# Bogey boys keep it goin

WHAT have Wigan Athletic, Macclesfield Town and Boston United all got in common?

The answer is that they are the only clubs to boast unbeaten league records at Kenilworth Road from the 92 sides currently plying their trade in the Football League and the Premiership.

Arsenal (six times), Liver-pool (six times) and Manch-ester United (three times) have all left Luton without a point in the past, but Saturday's 1-1 draw means the Hatters have now failed in five attempts to beat Wigan in a home league fixture

And, with Macclesfield only providing the opposition at Kenilworth Road on two occasions and Boston yet to pay their first visit, Wigan can lay strong claims to being the Hat-

ters' official bogey team. Joe Kinnear's men did, however, come agonisingly close to ending the hoodoo before Latics captain Jason de Vos headed in an 88th-minute equaliser to keep his side top of the Division Two table.

Aaron Skelton had earlier given the Hatters a 24th-minute lead with his first goal in 13 months



We dominated the early stages and if we'd taken our chances we could have been three up. The keepe was their best player. He was outstanding. They pushed us back in the second-half but I'm dis pointed to give a goal away that late and in that manner.

And, when former Hatters favourite Matthew Jackson was sent off on 85 minutes, the home side looked on course to register the toughest of six

successive league victories.

Jackson was given his marching orders on 85 minutes after being shown a second yellow card for the slightest of brushes with Steve Howard on

the half-way line.
But Wigan's 10 men grabbed the point their greater possession deserved when Russell Perrett was penalised and an unmarked de Vos headed in Steve McMillan's free-kick.
The manner and timing of

the goal, however, were galling for a Hatters side that had displayed a tremendous work ethic and attitude to protect a one-goal lead against a visitors team boasting £4.75 million

worth of playing talent.

In fact, if Australian keeper
John Filan had not made two
breathtaking saves to deny
Hatters' top scorer Howard, de
Vos' late goal would have been
a mere consolation a mere consolation.

Instead, the Canadian inter-national's effort extended his

national's effort extended his side's unbeaten run to 12 matches after he profited from a rare Hatters defensive lapse.
Nathan Ellington, at £1.2 million, is the costliest of Wigan's many big-money signings and his rather grandiose nickname is "The Duke".

But it was home defenders Perrett and Chris Coyne that enjoyed majestic performances to ensure that Wigan's Duke lost this particular battle

Perrett again struggled manfully to ignore a groin

injury that saw him limping tentatively back on to the pitch at the start of the second-half.

The 29-year-old defender's handicap proved no hindrance, however, and he was the driving force, rather than a passenger, during a determined performance from the home defence.

Full-backs Emmerson Boyce

and Sol Davis also played their parts in frustrating the high-flying visitors, as did Matthew Spring, who covered every blade of grass for his side's cause and appears to be relishing the responsibility of the captain's armband.

The Hatters pinned Wigan back during the early stages of the match, with Davis making several penetrating raids down the left flank.
But it was Cedric Berthelin

who made the first save of the afternoon, instinctively keeping out Neil Roberts' volley from an acute angle.

Luton went ahead six min-utes later when Peter Holmes' deep cross to the far post was headed down by Howard and Skelton stretched out a leg to force the ball into the bottom

corner from four yards.
The visitors' response was swift with Ellington forcing a low save from Berthelin.

Tony Dinning then fired an excellent chance wide and Lee McCulloch's volley cleared a beaten Berthelin's bar by a

matter of inches.
The Hatters' French keeper produced a fine save to prevent Roberts netting from 15 yards on 41 minutes before Howard

was denied by an even better stop at the other end. Howard's stabbed shot from six yards seemed certain to double the lead before ex-Blackburn keeper Filan dived

low to his right to turn the ball behind for a corner. Berthelin then flapped at a Gary Teale cross but McCulloch hit a post instead of the unguarded goal and Filan saved a weaker Howard effort when the Hatters' forward should have done better from

eight yards.
Ellington's mishit cross nearly handed Wigan a freakish equaliser on 51 minutes when the ball bounced off Berthelin's crossbar. Seconds later, Filan pushed

Spring's bouncing shot around a post after Boyce had skipped

past two challenges during a great run down the right. Wigan continued to press for an equaliser but the Hatters defence held firm, although Dinning's 76th-minute header

Berthelin's punch only reached the edge of the box.

Jackson, who had been cautioned on seven minutes for a foul on Howard, was then harshly ordered off after a second incident involving the two players. Howard almost won the match moments later but his close-range header forced an acrobatic finger-tip sare

from Filan.

Berthelin could not produce from Filan.

Berthelin could not product the same heroics two minutes later when McMillan's quickly-taken free-kick was met by an unmarked de Vos and his downward header found the net. Howard, nor mally a crucial component in the Hatters' defensive armoury at set-pieces, was nowhere to be seen as de Vos stole in between Boyce and Holmes to earn his side a point.

Victory against a side Kimpear correctly identified as the best in the division before the best in the division before the match would have taken the Hatters to within three points of a play-off spot.

of a play-off spot.

But a draw still meant kind ear's men had only lost one of their last 11 league games and the result should end any rejidation the Hatters might have about meeting any other result in the division.
