Inside Forward

THE fixture list is all ifs and buts for the next couple of weeks, and until Monday evening the Town do not know where they will be playing next Saturday. If Darlington win an FA Cup replay at Peterborough on Monday, their all-ticket match against the Town will be postponed while they take on Newcastle.

If that happens, the Town will be at home to Exeter City, hoping to make it third time lucky after two postponements caused by frost at the turn of the year. Exeter already have a day off next Saturday - they were due to play York, but the Minstermen will be at home to Fulham in the FA Cup instead.

We have a provisional date for the visit of Bristol Rovers, after the game in early December was postponed because they too were in cup action. Next Saturday they are away to Gillingham in the fourth round, and unless that goes to a replay Rovers will come to Kenilworth Road on Tuesday February 5 (7.45pm).

New Contract Agreed

CHANGES in personnel have been made since the last home game. Financial packages have been given to Liam George and Dean Brennan to take them off the pay-roll, while Ahmet Brkovic's contract has been extended to the end of the season.

The 27-year-old Croatian was recruited on a three-month deal in early October, after rejecting new terms at Leyton Orient, and has proved to be a very useful addition to the squad.

And Joe Kinnear is still keen to bring in more competition for places. He has two vacancies for loan deals, and also has cash available to buy the right men.

He said: "The board have been tremendous in their support. I have spent £300,000 to rebuild and improve the squad, and that is about half of my transfer budget. I would like to bring in two more players. "I know we won't go from now to the end of the season without more injuries, so I need to get in players to make the squad that much stronger, and there's not a day goes by when I don't enquire about players."

The injury list is easing considerably, with the best news that Carl Griffiths is out of plaster, and hoping to step up the pace to full training before too long. Aaron Skelton, Stuart Fraser, Paul Hughes, Lee Mansell and Adam Locke are all regaining match fitness in the reserves, while Chris Coyne and Peter Holmes could return in the Avon Combination in a week or two.

Two players have returned to the club after loan spells, striker Peter Thomson having been at Rushden and Richard Dryden with Conference club Scarborough. Rushden decided not to make an offer for the striker, who is available on a free transfer, while Dryden turned down the chance to stay at Scarborough longer.

Meanwhile Stuart Douglas has now gone to Rushden on trial, and Jude Stirling is likely to have a trial with Swindon, where the manager, for the second time, is former Town star Andy King.

WHILE the Town are ready to go shopping for new recruits, other clubs are casting envious eyes on the talent at Kenilworth Road, and the manager admits he could be faced with some difficult decisions in the coming weeks.

Matt Taylor and Matt Spring will be due new contracts at the end of the season, but their agents have told the boss that they think the players can earn more lucrative pay packets at a higher level. If they turn down offers made to them by the Town, they can walk away. As they are both under 24 the Town would still claim transfer fees, but they would almost certainly be subject to tribunal decisions, with Joe not terribly confident he could get a fair price.

He said: "I want both players to stay, and play at a higher level with Luton Town - in the Second Division next season, and hopefully the First 12 months later."

The hard decision that might be forced on him will be if big offers come in for either player before the end of the season. The boss rates Taylor as a £2million man, and is under no pressure to sell anyone. He wants Taylor and Spring to be part of the team celebrating promotion next April, but while he is unsure about their future plans offers from other clubs might have to be considered.

He has already turned down West Brom, who offered striker Jimmy Quinn and £500,000 for Taylor, having paid £500,000 for Quinn from Blackpool four years ago. Southampton have also enquired about Taylor.

The Manager

IT'S A good feeling to be playing at again after consecutive four games. We away were all disappointed

that the weather beat two attempts to play the home match against Exeter, despite Herculean efforts by the ground staff.

If gave us an enforced lay-off, and thankfully we turned that to our advantage. There is always a worry that when you are on a roll, as we were before Christmas, an interruption to the flow of games can be costly. Thankfully, we carried on into the new year just as we had finished the old one, and the players deserve great credit for the efforts they have put in.

We have not lost since November, when the defeat at Macclesfield concentrated a lot of minds. As a result of that debacle we gave up days off, took a hard look at ourselves, and settled down to work harder. Players, coaches - and the manager! - were willing to put themselves out to get back on track, and it has paid off.

