CFC RIOTING SOCCER THUGS BANNED

FOUR Chesterfield soccer hooligans have been jailed and 14 are given long match bans for violence and disorder before and after last season's Spireites-Cardiff City clash.

District Judge Richardson said their behaviour "gave football in general and Chesterfield in particular a bad name" and would not be tolerated.

He said a large number of Chesterfield fans were frustrated by successful police measures to keep rival supporters segregated after the March 30 match.

They threatened and abused police, threw bottles and a breakaway mob charged officers in a bid to reach visiting fans. Further scenes of disorder broke out in the town centre into the evening.

"The message has to go out that this type of behaviour by people who otherwise lead law-abiding lives cannot be tolerated," added Mr Richardson.

Clare Dolman, prosecuting, said police had seen messages posted on the internet before the game - and deployed more than 120 officers in full riot gear for the first time on a match day in Derbyshire.

She said the first confrontation happened outside the Saltergate ground before the match. After the game, local fans were shepherded towards the town centre but about 50 suddenly broke away and outnumbered police in Spencer Street, where violence flared as they charged at officers.

Police forced them back towards the town centre, where disorder broke out outside Yates' bar. Later, a gang of local men confronted Cardiff fans inside Spa Lane Vaults bar, causing violence and damage before task force officers cleared the pub.

"It was the worst outbreak of widescale soccer violence Chesterfield has seen," said Miss Dolman. After the hearings, Chief Inspector Debbie Platt said: "this

case emphasises that we are taking football violence very seriously. "It is an act carried out by a minority that spoils football for the rest of the fans. And it was the general public that helped us with identifying many of the people who have been dealt with by the courts.

"The fact they have all been given Football Banning Orders will make it easier for us to police football matches in Chesterfield in the future."

Jeremy McNeil, aged 42, of the Crown & Anchor pub, Sheffield Road, was convicted of using threatening behaviour. Mr Richardson said McNeil had started the violence in the Spa Lane Vaults. He was jailed for four months and banned from matches for six years. Bail was refused bail pending an appeal against

Three month jail terms and six-year bans were imposed on Mark Shaw, 38, of Crown Road, Stonegravels; John Callaghan, 31, of Wenlock Crescent, Ashgate: and Simon Hudson, 30, of Mill Lane, Bolsover, Shaw and Hudson admitted assault and threatening behaviour, while Callaghan admitted threatening behaviour.

Four-year bans were handed to five defendants who admitted threatening behaviour: Adrian Jones, 38, of Rufford Close, Boythorpe, will be tagged under a three-month curfew order and must pay £175 costs, Gavin Treweek, 32, of Whitworth Road, Newbold, received 100 hours community punishment and a oneyear community rehabilitation order. Peter Notley, 36, of Cambridge Crescent, Bramley Vale, got 240 hours punishment with £250 costs; Daniel O'Neill, 19, of Victoria Street, Newbold, received 240 hours punishment, with £175 costs; and Dale Stoneley, 41, of Tapton View Road, Newbold, was handed 150 hours punishment, with £175 costs.

Five men admitted causing harassment,

Karl White, 33, of Recreation Road, Langwith Junction, was fined £300, with £175 costs, and Scott Slater, 19, of Old School Lane, Calow, was fined £350, with £175 costs. John Sedgewick, 35. of Derby Road, Birdholme; Glenn Bloom, 28, of Haddon Close, Brampton; and Andrew Hibbert, 39, of Cordwell Avenue, Dunston, were each fined £100, with £100 costs.

A warrant was issued for the arrest of Jamie Wood, 29, of North Crescent, Duckmanton, who failed to attend court after admitting the same offence.

Note:Fans already sentenced and banned for their part in the trouble at a hearing in September, Darren Hirst (21) of Stillman Close, Hasland was jailed for three months and banned from professional matches for six years. Terrance Henman (38) of Cross London St, New Whittington was jailed for two months, Anthony Allston (28) of Darley Close Staveley, received six weeks imprisonment and Craig Revill (18) of Talbot Crescent, Hasland, was handed one month's youth custody. They were also banned from soccer matches for six years.

