

Decisions can change matches and that was certainly the case on Tuesday and people know how I felt about some of them but at the end of match I was pleased with what we saw from the players.



After an excellent away win last Saturday, Tuesday night was doubly disappointing not just because of our defeat after such a promising start but because we must now cope without even more first team players due to injuries and suspension.

Simon Haworth now joins Sean Connelly, Jason Price, Andy Parkinson and Alan Navarro on the injured list and Mickey Mellon, John Achterberg and Christian

Obviously all clubs face similar problems from time to time but we seem to have been spending in line with income. But surely hit with more than our fair share of restrictions on team selection so far this

As a result, the players have barely had a chance to settle as a team. Injuries and suspensions have forced the Manager to chop and change almost match by match. We haven't had the benefit of stability. So far 30 players have been involved in our campaign this season - compared to 24 at Oldham and 18 at Cardiff and Wigan.

Ray Mathias has the Board's support to make new signings - both permanent and temporary - but inevitably they will mean even more change.

Much of Ray and Ned's time has been spent trying to find short term replacements for injured and suspended players. Thankfully we have the resources to make this possible. Next season, however, new regulations proposed by The Football League could prevent us bolstering the squad in this way. You may have read that The Football League Executive have asked chairmen to give their approval, in principle, to a players' salary cap mechanism to be implemented next year based on 50 percent of a club's "relevant income". Our players'

costs (ie. wages, bonuses, signing on fees, etc) already represent a far higher percentage than this so we would be forced to cut the players' wage bill by the start of next season. Failure to cut wages by the required amount would mean a very hefty fine for every pound spent on players' wages in excess of the prescribed limit. Players' wages certainly did get out of

control at many clubs in the 1990's and the Edwards all face suspension during the next collapse of the ITV Digital deal has caused all Football League clubs to re-consider their whole cost base and attempt to bring this is just common sense - normal business practice in any other industry. Surely those running football clubs shouldn't need to be told how much they can or cannot spend on players' wages.

> Clearly some Boards struggle to control their club's finances and some feel they need a mechanism to hide behind in order to cut the amount spent on players' wages without incurring the wrath of supporters. A mechanism enshrined in Football League regulations would stop many directors being put under pressure from coaching staff, supporters and the media to invest in the squad. The rules simply would not allow the directors of a club like Tranmere Rovers to spend any more on players' wages. In fact, we would be forced to make a significant cut in the wage bill before the start of next season.

> The proposed mechanism will be costly and difficult (perhaps impossible) to monitor and will damage clubs at all levels. Those at the top of the First Division will be badly prepared for survival in the Premiership and those with lower income levels will be held back.

A mechanism based on a percentage of

income will only increase the gap between small and large clubs. Those with more revenue - perhaps because they are in city centres or let their ground to other clubs or have more non-footballing revenue - will be able to attract the better players and afford bigger squads. If the proposed regulations are implemented it would mean that at times when many players cannot be involved due to injury or suspension - as we have faced this season - it would not be possible to bolster the squad if the extra spending takes the players' costs above the set limit. The proposal is not only unfair on clubs and supporters but obviously on players themselves. I hope it is rejected but, at present, it seems likely it will be approved. That means, if we are to compete with bigger Football League clubs, it is essential we generate significant new sources of non footballing revenue. The review we are conducting at the moment of options for redevelopment of Prenton Park * ... or alternative sites could not be more

On Monday Tony Adams and I met with members of the Club and Liaison Support Group. Many interesting issues were raised relating to the whole matchday experience, the programme, Club marketing and profile. I know the members would welcome feedback on the ideas discussed. They will be available in Aldo's on Monday evening at 7.00 pm.

Finally, I hope you will join me in welcoming the Directors, Manager, players and supporters from Luton Town to Prenton Park this afternoon.


The delight of winning promotion last season was just one more chapter in a series of ups and downs that Luton Town have experienced in their history.

They have enjoyed life at the very top, and suffered the indignity of twice tumbling all the way from the highest division to the lowest. Now, with a new board at the helm and manager Joe Kinnear instilling a never say die spirit within the playing staff, they hope to be on their way back, after finishing runners up to Plymouth Argyle in division three last season.

