Adrian Caceres was put in because we believed he could cause their back four a few problems and for the first 15 minutes we looked the more dangerous side.

At that point I was happy with the way things were going but then we went and conceded a really sloppy goal which came from a comedy of errors on our behalf.

Across the 90 minutes we had a lot of the ball but from a personal point of view I don't think we did enough with it and was disappointed with the number of chances we created.

Credit must go to Darlington's two centre-halves as they defended extremely

well but we could have done more.

In the end those two lapses in concentration cost us dearly and we paid the ultimate price.

That defeat made the game at Cheltenham more important and the performance was an improvement but again we didn't get the result which is the most important thing.

The script was similar to the previous two or three away games in that we had plenty of possession and played the better football at times.

We also had our chances and when you travel to take on teams who are at the top end of the division you have to make sure that you take them.

Unfortunately we didn't and we got caught out from a set-piece which just adds to the disappointment.

The corner they scored from was a decent one but we never really picked the guy up and having defended well up to that point it was a poor way in which to lose the game.

In terms of spirit, effort and commitment I couldn't have asked for much more but that doesn't win you games.

Anyway, we have four fixtures left and the aim is to win all of them if we can. It's a big ask but it's not impossible and getting a good result against Luton today would be a perfect place to start.

# Top Hat-ters?

Less than a year ago Luton Town suffered relegation, which saw them playing in the bottom division for the first time since being Division Four Champions in 1968.

More often than not relegated sides are soon installed amongst the favourites for promotion but very rarely does a relegated side make an immediate return to the division above.

Often when a side is closing in on promotion they suddenly have an attack of the jitters and start unexpectedly dropping points. That is not the case with Luton Town.

The Hatters secured automatic promotion last Saturday with a 3-1 win at Swansea City. That victory also broke a club record because it was their tenth successive win, a feat never before achieved in the clubs 117 year history.

After a maximum haul of thirty points and with promotion secured, the Hatters may have been excused taking it a bit easier in their Easter Monday fixture against fellow promotion contenders Mansfield Town at Kenilworth Road.

However, the 5-3 victory saw them chalk up their eleventh successive win, their 90th league goal of the season and also their 28th league victory of the season – another club record. On the two previous occasions that the club had managed 27 league wins in a season, they were promoted as champions.

That feat is also not beyond them this season. The defeat of Mansfield coupled with Plymouth's 1-0 defeat at Hartlepool on the same day saw the gap at the top reduced to only two points although the Pilgrims do still have a game in hand on the Hatters.

Manager Joe Kinnear is aiming for maximum points from their three remaining games (at home to Macclesfield and away at Shrewsbury after today's game) which would see the Hatters finish on 99 points and mean that Plymouth

would need a century to take the title.

Although the Hatters went out of the Worthington Cup at the first round stage with a 4-0 defeat at Reading, ten wins and three draws in the opening sixteen league games saw them firmly established in the promotion race.

Crucially one of the three defeats came in a 2-1 reverse at Plymouth. A run of five defeats in six games included cup defeats at Dagenham and Redbridge in the LDV Vans Trophy and Southend United in the FA Cup. The three league defeats in that period included 4-1 scorelines at both Mansfield Town and Macclesfield Town and the Tigers 1-0 victory at Kenilworth Road courtesy of Rob Matthews' strike.

An unbeaten run of eight games put them back on track and although three defeats in four games followed. Scunthorpe's 3-2 victory in Bedfordshire on February 16th was the last time that the Hatters failed to take maximum points. During the magnificent run of eleven successive wins they have scored 29 goals and conceded only 6.

Steve Howard leads Luton's scoring charts with 20 league goals, the most the ex Hartlepool and Northampton striker has managed in a season. He has formed a formidable strike partnership with Dean Crowe who has netted 14 times so far this season.

Wingback Matthew Taylor has weighed in with 11 goals and is rated as the brightest prospect at the club. Joe Kinnear has reportedly rejected a bid of £500,000 from West Bromwich Albion for the product of the clubs youth policy.

The 20 year old has attracted the attention of a number of Premiership clubs including Newcastle and Tottenham, and has turned down a new contract at Kenilworth Road. However, due to his age, he will not be available on a Bosman and therefore any transfer fee would have to be settled at a tribunal and

Kinnear says that he expects the club to be adequately recompensed. Taylor missed the second half of the victory at Swansea last week after suffering what was originally feared to be a serious eye injury. It turned out to be only the start of a migraine, which cleared up in time for the Mansfield fixture.

Although there were no departures from Kenilworth Road on transfer deadline day, Joe Kinnear added to his squad by signing Steven Kabba on loan until the end of the season. The Crystal Palace striker possesses great pace and has bagged 14 goals for Palace reserves.

Although the title is still to be played for this season, the Hatters are already planning ahead for next season. Rather than just looking to consolidate in the Second Division, Joe Kinnear will be aiming for a second successive promotion.

The fans are very happy with the progress made by Kinnear believing that the squad is much stronger now that it was a year ago because the Board has provided the necessary finances.

Chairman Mike Watson-Challis has also revealed that the club's plans for a new stadium are progressing well. Luton have been at Kenilworth Road since 1905 but space for development is extremely limited and so the club has purchased 55 acres of land near Junction 10 of the M1 on which to build a new stadium.

The club are to decide between five designs for the stadium which will initially have a capacity of 15,000, but which will be eventually increased to 25,000. The new stadium may also include a hotel, several restaurants, fast food outlets, a pub, swimming pool, leisure and conference facilities.