A four year match ban was imposed on Andrew Hargreaves (39) of Mansfield Road, Hasland who was also ordered to do 200 hours community punishment, with £50 costs.

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

THE DELIGHT of winning promotion last season was just one more chapter in a series of ups and downs that Luton Town have experienced in their history. They have enjoyed life at the very top, and suffered the indignity of twice tumbling all the way from the highest division to the lowest. Now, they hope, they are on their way back again after finishing last season as runners-up in Division Three.

In 1974 Luton were the first club in the country to sink from the top division to the bottom, and back all the way up again. Now their supporters are hoping that history can repeat itself. The club has had to cope with all sorts of difficulties in the last few years, including almost going out of existence when they were in receivership in the summer of

They survived, and a year later an old friend returned as the new owner and chairman, Mike Watson-Challis, who had been a director in Luton's glory years, for a decade when they flourished in the old First Division, now the Premiership, He and his colleagues on the board made an inspired choice when they decided to appoint the respected and highly experienced Joe Kinnear as manager in February 2001. It was too late to prevent the relegation that had looked nearly certain since the early days of that season, but on the day relegation was confirmed Kinnear promised the fans: "We'll be promoted in 12 months time..." Brave words, but Joe kept his promise to make it a brief stay in Division Three. Four club records tumbled in the process: 30 league victories, a run of 12 on the trot, 15 away wins and 97 points

Luton went into the 1990s as a top club they had ten glorious years in what is now the Premiership, and won the Littlewoods Cup by beating Arsenal in the 1988 final. But then came a decline, with a club in an antiquated stadium and unable to compete with the big-money outfits. They missed the first season of the Premiership, through relegation just

as it was set up in 1992, and the decline continued, with a drop into the Second Division in 1996. Previous boards of directors took plenty of stick from fans as the Hatters slumped - the club sold at least £1million worth of talent every year. without bringing in adequate replacements.

But now, with a new board and management team in place, money available for players, and plans taking shape for a new stadium, the supporters hope that at long last the Hatters really are set to move ahead again.

Supporters Trusts ——

No Supporters Trust in place at Luton Town, there have been plans mooted for a long time, indeed Case Workers at Supporters Direct describe The Hatters fan's move towards a Trust as, "a slow burner", however there is a Supporters Representative on the Luton Town Board of Directors, Yvonne Fletcher, a representative of FLAG, the Friends of Luton Action Group, indeed Yvonne, like our own Phil Tooley, is also a Director of Supporters Direct, so at least the fans of the Kenilworth Road Club know their interests are being safeguarded. The Manager - Joe Kinnear -



Joe Kinnear (56) took over the managerial reins from Lil Fuccillo at Kenilworth Road in February 2001 after iust a week as Luton

Director of Football. The ex-Wimbledon manager returned to the game after a 20 month break having spent seven-and-ahalf years as the 'Crazy Gang' boss.

His achievements at Wimbledon are well renowned in English football: having kept his unfashionable side in the top division throughout his time at Selhurst Park, despite having to sell several of the club's best players to balance the books. It is generally thought that his departure from the club was one of the major factors that led to Wimbledon being relegated to Division One in 1999/2000, after fourteen years in the top flight.

As a player, Joe spent ten years as a rightback with Tottenham Hotspur before moving to Brighton and won 26 caps for the Republic of Ireland.

He took over from Peter Withe as

Wimbledon manager in 1992 and helped The Dons reach an unlikely sixth place in the Premiership in 1993/94, their highest ever finish in the top flight. He turned down the opportunity to succeed Jack Charlton as Republic of Ireland manager in 1996 and led his team to the semi-finals of the FA and League Cups and to eighth in the League.

His last two years in charge proved to be less successful, despite having spent a club record £7.5 million on striker John Hartson, but Kinnear was not helped by problems with his health, which also had an adverse effect on his team's performance. His return to football with The Hatters came as something of a surprise, with the club languishing at the bottom end of

Division Two.

His immediate aim was to save them from relegation to Division Three before attempting to transform their fortunes and lift them back to the top division in English football. However, after initial success, Kinnear could not prevent Luton from slipping into the bottom tier of the football league and his sights were set on a quick return to Division Two.

