



As our fans will know, our luck in the league is not exactly breathtaking so we could do with a rest from it, but that will change.

I was gutted for Wayne and the lads on Saturday against Chester. I can't think of many instances when Mark Westhead was troubled, or even called on to do something other than pick the ball out of the net once from Daryl Clare. DAVID BAYLISS. **BORN LIVERPOOL 8.6.76**

A horrendous illness and injury crisis, with 24 players unavailable, led to Luton making one

signings last season. Manager Joe Kinnear spent a week in November 2001 chasing players to try to plug the gaps, and discovered to his great delight that Rochdale were prepared to release their longest-serving player. Centrehalf Bayliss



jumped at the chance to join the Hatters, and played a full part in the promotion campaign that followed. An inch under six foot tall, he had been at Spotland since he was a trainee, and made over 200 first-team appearances for Rochdale before deciding not to accept a new contract with them

Luton record to the start of this season: 18 appearances

EMMERSON BOYCE. BORN AYLESBURY, 24.9.79

One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS boy in the summer of 1995, and made the breakthrough to the League squad at the age of 19 midway through the 1999/2000 season after occasional appearances following a debut in the Auto Windscreens Shield in January 1999. He became a regular at right back, with a liking to attack on the overlap, and signed a new contract in the summer of

Luton record to the start of this season: 124 appearances, 4 goals.

Luton Town

AHMET BRKOVIC. **BORN DUBROVNIK, CROATIA, 23.9.74**

Believing a move would be good for his career, the midfield playmaker refused new terms at Leyton Orient in the summer of 2001, to join Luton on a Bosman free transfer. Orient had signed him on a free from HNK Dubrovnik in the autumn of 1999, and he became a regular in their league squad. He was bitterly disappointed when they failed in the play-offs to win promotion to the Second Division, and decided he might have a better chance if he joined Luton. He was right, playing a valuable role, mainly on the right flank, to help Luton return to the Second Division at the first attempt. Luton record to the start of this season: 22 appearances, 2 goals.

CHRIS COYNE **BORN BRISBANE, 20.12.78**


The centre-half was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he was selected for the Australian under-17 squad for the 1994 youth World Cup, and came to the notice of Harry Redknapp, then manager of West Ham. Coyne signed for the Hammers as a teenager, but Premiership chances were few and far between, and after loan spells at Brentford and Southend, Coyne went to Dundee. A £50,000 cheque persuaded the Scottish Premier League club to let the defender move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001 and Coyne rapidly became a crowd favourite in the promotion run that

Luton record to the start of this season: 31 appearances, 3 goals.

DEAN CROWE.

BORN STOCKPORT, 6.6.79 The striker was signed on loan from Stoke

City in September 2001 when an injury crisis decimated the Hatters squad. He made an immediate impact, scoring on his debut, at Plymouth, and was soon signed on a permanent deal. His goals helped Luton win pro-



BORN CHELTENHAM, 4.9.79

It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when the highly-rated defender decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of last season. Swindon boss Andy King failed in attempts to persuade him to sign a new deal, and Luton manager Joe Kinnear nipped in to add the tough-tackling left back to his squad. Davis had joined Swindon as a trainee in the summer of 1998, and made rapid progress through the youth and reserve teams to become a regular in the Nationwide League.

CARL EMBERSON. **BORN EPSOM, 13.7.73** Wanting com-

petition for the first team goalkeeper's spot. loe Kinnear signed Emberson in the summer of 2001. Ironically, Plymouth, who went on to edge Luton out of the Third Division championship a few months later. were also inter-



ested in a player who chose to leave Walsall under the Bosman ruling. His career began at Millwall as a trainee, but he made his

ADRIAN FORBES. **BORN EALING 23.1.79**

After considerable First Division experience, and with an England youth cap to his credit, Forbes was a surprise inclusion on Norwich City's list of players available for transfer in the summer of 2001, and Luton boss Joe Kinnear was delighted to pay £75,000 for a right winger to add width to his attacking formation. Forbes is noted for his ability to run at and past defenders, either to deliver crosses from out wide, or to cut in and have a crack at goal. He had been at Carrow Road for four years, starting as a trainee, before his move to Kenilworth Road. Luton record to the start of this season: 42 appearances, 5 goals.