Although a planning application has not yet been made Luton Borough Council is supportive of the idea and is also keen to redevelop the Kenilworth Road site, which it owns.

The current form tables may suggest an away victory for Luton's first league visit to Boothferry Park since April 1978, but earlier in the week Joe Kinnear won the Nationwide Division Three manager of the month award for March, which quite often seems to provide some sort of curse.

## Player Profiles 2001/2002

### EMMERSON BOYCE - 17

Emmerson had a good season for Luton in 2000-01 despite playing in a struggling team and was a near ever-present missing just four matches. He won the young supporters' 'Player of the Season' award as a reward for his efforts. A calm and cultured defender who is equally at home either as a full back or central defender, the 22 year-old has made a tremendous contribution to this season's success with over 30 appearances.

### CHRIS COYNE - 12

23 year-old Chris has formed the vital solid central defensive partnership with Russell Perrett since signing for Town from Dundee £50,000 in September. Born in Brisbane, the big Aussie joined West Ham from Perth SC in January 1996 for £150,000, and had loan spells at Brentford and Southend before moving up to Dundee in March 2000. Chris' only senior appearance for the Hammers was as a sub for Rio Ferdinand in a 1-5 home defeat by Leeds in May 1999.

### DEAN CROWE - 34

Having gone on the transfer list in the summer, Stockport-born Dean began the 2001-02 campaign on loan at Plymouth. He made only one Pilgrims appearance before moving on to Luton from Stoke. The 22 year-old had been a Potters pro since

September 1996. A quick and lively striker with a committed approach, Dean has so far netted 14 times for the Hatters.

### CARL EMBERSON - 16

An experienced goalkeeper, Carl was again second choice to Jimmy Walker at Walsall in the 2000-01 campaign. He was released by the Saddlers in the summer and was soon snapped by Joe Kinnear. The Epsom born keeper has played a big part in Town's promotion success with 13 clean sheets in his 29 Division Three appearances. 28 year-old Carl has also played for Millwall and Colchester.

### ADRIAN FORBES - 7

A significant summer capture, Adrian's July move from Norwich cost Luton £60,000. The 23 year-old had made 121 appearances for the Canaries - his only previous League club. The former England youth international is usually used as a wing man but his pace and direct style can be used to good effect in a central striking role. He has scored five goals for the Hatters so far.

### IAN HILLIER - 33

The 22 year-old from Neath originally joined the Hatters on loan from Tottenham in August, making the permanent move in a £30,000 deal two months later. Midfielder Ian is a Wales Under-21 international but failed to make a senior appearance for Spurs. His only goal so far was the winner at York in September.

### PETER HOLMES - 20

A product of the FA School of Excellence, Peter joined Luton in the 2000 close season after three years as a professional at Sheffield Wednesday. Although the Bishop Auckland-born midfielder failed to make a senior Owls appearance, he featured regularly in the first half of last season but

#### STEVE HOWARD - 19

Steve played regularly up front for Northampton in the 2000-01 season until he surprisingly moved to neighbours Luton on the Transfer Deadline Day for £50,000. It has proved to be a sound investment as the powerful centre-forward has contributed 20 goals to the Hatters promotion success. Born in Durham, 25 year-old Steve moved from Hartlepool to Northampton for £120,000 in February 1999.

#### PAUL HUGHES - 27

Paul is available for selection this afternoon having served a two-match ban over Easter following his second dismissal of the season (against Kidderminster). The 25 year-old joined Luton in August having failed to make a senior appearance in the two previous seasons. The Hammersmith-born midfielder started at Chelsea and made 24 appearances before following Glenn Hoddle to Southampton in March 2000.

#### MARVIN JOHNSON - 6

Currently the longest-serving player at Kenilworth Road, Wembley-born Marvin is a survivor of the Hatters last spell in top flight football having made his debut at Wimbledon in March 1888. The 33 year-old had been a rock in the centre of defence in recent seasons and provided essential back-up during this season's success. He has now made over 400 appearances for Luton.

#### STEVEN KABBA - 44

21 year-old Steven joined Luton on loan from Crystal Palace on Transfer Deadline Day. Although the Lambeth-born striker has made only seven Palace appearances, his moment of glory came with the deciding kick in a penalty shoot-out success against Tranmere in the Fourth Round of last season's Worthington Cup. Although he has yet to score in senior outfield play, Steven did show his potential

with a four-goal salvo against Norwich reserves last April.

#### KEVIN NICHOLLS - 8

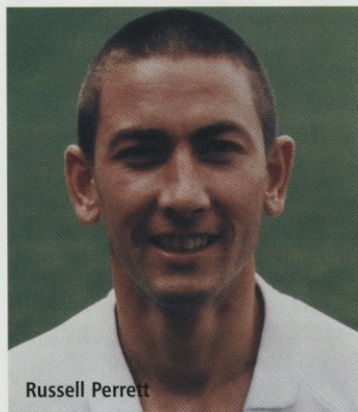
23 year-old Kevin received few opportunities at first-team level for Wigan last term until the appointment of Steve Bruce as manager in April. He was then restored to the side and went on to produce some fine performances as the Latics reached the Play-Offs. The combative midfielder moved to Luton in August for an initial £25,000, rising to £150,000 depending on appearances. Kevin has previously played for Charlton and Brighton.

#### MARK OVENDALE - 1

Mark joined Luton in the 2000 close season from Bournemouth for £425,000. The 28 year-old keeper began last season on the subs' bench but quickly won a place in the first team. Mark has subsequently reverted to second choice behind Carl Emberson, making only one appearance since January. He previously played for Wisbech, Northampton and Barry.

