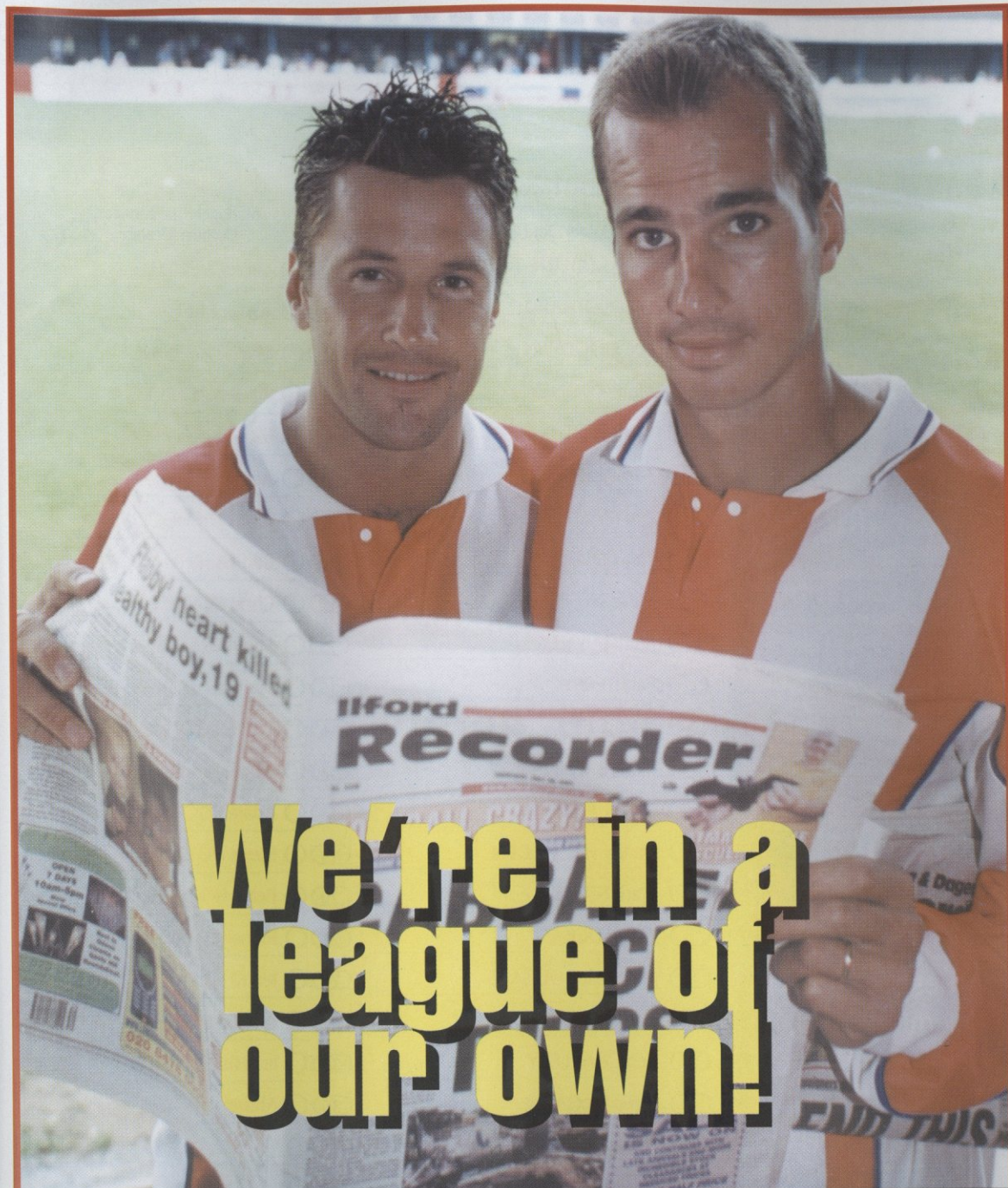
