Mansell's drive impresses Joe

HATTERS forgotten man Lee Mansell was praised for his commitment and passion after making a rare first-team appearance at Wycombe on Saturday.

But Hatters boss Joe Kinnear also told Mansell, now 20, that he needs to improve his passing and

Mansell has spent 14-and-a-half months in the reserve wilderness at Kenilworth Road since his last Football League appearance.

That came in the 2-0 win at Scunthorpe in October 2001 when he was replaced by Adrian Forbes at halftime after struggling to

combat Peter Beagrie.
The recent injury crisis has seen Mansell back on the first-team bench and on Saturday he replaced Dean Crowe when the striker felt a twinge in his hamstring

"He's got a big engine and a big heart but needs to improve his passing and have more composure.

"He's very hyperactive and a 100 miles per hour type of player.
"You can't take anything

away from him in terms of commitment and he can

'I've never doubted that and his energy levels but it's just his passing and vision he needs to work on

"They normally say that comes with experience and he's a brave lad who sticks his foot in.

You know you will get 100 per cent from him but you do not always know what kind of quality you

It's a goal feast for Steven

CHRISTMAS, like 2002, has appropriately been a real feast for Luton's very own Steven.

Hatters striker Steven Howard, unlike his biblical namesake, may be no saint, as his recent three-match ban paid testament to, but there would be few objectors to his canonisation at Kenilworth Road right now.

Howard's match-winning brace at Wycombe Wanderers made it a heaven-sent four goals for the Hatters in three fixtures over the festive period from the goal-hungry striker.

Even more impressively, it took his tally for the year 2002 to a mouth-

watering 33 goals.
Only Hatters legends Joe Payne (twice), Andy Rennie and Gordon Turner have bettered that record in a

The 6ft 3in striker's two-goal blast at Adams Park also saw him overtake another Kenilworth Road superstar Malcolm MacDonald on his way to

fifth place in the club's all-time list. Howard's haul is the best in a single year since the Hatters' record scorer Turner plundered 34 goals in 1957, eclipsing the prolific achievements of any other striker at the club


in the last 45 years.

The 26-year-old forward finished last season as Division Three's leading marksman and has already netted 14 goals this campaign despite

stepping up a level.
His form away from home has been particularly crucial in the Hatters play-off push.

He has scored nine times this sea-

son away from Kenilworth Road and without his goals, the Hatters would have collected eight fewer points on their travels and now be just one posi-Wycombe in 13th spot.

The wonderful Worthington Cup win at Vicarage Road would also not

have been achieved without his name on the scoresheet.

Hatters boss Joe Kinnear has no doubts about his value to the team during 2002 and the Christmas period

and expects him to carry on in the same vein in the New Year. Kinnear said: "We are not the same side when Steve Howard does not play which showed in the period he was out. He's stuck 14 in this season and got four in the last three games, which were all crucial goals.

"He's playing out of his skin and I'm glad we've got his services for another two-and-a-half years. There's no question he'll get 20 goals again this season.

'He works hard and is improving all the time. He's got a real appetite for the game and was far ahead of any the other strikers on show at Wycombe.

"To get 33 goals in a year is absolutely brilliant because he's also

missed games."

The variety of Howard's goals has been almost as impressive as the quantity and his first strike on Saturday was another effort that bolstered his spectacular 2002 collection of

greatest hits.

Dean Crowe and Tony Thorpe, playing alongside Howard again in a three-man strikeforce, both won headers before the ex-Hartlepool and Northampton forward unleashed a 25-yard thunderbolt that crashed into the bottom corner of home keeper Frank Talia's net on 21 minutes.

Talia had earlier made a fine save to prevent Howard opening the scoring after just two minutes.

The Australian reacted brilliantly

to keep out Howard's close-range header after an Emmerson Boyce

Crowe then sent an overhead kick whistling over Talia's bar seconds later as the Hatters made an attacking start to the game in front of a travelling army of more than 2,000

supporters.

But wily campaigner Steve Brown could have put Wycombe in front on 12 minutes when his curling free kick hit Carl Emberson's crossbar.

Howard then broke the deadlock

and, when unmarked teenage home striker Jonny Dixon volleyed wastefully over from just six yards, the Hatters striker grabbed his second of the afternoon a minute later in almost effortless fashion.

A long 34th-minute throw into the penalty box by Ian Hillier was met with a flick of Howard's head which guided the ball past Talia and into the bottom corner of his net.

Emberson saved a Paul McCarthy header at the other end to ensure the Hatters went into the interval with a commanding lead.

Injuries to wide men Crowe and Ahmet Brkovic either side of half-time did, however, disrupt the Hatter, progress

time did, nowever, disrupt the Hatters' progress.

Lee Mansell was given his first taste of Football League action since October 2001 and acquitted himself well, reminding Hatters fans of the explanation and surging forward. exuberance and surging forward runs from midfield that brought him seven goals in his first season and an extra dimension to a struggling side extra dimension to a struggling side.
But, on the other side, the Hatters

missed Brkovic's midfield qualities with full-back Alan Kimble asked to operate in front of Sol Davis. Mansell provided Thorpe with an

excellent opportunity to score a third goal on 52 minutes but he lost control and the ball bounced wide.

Howard then went close to scoring the second hat-trick of his career but his powerful shot on the turn flashed wide from 20 yards. Wycombe pulled a goal back on 65 minutes when Michael Simpson's free kick from the left was headed into the air by Paul Hughes and a back-tracking Emberson failed to make a telling connection with his attempted punch on the goal-line, leaving Dixon to pounce and force the ball in from close range.

Emberson made amends on 80 minutes by turning behind Dannie Bul man's powerful 35-yard free kick and was, no doubt, relieved when Mark Rogers' later header went narrowly

But that would have, unfairly, deprived Howard of the perfect finale to an excellent 2002.

And the Hatters' goal king is already looking forward to the next 12 months, saying: "It's been a brilliant year, a fantastic one and probably the best of my correct."
