He did, however, allow the first goal to stand despite Anthony Williams in the United goal claiming that he had been impeded.

The move was started by Ahmet Brkovic, who chased an unlikely ball before crossing through a pack of players on the half hour.

The goalkeeper dropped the ball and Crowe was quick to drive it into the roof of the net. On the stroke of half time, Taylor struck a killer goal for the Hatters.

Mathew Spring collected the ball from Crowe to put in a splendid centre into the zone of uncertainty between defenders and goalkeeper. Taylor was the only player to react, finding himself all alone to slide in for an easy score.

The Hatters were cruising through the second period without creating too much when Hillier was sent off for a mistimed tackle on right winger Darryl Clarke on 58 minutes.

With United players and crowd ecouraged, the match completely changed character and six minutes later Clarke made the visitors pay.

He cut inside Taylor to fire in a shot that Mark Ovendale could only parry to Humpreys who converted the rebound from close range.

Coyne, Bayliss and company were then subjected to a severe examination, having to face wave after wave of home attacks.

Ovendale produced three blinding saves on his return to the side, and the Town passed the test with flying colours to hold on to a victory that could prove so important in their quest for promotion.