ANDREW FOTIADIS. **BORN HITCHIN, 6,9,77.**

A local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before being a full-time soccer professional. He won England Schools caps at under-15 and under-18 level, and developed into an old-fashioned centre-forward, with good physique and power. But injuries and fierce competition for places restricted him to only one first team start last season, in the LDV Vans Trophy at Dagenham

Luton record to the start of this season: 123 appearances, 14 goals.

CARL GRIFFITHS. **BORN WELSHPOOL, 15,7,71**

An impressive scoring record - a goal in every 2.5 starts for seven previous clubs led to the striker becoming a major target for Luton after their relegation from the Second Division in 2001. They got their man from Leyton Orient for £65,000, but he suffered a broken leg soon afterwards and missed most of the promotion season after a highly promising start. His earlier moves had totted up to well over £1 million, after starting as a trainee at Shrewsbury. His other clubs were Manchester City, Portsmouth, Peterborough, Leyton Orient, Wrexham, Port Vale and back to Orient for a second

Luton record to the start of this season: 11 appearances, 7 goals.

IAN HILLIER. BORN NEATH, 26.12.79 No-one was

more surprised than the Welsh under-21 international himself



his league debut for Luton in the second game of last season. The day before he was training with Spurs, where he was captain of the reserves, but a crop of injuries at Luton led to Joe Kinnear taking the young right back on loan, and Hillier settled in so quickly that Luton soon decided to buy him for a bargain £30,000 fee and he became a regular squad member.

Luton record to the start of this season: 24 appearances, I goal.

PETER HOLMES.

BORN BISHOP AUCKLAND, 18.11.80 A midfielder who once seemed destined for soccer stardom - he is a product of the FA School of Excellence, from the same year as Michael Owen - Holmes has had to fight to stay in pro football.. Sheffield Wednesday were his first club, but their relegation from the Premiership in May 2000 left them desperate to cut the pay-roll and he joined Luton for a nominal fee. He was on the fringe of Luton's promotion squad last season, and is hoping to establish himself in this

Luton record to the start of this season: 32 appearances, 2 goals.

STEVE HOWARD. **BORN DURHAM, 10.5.76**

Joe Kinnear swooped on deadline day in March 2001 to prise the tall striker away from Northampton for £50,000, and the deal looks a bigger bargain with every game. Howard had cost the Cobblers a then record club fee of £120,000 when they recruited him from Hartlepool two years previously. He helped Northampton win promotion to Division Two, and they grudgingly accepted a third of their asking price for a player who would have left for nothing soon afterwards under the Bosman ruling. Howard exploded into action in his first full season with Luton, and his 24 goals made him the Third Division's top league marksman, and played a major part in Luton's drive

BORN HAMMERSMITH 19.4.76 A promising career that began at Chelsea

was cruelly interrupted after the gifted midfielder earned the admiration of, among others, Joe Kinnear and Glenn Hoddle, the former England boss. Hughes worked his way up at Stamford Bridge from trainee to Premiership, learning his trade under Hoddle's management, and gained experience on loan to Stockport, Norwich and Crewe. When Hoddle became manager of Southampton he soon recruited Hughes, but a serious groin injury put the midfielder out of football for nine months.

Southampton, by then under new management, made him available for transfer, and he joined Luton just before last season kicked off.Luton record to the start of this season: 23 appearances, 3 goals.

JOHNSON. BORN WEMBLEY. 29,10,68

player at Kenilworth Road, Johnson is probably the most popular member of the Kenilworth Road staff with his colleagues and fans alike, but he



knows that his first team chances are likely to be limited this season as younger men make an impact. Always cheerful, even when recovering from injury setbacks, the defender is in his 15th season as a first-team regular at Luton, his only club, having been on the books since he was schoolboy. He is the only member of the staff to have appeared in all four divisions for Luton - he made his debut at Goodison Park in 1988 in the old First Division, now the Premiership. He signed yet another contract in the summer, but has also gained coaching qualifications which will be put to use part-time with Luton's youth

