

Inside Forward

A £1.2MILLION striker ended this season's FA Cup hopes at Wigan, where a 3-0 scoreline flattered the home side on a day when the Town were forced to field a vastly under-strength team. With Steve Howard and Kevin Nicholls suspended, a painful injury list left the Town with only one fit senior striker, and three youth team players had to be pressed into service on the subs' bench.

The Second Division leaders were still made to work hard to gain the ascendancy, and the difference between the sides was their leading marksman Nathan Ellington, who took his season's tally to 15 goals. His second of the game, which effectively ended the contest, was an excellent strike, showing why Wigan splashed out a club record fee to recruit him from Bristol Rovers.

The Town's patched-up team deserve every credit for a valiant effort to beat the odds, and we can only wonder about what might have been had the early sharpness brought a goal or two. Andrew Fotiadis was the only out and out striker, with Ahmet Brkovic on the left and Steve Robinson on the right working hard on the flanks to support him. They combined to create an opening for Brkovic, but he shot straight at the keeper, and then from a sweet passing move Alan Kimble's cross was headed down by Brkovic for the onrushing Peter Holmes, but he shot wide from a good position.

But just as the Town looked capable of getting something out of the game Wigan snatched the all-important first goal, after 37 minutes. Ellington eluded Chris Coyne and shot into the bottom corner from the edge of the box, and Wigan looked more confident after that. Even so they had a let-off when Emmerson Boyce, as willing as ever to attack, had a shot blocked by the keeper's legs a minute after the goal.

Paul Hughes looked good in the Kevin Nicholls role, and the Town chased hard for the rest of the game. The home manager was concerned enough to send on two subs to ginger up his midfield ten minutes after the break, by which time the Town had gone close again through Matt Spring and Brkovic.

Gary Teale's introduction turned out to be crucial, because his neat through-ball to Ellington caught the Town stretched in the 65th minute, and the big striker hit a thumping drive into the net across Carl Emberson from the inside-right angle of the penalty area.

Robinson joined him in attack, but Wigan were by now content to hold on to their two-goal lead, and it came as something of a surprise when they made it a flattering result with an 85th-minute header by Mike Flynn from a free kick by Nicky Eaden.



Manager's View

WE WERE very disappointed that we could not beat the odds stacked against us at Wigan on Saturday. We were a long way below full strength, playing away to a club which has invested £6million in its squad. I felt the three-goal margin was harsh, but otherwise we could have no complaints about losing.

The odd thing was that we probably created easily as many scoring chances as Wigan, but they made the best use of theirs. Steve Howard and Kevin Nicholls were suspended, and they are two of our more influential players who were bound to be missed. Injuries to Tony Thorpe and Dean Crowe severely limited our attacking options, and with a total of nine first-teamers unavailable I had to put three boys from the youth squad on the bench. In the circumstances I did not blow my top over a defeat that hardly ranks as one of the season's great cup surprises. Wigan had lost on their own ground only once, and that was in the first month of the season.

We saw in the league game against them at Kenilworth Road that they are a good side, and worthy favourites for promotion, but on that occasion they were lucky to go home with a point from a very late equaliser.

They went into Saturday's game on a high after beating Fulham in the Worthington Cup, and I knew that if we were to progress at the JJB we must first take the

sting out of them, and hit them with a goal or two on the break. It could

easily have happened because the current we had the better of the first half. But we failed to cash in from a couple of good chances. and then conceded a goal from a mis-hit shot.

We worked with a will after that, but Wigan had a bit too much for us, and in the end we had to accept that we were, not surprisingly, second best on the day. My last words in the Pressroom, however, were to promise that when we go back there in March, for a much more important game, they will see a different Luton Town.

Cup defeats are always disappointing, but disastrous, and despite all our difficulties we are still looking good in the league.