The club have had to cope with all sorts of difficulties in the last few years, including almost going out of existence when they were in receivership in the summer of 1999.

They survived however, and a year later former director, and long serving fan of the Hatters, Mike Watson-Challis returned as Owner and Chairman with the promise of better things to come.

He and his colleagues on the board made an inspired choice when they decided to appoint the respected and highly experienced Joe Kinnear as manager in February 2001. It was too late to prevent relegation to division three, which had unfortunately been on the cards since the



early days of the season, but on the day of relegation, the first time he had ever experienced relegation in his career, Kinnear promised the Kenilworth Road faithful 'We'll be promoted in 12 months time...' Brave words, but Joe kept his promise to make it as brief a stay as possible in division three with a promotion run of 30 league wins, 12 coming consecutively and 15 of those away from home.


This season has been a steep learning curve for Kinnears charges, and like us they are slowly beginning to adjust to life in division two. A good run of form though has seen them within touching distance of a play off spot, and indeed it could be these two teams who form part of the play off drama come April/May.

We take a look at the Hatters of Kenilworth Road:

Goalkeepers.

MARK OVENDALE(1). The arrival of a new board of directors enabled Luton to break an all too familiar pattern set over the last few seasons of having to sell their best players, and not replacing. Ovendale was signed in 2000 from Bournemouth for a club record fee for a goalkeeper of £425,000. Last season he was one of two very capable keepers fighting for the jersey, although this season he has fallen out of favour.

CARL EMBERSON(16). Wanting competition for the first team goalkeeper's shirt, Kinnear signed Emberson in the summer of 2001. Ironically, Plymouth, who went on to edge Luton out of the third division championship a few months later were also interested in the keeper who chose to leave Walsall under a Bosman

CEDRIC BERTHELIN(). Signed on a month's loan from French side Lens, Berthelin has been ever present since, keeping three clean sheets in the process. Kinnear is looking to keep the stopper until the end of the season.

Defenders.

EMERSON BOYCE(17). One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS in 1995, and became a regular in the first team midway through season 99/00.

ALAN NEILSON(3). Former Welsh international Neilson was signed on a free from Grimsby in February of this year. A vastly experienced defender, he has played at the highest level for Newcastle, Southampton and Fulham, as well as winning Welsh caps at youth, u-21 and full levels.

CHRIS COYNE(12). The centre half was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he was selected for the Australian under 17 squad for the 1994 youth world cup, and came to the notice of then West ham manager Harry Redknapp. Coyne signed for the Hammers as a teenager, but premiership chances were few and far between, and

after loan spells at Brentford and Southend, Coyne went to Dundee. Luton then signed the defender for £50,000 in 2001, and quickly became a crowd favourite.

SOL DAVIS(24). It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton Town, when the highly rated defender decided to leave the County ground after his contract expired at the end of last season. Although a new deal was on the table for him at Swindon, Sol decided to move across country and join Kinnears Hatters, and the tough tackling left back has impressed ever since.

IAN HILLIER(23). No-one was more surprised than the Welsh under 21 international himself when he made his league debut for Luton in the second game of last season. The day before he had been training with Spurs, where he was captain of the reserves, but a crop of injuries at Luton led to Joe Kinnear taking the right back on loan, and Hillier settled in so quickly that Luton soon decided to buy him for a bargain £30,000 fee and he has become a regular squad member.

Midfielders.

MATTHEW SPRING(4). Spring has been at Luton since he was a schoolboy, and was the driving force behind the side that reached the FA Youth cup semi finals in 1997. After a league debut when still only 17, he soon became a regular in Luton's side, and his first 100 appearances were clocked up whilst still only 20.

KEVIN NICHOLLS(8). The tough tackling midfielder began his career as a trainee at Charlton and quickly made an impact skippering the England under 18, under 19 and under 20 sides. Kinnear signed him after a spell at Wigan fell sour and he has since become team captain. A ferocious tackler with bags of 'enthusiasm', Nicholls is always at the mercy of the officials and opposition alike.