That was exactly what he got however, as in 2001-02, the team finished as runners-up in Division Three and secured an immediate promotion back to the Second Division.

Luton Town

DAVID BAYLISS

A horrendous illness and injury crisis, with 24 players unavailable, led to Luton making one of their best signings last season. Manager Joe Kinnear spent a week in November 2001 chasing players to try to plug the gaps, and discovered to his great delight that Rochdale were prepared to release their longestserving player. Centre-half Bayliss jumped at the chance to join the Hatters, and played a full part in the promotion campaign that followed. An inch under six foot tall, he had been at Spotland since he was a trainee, and made over 200 first-team appearances for Rochdale before deciding not to accept a new contract with them.

EMMERSON BOYCE

One of the many to come through from Luton's schools and youth development programme, the defender was signed as a YTS boy in the summer of 1995, and made the breakthrough to the League squad at the age of 19 midway through the 1999/2000 season after occasional appearances following a debut in the Auto Windscreens Shield in January 1999. He became a regular at right back, with a liking to attack on the overlap, and signed a new contract in the summer of 2002.

AHMET BRKOVIC

Believing a move would be good for his career, the midfield playmaker refused new terms at Levton Orient in the summer of 2001, to join Luton on a Bosman free transfer. Orient had signed him on a free from HNK Dubrovnik in the autumn of 1999, and he became a regular in their league squad. He was bitterly disappointed when they failed in the play-offs to win promotion to the Second Division, and decided he might have a better chance if he joined Luton. He was right, playing a valuable role, mainly on the right flank, to help Luton return to the Second Division at the first attempt.

CHRIS COYNE

The centre-half was playing for Perth Soccer Club when he was selected for the Australian under-17 squad for the 1994 youth World Cup, and came to the notice of Harry Redknapp, then manager of West Ham. Covne signed for the Hammers as a teenager. but Premiership chances were few and far between, and after loan spells at

Brentford and Southend. Covne went to Dundee, A £50,000 cheque persuaded the Scottish Premier League club to let the defender move to Kenilworth Road in September 2001 and Coyne rapidly became a crowd favourite in the promotion run that followed.



The striker was signed on loan from Stoke City in September 2001 when an injury crisis decimated the Hatters squad. He made an immediate impact, scoring on his debut, at Plymouth, and was soon signed on a permanent deal. His goals helped Luton win promotion last season. Crowe began his career as a YTS boy at Stoke, but found it difficult to hold down a regular place in their league side after a change of management and an influx of Scandinavian players. He was made available by Stoke after loan spells at Northampton and Bury.

TONY THORPE

Tony joined Cheltenham Town in the summer of 2001. His signing proved an inspiration as the Robins, who had struggled to score goals in their first two seasons as a Football League club, began to find the net regularly. He began his career in non-league football with Droylsden and was signed by Crewe manager Dario Gradi for £20,000 in 1990. It proved to be a sound investment as Tony hit 45 goals from 108 Football League starts and earned himself a £150,000 move to Port Vale in 1994.

ADRIAN FORBES

After considerable First Division experience, and with an England youth cap to his credit, Forbes was a surprise inclusion on Norwich City's list of players available for transfer in the summer of 2001, and Luton boss Joe Kinnear was delighted to pay £75,000 for a right winger to add width to his attacking formation. Forbes is noted for his ability to run at and past defenders, either to deliver crosses from out wide, or to cut in and have a crack at goal. He had been at Carrow Road for four years, starting as a trainee, before his move to Kenilworth Road.

A local discovery, Fotiadis chose to stay at school to gain GCSE A-levels before being a full-time soccer professional. He won England Schools caps at under-15 and under-18 level, and developed into an oldfashioned centre-forward, with good physique and power. But injuries and fierce competition for places restricted him to only one first team start last season, in the LDV Vans Trophy at Dagenham.