#### RUSSELL PERRETT - 5

Russell had a desperately disappointing season at Cardiff in 2000-01 when he was hit by a series of injuries that kept him out for virtually the whole campaign. The former Portsmouth defender moved on to Luton in August, and has been a key figure in the promotion campaign. He is 28 year-old centre back who is strong in the air and has considerable ability on the ground.

#### MATTHEW SPRING - 4

22 year-old Matthew has again retained a regular first-team place for Luton in 2001-02. He has been a driving force in the centre of the park in what has been a very successful season for the Hatters. A tenacious midfielder with a biting tackle and impressive vision, Matthew has now made over 200 appearances for his only League club since signing pro forms in July 1997.

#### MATTHEW TAYLOR - 15

The current PFA Third Division Player of the Month had his efforts during last season's traumatic campaign rewarded with two of the club's 'Player of the Season' awards. After the highly rated 20 year-old left back (who has scored 11 goals this term) rejected the offer of a new contract recently, Matthew was placed on the transfer list last month. He has attracted interest from Spurs, Sunderland and West Brom but Joe Kinnear is said to be looking for a £2million fee.

#### JEAN-LOUIS VALOIS - 28

The 28 year-old Frenchman has made a sensational impact since joining Luton in September after being released by Lille in the summer. Jean-Louis had made nine appearances in the French Championnat last season having helped them to their Second Division championship success in 1999-00. He previously played for Gueugnon, Auxerre and Lyon-la-Duchere. A supremely talented left-sided attacking midfielder who has scored six times for Town, Jean-Louis has yet to decide where he will play next season.

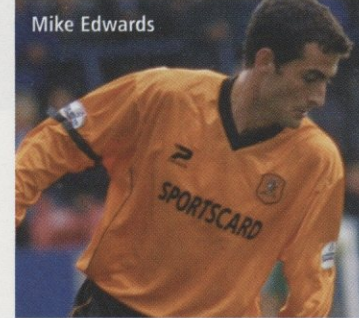

**A memorable week**

The last week has seen a few of City's players reach some notable landmarks within their careers; today offers one Tiger the chance to reach another.

Last Saturday's fixture against Darlington saw Ryan Williams make the 150th League appearance of his career. On Monday, Paul Musselwhite's appearance in goal for the Tigers against Cheltenham was the 500th League outing of his career. In the same game Jason Van Blerk was making his 250th career outing.

Today, assuming he takes some part in the game, Mike Edwards will be making the 200th senior appearance of his career. He still has a couple of weeks to go before his 22nd birthday, thus making him one of the youngest players within the club's history to have achieved the double century.

**No maybe, it's Molby**

After all the excitement and speculation over who will be the next manger of Hull City we can now, as they say in Liverpool, "Calm down." The speculation is over; the appointment is made, and drawing on Liverpool philosophy is quite apt, for it was within the red half of Merseyside that the latest recipient of the Tiger managerial baton, Jan Molby, made his name in football.

The speculation may have run its course, but I suspect the excitement still has a few miles left in the tank, fuelling the hype and expectation. If that's the case then let's not lose sight of those two words of Merseyside caution; nothing is certain in football.

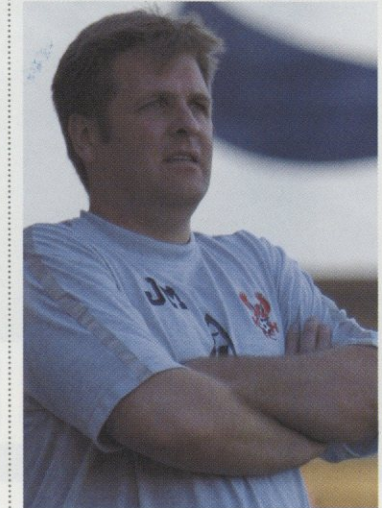
He may be the new kid in town, but Jan's career, prior to his Boothferry Park appointment, has some interesting connections with our stadium's history.

The last crowd in excess of 20,000 at Boothferry Park saw Jan Molby in the visiting Liverpool side for an FA Cup 5th round tie here back in February 1989. The highest scoring League game on home territory involving the Tigers also had a Molby link. As manager of Swansea he would not have enjoyed seeing his side mauled 7-4 in August 1997. In the near future he has the opportunity to be part of similar records at our new stadium.

In one respect, some might say that his arrival already creates a new entry in the Tigers' record book: our first

overseas manager. But if you take a somewhat literal interpretation of the word overseas you will find that is not the case. Bill McCracken and Terry Neill, both born in Belfast, could lay claim to this particular accolade.

In addition to their birthplace they also share similar status in the record book. McCracken took the Tigers further than any other City boss in the FA Cup (semi-finals 1929/30); Terry Neill is responsible for guiding the Tigers to their highest ever position in the League: fifth place in the old Division Two in season 1970/71.



Jan has already more than matched them in terms of origin. Can he emulate them in terms of performance? There are thousands wishing him "Held og lykke" (Good luck) in the attempt.