Luton record to the start of this season: 437 appearances, 10 goals,

ALAN KIMBLE **BORN DAGENHAM, 6.8.66**

When Luton won promotion last season, Joe Kinnear felt that he needed more experience in his squad to help his young side cope with the Second Division. He knew exactly what he was getting when he signed defender Kimble, because the two had been manager and player together at Wimbledon for most of the 1990s. Now they have teamed up again after the Dons released Kimble last summer. The had received sterling service from him after recruiting him from Cambridge United for £175,000 in the summer of 1993. Charlton had missed out on a bargain: they had Kimble as a trainee, but after only six league appearances he was allowed to leave to join Cambridge on a free transfer in 1986.


LEE MANSELL. **BORN GLOUCESTER 23.9.82**

The young midfielder is hoping to make the permanent breakthrough into Luton's first team this season, after making a dramatic surprise debut. Because of injury absences, he had to make the transition straight from the youth squad





Luton team roundup continued

to the first team in January 2001, and was just 58 seconds into his debut against Queens Park Rangers, in an FA Cup third round replay, when he scored. Luton had looked after him since he was an II-yearold, and signed him as soon as he left school. His dramatic emergence at Loftus Road led to him being rewarded with a full professional contract, but he went into this season still fighting against stiff competition for a permanent place in Luton's midfield. Luton record to the start of the season: 32 appearances, 7 goals.

ALAN NEILSON. **BORN WEGBURG, GERMANY, 26.09.72**

WITH Luton's promotion bid going well in February 2002, Joe Kinnear felt it was the right time to boost his squad for the run-in, and defender Neilson, a former Welsh international, was signed on a free transfer after being released by Grimsby as part of a costcutting exercise. He brought with him plenty of top football experience. His international career began with appearances for Wales at youth and under-21 level, followed by five full caps, and he enjoyed a good career in the Premiership, with his first club Newcastle and then with Southampton and Fulham, and established himself at right back for Luton in the closing stages of last season. Luton record to the start of this season: 8

KEVIN NICHOLLS. **BORN NEWHAM, 2,1,79**

The tough-tackling midfielder began his career as a trainee at Charlton and quickly made an impact after skippering England youth teams at under-18, under-19 and under-20 levels. At the time Joe Kinnear, now manager of Luton, was in charge of Wimbledon, and made a note of the young Nicholls, and just before last season started he was surprised - and well pleased - to hear that Nicholls was available for transfer. Charlton had sold him for £250,000 to Wigan in the summer of 1999, but the move did not work out, and Luton's offer of £150,000 led to him moving to Kenilworth Road. He quickly became team captain, and his huge enthusiasm and ferocious tackling soon made him a big favourite with Luton fans, although opponents did not always view his all-action style with similar relish. Luton record to the start of this season: 43 appearances, 6 goals.

MARK OVENDALE. **BORN LEICESTER, 22.11.73**

The arrival of a new board of directors at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2000 enabled Luton to break a depressing pattern set over the previous three years. Then, with continuing financial problems, including a spell in receivership, Luton had been great sellers of players, and very rarely buyers. That changed when Mike Watson-Challis

became the chairman, and made cash available to secure goalkeeper Ovendale from Bournemouth for £425,000, a Luton record fee for a goalkeeper. He was previously with Wisbech, Northampton and Barry Town. Last season he was one of two capable goalkeepers fighting for the keeper's jersey, competing with Carl Emberson. Each had spells in the team, knowing the other was always waiting to displace him. Luton record to the start of the season: 47

RUSSELL PERRETT.

BORN BARTON ON SEA, 18.5.73 Having helped Cardiff City win promotion to the Second Division in May 2001, the big central defender was the victim of a huge recruitment drive at Ninian Park and Perrett knew his first team future at Cardiff might be limited. Luton boss Joe Kinnear had a longstanding friendship with Cardiff owner Sam Hammam, from the time when they were manager and owner at Wimbledon, and Hammam allowed Perrett to join Luton a few days before last season began. It proved to be a shrewd acquisition, with Perrett an automatic choice in the promotion-winning team, losing his place only when injuries and a suspension intervened. His career had begun with non-league Lymington before he went to neighbouring Portsmouth in 1995 and then to Cardiff four years later. Luton record to the start of this season: 41 appearances, 3 goals

STEVE ROBINSON.

