Matt finish for happy Hatters

GEORGE GRAHAM'S Arsenal once made a Championshipwinning habit of 1-0 scorelines.

The uncanny knack even gave voice to a popular terrace song at Highbury in the late 1980s and early '90s.

Luton, under Joe Kinnear, have generally adopted a more cavalier approach to winning games this season with bulging nets a more regular

feature than clean sheets.

The football has thrilled home supporters who, with their expectations raised, grew restless before Matthew Spring's 72nd-minute goal grabbed a 1-0 win over fellow promotion hopefuls Shrewsbury.

Spring's effort secured his club's first single-goal victory for 32 matches with the last one coming against Cam-

But Friday night's taming of the Shrews could prove as crucial as any of the Kenilworth Road goal feasts come May.

It may also prove a psychological turning point in the Hatters season as, previously, Kinnear's men have normally dropped points when they have played poorly.

But against Shrewsbury the Hat-ters managed to sneak all three despite a largely unconvincing per-

Kinnear also emphasised the importance of bouncing back from the 4-1 mauling at Mansfield with a clean sheet vital in the exorcism of

that particular ghost.

The impact of Mansfield did, however, appear to have dented confidence early on. Distribution from the back was dreadful in the first-half with Chris Coyne the calmest head in a

nervous back four. There were also few chances created at the other end before the break although Steve Howard should have converted at least the second of two early opportunities.

Howard had a fifth-minute header tipped over by former Liverpool youth team keeper Ian Dunbavin on five minutes after Jean-Louis Valois'

cross. But the 6ft 3in striker should have done better moments later when he headed over from almost under the

bar after Spring's cross. Luton then lost their way and ex-Hatters trainee Greg Rioch demonstrated that he has inherited the left foot of his father Bruce by going close

with a 35-yard thunderbolt.

Home keeper Carl Emberson then tipped over Matty Redmile's 31st-minute looping header before Spring signalled a warning of things to come when he drove a powerful 30-yard

effort wide on the stroke of half-time. Emberson saved from Shrewsbury goal machine Luke Rodgers early in the second-half, while Howard head-ers continued to look the most likely source of a goal for the Hatters with Dunbavin saving one and another bouncing wide from Valois' corner.

Rodgers and Luton's Dean Crowe went into the match as two of the division's in-form strikers, but both players missed early chances to break the deadlock around the hour mark.

First, the home crowd held their breath after Russell Perrett mis-

judged a header and gave Rodgers a clear sight of goal.

But the 13-goal forward uncharac-

teristically scuffed his shot much to the relief of Perret, an exposed Emberson and the Kenilworth Road faithful. Crowe then squandered as good an opportunity when he dragged his shot wide after collecting Aaron Skelton's mis-hit cross and beating the offside trap.

Former Nottingham Forest striker Nigel Jemson nearly showed the young pretenders how it was done with two long-range efforts from free-kicks. His first curled just over on 67 minutes and, shortly afterwards, he smacked the post after a cleverly-worked set-piece by the visitors.

But Spring upstaged all the striking talent on show when he opened the scoring on 72 minutes.

The 21-year-old midfielder exchanged passes with Crowe and drove into the penalty box before keeping a cool head to fire into the bottom corner of the net.

It was a fitting reward for Spring, who has recently shown signs of recapturing the form that made him a

Premiership target as a teenager.
The goal was also a timely one with Kinnear ready to throw on Adrian Forbes to give his side a greater attacking impetus.

Super-sub Forbes was stripped for action before Spring's goal, but then returned to the bench for the rest of the match.

Howard had another header saved and Valois volleyed wide as the Hat-

ters sought a flattering second goal.
Shrewsbury's best attempt at an equaliser came from veteran midfielder Mark Atkins, but his goal-bound effort deflected off Coyne and went over

Ahmet Brkovic should have given the Hatters a less anxious wait for all three points on 87 minutes but delayed his shot after being sent clear by Val-ois and allowed Dunbavin to smoother at his feet. The Croatian's miss did not cost Luton, however, and Kinnear celebrated by taking the players to Sandown races on Saturday.

Next three trips are all-ticket

EXCEPTIONAL support means the next three away matches will be all-ticket affairs for Hatters fans.

Saturday's FA Cup first-round trip to Southend United is the first of the trilogy, followed by the matches at Macclesfield Town (November 24) and Kidderminster Harriers (December 1).