Our last home game was a tremendous advert for the Second Division in general, and Luton Town in particular, when Queens Park Rangers were so fortunate to be avoid defeat against our nine men. I had a word or two about the referee's performance that day, and I had every sympathy with Steve Howard and Kevin Nicholls for their red cards which were very harsh, to put it mildly.

However, having failed in our appeal against Howard's sending-off we had to get on with it, and the performance at Tranmere was excellent. We well deserved that victory, overcoming a half-time deficit by playing excellent passing football. We are overcoming our poor start to the season with a consistency that is a delight for everyone, and on our day, and with a full squad available, we are a match for anyone in this division. We have played five of

top six, and not

one of them has beaten us. Our defeat at Northampton is the only reverse we have suffered in our last 11 league games.

That run has carried us up from bottom but one in the league table to seventh and level on points with sixth place.

There is still a lot more work to do, but we have a realistic chance of becoming established firmly in the top six by the turn of the year, and that is the current target.

Tonight's game, therefore, is in some ways a bit of a distraction, but that is not to say that we don't want to win. I have had to think very hard about what sort of team I put out to entertain Cambridge, because they will come here with no pressure on them, and in a decent run of form as they chase promotion from the Third Division, having got themselves into fourth place.

We would welcome the chance to go all the way in the LDV Vans Trophy, and I am sure supporters, like everyone on the staff at Kenilworth Road, would enjoy a day out to the Millennium Stadium in the spring.





WELCOME to Kenilworth Road for this evening's match against Cambridge United. As you may have heard, we have gone through a very confusing spell over the past five days because we might have been playing Wigan tonight.

It has been unavoidable inconvenience, for the club and for its supporters, but it was all down to circumstances beyond our control.

On Thursday morning, our fix-

ture list for the near future was clear enough: Wigan away on Saturday in the FA Cup, Cambridge at home tonight, Colchester at home in the League on Saturday, and a possible cup replay with Wigan, if one was needed, next Tuesday. That all changed after Wigan beat Fulham in the Worthington Cup at the JJB Stadium last Wednesday. The following morning we were advised by The Football Association, in conjunction with The Football League, that if Saturday's match at Wigan was drawn the replay would have to be tonight, because Wigan will entertain Blackburn in the fifth round of the Worthington Cup next Tuesday.

The FA Cup took precedence over the LDV Vans Trophy, and if our game against Cambridge had to be postponed, it would be switched to next Tuesday. However, if Cambridge were to draw in the FA Cup against Northampton on Saturday, that replay would be next Tuesday, so Luton v Cambridge would have to be scheduled again. I felt like suggesting Christmas

Eve as the only available date! The football authorities, of course, are keen to avoid any backlog of fixtures at this time of year, when bad weather is a possibility. You might be interested to know that if our match at Wigan on Saturday had been postponed, it would have been played at the JJB tonight!

It amounts to an incredible mixture of ifs and buts, and it did little to help us in our planning for this evening, and we have made the FA and Football League aware of how a possible date change at such short notice can affect our income, and be inconvenient for supporters.

Congratulations to our youth team on winning their third round tie in the FA Youth Cup. It was good to see so many people supporting the boys against Stoke. In the next round, which has to be played by January 25, we will be at home to Bradford, and I will advise you of the date as soon as possible.

The postponed match in the Football League Youth Alliance under-19 section against Cambridge has now been arranged for Saturday December 21

GOALKEEPERS

1. SHAUN MARSHALL

A promising goalkeeper, Shaun Marshall was a product of our successful youth policy. After first being spotted by the Club at the age of eight, Shaun made one appearance for the first team whilst still a trainee and has made good progress ever since. First team opportunities were limited by the presence of the popular Lionel Perez, but Marshall has the chance to shine now that the Frenchman has moved on.

13. Martin Brennan

A young keeper, previously in

the youth ranks of Tottenham who reads the game well, and Charlton, Brennan was signed on the eve of the 2002/03 campaign.

