Inside Forward

WITH Dean Crowe ruled out of action for the rest of the season because of a broken leg sustained at Mansfield on Tuesday, Joe Kinnear was yesterday trying to persuade two strikers to join the Town's promotion campaign by signing loan deals. As we went to press he would not name them, except to say that both are experienced forwards with First Division clubs, but currently out of their league sides.

If either is signed he will be in today's squad. "I'm not into signing Mr Average," said the boss. They are front runners, and familiar names in the game. But the search also continues for a pair of wingers to improve the balance of the side. As he says in his column, he thinks the squad of available players is "a bit thin" because of the latest crop of injuries.

The boss has been able to sign one player on a short term contract, fullback Duncan Jupp, formerly with Wimbledon, and more recently at Notts County. "Fit as a fiddle, a strong runner, and won't let us down," was the manager's description.

He knew the player from his days at Wimbledon, who paid £200,000 for him from Fulham in 1996. The Town made their offer to him after impressive performances in a couple of reserve games. Notts County thought they had beaten Joe to Jupp, but having gone into administration they were not able to offer him a full contract after he made half a dozen appearances for them. Ironically, their next sight of him was in the Town squad last Saturday.

Jupp, 28, a former Scottish under-21 international, is normally a right back, but can play on either flank and made a brief debut as a sub at Meadow Lane before replacing lan Hillier for his full debut at Mansfield. He will probably make his home debut this afternoon.

Defenders On The Way Back

Hopefully, Lars Hirschfeld, on loan from Tottenham, will also be in the team today, but his loan agreement includes a stipulation that Spurs can recall him at 24 hours notice if anything happens to their two senior keepers.

The Canadian international's loan is for a month, initially at least, and the chances of a permanent deal are slim: the 24-year-old is



on a four-year contract at White Hart Lane, being groomed as an eventual replacement for Kasey Keller and Neil Sullivan.

He has appreciated the chance of first-team football, and Joe is well pleased with what he has seen so far. The keeper, he said, was not down for any of the goals conceded at Nottingham and Mansfield.

Russ Perrett, out injured since mid-November, is ready to compete for a recall, having had a very brief appearance as a sub at Field Mill on Tuesday. David Bayliss is also getting

close, and both defenders were frustrated when Wednesday's reserve game against Crystal Palace was called off, because they hoped to play to show the boss they were ready for a return to league soccer.

The postponement also disappointed several clubs, who had hoped to watch Carl Griffiths in action. After dreadful luck with injuries, Griffiths, 32 in the summer, seems likely to leave Kenilworth Road.

Exeter, Lincoln, Rushden & Diamonds, Dagenham & Redbridge and Woking have all enquired about him, and the Town manager said: "If he wants to talk to any of them, he is free to do so."

Chris Willmott's month loan from Wimbledon ends after today's game, with the boss thinking over an approach to extend it.

New Contract For Midfielder

HAVING been part of the first team squad recently, midfielder Michael Leary was given a new two-year contract this week. It was a nice early birthday present – he will be 20 next month. Born in Ealing, he has been at Kenilworth Road since he was a schoolboy, progressing through the youth and reserve teams. His only first team experience so far was in the LDV Vans Trophy, with a full game at Woking and a substitute appearance at Stevenage.

His manager said: "He's an aggressive player, something like Kevin Nicholls, and not frightened to stick his foot in. He has done well in training, and he has a good attitude."

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
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Captain's View

THERE has been some very certainly score one or two straight talking in the dressing room this week, after our very performances Nottingham and Mansfield.

I felt devastated. We are capable of doing so much better, but in recent weeks too many players have let themselves down. We let six points slip through our fingers in the space of four days, to teams we should have beaten that. In four games over the comfortably. Are Notts County better than us? Are Mansfield? No way, would have been my answer a week ago. But they were able to beat us all too easily, and it was all down to our awful defending.

You never know why you can play better some days than others, and players performances, naturally, do dip. But even if you are having a bad game, you have to give 100 per cent.

answer is to have a bit of bottle, and whatever your form stand expect to beat teams like them. up to be counted and do your bit for the team. The worse you play, the harder you must try. I am desperate to do whatever I can to help get the best out of we play the big teams, that is everyone at all times.