Since Macclesfield we have gone seven games without defeat, and taken 17 points out of 21. That's not just promotion form - it will bring the championship if we can keep it going, and we believe we can. I want Luton Town to take the title, but in the end we will of course settle for any of the top three places for automatic promotion. Every manager knows that there are bound to be times during a season when you suffer a little blip or two, but we have built up a safety-valve in terms of league points. We are nine points clear of third place, and, more to the point, ten clear of fourth, the position behind the cut-off point for promotion.

Today's game is a reminder that in this division, as with all football, you can take nothing for granted. Carlisle have had to battle for survival for a long time, and all credit to them and their manager Roddy Collins for

succeeding. But we must beware of complacency. Last week's best result in the whole of the Football League was a reminder: Leyton Orient, having beaten First Division Portsmouth 4-1 away in the FA Cup a week previously went to Carlisle, hot favourites to get a result, and were hammered 6-1. Then Carlisle claimed another great result on Tuesday, when they ended Hull's unbeaten home record. I watched the game, and Carlisle won deservedly. Hull were lucky to get away with no more than a one-goal defeat.

We can be sure that Carlisle will relish the chance to make it three wins in a row today. Because we are doing so well, opposing teams are always likely to lift themselves when they meet us - we are a scalp worth collecting. However, if we apply ourselves as well as we have done since Macclesfield, we have nothing to fear.

We are certainly in far better shape now than we were when I joined the club nearly a year ago. Relegation last summer was one of the lowest points not only of the old year, but of my career. It had never happened to me before, as a player or manager. But it delivered a kick up the backside by reminding us that urgent action had to be taken to improve the squad.

The chairman was as determined as anyone that we should rebuild. His promise was to back me and my judgement. My pledge was to deliver promotion in return, and the board has played its part. Today, we are halfway there.

Promotion will go a long way towards wiping out the bad memories of last year. And hopefully, when we next gather at Kenilworth Road for the first game of a New Year, we will be well set for a second successive promotion.

Keep the faith, and enjoy the game.

IF IT is not too late, at our first home game of 2002, and on behalf of all the players, I would like to wish everyone a very happy

new year, and to say thanks to a great bunch of supporters. One of the features of the season so far has been the marvellous backing we have had, particularly at away games.

It has helped us, and in the dressing room there is a real air of confidence and optimism. We believe we are capable of winning promotion, perhaps with the league championship. I was glad to see the back of the old year: relegation last May is still a miserable memory but now we have a vastly different squad from the one that went down, and I rate it as one of the best I have seen in my time here.

For me personally, things are now brighter than they were a month or two ago. I have got over my injuries, and been involved in the last five games, starting with the Hartlepool match. I know it was a month ago, but that was a nice day for me - back in the squad, then going on as a sub, and scoring a late equaliser.

I have been on the bench for each game since then, and it is a little frustrating being so near, yet so far, when you are itching to do your bit for the team. I have also had a couple of reserve games to maintain my fitness, and I am feeling really good, and ready for anything.

I have watched the way the team has performed in the last few weeks with great pleasure, and have to admit that while I am confident in my own ability it is hard to see who I could replace at present. The whole squad has been doing very well, so I can't have any grumbles at not reclaiming a starting place. To be unbeaten in seven games, especially when five of them have been away from home, is proof that we are a strong team. We have also

shown good character - I don't think I can ever remember a run like this one, when we have fallen behind so often, but still come back to take at least one point, and at Oxford, Southend and Kidderminster fought back so well that we took all three. We could have done it at Cheltenham as well - perhaps the boss should have sent me on as a striker!

Having done well on the road, we want to build on that by making the best of home games, with several important ones coming up. Plymouth, in a fortnight, will be seen as the really big one, but every match is impor-

That includes today's, as we try to complete a double over Carlisle. They have just enjoyed two tremendous results, and that may have done us a favour. If there was any danger that we would be complacent, Carlisle have blown that away with their 6-1 thrashing of Leyton Orient, and then becoming the first visiting team to win at Hull this season.