DEFENDERS

2. WARREN GOODHIND

South African-born Warren Goodhind is a versatile player who can play in the centre and on the right of midfield and defence. He became Barnet's youngest ever captain and has scored three goals in 79 starts for the Bees. He was on the verge of a big-money move Tottenham Hotspur in 1998 but broke his leg and was out of action for 15 months. A strong, experienced, cultured defender Goodhind deferred his sports science degree to establish himself at the Abbey Stadium.

3. Freddie Murray

Irish under-18 international Freddie Murray, initially joined on loan from Blackburn Rovers in December 2001, and became the first signing of John Taylor's managerial reign when he made the move permanent with a free transfer on March 7th, 2002. The young left-back has been almost ever-present since.

4. Andy Duncan

A central defender signed for £20,000 from Manchester

Cambridge United

United in April 1998 following a successful three-month loan spell at The Abbey, Andy Duncan is a solid, consistent player at the heart of the United defence. His positional awareness, composure and strength have shown that his transfer fee was money well spent, and Uís fans were delighted when he agreed a new contract in the summer of 2002.

5. Adam Tann

A young defender who is equally comfortable at right back on in the heart of the back four, Adam Tann won international honours when making his Under-18 debut England against Switzerland September 1999. A highly promising player, Tann is another product of Cambridge United Youth Scheme and impressed many in difficult circumstances last season. Cool and calm, Tann has already captained the side.

6. Stevland Angus



Named Stevland as his parents are fans of Stevie Wonder, Stev

Angus came through the youth ranks at West Ham. Although signed primarily as a left back he is a versatile defender who has proved to be an asset to the Club. His first taste of League Football came when on loan from West Ham to loan spell Bournemouth in 1999. When the loan was curtailed by illness, his enforced return proved to the turning point in another player's career, and the catalyst to record books being re-written, the replacement West Ham sent to the south coast was Jermain Defoe who went to break the record number of goals in consecutive League matches against The U's at the Abbey Stadium!

17. Franco Nacca



Franco Nacca is another product of the Club's Youth Team. Venezuela-born, he snatched from under the interested eyes of Aston Villa. His best position is more of a right back/wing back although he has been comfortable playing in a back three or back four.

19.

Graham Rush

Cambridge-born Graham Rush is a life-long U's fan, so the decision to award him a professional contract at the end of last season was a dream come true. A solid defender, Rush was captain of last season's Under-19s.

22. Dan Huggins

Versatile defender, Huggins has been at the Club since he was 15 when he was signed from Norwich on a three-year scholarship. A first year professional, Huggins can do a job anywhere along the back.

23. Daryl Bourgeois

First year professional Daryl Bourgeois is a cultured defender who joined the Abbey Stadium Youth Development scheme after being released by Southend. Born in Forest Gate, East London, he can play anywhere in a back three.

25. Phil Warner

Pacy young defender, Phil Warner joined the Club for no initial fee from Southampton, where he came through the ranks but was unable to claim a regular first team place despite a number of Premiership appearances. Primarily a rightback, he can also play at centreback, left-back or in midfield.

MIDFIELDERS

7. PAUL WANLESS

The heartbeat of the side, Paul Wanless is a powerful midfielder with an infectious enthusi-

asm and almost kamikaze bravery. The United captain, he began his career as a trainee at his hometown Club Oxford before a short spell at Lincoln, during which time he managed to serve under three different managers. Wanless joined The Uis in the summer of 1996 after a spell on loan at The Abbey the previous season and is a regular winner when the Player of the Year award is handed out.

8. Terry Fleming

Often described as a utility player the term seriously underestimates Terry Fleming's value to the squad. A player with bags of pace and a prodigious long throw, he has operated at left-back, right-back, wing-back and midfield and never lets anyone down wherever he is asked to play.

14. Luke Guttridge

Luke Guttridge lived up to his "One for the Future" tag last season with a series of performances belying his years. A Combative midfielder, compared to Billy Bremner by former U's boss Roy McFarland, Guttridge made his first team debut in spectacular fashion in March 2001, netting inside 2 minutes. Diminutive in stature, but with a massive heart, you would rather have Guttridge playing for you than against you.

