## French striker goes on trial

MONTPELLIER striker Oliver Bogaczyk will be bidding to earn a Hatters contract against Colchester Reserves this afternoon at Kenilworth Road.

Bogaczyk, 24, has trained with the Hatters this week as Joe Kinnear looks to bolster his strike force with first-choice attackers Steve Howard and Adrian Forbes both suspended for Saturday's

trip to Torquay.

Top scorer Howard is also banned for Tuesday night's home match with Leyton Orient and Kinnear has made several bids for new forwards.

Ex-Scotland interna-tional Gary McSwegan, on loan from Hearts, may be in contention for Sat-urday's match but is still suffering from a shoulder injury. Kinnear said:

"He trains one day, then does not train the next day and spends the next morning on the treat-ment table getting his shoulder massaged.

"But he'll be in the squad for every game and I'll use him if I have to."

The Hatters will also look at two Angolan internationals on Friday. Both have been recom-

mended by former Mills wall winger George Lawrence, who is flying them into the country.

Alan Neilson, 29, became Kinnear's latest signing, joining on a free transfer from Grimsby.

The ex-Newcastle, Southampton and Fulham defender has signed until the end of the sea-son when he could be offered a two-year deal by the Hatters.

# Stevie's wonder comeback!

A HUNDRED and sixty one days is a long time in football – just ask a rejuvenated Steve Howard.

The 6ft 3in forward bagged a brace to sink York City in Saturday's 2-1 victory for the Hatters exactly 23 weeks after a display against the Minstermen, described as 'disgraceful' by Joe Kinnear, had placed his Kenilworth Road

career in jeopardy.

Howard flouted Kinnear's orders in September's first match between the two clubs when he missed a penalty twice and almost came to blows with his team-mates who tried, unsuccessfully, to wrestle the ball from him after his spotkick blunder.

He was substituted in that match after continued squabbling and axed from the first-team squad for the next

game. But his aggression and muscle has been used to better effect since that dark day in Yorkshire and Saturday's double was the perfect way to exorcise the ghost of Bootham Crescent, completing the kind of transformation that has seen David Beckham go from England pariah to the country's

most popular player. Howard was hardly a crowd favourite before his York shenanigans, having waited 10 games to score a goal in open **Joe view**

play for the Hatters and starting this season without finding the net in his first seven matches

But Saturday's latest matchwinning display saw Howard leave the pitch to chants of "Stevo," a ditty previously reserved for talismanic former centre-back Steve Davis.

"I think the supporters are beginning to see he's a halfdecent player," said Hatters boss Kinnear afterwards with a hint of under-statement.

Howard's goals took his tally to eight in nine games since the turn of the year and 13 for the Howard headed into the top season.

His performances have caused the Hatters to twice revise his goal target for the season. Kinnear had originally demanded 10 goals from Howard at the start of the campaign, but recently changed that figure to 15 and he now

The brace was Howard's first since joining the Hatters and he went close three times to completing a hat-trick in the

But it was York forward Michael Proctor, a player highly-rated by Hatters boss Kinnear, who struck first in Saturday's clash.

The on-loan Sunderland striker forced Carl Emberson into a 10th-minute save and then fired the visitors in front after Matthew Spring had warmed Alan Fettis' hands with a low drive at the other

Proctor was left in splendid isolation on the left-wing by a careless Hatters defence and capitalised fully, cutting inside before curling an unstoppable shot into Emberson's top corner from the edge of the area.

Two minutes later, the visitors were equally as neglectful when Emmerson Boyce foraged down the right flank unchallenged and delivered an accurate cross that

corner from five yards.

Adrian Forbes, chosen ahead Dean Crowe and Gary McSwegan to partner Howard, then shot over on 25 minutes before Fettis kept Ahmet Brkovic off the scoresheet with an instinctive reflex save.

The Croatian midfielder is

clearly under instructions to get into the opposition's penalty box at every attacking opportunity and met a Jean-Louis Valois cross, only to be denied by Fettis from pointblank range.

York almost regained the lead in extraordinary circumstances in first-half injurytime when a miscue by Chris Coyne saw the ball fly off his toe end from 35 yards and just over Emberson's bar with the

Hatters keeper well beaten.
The Hatters survived that scare and forged in front five minutes into the second period when Howard used his knee to meet Forbes' right-wing cross and his clumsy effort squirmed

under Fettis' body.
Forbes had the ball in the net
again seconds later but his
effort was disallowed after he handled just before shooting.

York midfielder Lee Bullock wasted his side's best chance of a point on 55 minutes when he shot woefully wide after bursting purposefully into the penalty box.

The Hatters then searched

for an assuring third goal and, on 71 minutes, Brkovic broke clear from the halfway line but lacked the pace to leave the visitors defence behind and his eventual chip was ambitious and easily saved.

Matthew Taylor tested Fettis on 72 minutes from 25 yards and curled a low free-kick wide after Marvin Johnson's replacement of Valois had seen him pushed into midfield.

Howard's three late chances to clinch a personal treble saw him shoot on the turn at Fettis, head over from Brkovic's corner and, in injury-time, fire in a goalbound effort that was bravely blocked by York sub Stuart Wise.

The last opportunity had been crafted by Brkovic and

Paul Hughes, who impressed as the Hatters' midfield anchorman after replacing Aaron Skelton on 57 minutes.