CARL GRIFFITHS

An impressive scoring record - a goal in every 2.5 starts for seven previous clubs - led to the striker becoming a major target for Luton after their relegation from the Second Division in 2001. They got their man from Leyton Orient for £65,000, but he suffered a broken leg soon afterwards and missed most of the promotion season after a highly promising start. His earlier moves had totted up to well over £1million, after starting as a trainee at Shrewsbury. His other clubs were Manchester City, Portsmouth, Peterborough, Leyton Orient, Wrexham, Port Vale and back to Orient for a second time.

PETER HOLMES

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A midfielder who once seemed destined for soccer stardom - he is a product of the FA School of Excellence, from the same year as Michael Owen -

After promotion last season, Joe Kinnear recruited four full timers. ALAN KIMBLE from his old Club Wimbledon, SOL DAVIS (£60,000) from Swindon, STEVE ROBINSON cost £50,000 from Preston and regular scorer against us TONY THORPE returned for a fourth spell at Luton. Loan men have been two keepers. both now back at their parent Clubs. BEN ROBERTS (Charlton) and CEDRIC BERTHELIN (Lens, in France) mean four keepers have been used this term.

Leavers have been JEAN-LOUIS VALOIS (Hearts), STUART DOUGLAS (Boston) and MATTHEW TAYLOR, a £400,000 sale to Portsmouth, Freed players, of which there have been seven, include ADAM LOCKE and STUART FRASER.

Three consecutive defeats prior to the holiday fixtures, at home to Colchester, at home to Cambridge (LDV) and at Wigan followed a sound 3-1 win at Tranmere. Luton of course beat us 3-0 at Kenilworth Road back in August, a scoreline they repeated against Swindon and exceeded against Guiseley (4-0) in the FA Cup. Away, they've won at Watford (Worthington Cup), Huddersfield, Stockport, Oldham Woking (LDV), Crewe, Stevenage (LDV), and Tranmere, so they're not afraid of unfamiliar territories. Their 10 match record to 20th December reads: LLLWDWWDLW.

Hotshot

19. Steve Howard

Joe Kinnear swooped on deadline day in March 2001 to prise the tall striker away from Northampton for £50,000, and the deal looks a bigger bargain with every game. Howard had cost the Cobblers a then record club fee of £120,000 when they recruited him from Hartlepool two years previously. He helped Northampton win promotion to Division Two. and they grudgingly accepted a third of their asking price for a player who would have left for nothing soon afterwards under the Bosman ruling. Howard exploded into action in his first full season with Luton, and his 24 goals made him the Third Division's top league marksman. and played a major part in Luton's drive to their player of the year.

Holmes has had to fight to stay in pro football... Sheffield Wednesday were his first club, but their relegation from the Premiership in May 2000 left them desperate to cut the pay-roll and he joined Luton for a nominal fee. He was on the fringe of Luton's promotion squad last season, and is hoping to establish himself in this campaign.

STEVE HOWARD

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MARVIN JOHNSON

Longest-serving player at Kenilworth Road, Johnson is probably the most popular member of the Kenilworth Road staff with his colleagues and fans alike, but he knows that his first team chances are likely to be limited this season as younger men make an impact. Always cheerful, even when recovering from injury setbacks, the defender is in his 15th season as a firstteam regular at Luton, his only club, having been on the books since he was schoolboy. He is the only member of the staff to have appeared in all four divisions for Luton - he made his debut at Goodison Park in 1988 in the old First Division, now the Premiership. He signed yet another contract in the summer, but has also gained coaching qualifications which will be put to use part-time with Luton's youth

KEVIN NICHOLLS

The tough-tackling midfielder began his career as a trainee at Charlton and quickly made an impact after skippering England youth teams at under-18, under-19 and under-20 levels. At the time Joe Kinnear, now manager of Luton, was in charge of Wimbledon, and made a note of the young Nicholls, and just before last season started he was surprised - and well pleased - to hear that Nicholls was available for

transfer. Charlton had sold him for £250,000 to Wigan in the summer of 1999, but the move did not work out, and Luton's offer of £150,000 led to him moving to Kenilworth Road. He guickly became team captain, and his huge enthusiasm and ferocious tackling soon made him a big favourite with Luton fans, although opponents did not always view his allaction style with similar relish.

