

A MAN sitting in front of me turned to his mate at the final whistle, shook his head and muttered: "Superb".

Of course, there's a chance he could have been talking about Alan Titchmarsh's performance on Groundforce but I'm pretty sure he was referring to the match.

After a distinctly dodgy opening, (which showed Pool's defensive lapses are still alive and well, Steve McMahon's side were simply stunning, turning in a final 20 minutes so devastatingly good it had Luton wishing they'd missed out on promotion.

All five goals were good but let's skip straight to the fourth. What a

As McMahon hinted afterwards, if Man United or Liverpool had scored it, the goal would have been fawned over by the likes of Alan Hansen and Mark Lawrenson for years to come.

The whole move - which involved about 20 passes - is too long to describe, so let's cut to Martin Bullock, on the right, spreading the ball across field to John Hills.

He linked up with Scott Taylor before delivering a perfect pass to the feet of Richie Wellens, bursting into the box.

Wellens did his trademark foot over the ball trick to take out the defender, drew the keeper and

pulled it back to Paul Dalglish who rammed the ball in from six yards to score on his home

It all happened in seconds, it was football at its best and it sent the crowd wild.

Wellens ran one way to be engulfed by the fans; a delighted Dalglish went the other to an equally rapturous recep-

A great moment ... but there were plenty of others as well.

Peter Clarke, who last scored 18 months ago in an England under-18 international, netted twice, a feat matched by substitute Scott Taylor, who responded in the best possible manner to being left out.

Taylor deserves special praise. He was probably Pool's best player in pre-season, and although he didn't have a great game at Bristol he changed the shape of last night's match.

He arrived on the pitch on 63 minutes, scored in the 64th

The perfect response in just 58 seconds

STRIKER Scott Taylor was dropped to the bench last night but he fired the ideal riposte.

The Pool striker scored two goals after coming on as a second half substitute, his first just 58 seconds after he walked onto the pitch.

"I was obviously disappointed to be left out but I didn't think I played too well on Saturday at Bristol, so perhaps that's why," he said.

"But to come on up front last night and get two goals was great.

"I could have had a hat-trick but the keeper

came out, and although I managed to dink it over him the ball unfortunately ran away.

"The support from the crowd was brilliant. Even on the bench in the first half there was no moaning and groaning when we went a goal down. They kept cheering and supporting, and that helped us turn it round.

"I'm looking forward to Swindon on Saturday and hopefully, if I'm selected, I can grab another

and was booked in the 65th – not bad going by anyone's standard.

He linked up superbly with the impressive Dalglish, took both his goals well and, with a bit more luck, could have had a hat-trick.

"I enjoyed it," the striker said, "and luckily I got a couple of goals." There was no luck about it and Taylor is now on his way to his season's target of 15.

It was a cracking night all round. The crowd was only 6,300 but the supporters were so noisy it sounded full.

Early on, though, it did threaten to go a bit pear-shaped.

Hatters striker Steve Howard top scorer in Division Three last season with 24 goals – was given an acre of space to head in Matthew Spring's corner with barely five minutes on the clock.

Pool were playing poorly at this stage and, with four new summer signings in the team, they were taking time to gel.

On 18 minutes, though, it started to come right.

A short corner (someone in front of me groaned as it was taken - he wanted it knocked in first time) was eventually whipped in by Wellens and Peter Clarke, standing six yards out, lashed it into the net. The same supporter jumped to his feet cheering.

Five minutes later, the Seasiders were in front. Wellens' corner was flicked on by Richard Walker and there was Clarke again to nod it home at the back post.

"I didn't really know what to do. It's been so long since I scored," he said.

The only worry is that on this form the on-loan Clarke, along with fellow Scouser Keith Southern, will be called back to Everton - a fear heightened by the fact that David Moyes was watching his two players have blinders from the Bloomfield Road directors box.

Moyes must have been impressed and so were the crowd. The North Stand drummer put in a performance that even Keith Moon would have admired and the fans erupted into a chorus of "Stand up if you hate Bristol" - and even though my Aunty Patsy lives there, after Saturday it's fair comment.

Pool piled on the pressure. Bullock was superb all night on the right, while Wellens was dictating things in the middle, helped by the energetic and extremely impressive Southern, reminiscent at times of Steven Gerrard.

It didn't make any difference, though, and the only surprise was that the first half ended without more goals, though Dalglish did his best, hitting the bar with a glorious 30-yard chip.

The second period was scrappy for a while but Taylor sorted things out when he produced a sublime left-shot finish with his first touch after coming on, hav-