BORN LISBURN, 10.12.74 Having rebuilt his side to win promotion from the Third Division, manager Joe Kinnear knew that an even stronger squad was needed for this season's challenge, and one of his first summer signings was mid-fielder Robinson, for £50,000 from Preston North End. Capped five times by Northern Ireland, the attacking midfielder had made his name at Bournemouth after joining the Cherries on a free transfer from Spurs, where he had been a trainee. He hit 60 goals in 286 appearance for Bournemouth, an enviable strike rate from midfield, and Preston paid £375,000 for him. But he failed to make the same impact in two years at Deepdale, and jumped at the chance to get his career moving again when Luton came in

AARON SKELTON. **BORN WELWYN, 22.11.74**

It was a case of going "back home" when the defender, born a few miles from Luton, signed for the Hatters for the second time in July 2000. He had joined the club as a schoolboy, and worked his way up through the ranks to be on the fringe of the league team when he was 19. But a succession of injuries sidelined him for long periods and a change of club, on a free transfer to

Colchester in the summer of 1997, brought a much-needed change of luck and Skelton rapidly became a big favourite at Layer Road. His contract there expired in the summer of 2001, and although Colchester wanted him to sign a new deal, the invitation to move back to his first club, on a Bosman, was too good to turn down. Luton record (current spell) to the start of

MATTHEW SPRING. **BORN HARLOW, 17,11,79.**

this season: 23 appearances, I goal

There was relief all round when the competitive midfielder accepted a new contract at Kenilworth Road at the end of last season. Spring has been at Luton since he was a schoolboy, and was a driving force in the side which reached the FA Youth Cup semi-finals in 1997. After a league debut when still only 17, he soon became a regular in Luton's Second Division team, and his first 100 appearances were clocked up while he was only 20. He was influential in the Luton team that won promotion last season, and manager Joe Kinnear's determination to guide Luton to a second successive step up helped to persuade Spring to remain at his only club, rather than insist on leaving under freedom of contract

Luton record to the start of this season: 213 appearances, 21 goals.

TONY THORPE.

BORN LEICESTER, 10.4.74

It was a case of "coming home" for the striker when he joined Luton as a Bosman free transfer in the summer - it was the fourth time he had signed for the Hatters! He was 18 in 1992 when Leicester declined to sign him at the end of his traineeship at Filbert Street. But David Pleat, previously at Leicester, and by then Luton manager, knew that Thorpe had potential, and gave him a chance at Luton. Thorpe was a spectacular success, particularly when Pleat switched him from midfield to the front. Nimble footwork and an instinctive eye for goal made Thorpe a hot property - he netted 31 times in 1996/97, the first time anyone had done that for Luton since the days of Malcolm Macdonald 25 years earlier. At the time Luton were very much a selling club, and they cashed in when Fulham offered £850,000 in February 1998. A £1million move to Bristol City followed four months later, but in his early days at Ashton Gate management changes left the striker unsure of his future. He returned to Luton twice in 1999 on loan deals, but a permanent move could not be sorted out, until, in the summer of 2002, Thorpe became a free agent, and could hardly wait to get back to his old pals at Kenilworth Road. They will be delighted if he can reproduce the strike rate of his first spell at Luton - 60 goals in 144 games.

Trotty doubtful for tonight

Saturday October 26th 2002 will remain in the memory of the writer for many reasons not least Cup competitions! Firstly, on route to Grays, via Harlow, to pick up a fellow season ticket holder the news came through of the LDV Trophy draw...a surprise for more than one reason. I thought the draw was noon and the time was I I am, so the Talk Sport presenter advising me that the draw had already taken place was a surprise and the fact that the draw Wayne had wanted - against his old club, Luton Town had been picked, with Boro gaining the home advantage - a total shock for some reason!