15. Tony Scully

Tony Scully turned down a new contract with QPR to join Cambridge United on a

Bosman free transfer in July 2002. A Republic of Ireland international at Schoolboy, Youth, Under-21 and B level. the native Dubliner began his career with Crystal Palace and, loan spells Bournemouth and Cardiff, he joined Manchester City for £200,000 in 1997. A £155,000 deal took him back to London when he joined QPR in 1998. Although he normally operates on the right wing, Scully has also played on the left side in attack or as a wingback.

18. David Bridges

A graduate of the youth development scheme, David Bridges is a versatile midfielder or forward with an eye for goal, scoring two consecutive hat-tricks for the Under-19s in December and January of last season.

He made his debut against Huddersfield in March 2002 and his performances were a bright spot in an otherwise largely disappointing season for the Club. Bridges netted his first goal for the Club in the final home game of last season, in front of the terraces on which he stood to support The U's as a boy.

20. Shane Tudor

When Wolverhampton-born midfielder Shane Tudor left his hometown Club for The U's in November 2001 he must have wondered whether he had done the right thing. Signed by former boss John Beck hours before he was replaced in the Manager's Office, Tudor has impressed with his terrier-like performances on the wing and

in the centre of midfield, which quickly made him a fans' favourite.

FORWARDS

9. DAVID KITSON

A pacy striker signed from non-League Arlesey Town, Dave Kitson's tall physique and naturally red hair (when not dyed peroxide blond) makes his a beacon when leading the line. Despite his height, Kitson has a good touch on the ground and, with a season of professional football now under his belt, he is poised to become and even greater asset to the Club.


10. Tom Youngs

Tom Youngs is an intelligent, creative forward player who almost scored with his first touch when he made his League debut in September 1997. He was awarded a professional contract despite remaining at school to study for his A Levels, having been at the Abbey since the age of ten and has progressed right through Youth Development Scheme. Despite a string of niggling injuries, Youngs has been the Club's top scorer for the past two seasons and, if he can remain injury-clear, more than several Division Three defenders will have sleepless nights prior to facing The U's.

12. Dan Chillingworth

A former England Schoolboy international, local boy Dan Chillingworth has been growing in stature since making his League debut April 2000, short-

ly after signing his first professional contract. Another product of the Club's Youth Development Scheme, "Chilli" scored his first League goal for The U's on Boxing Day of last season and, despite his tender years, is sure to be a factor in this campaign.


16. Alex Revell

First spotted on a Football in the Community coaching course, Alex Revell is another product of the youth scheme. This local lad raised a few eyebrows when he was offered a professional contract a year early two seasons ago, and his early promotion looks well founded. Last season he had the distinction of scoring goals for First Team, Reserves and Under-19s.

21. Owen Paynter

First year professional Owen Paynter impressed in reserve team football last season and will be looking to add to his experience this year. Newmarket-born, he has been at the Club since he was 11.

24. Omer Riza



Lightening-quick forward who was a fans' favourite before actually signing for the Club! A loan spell at the end of the 2000/01 campaign established his cult status, and U's fans were delighted to see his return when he was signed on the eve of the 2002/03 season after a impressive pre-season trial.

28. John Turner

Promising young striker with tremendous natural ability, Turner earned a call-up to the first team squad just days after representing the Club at Under-18 level. A first year trainee, he was released by the Aston Villa academy and was invited for a trial at United after being spotted playing for Bedford-based Sportivo Valerio against a Cambridge United Trialist XI.

MANAGER

JOHN TAYLOR

"JT" is a legend at The Abbey, having starred in the successful U's side of the early nineties alongside Dion Dublin, returning home for a second spell in January 1997 when he joined from Luton Town. Originally signed by the U's in 1988 from non-league Sudbury Town, he left The Abbey for Bristol Rovers in a controversial player-exchange deal in March 1992. He enjoyed a successful spell with Rovers before moving on to join Bradford City and then Luton Town.