STEVE ROBINSON

Having rebuilt his side to win promotion from the Third Division, manager Joe Kinnear knew that an even stronger squad was needed for this season's challenge, and one of his first summer signings was midfielder Robinson, for £50,000 from Preston North End. Capped five times by Northern Ireland, the attacking midfielder had made his name at Bournemouth after joining the Cherries on a free transfer from Sours, where he had been a trainee. He hit 60 goals in 286 appearance for Bournemouth, an enviable strike rate from

midfield, and Preston paid £375,000 for him. But he failed to make the same impact in two years at Deepdale, and jumped at the chance to get his career moving again when Luton came in for him.

ALAN NIELSEN

WITH Luton's promotion bid going well in February 2002, Joe Kinnear felt it was the right time to boost his squad for the run-in, and defender Neilson, a former Welsh international, was signed on a free transfer after being released by Grimsby as part of a cost-cutting exercise. He brought with him plenty of top football experience. His international career began with appearances for



Wales at youth and under-21 level, followed by five full caps, and he enjoyed a good career in the Premiership, with his first club Newcastle and then with Southampton and Fulham, and established himself at right back for Luton in the closing stages of last season.

He was influential in the Luton team that won promotion last season, and manager Joe Kinnear's determination to guide Luton to a second successive step up helped to persuade Spring to remain at his only club, rather than insist on leaving under freedom of contract.


Stopper 24. Sol Davis

It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when the highly-rated defender decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of last season. Swindon boss Andy King failed in attempts to persuade him to sign a new deal, and Luton manager Joe Kinnear nipped in to add the tough-tackling left back to his squad. Davis had joined Swindon as a trainee in the summer of 1998, and made rapid progress through the youth and reserve teams to become a regular in the Nationwide League.

1. Mark Ovendale

The arrival of a new board of directors at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2000 enabled Luton to break a depressing pattern set over the previous three years. Then, with continuing financial problems, including a spell in receivership, Luton had been great sellers of players, and very rarely buyers. That changed when Mike Watson-Challis became the chairman and made cash available to secure goalkeeper Ovendale from Bournemouth for £425,000, a Luton record fee for a goalkeeper. He was previously with Wisbech, Northampton and Barry Town. Last season he was one of two capable goalkeepers fighting for the keeper's jersey, competing with Carl Emberson. Each had spells in the team, knowing the other was always waiting to displace him.



Player Profiles Shaun & Shayne

Two new faces in Chesterfield's squad for the festive fixtures are on loan attacking midfielder Shaun Wilkinson and striker Shavne Bradley, signed on until the end of the season.

Shaun (21), born in Portsmouth, is in the middle of a six week loan spell from Brighton & Hove Albion, his only previous League Club. He joined the Seagulls' Scholarship scheme and went on to make his debut as an 18 year old as sub for 21 minutes, replacing Ryan Palmer, against Swansea City on 18th December 1999. He played for 40 minutes against Plymouth that season, but for the next two seasons, he was restricted to just one first team run out for Brighton, as a sub against Barnet



in March 2001.

The 2002-03 season saw Shaun start five times for a struggling Brighton side, after sub appearances against Burnley and Coventry, he made his first full start against Norwich City on 17th August, a 2-0 win for the visiting Canaries clipped The Seagulls' wings. He was subbed near the end of that game but completed his first 90 minutes in senior football in the 1-0 loss at Wimbledon. More sub appearances before a 120 minute game and his first senior goal, Brighton's 34th minute leveller at home to Exeter in

the Worthington Cup, a game Brighton won 2-1 after extra time.

Starts against Gillingham and Stoke followed before a return to the bench, his last Albion appearance was in the infamous Brighton 2 Sheffield United 4 match on 19th October, he came on in the 85th minute with the scores at 2-2!

Bradley (23), born in Gloucester, began at Southampton, making 4 appearances as a sub in the Premiership for them, his first on 12th December 1999, four days after his 19th birthday, an 87th minute replacement for James Beattie at Everton, who won 1-0. An even later sub appearance at Chelsea followed before 15 minutes were experienced at home to Newcastle.

