HATTERS GRAB ATEW GTOP

IF YOU don't create chances, you don't win

Tranmere are a more cultured football team than Joe Kinnear's battlers from Luton.

But they deserved to lose to the Hatters 3-1 this afternoon, despite leading for more than half the match, because they created virtually nothing in the way of

By contrast, Luton's more combative, direct style ensured they fought their way back into the game after falling behind to Gareth Roberts' 23rd minute goal.

The majority of their chances came from set-pieces. But the goals which turned the game on its head, netted by Matt Spring, Ahmet Brkovic and Steve Howard in the final half hour, were all quality finishes from chances carved in open play.

It was a harsh lesson for Rovers but they can have no complaints with the outcome.

A month ago Stuart Barlow would have probably shied

away from the responsibility of taking a penalty. But in the last few weeks he has rediscovered his

scoring touch and his confidence has come flooding

And so when Luton's Kevin Nicholls handed Rovers a spot kick by inexplicably fisting the ball away as he challenged with Marvin Robinson for a long throw from Gareth Roberts, it was Barlow who stepped forward and claimed the responsibility of taking the penalty.

He brushed aside Shane Nicholson, who had expected to take the kick, and promptly saw his well placed right-foot effort brilliantly parried by Cedric Berthelin in the Hatters' goal.

The Frenchman, who is on loan from Lens, even managed to push away the rebound from Robinson as he lay

But he could do nothing to stop the third goalbound effort in quick succession flying beyond him and into

The scorer was Gareth Roberts, who celebrated in his now customary manner by wheeling away and ripping off his shirt.

That goal came on 22 minutes. Before then the lack of eye-catching action on the pitch meant many fans were left to discuss the events of the morning in the Prento-

It was there that the Tranmere & Wirral Supporters Trust held their first AGM. The meeting was dominated by the proposal to forge a partnership with local charity Weston Spirit in a bid to buy Tranmere.

Not surprisingly, the received partnership unanimous support from the Trust members, who were urged to press ahead with the audacious bid by former FA Chief Executive and keen Luton fan Graham Kelly.

Kelly was in tune with Tranmere's fans during that meeting. He probably wasn't quite so like-


minded after 3pm. The Luton side he follows are a fiercely competitive outfit. They produce some thunderous very difficult for their opponents.

Former Wimbledon midfielder Alan Kimble was introduced by Luton boss Joe Kinnear 10 minutes

into the second period, replacing defender Sol Davis as the Hatters went in search of the equaliser.

But while the chances kept coming along for Luton from set-pieces, Tranmere seemed comfortable in their position of dominance.

Urged on by an increasingly edgy home crowd, Rovers came close to adding to their lead in the 65th minute. A cross from the left by Nicholson was headed down towards the front post by Barlow but it was just too far in front of Robinson, who failed to reach the ball as he stretched towards the by-line.

Moments later at the other end and Rovers were again under threat from

a Luton set-piece. This time it was a well-struck freekick from Kimble which skipped wide of the post from 25 yards.

When the equaliser did arrive in the

69th minute it was something of a shock in that it came from open play.

A Steve Robinson cross from the right was turned into the path of Steve Howard by Matt Spring.

The striker's shot on the turn from a tight angle was scuffed but had enough pace on it to beat Achterberg.

Christian Edwards dashed back in an attempt to clear off the line but failed as he tumbled across the line.

Barlow was sacrificed with 16 minutes left and replaced by Australian striker Iain Hume.

The departure of the veteran forward was not well received by the Rovers fans in the Bebington Kop, who chanted "You don't know what you're doing," and as the game entered the latter stages Tranmere's lack of cutting edge ensured it was Kinnear's men who looked the more likely to grab the winner.

And they put themselves in a position to do just that when Ahmet Brkovic made the most of the acres of space afforded him down the centre of the pitch by curling a shot beyond Achterberg from 20 yards in the 79th minute.

The chance was handed to him on a plate by the lively Thorpe, who played the ball into Brkovic's path following a fine run down the right.

James Olsen came on for Danny Harrison with seven minutes remaining. The third goal came two minutes from time when Steve Howard lashed the ball beyond Achterberg from the tightest of angles on the right edge of the area.