A positive, popular and jovial character he found time to become joint top League scorer four seasons ago, breaking Alan Biley's Club records for total number of League goals and overall goals in the process while managing the Reserve side. Now with over 100 Cambridge United goals to his credit, Taylor still occasionally turns out for the Reserves, but has decided to concentrate all his first team energies on management.

Former bosses Roy McFarland and John Beck encouraged his coaching development and when he took over initially as Caretaker Manager November 2001, following the resignation of John Beck, it was to universal acclaim from the supporters. Steering The U's to the LDV Vans Trophy final within months of taking over. Taylor's popularity with the fans has not been diminished by last season's disappointing League campaign.

Blast From the Past

The Associate Members Cup was introduced in the 1983/84 season for clubs in Division Three and Four (now two and three). It was rightly assumed that very few of those clubs managed to fight their way through to the later stages of the other two cup competitions and therefore needed something to hopefully keep their seasons alive.

The Hatters first entered the competition, by now sponsored by Auto Windscreens, in 1996 following relegation from Division One and in the first round were drawn at home to Leyton Orient. A crowd of only 1,594, the lowest at Kenilworth Road for a competitive game since before World War One, were scattered around the ground to see a late goal from Kim Grant secure a 2-1 win and save the torment going on for a further 30 minutes.

The reward for this victory was a first ever visit to Sixfields,

Northampton to take on the Division Three pacesetters. Over 1,100 Luton supporters made the short trip to boost the crowd to 4,201 but they were disappointed when Cobbler's Matthew Rush, a loanee from Norwich, scored the only goal in the 88th minute of another turgid game.

The Town were granted a first round bye the following season and were then paired with Brentford at Kenilworth Road for a round two clash. The Bees had an injury crisis with 14 regulars unavailable and even manager Micky Adams was forced to pull on a shirt for the first time in two on loan from Coventry, kept up vears.

Goals from Tony Thorpe and David Oldfield enabled the Town to move into a comfortable 2-0 lead with Chris Allen, on loan from Nottingham Forest, giving probably his best display in Luton colours and setting up chance after chance. A late goal from

Brentford caused a few anxious moments for the crowd of 3,106 but the Town eventually ran out deserving winners with a journey to Fulham awaiting the victors.

A trip to newly rejuvenated Fulham was probably the most awkward tie left in the competition and this was made doubly difficult when the Cottagers won 4-1 at Kenilworth Road only three days before in a league clash.

A crowd of 5,103 turned up to witness the anticipated slaughter but they were shocked when Dwight Marshall fired the Town into a first half lead. Kyle Lightbourne, his remarkable scoring run against Luton when he levelled after half-time but as the home fans sat back waiting for the expected goal avalanche it was left to substitute Tony Thorpe to slam home the winner with the final kick of the game.

The Hatters were now through to the heady heights of the Southern semi-final where they faced a trip to Bournemouth, a team that had already beaten them twice in the league that season. Mindful of this, manager Lennie Lawrence strung five players across a defensive midfield and hoped for a goal on the

This tactic had the effect of killing the game but with the contest drifting towards extratime a Franck Rolling goal, with three minutes to go, sent the home crowd of 5,367 wild and with it the end of another cup run.

In the early part of the following campaign the Town

it all by losing at home to Hull of Division Three in the F.A.Cup.

The Auto Windscreens Shield, and a home tie with Walsall, was therefore the only thing left to play for in a season that was slowly falling apart. A run of eight league games without a win led up to the Walsall clash and Lennie Lawrence decided to rest a number of players feeling that the preservation of Division Two status was more important.