Shayne then went on loan to Swindon Town, his first start was a bit of a nightmare, a 6-0 home defeat against Ipswich Town, Shayne was subbed at 5-0. That spell in April 1999 (7 games) was followed by his final Southampton sub game, again at Everton, a 4-1 loss.

On to Exeter, again on loan, and during his spell there, in the Autumn of 1999, he bagged his first goal,

after 3 minutes of Shrewsbury 1 Exeter 4, and he tasted an early bath in the FA Cup win over Eastwood Town.

In the summer of 2000 a £150,000 fee took him to Mansfield Town, 8 goals came in his first season, including two against Barnet (Stags won 4-1), he played in both games against us that season, as an early sub for the badly injured ex Spireite James Lomas at Saltergate (4-0 to The


Spireites!) and in our 1-0 win at

The players union, the Professional Footballers' Association, has agreed to give Derby County a loan, reported to be worth £0.5m to aid its financial situation. The loan will be paid over the course of the season to the First Division club, whose debts are believed to total between £20m-£30m. "We are giving Derby financial assistance, but that is just one piece of the jigsaw," said PFA



deputy chief executive Mick Maguire. "The club will have to sell players in January, cut players' wages

and exercise a number of other financial strategies. Our loan is just the final piece of the jigsaw." Earlier in the week, Italian forward Fabrizio Ravanelli had agreed to take a deferral of around 25% on his salary, which is thought to be around £40,000 a week.

The Football League's acting chief executive, Peter Heard, has revealed that clubs promoted from the Conference to the Third Division will from next season be given a year to bring their stadiums up to FL standards. "If they win promotion and they don't have a grade 'A' ground then they will be given one year to put that right," Heard told media.

Meanwhile, FL spokesman lan

Christon has confirmed to media that the FL is close to announcing a £20m loan to help its 92 clubs cope with the financial fallout caused by the collapse of ITV Digital earlier this year. "We are close to a deal that will be worth a similar amount to the package unveiled recently." he told media. Last Friday it was revealed that the FL clubs will be handed £20m - paid in two tranches, one this week and one next August - which has been diverted from the Football Stadia Improvement Fund.

Sheffield Wednesday finance director Bob Grierson has revealed that the First Division club's board has invested in over £2.85m themselves into club as part of an agreement with the Co-Op Bank. The agreement with the Co-Op has been extended until October 2004 and is reported to comprise a £17m loan, plus a £3.9m overdraft. Currently the club's overdraft stands at £18.4m, Grierson said. The news emerged at the club's AGM held on Monday, at which director Dave Allen also admitted that he had put in over £2m himself. Grierson confirmed the recent set of results for last season which showed a pre-tax profit of £840,000 for the year to 31 May 2002. He forecast, however, a loss of £7.6m for the current financial year, with a £6.5m trading loss. The change in fortune was put mainly down to the end of parachute TV payments from the Premier League, the termination of the deal with ITV Digital and player amortisations worth £1.1m. "I believe the bank would continue to support us because the board has put a credible alternative to administration," Grierson told

shareholders. He added that the club was looking for new directors willing to pay £500,000 in cash to join the board. Four potential candidates have already been approached including boxing promoter Dennis Hobson.

Sheffield United plc acting chairman Kevin McCabe has revealed that a shareholders' forum will take place at the end of the current season at which plans for the company's financial reorganisation will be discussed. Former chairman and major shareholder Mike McDonald will be asked to attend, McCabe said at the plc's AGM on Monday evening, to which around 300 shareholders went. In June, McDonald voted against proposals for an open share offer which could have raised up to £4.05m through the issue of 57,905,401 new shares funding which the club estimated it needed to cope with the shortfall caused by the collapse of ITV Digital. This meant that it failed to gain the 75% shareholder approval required. If the share offer had been passed, a group of four directors of the club, along with several others (including



actor Sean Bean), would have underwritten £3.5m of the £4m to be raised from the offer. Of the £3.28m minimum net

proceeds, £1.8m would have been used to repay bank loans and £1.5m to develop the club's academy. McCabe said he was sure that McDonald would be happy to come to the forum.