STEVE ROBINSON(11). Having rebuilt his side to win promotion from division three, Joe Kinnear knew that an even stronger squad was needed for this season, and one of his first signing of this summer was midfielder Steve Robinson, for £50,000 from Preston. Capped five times by Northern Ireland, the attacking midfielder made his name at Bournemouth. He hit 60 goals in 286 appearances for the Cherries before Preston paid £375,000 to take him to Deepdale. AHMET BRKOVIC(18). The Croatian midfielder joined Luton in the summer of 2001 on a free from Leyton Orient. Bitterly disappointed at missing out on promotion

with the 'O's, the former HNK Dubrovnic player finally won promotion with Luton and is starting to make an impact at a higher level

PETER HOLMES(20). A midfielder who was once destined for stardom, he is a product of the FA school of excellence, from the same year as Michael Owen Holmes has had a fight to stay in pro football. He was on the fringe of Luton's promotion squad last season and is hoping to establish himself this campaign.

PAUL HUGHES(21). A promising career that began at Chelsea under the watchful eye of Glen Hoddle, Hughes worked his way up at Stamford Bridge from youth to premiership. When Hoddle moved to Southampton, Hughes followed until a serious groin injury sidelined him for nine months. He signed for Luton just before the season kicked off.

Strikers

TONY THORPE(9). It was a case of coming home for the striker when he joined Luton for the Fourth! Time this summer from Bristol City, Spells at Leicester, Fulham and Bristol City have been interspersed with various spells at Luton, which has seen the striker net 60 goals in just 144 games. STEVE HOWARD(19). Joe Kinnear swooped on deadline day March 2001 to sign the tall striker from Northampton for £50,000, and the deal looks a bigger bargain with each game. Last season he netted 24 times to top the third division scoring charts and earn him the Hatter's fans player of the year. ANDREW FOTIADIS(14). A local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school and gain GCSE and A-levels before becoming a pro footballer. He won England caps at under 15 and under 18 level and has developed into an old fashioned centre forward, with good physique and power. Injuries and fierce competition for places have kept his chances limited however.

Other players in the Luton squad include former Cardiff City centre half Russell Perrett who is out with a groin strain at the moment, and former Norwich City winger Adrian Forbes.

We cannot finish without mentioning Luton Towns longest serving player, Marvin Johnson. In his 15th season as a first team regular at Luton, he is the only member of the staff to have played for Luton in all four divisions, making his debut at Goodison Park in 1988 in the old first division. Now coaching part time as well as playing, he has made over 440 appearances for his only club.

It's already up there winning awards but is there anything you feel is missing? Is it time to change the Rockford Files?



I open with this line due to the feel good factor that was felt strongly during the days leading up today's game. I'd already heard several Tranmere fans hedging their bets on a 2-1, even a 3-1 scoreline to the Rovers - and this was on the previous Wednesday!

Buckinghamshire beckoned, and with a click of the fingers, it was off to visit the Adams Family...

'Let's Groove' (The Ground)

The most recent home of the Chairboys, Adams Park, probably serves as a good testament to what the Deva Stadium should have looked like, once Chester City were forced out of their Sealand Road home way back in 1990. Irony then, as what we have here is an almost identical scenario to Bumpers Lane, as one straight road leads you in and out from the ground - and located at the end of an industrial estate.

The Roger Vere Stand offers a fantastic view of the action to be honest, while the much bigger Woodlands (two-tier) Stand ensures a major focal point to the ground. The latter was improved several seasons ago, as promotion from the Third Division saw their crowds almost double to an average of around 6,000.

Elsewhere, the much more basic Greene King Terrace and Seymour Taylor Stand may look to struggle to accommodate a big match crowd, but are nonetheless smart enough to be included in this bang up to date, small, but impressive venue.