Walsall decided to put out a virtual first team and cruised to an easy 3-0 victory while the Town finished the game with seven teenagers on the pitch. Herve Bacque, a sensation in pre-season games, sadly kicked his last ball for the Town when seeing his second half penalty easily saved while loanee, Sean Dyche, making his debut, must have wondered what he was letting himself in for! The only bright spot on a miserable evening was the sound debut of Emmerson Boyce.

Only 1,220 bothered to turn up at Oxford for the opening round clash the following season, the lowest to watch the Town on these shores since the 469 brave souls that attended a league game at Thames Association in 1930. Non-contract forward Paul Read made his one and only Luton appearance in this match which also saw a debut for James

The Town had most of the game but could not find the back of the net while Oxford had just two shots on target, both penalties, which saw them ease through.

The sponsorship of the competition was taken over by LDV vans for the following season with the Town drawn to play at Peterborough, who they had already knocked out of the Worthington Cup earlier that campaign, in the opening round. Struggling in the league, the Hatters had recorded a remarkable 3-1 win at promotion chasing Stoke the previous weekend and it was decided to rest five players for the trip to Peterborough.

The depleted side, however,

played well and it was against the run of play when Francis Green scored the only goal of the game for Posh shortly towards the end. The Town's misery was compounded when Mark Stein was dismissed in the final minute for a two footed tackle.

By now Conference sides were admitted to the competition and the Town were faced with a first ever trip to Dagenham and Redbridge last season. Manager Joe Kinnear put out a complete reserve side to face the Conference leaders who also rested several players including ex-Hatter Mark Stein.

Goals from Dean Brennan and Peter Thomson put the Town into a 2-1 lead but a late leveller took the game into 'golden goal' extra time where Ashley Vickers netted for the home side three minutes after the restart.


"We are all season ticket holders in the Main Stand Enclosure, only half a block apart. We had never met before, but we now continue our friendship back home."

We average about 40 children per week at a venue that has a maximum safety number of 48. Therefore she has offered us the chance to run courses throughout next year.

They will include Saturday Soccer Clubs, Monday and Friday After-School Clubs and Courses, and our usual holiday courses.

We will also be trying something new at this venue in next year's summer holidays, a course lasting a full week for five hours a day. Should this be successful we will start to look at the possibilities of all-day child care for future holidays, involving a variety of activities between 8.30am and 5.30pm.

However, first of all here are the details of the next Saturday Soccer Club. As usual it will be held at Bramingham Primary School in Freeman's Avenue. It will start at 10am and finish at 11.30am. The dates are

January 18 and 25; February 1, 8, and 15; and March 1, 8, 15, 22 and 29.

The cost is £2.50 per week, or a one-off block booking payment of £20.00. As usual all you need to do to register is to fill in the form opposite, and return it to me at the club, or, if you prefer, call me on the Community Department office number, 01582 391927.

Finally today, as you may have read in previous match day magazines, the club is holding a carol service at St Mary's Parish Church, Luton, next Monday, commencing at 7.30pm.

All supporters are invited to enjoy the evening in company with players, management and staff of the club. As Community Development Officer I feel my job extends beyond football, and I would like to invite the children who have participated in all of our courses over the last year to attend and celebrate the real meaning of Christmas. I think this will be a memorable experience.








Fans on the road

Action Replay

A TOP six team they may have been, but QPR were desperately lucky to go home with a point from a tempestuous game in which the Town were down to ten men after 14 minutes, and reduced to nine after 50.

The biggest crowd of the season, including the first near-full house in the away end, created a fantastic atmosphere, egged on by a refereeing performance, which left Joe Kinnear furious, Steve Howard was red carded for a late challenge on Clarke Carlisle, and Kevin Nicholls left early in the second half for his second yellow card offence. They paid the price on Saturday: the skipper missed his return to his former club in the FA Cup, and Howard, whose appeal to the FA was rejected, also sits out tonight's match and Saturday's game against Colchester.