Carlisle are clearly on the up, but we are also going well, and are as keen as ever to impress our supporters on our own ground. Our destiny is in our own hands, and to get back to where I started, we owe it to the supporters to continue to give them reason to cheer.

In my case, I seem to have given some a reason to laugh. I have had a bit of stick from the lads about my slightly garish winter woolly hat. I didn't choose that shade of fluorescent green. Ages ago Julian Watts was going out to buy a hat to wear in training, when the weather was bitterly cold, and I asked him to get me one at the same time. You may have noticed that its debut was when I was on the bench against Hartlepool, the start of our current run. I have worn it at every game since, and we still haven't lost, so whatever the weather this afternoon, the lucky hat will be making another appearance. I trust we won't need to be lucky, however! IT'S A pleasure to report that it is all good news from the treatment room this week, with Andrew Fotiadis my only new

customer with a minor groin strain. The best news is that recovery is in sight for long-term injury men Carl Griffiths, Chris Coyne and Peter Holmes.

Griff has been out of action with a stress fracture of the leg since September, and has had to work to get over it, despite being in plaster for more than two months. The specialist has now confirmed that the fracture has completely healed, so the cast has been discarded and Griff is stepping up his work rate. He will be swimming every day and do some work in the gym, but is not running yet - he will be eased into that very carefully. But he should be able to raise a canter in a couple of weeks or so, and then extend his training to some football

activities. He will have to work to build up muscle strength, but is now much happier than he has been for a while, knowing that he has a good chance of playing again this season.

Coyne and Holmes have both been sidelined since mid-December, but are well on the way to full recovery. They have been model patients, and worked well to aid recovery. Coyne has got over his knee ligament damage, and we worked him quite hard in training for the first three days of this week, and he came through tha test well. He is able to run without any problems, and is very close to being able to rejoin the squad for full training.

I,hope that Holmes will also be able to resume normal training next week after his ankle and knee injuries, and with luck he and Coyne will both be ready for a run-out with the reserves in the fairly near future.

WELCOME back to Kenilworth Road for a home game at last! The match with Bristol Rovers was postponed because of their FA Cup

commitments, and two attempts to play the New Year game against Exeter were beaten by the weather. That was a huge disappointment to everybody, especially Richard Bird and his staff, who worked extremely hard and long to try to overcome the frost.

At present we don't know who or where we are playing next week, as is reported on page 2 and page 10. It will be Darlington away or Exeter at home. If it is Darlington, please note that it will be an all-ticket match for our supporters, and supplies are limited. Again, see page 10 for details.

Christmas is just a memory now, but I want to put on record our appreciation of the visit by the Salvation Army band from Dunstable, who entertained us with carols on the day of the Hartlepool game. Supporters have told me how much they enjoyed it, and we intend to keep it as a traditional part of our Christmas arrangements. I must also pass on the thanks of the Salvation Army for the £160 contributed by supporters to their charity appeal.

Copies of the matchday magazine prepared for the Exeter match are available to supporters, and one of the items in my column that day has brought a swift response.

Gary Gravatt, a long-time supporter, asked us to settle a debate about the Town wearing red shirts at Sheffield Wednesday on August 27, at the start of the 1988-89 season. The question he and his pals discussed on a long trip to an away game was if it had ever happened before or since, and who was the second sub on a day when lan Allinson was the only sub used.

Club statistician Roger Wash was one of several who came up with the answers. The red shirts were a third strip, used when the all-blue second kit caused a colour clash, as it did at Hillsborough. Its only other use in a competitive

game was at QPR later that season. In the following season the second and third strips were blue and orange diamond-patterned affairs.

"The unused sub for the Sheffield Wednesday game was Rob Johnson. The increase to two permitted subs was introduced at the start of the 1987/88 season in league games, having been brought in for the FA Cup the season before, and the Town used both their subs on the opening day of that season, in 1-0 defeat at Derby.

"The Town always used red as their favoured second strip as far back as I can remember, right up until the change from white first choice shirts to orange in 1973."

I hope that information is of use to Gary and his pals.