We hardly got going at Meadow Lane on Saturday, and while County's goals were well struck, the guy should never have been given the chance to get through us. There were some harsh words said after that game, and I really expected us to bounce back at Mansfield. We knew what to expect there, and once again all we had to do was to defend properly, knowing that we would almost

ourselves.

Unbelievably we gifted the at opposition a goal in the first ten minutes, when the ball should have been booted up to row Z instead of being allowed to reach a striker in the box. Not one defender was within a yard of him, and the same was true of their other goals.

> I get angry about things like past two seasons Mansfield have put 13 goals past us, and taken nine points to our three. That average is not good.

That leads to something else that makes me angry with our record in recent weeks: Blackpool apart, we have given good accounts of ourselves against the top teams. But we have lost to outfits like Notts County, Mansfield and Brentford. I am not being disrespectful to any of those My philosophy is that the best clubs when I say that as I expect Luton to win promotion, I If we can't we won't deserve to go up. And if we don't stop leaking goals, forget it. And if players are up for it only when an attitude which must be changed.

Much, much more has been said in the privacy of the dressing room, but don't get the impression from this that I am not still very optimistic. I sympathise with the fans who paid good money to watch poor performances at Nottingham and Mansfield.

But not so long ago we were defending solidly, and we have shown in the past that we can

bounce back from bad results.

We have 11 games to put things right and must treat every one as a cup final. Every single player must run his socks off. We have done the talking. Now it's time for action.

We have a wonderful opportunity, and we have to strain every muscle to try to grab it. Just imagine, if we can win promotion again, what a wonderful two years that will have been for everyone connected with the club. And what a prospect - to be playing next season just one division below the best league in the world. That thought alone should galvanise us into action for the rest of the season.

We have been fortunate that other teams have also suffered wobbles recently, and the gap between us and sixth place is only four points. We still have a hell of a good chance of closing it, but only if we play with a lot more professionalism today, and in the other ten games to

At our best we can take care of anyone. We have had a harsh reminder this week that only our best is good enough, whoever the opposition are, and I hope that today we will rediscover it. Conceding another double to Mansfield hurts. Today, it's our turn: Huddersfield are another team battling to get away from the bottom end of the table, and we know what to expect. This time we must do the business and kick off another winning run.

the consultant again during the next few days, and the consultant's report will decide where we go from there.



1: SCOTT BEVAN BORN: SOUTHAMPTON DOB: 16/9/79 HEIGHT: 6FT 6INS

Arrived at the beginning of the season on a 12 month loan from Southampton, where he was third in line. Scott is keen to prove himself as a number one. Suffered a recent injury which has kept him out of contention for the last 3 weeks.

35: PHIL SENIOR BORN: HUDDERSFIELD DOB: 30/10/82 HEIGHT: 5FT 11INS

Phil was involved with the first

team squad last season on the bench and following a recent injury to Scott Bevan he has become our regular first team keeper. Phil came through the Academy system and was a pupil at Lilleshall, after which he represented England at youth level. Although only 5 foot 11 he makes up for his lack of stature with his exceptional agility

Gareth signed for Town on a free transfer just days before the start of the 2001/2002 season from Leeds United. Having graduated through the youth ranks at Elland Road to make his debut in the Champions League against 1860 Munich. He made a number of appearances from the bench for Leeds before the lure of regular first team football led him to the McAlpine. Evans has been out all season with a knee injury.

4: NATHAN CLARKE BORN: HALIFAX DOB: 30/7/83 HEIGHT: 6FT 2INS

A teenage centre-half who signed professional forms in September 2001 after impressing in the Academy ranks. In his first season in the first team Nathan impressed but has had injury problems this season and after making a comeback with an impressive display against Barnsley has suffered another injury setback.

5: ADRIAN MOSES BORN: DONCASTER DOB: 4/5/75 HEIGHT: 5FT 10INS

Joined Town from Barnsley for an undisclosed fee in December 2000. He worked his way up through the ranks at Oakwell to establish himself in the first team picture. Represented England at under 21 level and has also played in the Premier Division for Barnsley. He made his Huddersfield debut as a secondhalf substitute against Tranmere Rovers in December 2000, but did not feature in the first team on a regular basis under the previous regime. Has become a regular this season missing out on the recent Barnsley derby through suspension.