There is no appeal against cautions, so Nicholls had to accept the ref's verdict, but he and his manager believe the official got it wrong, particularly on the first

yellow card, on 20 minutes, when he seemed to be the victim, not the aggressor.

The Town's nine more than made up for the manpower deficiency with a controlled passing performance, easily a match for QPR's eleven, and should have snatched victory, with sub Andrew Fotiadis missing two decent chances in the closing minutes. It was not just a matter of defending well against superior numbers: the counter-attacking was sharp and always menacing on a day when both goalkeepers made a couple of good saves, and occasionally were let off the hook by poor finishing

The rival managers had a bit of a spat over claims that the Rangers' bench was trying to egg on the ref to send off Town players. Rangers boss lan Holloway hotly denied it. We will never know how good a

match it might have been if

the referee had not dished out five yellow cards and one red to the Town, and two yellows to Rangers men. But the Town's fight against adversity made for a compelling spectacle, with a hard-won point the least they deserved.

The Rangers manager was left to complain that his men should have had a bit more savvy to find a way round nine opponents. When they did, their finishing was awful. "We were getting too desperate," he said. "But credit to Luton's nine men – they did their work very well."

Joe Kinnear blasted the ref's performance, and added: "That was a moral victory for us. We would have murdered them if we had kept 11 on the pitch. It had the makings of being a really good match and it was a shame it was spoiled."

Action Replay

THE Town's promotion drive was kept on track when a stylish second-half performance destroyed a good home side at Prenton Park. It pushed the Town into seventh place, level on points with the nearest playoff notch, and took the current run to one defeat in 11 league games.

Wigan are the only other side to go home with three points from Tranmere, and locals in the press box rated the Town a better side than the league leaders. Home boss Ray Mathias thought the Town's determination to deny his side clear-cut scoring chances was the crucial factor. The other was that after a not very compelling first half, the Town got their act together brilliantly, with the defence solid, Kevin Nicholls bossing the game from midfield, and Mathew Spring and Ahmet Brkovic both moving further upfield to support Tony Thorpe and Steve Howard.

Joe Kinnear was delighted with just about everything, except for the goal conceded following a penalty in the 24th minute. A throw-in was looped to the corner of the penalty area, and Emmerson Boyce and Nicholls were competing in the air with Danny Harrison, and the assistant referee spotted a handball by Nicholls.

"Our lads said Nicho was going up to head it and was pushed in the back," said Joe. The video replay confirmed use of the hand, but even so the Town might have got away with it, with Cedric Berthelin making two outstanding saves from the spot kick. He dived to his left to

keep out the penalty by Stuart Barlow, then managed to stick up an arm, despite being grounded, to keep out the follow-up attempt by Marvin Robinson. Gareth Roberts made it third time lucky for Tranmere from close range.

"That was the only thing I was narked about," said the Town boss. "The keeper made a blinding save and we didn't react. Instead of getting defenders in there we were second to the ball and were punished. "But to come back from that and win was very pleasing, and we were worthy winners thanks to the improved show in the second half."

Even the change forced by an injury to Sol Davis, who was replaced by Alan Kimble, failed to spoil the Town's second-half rhythm as they took control.

Steve Robinson and Howard shifted the ball swiftly and accurately to provide Spring with a close-range opening for the 69th-minute equaliser, and an equally clever play nine minutes later, by Howard and Thorpe, brought a neat finish by Ahmet Brkovic for his sixth goal in four appearances.

Howard signed off before his suspension with a lashing of sweet icing on the cake two minutes from time, set free by Spring's through ball and hammering in the rebound after his first shot had been blocked.

"Once Spring stuck in the first goal I had no doubts about what the result was going to be," said Joe. "In the first half there was a bit of apprehension in our play. But having had a good look at them we had enough about us to take the game to them. We went in search of goals. I told Berko to come in off the line into the inside left position and push up just behind the front two and get us a goal. He is in good form, and that worked.