**The Light service**

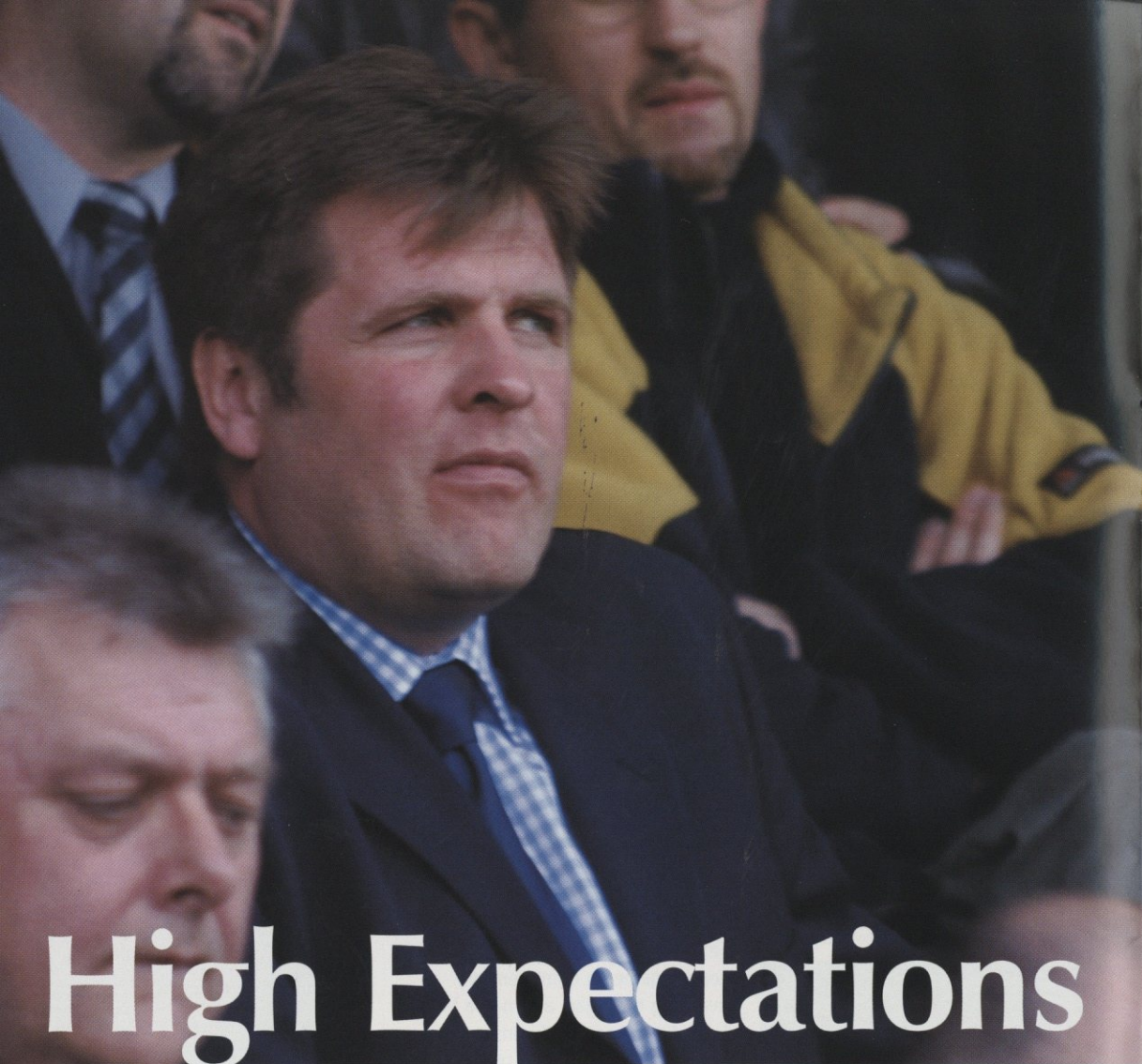
In November 1952 a small red light was spotted in the vicinity of the Directors' box in the West Stand. One comedian suggested that it meant the kettle was on ready for the Directors' half-time cup of tea. An amusing explanation it may have been, but it was incorrect.

The red light served a much more important function: confirming that the hospital broadcasting service was operating. In comparison to the modern day broadcasting options available - these days, whether you live in Aldbrough or Australia, Dunswell or Dubai, it make's not the slightest difference; following the Tigers' progress just involves letting your fingers do the walking, either on the computer keyboard or the radio - it may not have been a major innovation; but in its day it was groundbreaking stuff.

November 8th 1952 was the first game ever broadcast for the benefit of those confined to a hospital in Hull; and the Tigers' opponents that day were Luton Town.

The game was watched by over 22,000; I don't know how many were listening in from their sick beds, but I suspect that what they heard would not have assisted their recovery. Goals from Jesse Pye and Bert Mitchell gave the 'Hatters' a 2-0 victory.





# High Expectations

Feature writer Trevor Bugg profiles Tigers new manager Jan Molby.

**Not only is it a birthdate of 4 July 1963 that made for the appropriate title of the opening chapter of Jan Molby's biography - An Independent Spirit.**

Even from the outset of his magnificent career, Jan hasn't been scared to take on a daunting challenge. As a teenager - and against the advice of some of those who had known him since childhood - he left his home town team in modest Kolding in July 1982 to test his fledgling skills amongst the Dutch masters at Ajax.

Playing in the same side as Johan Cruyff, Jan went on to complete a Dutch League and Cup double. After 73

games and 21 goals, Liverpool manager Joe Fagan invested £575,000 in August 1984 as the Reds sought a replacement for the departing Graeme Souness.

As Jan adjusted to the frantic pace of the English game, he really came to the fore in his second Anfield season as he became a near-ever present under Kenny Dalglish. Liverpool completed a remarkable Double with Molby's contribution of 17 goals only bettered by Ian Rush.