Simon Pitts, another keen stats fan, has been in touch with regard to our recent record. He points out that if we had won at Cheltenham, it would have equalled the record of five consecutive away victories, not beaten it. We have not won five away matches in succession in any season, but it was achieved in 1981: we won 3-0 at Bolton on the last day of the 1980/81 season, and then won the first four away matches of the following season, at QPR, Bolton, Leicester and Orient.

But there was a record set at Kidderminster, says Simon - the first time we had ever played three consecutive away games and won them all.

And he adds another item to delight all anoraks: when Dean Crowe scored at Southend, it was our 5,000th goal in the Football League.

I never cease to be amazed at our supporters' depth of knowledge about the club. My thanks to all who got in touch - I am always pleased to hear from supporters, by letter, phone call or e-mail. We are here to listen to your views, and they are very welcome, and we always reply to everybody.

Futcher wins the basement battle

When the Hatters won promotion in 1974, to move back to the top flight that they had last

graced in 1960, it was on the back of financial constraints still lingering around Kenilworth Road following the major problems of three years previously. The collapse of Vehicle and General Insurance Group, owned by chairman Tony Hunt, in 1971 would reverberate around the club for many years to come.

In truth, the club's new board would probably have preferred it if the Town had not won promotion, mindful of Division One wages and associated costs but decided to make a fist of it as the supporters demanded.

An opening day 1-2 home defeat at the hands of Liverpool was no disgrace but a haul of only five points from the next eight games meant that the Town were struggling from the start and were in danger of being left far behind. Division One was not much fun after all!

The tenth game saw the visit of Carlisle to Kenilworth Road. The Cumbrians had also struggled to promotion to Division One at the end of the previous season but they had opened the new campaign in some style and after a run of three straight wins stood proudly at the top of the table.

By the time of the visit to Luton, however, the gloss was beginning to fade as only one more win had been recorded. Even so they were still 12 places higher in the league table than the Hatters.

On the morning of the game a bombshell was dropped when it was announced that top scorer, Barry Butlin, was to be transferred to second division Nottingham Forest for £120,000. Apparently Forest manager, and ex-Hatter, Allan Brown, had money to burn following the sale of Duncan McKenzie and his bid for Butlin was too good to turn down.

Luton manager, Harry Haslam, put on a brave face and said that he needed to change things around anyway as most of the Luton forward play had been directed to the head of Butlin. Most Luton supporters felt that it was crazy to sell a proven goalscorer when the team was struggling.

Peter Anderson was pushed up front to link with Jim Husband and Australian international Adrian Alston, with the brief that all three should interchange and pass their way to goal.

To be fair the system worked, particularly in this game, as Carlisle were swept aside after a few opening scares. Anderson opened the scoring in the 13th minute after running through a square Carlisle defence to latch on to a clever through ball from Alston and net with ease.

Carlisle equalised as half-time approached through Joe Laidlaw's clever overhead kick but the lead was regained on 54 minutes when Alston wormed his way through the Carlisle defence before blasting past ex-Hatter, Alan Ross, in the Cumbrians goal.

The killer goal came with 14 minutes left when a shot from Husband hit the unfortunate Bobby Parker on the hand which led to a penalty stroked home by the cool Jim Ryan.

Unfortunately, the Town were not able to add to that win and by Christmas sat rock bottom with only nine points to their name. Haslam then decided to go for broke and threw in the kids with Steve Buckley and twins, Ron and Paul Futcher pitched in at the deep end.

Suddenly the Hatters were rejuvenated and promptly won three games on the trot to close a bit of daylight between them and the other clubs scrapping at the bottom


By the time of the return with Carlisle, in mid-March, we had hoisted ourselves off the bottom but a run of three straight defeats had not helped our cause.

Bottom of the pile, after a run of five defeats in a row, were Carlisle who no doubt felt that the heady days of the previous summer seemed light years ago.

Predictably, this bottom of the table tussle attracted the lowest crowd of the season to Brunton Park and in a high, swirling wind neither side looked to have the ability to escape the drop. In a dull first half Hugh McIlmoyle saw his diving header cleared off the Luton line and the same player send in a centre that smacked against the cross bar.