"We dominated the second half, and it was unusual for an away side to have so much possession. Spring got further up the pitch, and we are a better team with him playing up close to Thorpe and Howard. In the first half the front two were too isolated

"Howard has suffered a bit of a lean spell, but I knew the goals would come, and I was delighted for him. He smashed that one away like someone who was relishing it. And the build-up was tremendous for all the goals.





EVACUATION PROCEDURE



On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.



BELLES senior youth team, the Under 14s, were involved in a tremendous seven-goal thriller away to Cambridge United, who until then boasted a proud unbeaten two-year home record. Luton broke from the kick off when Michelle Byrne crossed from the by-line and found Holly Flynn but she shot straight at the keeper from six yards. With just 90 seconds on the clock the home side were in the lead when the ball broke to the Cambridge centre forward on the penalty spot and she swivelled to volley into the bottom corner.

Luton were stunned into action and were level in the fourth minute. Michelle Byrne picked up the ball on the half way line and stormed past her marker down the right. Her pace took her clear of the entire defence and as the Cambridge keeper came out to narrow the angle she lofted the ball over her head into the far corner of the net.

The home side continued to press forward, but were well handled by inspired performances by skipper Gemma Vale and defensive midfielder Kelly Halsey.

But after 20 minutes United regained the lead when a cross from the right was only half cleared and the ball was swept into the net. Cambridge then hit a purple patch and at one stage threatened to overrun the Town defence.

The turning point came when the Cambridge captain fired in a shot from 25 yards. The ball flew towards the top corner and Luton keeper Alice Burbury leapt across her goal to push the ball over the crossbar with her left hand to produce a save worthy of any football ground in the country.

Luton then weathered the storm and fought their way back into the match to trail by the odd goal at half time.

Whatever was said at half time certainly did the trick as within a minute Luton were level. Michelle Byrne was running her marker ragged and was brought

Fay Rolls almost extended the lead when her 25-yard shot curled a foot wide with the keeper beaten. But in the last minute Luton hearts were broken as Cambridge levelled with a curling shot from just inside the area to make it 3-3.

There was time for just one more attack, and Fay Rolls chased a lost ball to the by-line before screwing the ball across the six yard box where Lizzie Randall arrived to fire in the winning goal with just seconds left.

Without doubt this was Belles best performance of the season becoming the first team to come away with all three points and leaving them just two points behind leaders Stevenage Borough, with two games in hand.





THE referee had the major impact on this match, sending off Andrew Fotiadis and Michael Leary early in

the second half. We were two down, having played well except for the failure to turn good play into goals. The two red cards upset us, but the nine men responded by suddenly looking stronger and more incisive, and after we pulled a goal back there was a real chance that we might get something out of the game.

The scoresheet was blank at the interval, and I felt at that stage that we were going to be all right. We had played well, but were let down by powder-puff attacking. Several times the ball was sent pin balling around their six-yard area, with no-one able to show the killer instinct. Mark Ovendale was almost a spectator in our goal, and Fotiadis could have had a hat-trick in the first half.

He was given a rough ride, and I felt the ref should have been stronger as he was fouled persistently. The last straw for the striker was when he was kneed in the back and nothing was done about it. Northampton broke and scored, and Fotiadis had a go at the referee. He was sent off for using foul and abusive language, which he strongly denied.

Northampton had taken a lead they did not deserve on the run of play in the 50th minute. Our defending was poor. We failed to block off a cross that led to the goal,

and then failed to close down the striker who scored.

Five minutes later we let in a very scrappy goal, and that led to Fotiadis making his views known before being red carded. Two minutes later Leary was also sent off for a tackle, which I felt, was a yellow card offence at the most.

Matthew Judge was sent on as a substitute, and our nine men did very well in keeping possession and working the ball forward. Judge rifled in a great goal on 75 minutes, and after that there were signs of panic in the Northampton side as we took the game to them. But we created only half chances, and failed to take any of them, and in the last minute Northampton got their third goal from a corner. It was a very harsh result.