One observer noted that the Dane exuded authority as the Reds' creative fulcrum, supplying a nourishing diet of exquisitely weighted through balls. Like Souness, Jan laced his constructive

merits with formidable power, and his dead-ball expertise was indispensable.

In all, Jan made 326 Liverpool appearances and scored 64 goals. He won two Championship winners medals, two FA Cup winners medals and a League Cup winners medal to add to his 34 full international. Surely, his personal honours list would have been even more impressive had it not been for the European ban enforced following the tragic events at Heysel in 1985.

Probably much more important is the undoubted affection that he is held in the hearts of the Anfield fans. They delighted in his famous Danish-Scouse accent and the way he - as one of the

first foreigners to grace the British football - embraced the Merseyside way of life. The shared grief of Hillsborough enhanced their mutual respect.

With his sumptuous talent, it's arguable that a succession of injuries robbed him of ultimate chance to prove himself as one of Europe's greatest-ever players. After twelve years at Liverpool, loan spells at Barnsley and Norwich City, and a thoroughly deserved testimonial, Jan departed in February 1996 to commence his managerial career at the unlikely location of Swansea City.

Many hoped he could repeat the remarkable Vetch feats of fellow Reds legend John Toshack, but he arrived at a club in turmoil. Despite a notable improvement, Jan couldn't avoid his new charges' relegation to the Third Division.

As October 1996 came to a close, the omens didn't look good either. The Swans were two from bottom and Vetch attendances were hovering around the 2,000 mark. Molby stuck to his principles though and the season was to end before 47,000 at Wembley as the Welshmen dramatically lost to a last-minute twice-taken Northampton free-kick in the Play-Off Final.

New owners arrived in the summer of 1997 with Jan's relationship being never better than uneasy. A run of six defeats in eight games (starting with the amazing 7-4 game at Boothferry Park) ended with an unceremonious departure on 8 October.

Jan then spent some nineteen months out of the game, concentrating on media work in the North West of England and in Denmark. His natural charm and thorough knowledge of the game ensured he excelled in both written and spoken forms.

The desire to return to a manager's chair was never far away though and, in May 1999, he signed in for another less-than-obvious challenge. Although one of non-league football's most established clubs, Kidderminster Harriers had dropped to the lower reaches of the Conference with gates dwindling accordingly.

Jan wasted no time at Aggborough and, although they lost four of their first five games, the Harriers were crowned

champions of the Nationwide Conference only twelve months after his appointment. He delivered League football to the Worcestershire club at his first attempt, but 114 years after their formation.

After a season of consolidation, Kidderminster became genuine Play-Off contenders as the current campaign progressed.

But the unprecedented success hasn't been accompanied by popularity at the Aggborough turnstiles. Chairman Lionel Newton blamed his own recent departure on a fall in gates. For Jan, the writing appeared on the wall as far back as 22 January. He launched a heartfelt plea to the Kidderminster public when only 2,295 watched the win over Halifax.

Mr Newton's successor Colin Youngjohns - although understandably disappointed in Jan's subsequent decision to resign - was fulsome in his praise. He said: "We would like to place on record our sincere thanks for the massive contribution Jan has made to the development of the club over the last three years. Jan Molby made the dream of Nationwide League football a reality in this town."

Since he guided the Harriers in to the Football League, Jan has been linked to a number of managerial posts

including Wigan Athletic, Tranmere Rovers, Walsall and Barnsley. We are delighted that he has chosen to accept arguably the biggest challenge of his glorious career - realising the high expectations of those who hold the aspirations of Hull City AFC close to their hearts.

Now well versed in the rough and tumble of Division Three, Jan is of the opinion that his coaching beliefs are compatible with his great playing success.

With the considerable talents at Boothferry Park now at his disposal, Jan has the opportunity to prove that it is possible to play-your-way out of the Third Division: "I look at Crewe as an example and they did it. They didn't do it overnight but they slowly built a team and kept maybe six or seven players and kept bringing in new ones till gradually they got it right.

"They played their way into the First Division and they still play good football now and are hanging on. I don't care what anyone says, it can be done."

Jan Molby said he had taken Kidderminster Harriers as far as he could. If the fullness of time proves that he takes Hull City as far as we think we can go, not only would we forgive him if he doesn't quite get to grips with a Hull accent, but hope he appreciates the magnificent statue that such an achievement would surely merit.

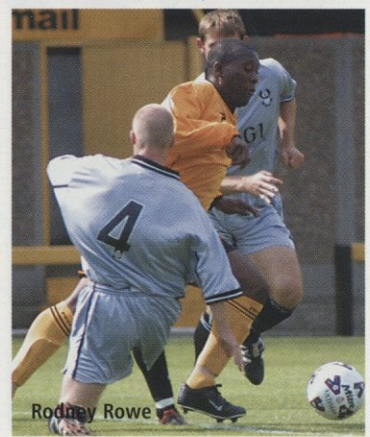

All in all it was a satisfactory afternoon from a City point of view and Rod Arnold commented:

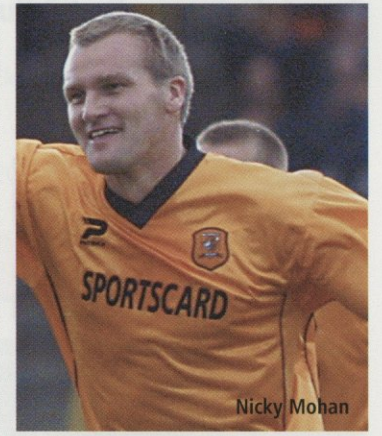
"We had a lot of young lads in and they stood up well to Hartlepool who fielded a few of their first team players.