Carlisle eventually opened the scoring just after the interval when Laidlaw played a wall pass with Dennis Martin and headed in the return ball from close range, leaving Keith Barber in the Luton goal with no chance of saving.

The Town battled back and within five minutes scored a deserved equaliser. A free kick from Buckley was headed against a post by Ron Futcher and with Ross stranded, John Aston, quickest to react, nodded in the rebound.



The game seemed to be petering out for a 1-1 draw which would have been a fair result but with two minutes left the Town snatched a second goal and both points with a fluke effort. Out on the right touchline and in acres of space Ron Futcher slung over a long, high and very speculative cross in the general direction of the Carlisle goal.

The ball was caught in the wind and looped over a bemused Ross to hit the far post and rebound gently into the net.

This very fortunate win seemed to kick-start the Town's season once more and five wins from the final nine games almost led to an incredible escape from relegation at the death. It was not to be, however, and the Hatters and the Cumbrians fell through

the trapdoor to meet up again the following season in Division Two.




The Town's standard issue for this Division One season had all the basics you needed with only three pages of advertising amongst 16 pages of comment, photos and statistics.

Kidderminster Harriers 1 Luton Town 4 (HT 0-0)

"KEEP it going" was the New Year rallying cry of Joe Kinnear as the Town saw off 2001 on a high, and kicked off 2002 with another thumping away win. But Kidderminster boss Jan Molby was grudging in his praise of the Town's performance, having seen his goalkeeper stake strong claims to be the Town's player of the year.

Stuart Brock had a nightmare, and the Town took full advantage to destroy a team that had lost at home only one, and conceded just five goals in its 12 previous league games at the Aggborough. After taking a good look at the opposition in the first half, the Town destroyed them in the second, with Matthew Taylor terrorising them. It was a delight for another big Town following, who swelled the gate to Kidderminster's biggest of the season, but Mr Molby was not a happy man after three goals in five minutes turned the game around.

He called the result unbelievable, having seen his team hit the bar in the opening five minutes, and then take the lead five minutes after the interval. "The first shot they had on target was for their second goal. And what happened in the next five minutes you would not believe, would you? We presented them with three goals in five minutes and I don't think I have ever seen any-

thing like that before. The goalkeeper chucked all three of them in, so you couldn't described it as good attacking. The first one was a cross; the second one I don't know what the kid was trying to do and the third one he spilled."

YOU can find a hatful of differences between today's Luton Town side and the one we saw floundering in the Second Division a year ago, and one of the major improvements was illustrated again at Cheltenham. Going a goal down is no longer the end of the team's fight: at Whaddon Road the Town found themselves trailing for the fifth consecutive match, but once more came back to earn a deserved reward. At Oxford, Southend and Kidderminster the recoveries were so complete that they ended in victories, and on Saturday Cheltenham were lucky not to suffer the same fate.

They were on the rack in the closing stages, and it needed a good save by Steve Book to prevent Adrian Forbes netting a late winner.

By then, the Town were looking confident and in control, having seen fortunes sway both ways earlier. The home side took a 22nd-minute lead with a wonderful goal, but it was somewhat against the run of play, and completely out of the blue.

Before then the Town had hit the bar through Matt Taylor, with Ahmet Brkovic and Steve Howard unable to get in the telling follow-up shots, and Howard had seen a header cleared off the line. Astute use of substitutes, in itself proof that the squad depth is much better now than when the manager arrived, proved important once more. Changes just after the hour mark sent Jean-Louis Valois and Adrian Forbes into the action, and the Town used four at the front, with good attacking support from midfield. The football was quick and effective, although Cheltenham also had their moments before the Town took command in the last 15 minutes.

Howard's hard work brought him his seventh goal of the season for the 73rd-minute equaliser, and after that Cheltenham, beaten only once at home all season, were hanging on to save a point.

Steve Cotterill, their manager, once a striker with Joe Kinnear's Wimbledon, complained that his side had not taken their chances to kill off the game in the first half, and was disappointed not to win.

The Town boss smiled sweetly at hearing that. "It was a tough game but as it progressed I always felt there was going to be one winner - us," he said. "Cheltenham ran out of puff in the last 15 minutes, when we should have cashed in."






