Town join hunt for Wolves ace

JOE KINNEAR is hoping to Kenilworth Road. The to sign Wolves forward Adam Proudlock on loan until the summer.

exy Hatters go Plain for Joe

THE HATTERS enjoyed back-to-back clean sheets for the first time this season - and for only the second time during Joe Kinnear's reign at the club - after Ahmet Brkovic's goal clinched a 1-0 victory at Torquay.

Kinnear's policy for most of his first full campaign in charge has been to outscore the opposition, but the Hatters boss announced after Saturday's shut-out that he is happy to temporarily sacrifice football" in the crucial quest for points as the club's promotion push enters its final furlong.

Luton last kept consecutive clean sheets sheets exactly a year ago today when a 1-0 victory over Cambridge United followed a 0-0 stalemate against Bristol Rovers.

Both those matches were at Kenilworth Road and Kinnear will be particularly pleased that the club have completed 180 minutes in a season without conceding a league goal on away soil for the first time since

December 1997.
The Hatters back-line has defended excellently in both 1-0 victories at Torquay and Lincoln, albeit against opposition with a dismal lack of firepower.

Plainmoor on Saturday, while Russell Perrett defended with

typical fortitude. Reliable club skipper Marvin Johnson also soldiered through another game at left-back until a nasty clash of heads with powerful home substitute Marcus Richardson brought a premature end to his afternoon, while Alan Neilson's integration into the Hatters side continued without fuss and he enjoyed another solid performance at right-back.

Neilson later illustrated his the coastal breeze blowing into versatility by switching to left-

back after Emmerson Boyce's replacement of the unfortunate Johnson.

"Marvin had an enormous egg on his head and was feeling very groggy so I told him we lost 3-1 and all three goals were down to him," Kinnear later ioked.

But the Hatters manager's defensive options suddenly look luxurious with David Bayliss available again after a three-match suspension, but probably ruing his one aberration in a Hatters shirt the red card at Rochdale which could leave him with a fight to reclaim his starting place.

Suspended striker Steve Howard and Adrian Forbes, available for last night's home match with Leyton Orient after serving a one-match ban, have less to fear with Dean Crowe lacking confidence and Gary McSwegan match fitness at Plainmoor.

Crowe missed an excellent 67th-minute chance to secure the points, but still showed sufficient signs that he is worth perseverance and capable of rediscovering the form that brought him 10 goals before the New Year.

Ex-Scotland international McSwegan also offered glimpses of his ability on Saturday, but his acquisition has demonstrated the problems of bringing in loan signings who have not played recent

first-team football. It was left to Croatian midfielder Brkovic to find the net on 21 minutes after Hatters keeper Carl Emberson had turned Alex Russell's low free-kick behind for a corner.

Brkovic collected Kevin Nicholls' pass into the penalty box before skipping around Luton-born keeper Kevin Dearden and coolly shooting into an empty net.

The diminutive midfielder was only denied a second goal on 40 minutes by Dearden's fine save after Matthew Taylor had received a first-time crossfield pass by McSwegan and crossed low into the penalty box.

Brkovic received a kick on his ankle shortly afterwards and did not reappear for the second-half, with Paul Hughes replacing him.
Taylor's header carried

insufficient power to beat Dearden on the hour mark after good work by Crowe on the right flank.

Crowe then failed to end his frustrating goal drought, fluffing his shot wide after Taylor's great cross had found him unmarked in the penalty

box.
Perrett headed inches wide from three yards out after a 77th-minute corner, but his presence at the other end helped restrict Torquay to hopeful long-range efforts from

Greg Goodridge.
The home side's clearest

sight of goal came on 84 minutes, but Jimmy Benefield never looked confident and dragged his shot wide of Emberson's goal just moments after replacing ex-Hatters midfielder Jason Rees, whose removal from the action was applauded by an unimpressed home crowd.

Jean-Louis Valois, a sub for the tiring McSwegan, then found Crowe with a searching pass in injury time, but the striker's heavy touch allowed Rueben Hazell to make a perfect covering tackle.

The victory was the Hatters' 11th away success of the season and broke a club record set by Alec Stock's 1969/70 Division Three promotion-winning side. Kinnear's men also chalked

up a fourth consecutive league win for only the second time in the last 15 years. The previous occasion was under Lennie Lawrence in December 1996.

Luton's latest four-match run may have come against sides in the bottom seven of the Football League's basement division but the Hatters have shown a necessary propensity to avoid slipping up against teams they should beat throughout the season.

The Kenilworth Road club

had won 14 out of 20 matches against teams in the lower half of the Division Three table after Saturday's victory, including six wins out of six against the bottom four sides before last night's home clash with lowly Leyton Orient.