With two wins from their opening two games, the Tigers were on a roll going into the clash and included several first year players as injuries begin to bite hard.

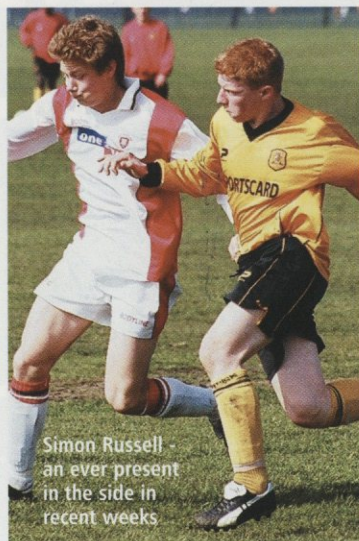
However, none of the younger lads looked out of place against a Rotherham outfit who were one of the better teams that City have come across during the campaign.

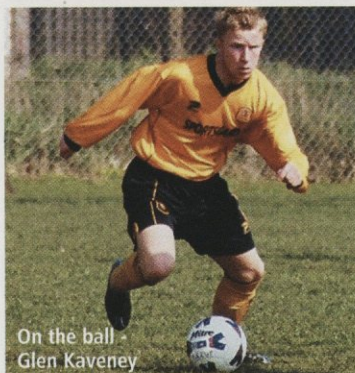

With Darlington not having won any of their previous ten league games, hopes were high that City could pick up the three points they desperately needed to kick start their play-off bid.

But on the day it didn't quite work out like that and the Quakers breached the Tigers rearguard twice to run out 2-1 winners on a disappointing afternoon at Boothferry Park.

Things had started brightly for the Tigers as they did all the pressing in the opening quarter of an hour, but with 17 minutes on the watch the visitors went into the lead.

Justin Whittle's sliced clearance was seized upon by Barry Conlon and he nodded the ball forward before heading past the stranded Paul Musselwhite to send the Quakers fans behind the goal into raptures.

It had come completely against the run of play and the Tigers were visibly stunned. Chances were few and far between during the remainder of the half and the best one fell to Adrian Caceres who helped on a Mark Greaves header only to see the ball bounce back off the bar.

That was the former Southampton man's last contribution as he limped off early in the second half to be replaced by Kyle Lightbourne.

A couple of half opportunities came and went before the Tigers dragged themselves level after 67 minutes.

David Norris' clever through ball sprung the Quakers' offside trap and Gary Alexander finished from a tight angle for his 23rd goal of the season.

But just as City looked the more likely side to go and snatch all three points they had a lapse of concentration that proved very costly.

On 79 minutes Adam Rundle caught out the Tigers back four and Ian Clark raced away and slotted the ball past the advancing Musselwhite to steal victory for the visitors.

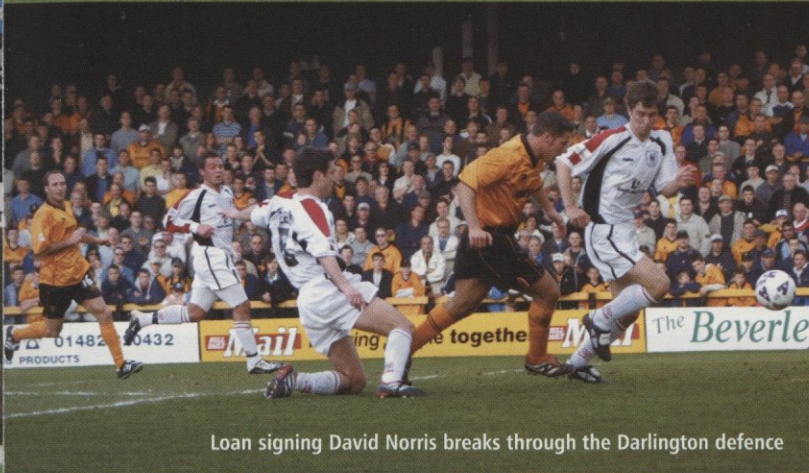

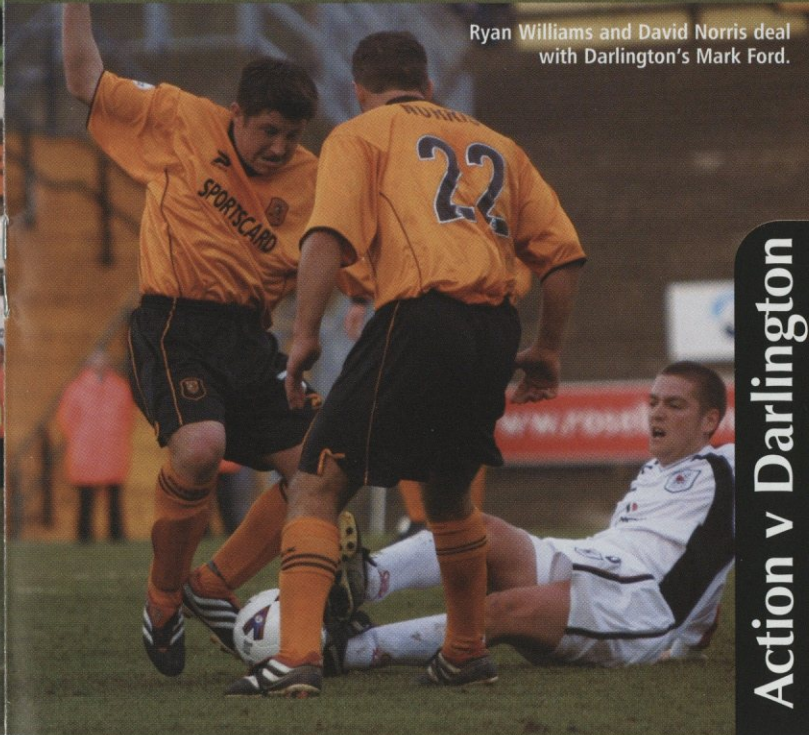

Over the last few weeks I have been charged with asking all my programme 'victims' for their particular memories.

