Luton, who had brought an amazing number of fans for the cup-tie, were in danger of being over-run by the intensity of Villa's onslaught and Joe Kinnear tried to plug the gaping holes in his midfield just before half-time manager by bringing on Alan Neilson for Peter Holmes.

Vassell's replacement by teenager Stefan Moore hardly made a difference to Villa's domination as Dublin added a third goal in the 48th minute — controlling the ball on his thigh before turning on the edge of the penalty area to despatch a right-foot shot inside the post.
