held firm with Chris Coyne outstanding alongside new signing David Bayliss, who made a very accomplished debut, looking quick, strong and excellent in the air.

And when the Hatters' back four were breached recalled keeper Mark Ovendale demonstrated that his shot-stopping ability remains impressive.

Hartlepool had four times as many goal attempts as the visitors and Ovendale's superb one-handed reflex save from Mark Tinkler's close-range header on 86 minutes secured victory and prevented his side

losing two crucial points.
The victory was the Hatters' sixth on their travels this season and only leaders Plymouth and fifth-placed Rochdale have won as many away games in the division. Kinnear's men also cruc-

ially bounced back after a depressing run of three successive defeats and there were encouraging signs for future improvement, including better performances from Kevin Nicholls, Taylor and Emm-

erson Boyce. Taylor, who played on the left side of midfield before Hillier's red card, should have given Luton the lead on 12 minutes.

A misjudgement by home keeper Anthony Williams after Hillier's long throw gifted Taylor the early chance but he

headed over a gaping goal. Humphreys had earlier fired over for the home side and also shot wide on 26 minutes

The Hatters went ahead three minutes later when Spring fed Ahmet Brkovic, whose right-wing cross was dropped by a shaky Williams

time tea no doubt tasted sweet although the first 45 minutes had been the subject of over-zealous refereeing which is proving a blight on Division Three football this season.

A fussy Tony Leake unnecessarily booked five Hatters players with Nicholls, inevitably, Howard, Brkovic, Hillier and Bayliss all having their names taken. Hillier's yellow card, which later proved so costly, was the harshest.

The Hatters left-back's strong challenge went unpunished by Leake, who failed to award a foul, but Hillier was then inexplicably cautioned whom his only misdeness. when his only misdemeanour was being shoved away by Hartlepool's Darrell Clarke in retaliation.

Spring shot wide from 25 yards early in the second-half before Ovendale saved well from Clarke. Tony Lormor then headed over from five yards before Hillier was sent for an early bath after a clumsy lunge at tricky Paul Smith.

Tinkler fired over from 30 yards moments later and Humphreys reduced the deficit on 63 minutes after Ovendale could only parry Clarke's low drive. It was then a question of whether the Hatters' 10 men could hang on for victory under incessant pressure.

An opportunity for relief was also woefully wasted when a rare counter-attack saw Howard shoot selfishly at Williams when an unmarked Spring was screaming for a pass inside the penalty box.

At the other end, substitute Paul Arnison fired wide from 20 yards and a low drive by Adam Boyd was beaten out by Ovendale with Nicholls quickest to react in the penalty box.

Ovendale's terrific save from Tinkler followed and the keeper could be forgiven for indulging in a spot of dramatic exaggeration when he kept out Boyd's last-minute header.