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Football Matters

Let's aim for more than a happy new year



As we enter the new year football in the lower divisions is as unstable as it's ever been. Peter Kenvon's

opinion may impress his fat cat Premiership counterparts but if we were to suggest to our visitors today that it was fine for Watford to stay in the League but at their expense we all know the answer. I suspect we'd even support Mansfield's right to exist even if we were to be the heneficiaries

Not only do the guys at the top know virtually nothing about lower league football but just as importantly they've failed to understand the role a club should play in the local community. We have the not so benign Ron Roades showing no community inclination at all. He owns two grounds (Brentford and Selhurst Park) and is regularly displaying his avaricious intentions by looking to sell Griffin Park from the under the fans' noses. His ideas have ranged from shipping the Bees out to Woking or ground sharing with a number of clubs within a 50 mile radius, such is the pull of prime London building land. Just as frightening is the fact that Palace's lease is up in 7 year's time and

Uncle Ron will be looking to capitalise there too!

The Football League has consistently shown it's lack of aumption when it comes to sorting out its own house - don't forget there is still nothing to stop any person with villainous intent (who can I be referring to ?) taking over a Football League club. It bottled it on the Wimbledon issue because it was a Division 1 side and Koppel had convinced several other divisional chairmen to support his

We now need it to be enshrined in the FL rules that a club represents it's locality and that persons becoming involved in a League club can not manipulate the rules and the law by creating new subsidiaries to gain personal windfalls (York City being a perfect example).

If the League can't police itself, what chance have the fans got when it comes to always picking up the pieces? Across the channel in Belgium on the day I visited Mechelen last month the Belgian Fist division club, former winners of the European Cup Winners cup, went bankrupt. The owner had put in £1m, no-one else stepped forward - end of club. At the time of writing fans are trying to raise money to allow the team to complete its fixtures but they are not optimistic. Another Belgian Div 1 side, RWD Molenbeek became

extinct during the close season. Both clubs suffered from a lack of community involvement and a lack of local support because the more glamorous, easy-to-get-to Bruges, Anderlecht and Liege had captured large chunks of fans who should have been better embraced by their local clubs.

We've got to get the balance right - fans need to turn up in greater numbers and the clubs need to reward their lovalty. Football clubs may be businesses legally speaking but, as Dave Conn (the marvellous journalist who did so much to untangle the mystery behind our ruinous recent era) points out in The football Business, that was an accident rather than by design. Football clubs are community assets that belong to their fans and their communities, who steward them from one generation to the

Football will only emerge stronger from its current crisis if the authorities take a stance and prevent the liquidators moving in to plunder and asset strip because, believe me, there are many people out there who still eve football clubs as financial opportunities.

We are so lucky here at Chesterfield - but probably don't realise how lucky - that we've got an opportunity to turn a nightmare situation, inherited by CFSS, into a modern day fairy story. The fans must play their part by being as patient as Crewe fans have been while we build on this season's solid progress to date and ensure that together we not only have a happy new year but a long and vibrant future too!

The player was shown a yellow/red card ... unfortunately not an infrequent happening, but to answer what happens next, the Football Association have rules about all eventualities. If we concern ourselves with "Disciplinary Procedures Concerning Field Offences" in "First Team Competitive Matches" (FTCM) for Football League Clubs, the rules are covered on pages 194 - 200 of the Football **Association Handbook** Season 2003/03.

In summary, a yellow card equates to one caution and if a player receives five cautions from the start of the season to the last day in February, he will receive a one match suspension from FTCM. A player who has already been subject to disciplinary action over five cautions and then goes on to record five more during the same season before the second Sunday of April, will receive a two match suspension from FTCM. 15 cautions in a season

Disciplinary Procedures

would mean automatic suspension for three FTCM, if a player manages 20 cautions he will be invited to a visit with the disciplinary commission. Any period of suspension commences on the 14th day after the last offence.

Players sent off will receive a match ban depending upon the reason for dismissal. In summary the offences are (1) second vellow card in the same match - one FTCM (2) hand ball to deny goal/goal scoring opportunity - one F T C M (3) offensive or insulting language etc. two FTCM (4) serious foul play/violent conduct - three FTCM.