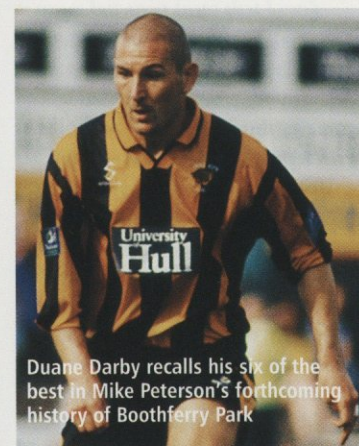

# In The Middle with Steve Sands

## Boothferry Park Memories

There are some fairly obvious connections between the Tigers and the Hatters - Brian Horton, Frankie Bunn, Garry Parker and Ray Daniel to name just four.

But I will start by reminding you of a more convoluted link. A player who made his debut against Luton Town on 20th December 1975 in a 2-1 home defeat against today's visitors.

For our thirty somethings, they will probably have a more vivid memory of our former Scottish midfielder that dates back to 19th February 1977.

The player in question scored against Bolton Wanderers and had his professional career cut short in the process. In the 64th minute he smashed the ball home at the North Stand End only to collide with non other than Sam Allardyce, now Manager of Premiership Bolton Wanderers.

He had brought the score back to 2-1 but was on his way to hospital by the time Peter Daniel equalised for the Tigers in the 88th minute.

As Rolf Harris might say, can you guess who it is yet? Yes, that's right, George Lyall.

When I last spoke to the man in question, I remember him being very philosophical about the incident. "Looking back, it was just one of those things that happen in football. I suffered a double fracture of the left leg. It was clear straightaway that it was a serious injury."

## A Question of Fitness

I'm certainly not going to get into the debate on player fitness or consider who's fit and who's not fit, especially as my over indulgence on the pie front precludes me from seeing my feet any more.

I was interested, however, to discover that one of Joe Kinnear's first jobs at Luton Town, was to appoint a fitness consultant, someone who knew everything that an athlete needs to know about fitness and winning.

That man was none other than champion decathlete and super hero Daley Thompson, who once said "Competition is my life--winning is my only goal. Everything I do is directed toward that end and I will never permit anything to jeopardise it."



George Lyall

George began his career at Raith Rovers, before taking in Preston North End, Nottingham Forest and the Tigers. "I was only seventeen and still taking my A Levels when the opportunity to go to Preston came up.

"Their chief scout was a Scotsman, so they had quite a few Scottish players, which made me feel at home. I was there nearly nine years, we won the Third Division Championship in 1970/71 and I met my wife there, so it was probably the most enjoyable period of my career.

"Then, after a good season at Preston, out of the blue I was offered a move to Nottingham Forest in May 1972. I played alongside the likes of Duncan McKenzie, John Robertson, Martin O'Neill and John McGovern."

## In our own hands

They say that honesty is the best policy and skipper Justin Whittle is obviously an advocate of that saying.

Defeats against Darlington and Cheltenham have just about finished off the Tigers' hopes of a play-off place and the City skipper knows that the team's fate is now out of their own hands.

"We let ourselves down in the Darlington game and having lost at Cheltenham as well it's going to be a real struggle to get into one of those play-off spots," he said.

"All we can do now is try and win our last four games and hope that other sides around us slip up somewhere along the way.

"Obviously it's not beyond the realms of possibility but it's disappointing that we're having to rely on other people rather than ourselves.

"We shouldn't really be in this position and the most disappointing factor about last weekend was that we were well placed to beat Darlington and blew it by conceding two bad goals.

"Those three points would have made a big difference but there's nothing we can do about it now.

"With four games to go the aim has to be winning them all but that will be a big ask with the run-in that we have.

"Nevertheless we just have to get on with it and try to finish the season in as positive a fashion as possible."



## A tall order

Ryan Williams

Two defeats over the Easter Period have all but ended the Tigers' play-off hopes, although you won't find the players giving up the ghost until their fate is cast in concrete.

Ryan Williams was a disappointed man following on from the reversals against Darlington and Cheltenham and knows that he and his team mates have to come up with four wins and hope that somebody somewhere smiles on them.

It's a tall order in anybody's book and the former Chesterfield winger

admitted:

"It will be an uphill battle but you can never throw the towel in until it becomes mathematically impossible.

"We're all massively disappointed with the two results over Easter, especially losing at home.

"In the opening 20 minutes against Darlington I thought we were well on top and were getting balls into the box and creating chances.

"But we then conceded a sloppy goal. Having said that I honestly felt that we were comfortable for most of

the game and how we ended up losing I just don't know.

"We travelled to Cheltenham hoping to put things right and again our performance was quite good with plenty of effort and commitment.

"But we didn't get the result, which is the most important factor, and it was another backward step for us."

