Irish luck costs Hatters

DUBLIN-BORN Joe Kinnear cursed the "luck of the Irish" after his side drew 1-1 against Carlisle United despite hitting the woodwork three times.

Matthew Spring, Dean Crowe and Adrian Forbes all rattled the Carlisle crossbar during Saturday's match as Kinnear's charismatic compatriot Roddy Collins celebrated a fortunate point at Kenilworth Road.

Collins, who took over at Brunton Park in the summer after leaving Eirecom League double-winners Bohemians, even sensed a third victory in seven days when Steve Soley headed his improving side in front on 52 minutes.

But Russell Perrett headed his third goal of the season midway through the second-half and Carlisle then survived a determined onslaught by a Hatters side searching for the three points that would have sent them back to the top of the table for the first time since

A frustrated Kinnear said afterwards: "We hit the woodwork three times and missed from six yards three times. They had so much luck in and around the penalty box.

'They must have thought they had won the pools when they scored because they did not have a chance before then. We enjoyed enough possession to win two or three matches but they had the luck of the Irish.

The Hatters were certainly unfortunate not to take the lead in the first half-hour against a cautious Carlisle team.

A bright start saw Spring release Emmerson Boyce expertly down the right and then race into the penalty box to head the full-back's cross wide after just five minutes

Boyce went close himself on 17 minutes, cutting in from the right flank before unleashing a fierce leftJoe's view

Top scorer Crowe then collected the ball near the corner flag before dribbling his way past three defenders into the penalty box and was only denied a fantastic goal when his shot clipped the top of the

Croatian Ahmet Brkovic was next to go close on 28 minutes, curling a free-kick narrowly wide despite the presence of set-piece experts Spring, Jean-Louis Valois and Matthew Taylor.

Spring turned away to celebrate a goal seconds later when he crashed his shot against the underside of the crossbar after Valois' corner had caused panic in the visitors defence but, sadly for the Hatters midfielder, the referee's assistants were from Kent and Essex rather than Russia and play continued.

Carlisle had rarely ventured into the Hatters half during a one-sided

start to the game but, on 36 minutes, were only denied a goal from their first attack by a strange offside

Peter Murphy intercepted an inadvisable throw-out by Mark Ovendale to Taylor and the Carlisle full-back's cross found Richie Foran.

The Irish striker's shot was then blocked by Hatters centre-back David Bayliss but Soley seized on the loose ball and drilled a low shot into the net, only for the referee's assistant to raise his flag.
Premiership referee Paul Alcock,

who was once famously shoved to the ground by Paulo di Canio, seemed at pains to prove he was no pushover and disdainfully dismissed the visitors protests, as well as administering touchline tickingoffs to both managers during the first-half.

Carlisle enjoyed their best period of the match in 10-minute spells either side of half-time with Ian Stevens testing Ovendale at his near post on 43 minutes and Foran going close to capitalising on a goalkeeping error straight from the

Ovendale escaped punishment after handling and spilling a Bayliss back-pass with Foran unable to gain possession before the relieved Hatters keeper safely gathered.

Stuart Green saw Ovendale make a more convincing attempt at saving his fiercely-struck free-kick on 50 minutes, but Spring should have opened the scoring seconds later when he shot wide from six yards with only an exposed Keen to beat.

Soley compounded Spring's wastefulness and profited from hesitant defending by Taylor two minutes later, heading in from two yards after the Hatters left-back had failed to clear Murphy's corner.

A spell of desperate shooting then followed with Valois, Spring and Taylor all hitting wayward efforts as the spirited Hatters almost tried too hard to find a way back into a game they had been dominating.

But Kevin Nicholls went closer with a low drive on 66 minutes and the Hatters did equalise with the next move of the match.

Carlisle struggled to deal with

Taylor's free-kick from the left and Perrett powered in at the far post to find the net after fellow centre-back Bayliss had headed across goal.

Having got back on level terms, the Hatters then searched for a winning goal just as they had done at Cheltenham seven days earlier.

At 33, Marvin Johnson might have left it a little late to carve out a career as an attacking full-back but his rampaging runs down the wing and dangerous crosses helped force back the visitors after the second-

half replacement of Crowe. Keen saved Forbes' diving header on 74 minutes and then produced a better stop to push Valois' low shot around the post after the Frenchman had skillfully sidestepped a Carlisle challenge to create space in the penalty box.

Substitute Forbes did beat Keen on 81 minutes, but his header from Valois' corner crashed against the crossbar and victory eluded the

Kinnear expressed his disap-pointment at the final whistle, but his side are now unbeaten in eight matches and have not lost since playerwatch