Fortified by a couple of swift half's in the Grays Sports and Social club, I witnessed a desperate start to the tie with Boro conceding a goal in the opening 5 minutes. How, I would have swapped the LDV tie against near neighbours Luton Town for victory at this point of the afternoon. Goals from Trotty and Jackson secured safe passage to the 1st round proper, £20,000 for the club in the process and also allowed me to look forward to the second cup draw of the day.

Radio tuned into 5 live and the time ticked around to 5.15 pm -draw time. The presenter announced, much to the annoyance of the packed car, that "due to the number of clubs involved in the FA Cup 1st round draw, that they would not be carrying the proceedings live but would give a complete run down once complete, as there was so much more important things to discuss" - what a let

What seemed like hours, but probably a matter of 15 minutes later, the full draw was read by the seeming bored presenter..."Stevenage Boro or Grays Athletic versus Hastings United or Kettering Town" - Surely I was just driving away from Grays with an away victory?? - No live draw and the BBC still get it wrong!

Replay night at Rockingham Road and I desperately wanted Hastings United to get the result for two reasons. Firstly I didn't fancy a derby game against a fellow Conference struggler and the memories

of losing to Kettering in last years 4th qualifying round replay were still too fresh. What I didn't expect though was the 5-0 score line in favour of Hastings

Hastings United, The F A Cup and The 2002/2003 season so far...

Saturdays game will represent Hastings 5th game in this years competition. In the 2nd qualifying round they were drawn at home against Selsey, running out 4 -1 winners in front of a 400 crowd. The 3rd qualifying round was also at home against Hendon, with a closer affair resulting in a 2-1 win for United in front of a 795 crowd. As Boro were overcoming Grays in the 4th qualifying round, Hastings were earning a 0-0 home draw against Kettering Town, in front of a bumper 1,538 home crowd. The replay in front of 1,144 will go down in Hastings history and sets United up for the away tie at Broadhall Way.

Hastings currently stands 7th in the Dr Martens Premier Division, having collected 24 points from 14 games (W 7,D3, L4). Included in their victories are two against former Conference teams, Hednesford United and Welling United. 2-0 and 3-0 respectively.

Stevenage Borough 0: I Chester City

Boro went down by a single goal at home to Chester City in a match that was almost a mini summary of the season so far, but which nonetheless sees their inexorable slide to the foot of the Conference continuing. With absences due to injury and suspension continuing to restrict Wayne Turner's hand, there was a debut for Gary MacDonald in a back three as Boro lined up in 3-5-2 formation.

It was the home side that threatened the goal in the first minute. Boro had won a corner after Kirk Jackson had pressurised the defence in the right corner. Michael Blackwood's corner was an in-swinger and Robin Trott looped a header onto the top of the bar after Wayne Brown had decided it would not threaten the net.

Then with only 5 minutes on the clock Richard Howell, again Boro's best player, had a shot deflected wide after Louis Riddle and Blackwood combined on the left. The visitors broke free from the resulting corner and in fact were two against one as they hit the Boro half at speed but the move broke down in one of those comedy moments as Ryan Sugden was tripped by his team mate.

Ex-Woking player Ion Brady put the home team under pressure with a first time cross that MacDonald did well to clear for a corner. Thereafter Boro had muchof the play. Kirk Jackson volleyed over after Richard Pacquette knocked the ball into his path. Pacquette had a header well saved by Brown after a Jude Stirling cross. Then MacDonald, in an impressive debut, won a tackle from which Howell made a lovely turn to set Riddle on a charge towards the box only to shoot well wide from 25 yards or so.

For Chester, Scott Guyett headed an

effort wide off the post and Daryl Clare was able to break after Stirling was caught in possession, but Boro continued to have most of the ball. For all their possession though, Chester were fairly comfortable in defence. Much of Boro's strategy seemed to revolve around Stirling's long throws, and with many of the crosses and corners being to the far post or deeper, Boro really missed the presence of Jamie Campbell in the box.

With the break approaching Stuart Fraser struck a free kick wide of the post, then disaster! Boro had one moment when the defence all seemed to go to sleep at once allowing Clare to dance unchallenged into the area before hitting the net despite Mark Westhead's best effort. Chester were one up and it was a lead that they scarcely deserved.