Players sent off for a second time in the same season will be suspended for one extra match, a third red card in the same season will increase the suspension for two extra matches and so on. Outstanding

suspensions at the end of the season will be carried over to the next season.

An administration fee of £7.00 is payable by each player in connection with a yellow or red card offence. The responsibility for fining players for field offences is left with the club who have to report any fines imposed or even if 'no fine' is made on the player.

Clubs are punished if 6 or more players are cautioned of dismissed from the field of play in the same match and the fine for a Division Two Club is £2,500 for a first offence. For a second/third/fourth occasion in the same season the fines will be £5.000/£7.500/£10,000 respectively. The Football Association can impose further penalties on clubs whose disciplinary record is considered worse than average.

His acquisition for only £8,000 represented a fine piece of work on the part of Joe Shaw, who was alive to the fact that Rod was having a miserable time at Kenilworth Road and was desperate to get away. Rodney turned down a move to Brighton, choosing Chesterfield to

time to recover from a back injury that had dogged his final year at Luton. When Joe Shaw finally moved him into the middle his Chesterfield career took off. He lost a stone in weight and the crowd's attitude changed as they saw a fitter and better Fern, his partnership with Malcolm Darling being particularly effective.

Shaw left during the next season, to be succeeded Arthur Cox, and he and Rodney never really hit it off. Cox made Fern play through injuries that included a torn top scorer for three seasons, Fern felt undervalued and was not reluctant to leave when his contract came up for renewal in the summer of 1979. Rotherham came in with an offer which more or less doubled his wages and, under Jim McGuigan and, later, lan Porterfield and Emlyn Hughes, Fern became an important member of the Millers' side that came within an ace of promotion to Division One, having won the Third Division



11. First and Last

Collectors of the programmes issued by clubs in their last season of membership of the Football League invariably feel like spectres at the feast. The last League programme before failing to be re-elected, or resigning from the League in financial ruin, is hardly a celebratory document. Far happier are the first League match programmes issued by clubs who replace the departed, and both types are extremely collectable as well as being of some football historical significance. In general, programmes throughout the first or last season of League clubs are of greater interest to collectors, and therefore more valuable, than ordinary League issues.

Taking the dear departed first of all (those who replaced them will be considered in the next match programme), one has to have a great deal of luck - and deep pockets - to be in possession of prewar issues from Thames, Merthyr, Aberdare and so forth. They do exist - but in single numbers only, some seventy years after their clubs drew their last League breath. First to fall after the war were New Brighton, replaced by Workington in 1951, and their red and white issues still appear on the market, albeit fetching offers in excess of £20.

Gateshead and Accrington were next to leave the League, and remain reasonably plentiful, albeit home programmes now appearing only on offer; which in any case they would warrant by their age, irrespective of their significance in terms of League membership. Accrington issues were never the hardest to come by in the 1950s and have survived well. They were reasonably substantial items of 20 or 24 pages - albeit completely dominated by advertisements. Gateshead programmes were smaller in page number, but often appear on superior quality paper, so they too have survived the passing decades.

More northern clubs fell at the end of the 1960s and early 1970s Bradford Park Avenue, Barrow, Southport and Workington. Their home programmes remain reasonably plentiful and are sold. at roughly double the value of contemporary league programmes. Collectors have been sweeping up these issues in recent years, and their value will certainly appreciate in the near future, as demand for them continues. While the dwindling home support for these ex-league clubs will collect fewer programmes as they suffer non-league football, new generations of collectors of the League teams they played maintain the demand for these programmes.

For more than a decade, there were no new instances of "Last Season League programmes", despite annual scare stories about the perilous financial position of lowly clubs. Eventually, however, Aldershot and Maidstone United succumbed. The introduction of promotion and relegation from and to the Conference also increased the collecting set. Darlington, Colchester United and Lincoln City fell, happily to return after only one season; Halifax Town still languish

Only the legislators have saved Torquay United, Northampton Town and Exeter City in recent seasons, although doubts about their ability to beat the drop result in a disproportionate interest in their current season programmes from collectors anxious to

steal a march - and beat the increased prices - of "Last Season" league