Those football connoisseurs among you will of course know that Wycombe have only graced the Football League fields since 1993, and even prior to this possessed a much more humble home than the one they have now. I'd have to say personally that this ground must be in the top ten in both Divisions' Two and Three, and barring the long walk from car to the doorstep of turnstiles 1 & 2, I've never ever had a problem visiting Adams Park. However, there is also a slight drawback to what surrounds a pleasant day out in Buckinghamshire, as the majority of essential items are priced over the odds and in particular

left many Rovers fans with a financial headache. A £16 ticket for second division football is just about bearable, but with juniors under 16 and senior concessions charged at £13, this was nothing short of scandalous. This however wasn't the half of it, as many souvenirs such as pennants (£7) and scarves (£8.99) wouldn't have looked out of place at say Highbury. Add to this the half time food - £3 a burger, plus pies at £2 and a programme costing you £2.50. All in all a very expensive day all round.

Ironically, many Wycombe followers hate the 'London-based' tag but funnily their club doesn't do much to discourage promoting the regional price rating!

'Boogie Wonderland' (The Away Support)

What looked like around 200, actually turned out to be a figure of 400 impressive indeed. I wondered if our slight turn around in results both home and away enticed some faces to rejoin forces with the die-hard SWA followers, and those who made the trip weren't to be disappointed.

League Cup Round Two, 10 October 1973.

It was a toss up between this and the Goodison triumph, but because Rovers were plving their trade in the old Third Division and the Gunners winning the 'double' three seasons previous, I opted for this match. First Division teams took this competition seriously in those days, and Arsenal lined up with a full strength side, missing only the injured Charlie George. All eleven Rovers players proved to be heroes, none more than the defensive paring of the 'Two Ronnies' - Moore and Yeats, while Dickie Johnson was faultless in goal. Striker Eddie Lovden scored a well-crafted decisive goal and could have doubled his tally had he not lost out in a one-on-one with Bob Wilson late in the game.

2) Everton 0, TRANMERE 3 (Yates 2, Koumas),

FA Cup Round Four, 27 January 2001.

Still very fresh in the memory - and the stuff of legends. If we'd had been Welsh they would have written a song about it for posterity. How this side managed to get themselves relegated remains one of life's great imponderables.

3) Southampton 2, TRANMERE 3 (K. Williams 2, McDonnell),

League Division Three, 11 April 1959.

I had to include this one as it was my first-ever experience of the joys of a Rovers away win. It came at the back end of the inaugural national Third Division season, one in which Rovers had been moulded into a very attractive side by player/manager Peter Farrell. Rovers out-footballed a prolific goalscoring and upwardly mobile Saints outfit in their own backyard. A week later, we thrashed Accrington Stanley 9-0! I am privileged to have sunk a pint or three with our own two goalscorers in recent times -Charlie Mac and Keith remain the best of mates and are both alive and well and still on the Wirral, or should I say the 'Wirrale'?!

4) Hereford United 1, TRANMERE 4 (G. Williams, Morrissey, Anderson, Ashcroft),

League Division Four. 14 December 1985.

In the midst of a tumultuous campaign under Frank Worthington's cash strapped managerial career, came this little gem. With half-an-hour or so remaining, with the score at 1-1, Rovers had Mark Hughes sent off. To the travelling fans surprise and delight, Rovers made a mockery of their numerical disadvantage and the wily old 'Worthy' inspired a brilliant fightback, hardly allowing the home side a kick. They swept forward incisively and scored three superb goals all resulting from flowing, passing movements.

5) Portsmouth 2, TRANMERE 5 (Flood, Moore, Allen, Palios, James),

League Division Three, 5 November 1977.

Rovers were developing a liking for Fratton Park, having recorded a convincing 3-0 victory there the previous season. The three-goal margin was maintained although at half time, the odds against this happening on a wet and gloomy Guy Fawkes Night were infinite. Pompey had eased into a 2-0 lead and


Russ Allen had lifted a penalty kick into the Fratton End Stand. All the fireworks came from Rovers in the second half. however, after a rare strike from left back Eddie Flood had put them back in contention. Shellshocked home fans were streaming out of the ground by the time substitute John James scored Rovers' fifth goal with his first touch, ten minutes from time. I'll continue my fond remininsing in the Notts County programme on 21