The second half pretty much followed the pattern of the first. Riddle made an early cross but it was too deep and Stirling was unable to control his header. Clare made a dangerous cross after Westhead miscued a clearance but the chance was wasted, then Guyett headed wide from a

Boro pressed again. Howell made a lovely turn and pass before receiving the ball back on the right side of the box. He fizzed the ball across the face of goal and Riddle arrived at the far corner of the box but fired over. Then Simon Travis, who was beginning to cause more problems down the right, fed the ball into Blackwood who's shot forced Brown to

Turner threw on Jack Midson and Jean-Michel Sigere in a bid to change things but it was Pacquette who immediately had a couple of chances to level the scores. First his shot on the turn was deflected for a corner, and then he got on the end

of a Fraser cross but headed over.

With time running out Howell had a shot deflected. The ball swerved viciously but somehow Brown was able to beat it out for a corner. From the corner Boro managed another shot on goal but it crashed back off Chris Tate and that was to be the last chance of the game.

Brown was booked for time wasting as the clock ran down, but Boro would have few grounds for complaints about that as each of Stirling's long throws must have wasted 30 seconds. With the Chester back line soaking them up reasonably comfortably it was difficult to see why the tactic was used with such persistence. There were occasions when Boro desperately needed to get the game moving with a quick throw.

It is difficult to know what else to say. Phil Wallace challenged the players to show they are better than the league table suggests, and one of the sports papers today suggested Boro were looking like a Ryman outfit. On today's showing that looks harsh (Chester are now second after all). Yet the fact remains that Boro







The visitors extended their unbeaten run to five games, despite falling behind to a stunning free-kick from Michael McIndoe and a Mark Smith own goal. Junior McDougald netted from the penalty spot to give Dagenham hope, and a late Gary Fletcher strike sealed a spirited comeback. Yeovil took the lead in the 15th minute when Daggers midfielder Paul Bruce hacked down Nick Crittenden 25 yards out. McIndoe stepped up to curl the ball into the top corner for his fourth goal of the season. The second half burst into life in the 54th minute when Yeovil, who were unbeaten at home going into the game, extended their advantage. Crittenden's cross flashed across the area and was inadvertently turned into his own net by the unfortunate Smith. But Garry Hill's side reduced arrears just three minutes later as Pluck brought down Fletcher in the box. McDougald smashed the spot-kick high into the net for his fourth of the campaign. The goal sparked fresh life into Daggers, and they began to look dangerous going forward. Their efforts were eventually rewarded with 10 minutes remaining as Fletcher struck a low drive past Chris Weale to earn a well-deserved share of the spoils.

Steve Soley and Peter Thomson scored to maintain Southport's promotion challenge at Hereford United's Edgar Street. The hosts created an opportunity after 15 minutes but Paul Parry's header from Matthew Clarke's cross was saved by Kevin Welsby. Michael Galloway,

who extended his loan spell with the Bulls earlier this week, then drilled a left-foot shot wide from 25 yards before Chukkie Eribenne hit the woodwork for Hereford with a right-foot shot after 29 minutes. Parry went close twice in quick succession as Southport continued to be put under pressure and Chris Lane was booked for a foul on Michael Rose after 35 minutes. Eribenne and Ian Wright both threatened again for Hereford before Welsby saved Parry's rightfoot shot from the edge of the area. The second period began in similar fashion, with Hereford dominating, and Eribenne had a curling rightfoot shot saved by Welsby after 48 minutes. However, completely against the run of play, Southport went ahead through Steve Soley a minute later when he prodded the ball home following a corner. The Shaymen were on top and loan star Ryan Mallon tested Rovers keeper from 20 yards moments later. Halifax boss Chris Wilder had completed a double swoop on Friday, signing Shaun Garnett, formerly on loan from Oldham, and Kevin Sandwith from Doncaster Rovers, and the pair looked comfortable in defence. So much so that it took the hosts 42 minutes to register a shot at goal, with Alex Meechan's 25-yard effort going wide. Rovers' cause was not helped when influential former Sunderland midfielder Gary Owers went off injured after 72 minutes and Mallon hit the second 10 minutes from the end. 