With the four games left the aim is to pick up maximum points and ensure that a season which promised so much doesn't go down in history as another when the Tigers finished in mid-table obscurity.

That is the big danger at the moment and Williams knows it.

"For us to finish where we are in the table now would be a real travesty from our point of view," he continued.

"When you think back we started the campaign like a house on fire and up until Christmas everything was going really well for us.

"But since then it's been a nightmare for one reason or another and to finish around 12th, 13th or 4th would be shocking.

"But the only people who can help to avoid that scenario are the players and it's up to us to get our heads down, work hard and try to win those four games.

"I've been asked the question as to what has gone wrong since Christmas but, like the rest of the lads, I can't put my finger on any one reason.

"If we could then there probably wouldn't be a problem in the first place. There's no doubt that the confidence within the side has suffered at times but apart from that I can't really offer any other explanation.

"Yes, there is expectation and has been all season but I wouldn't use that as an excuse.

"When you come to a club of this size that has lots of ambition you expect people to be telling you that you'll win this, that or the other.

"That's only natural and as a professional footballer you have to deal with it. With four games to go we have to go out there and win the lot.

"It won't be easy but that's the nature of the business and you just have to get on with it."

It's only a matter of time, do you want to miss it?

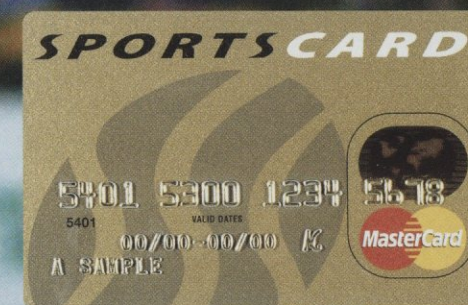

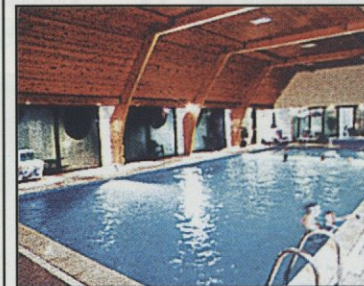

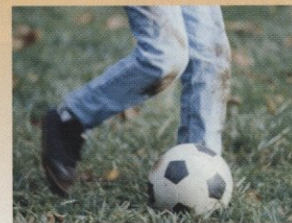

## Going West? Or North and South?

Well, Easter didn't resurrect our promotion aspirations after all. The eternal Tiger optimist in me might believe that mathematically it's still possible; but even viewed through my amber and black tinted contact lenses, the sums still add up to another season in Division Three.

And promotion's not the only thing that appears to have gone west either. As a result of the ITV Digital saga, it appears the Tigers' bank account might be looking a little on the slim side in the near future. Our chairman has publicly stated that we are better placed than most to cope with the shortfall. I've not heard similar noises coming from the chairmen of other lower division clubs

The problems between ITV Digital and the Football League cannot be dismissed lightly. The reliance of many clubs on the revenue promised by the deal is fundamental to their continued existence. ITV Digital's current place of residence is in Administration. It is a habitation in serious danger of overcrowding in the coming months as far as football is concerned.

The immediate prospects of a settlement look bleak; yet perhaps out of all the recriminations and accusations currently flying between the two parties, there may come some long-term benefit for the future of the game in this country. At last people with some influence in the Football League are starting to

consider seriously a proposal that, in my own opinion, should have happened at least 10 years ago. Better late than never.

The proposal to regionalize the bottom two divisions of the League has much to commend it. Instead of Division's Two and Three, we would have a Division Two (North) and (South). The existing Division One would remain unchanged.

It is not a new idea; in fact if the proposal becomes fact, it would merely be reverting to a structure that existed within the Football League between 1921 and 1958. There are occasions when reinventing the wheel is not as daft as it might sound. At present the only sounds coming out of many football clubs are ones of distress.

Look at the Tigers' average home attendance for games against northern clubs this season and you'll see it exceeds our overall average by at least a couple of hundred. Convert that into money and you're talking thousands of pounds - that's a powerful argument for making the switch and one that will apply to just about every club within Division's Two and Three.

The increase in revenue that such a change would bring would also be boosted by a corresponding reduction in costs. No more expensive overnight trips to places such as

Torquay and Exeter; in fact overnight stays would be almost wiped out completely.

The atmosphere at games would be much better as well. Remember City's games against York and Scunthorpe? They were a lot noisier than the encounters against Torquay and Exeter, weren't they? Luton's fans could probably provide similar examples.

Changing the structure of the League in this way could still accommodate the 'play-offs' as a means of deciding promotion issues. Champions of the Northern and Southern sections would gain automatic promotion. The next four teams in each section would then play to earn the right to be that section's representative in the play-off final. You could be even more radical and increase the number of promotion places from three to four. Perhaps that's too much change in one go?

The debate over more than one club being promoted from the Conference could be resolved as well. Two clubs from that League could be promoted, one to Division Two (North) and the other to Division Two (South). The mechanics of that process could incorporate a 'play-off' style approach if so desired.

Introducing regional football would not be without problems however. One of the biggest would probably concern the geographical location of some clubs in respect of whether they were placed in either the Northern or Southern section. It wouldn't be helped either if promoted and/or relegated teams were not geographically balanced.

The problems are not insurmountable though. The likes of Coventry, Mansfield and Port Vale have all sampled life in both Division's Three (North) and (South) during their history.

If the threat of lower division clubs going bust is to be averted, then the rational solution is for the Football League to go North and South. It makes sense.