17: EDDIE YOUDS BORN: LIVERPOOL DOB: 3/5/70 HEIGHT: 6FT 2INS

Eddie joined Town during the closed season from Charlton Athletic. Previous clubs include Ipswich Town and Bradford City. The impressive centre back has had an injury plagued career but as club captain following the departure of Steve Jenkins he is determined to make a success of

his career at Huddersfield.

20: THOMAS HEARY BORN: DUBLIN DOB: 14/2/79 HEIGHT: 5FT 10INS

Thomas is one of the club's longest serving players, having risen through the ranks after originally being spotted playing non-league football in Dublin by Academy Director Gerry Murphy. He made his first team debut against Stoke City on Boxing Day 1996. During his time at the club he has played in a variety of positions. Heary has represented his country from youth to under 21 level.

22: KEVIN SHARP BORN: CANADA DOB: 19/9/74 HEIGHT: 5FT 8INS

Kevin Sharp has previously enjoyed spells with Leeds United, Wigan and Wrexham and has established himself as a regular left back since his arrival in the close season.

Bruce from Birmingham City for a fee of £100,000, and made his debut in February 2000. He started his footballing career as a trainee at Preston before moving to Newcastle United and then Birmingham. A pacy midfielder, Chris has been a regular member of the first team during his time at the club.

7: DANNY SCHOFIELD BORN: DONCASTER DOB: 10/4/80 HEIGHT: 5FT 11INS

Danny signed for the club in the summer of 1998 from non-league club Brodsworth Town and made everyone sit up and take notice when he broke into the first team last season and for a time he topped the goal scoring chart. He can operate on either flank or is equally effective as a striker. Has been out of the side following a hernia operation but hopes to return before the end of the season.

8: KENNY IRONS BORN: LIVERPOOL DOB: 4/11/70 HEIGHT: 5FT 10INS

Arrived at the McAlpine from Tranmere Rovers during the summer of 1999 for a fee of £450,000. Built a reputation at Prenton Park as a hardworking midfielder with an eye for goal. A free kick specialist, one of his most memorable games for Town was at Stamford Bridge when his stunning free kick knocked Chelsea out of the Worthington Cup.

10: JOHN THORRINGTON BORN: SOUTH AFRICA DOB: 10/7/79 HEIGHT: 5FT 8INS

Thorrington joined Town after a

successful trial period in March 2001 after playing for Manchester United and Bayer Leverkusen. Thorrington made his full debut against Bury on August 25 2001. Impressed at the beginning of last season with his pace on the wing, but had a spell on the sidelines with an ankle injury and missed on a USA call up. Has been in and out of the side this season.

11: SIMON BALDRY **BORN: HUDDERSFIELD** DOB: 12/2/76

Simon is a product of Town's successful youth system. He operates effectively on the right wing but has played occasionally as a striker. Since signing a new contract last season reoccurring injuries kept him out of the side last season but he is currently

29: JONATHAN WORTHINGTON **BORN: DEWSBURY** DOB: 16/4/83 **HEIGHT: 5FT 9INS**

Jonathan Worthington is another Academy success. Jonathan is a gritty midfielder and has become a regular member of the first team squad.

33: DWAYNE MATTIS **BORN: HUDDERSFIELD** DOB: 31/7/81

HEIGHT: 6FT 1INS

Dwayne came up through the ranks at his hometown club and made his first team debut as a second-half substitute in May 1999 against Crystal Palace. He broke through into the first team last season. Has attained international honours with Ireland.

Blast From the Past

both Huddersfield Town and ourselves boast long and eventful histories we have locked horns only infrequently with the first clash for league points taking place as relatively recently as 1952.

lthough

During the 1952/53 campaign the Hatters had surprised the football world by being amongst the front runners in the old Division Two for almost the whole season. Surprising, because we had just endured several seasons of scrapping at the wrong end of the table and indeed had narrowly avoided relegation in 1951.

Huddersfield were looking for a quick return to the top flight, following relegation the previous year, and easily saw off the Hatters in an early season game at Leeds Road, the 0-3 defeat turning out to be our biggest of the campaign.

In the return at Kenilworth Road in February 1953 we looked to gain revenge but went down 0-2 in

front of a crowd of 25,831. We were third in the table at the time with Huddersfield one place above us, but whereas the Terriers could boast a settled side we had six first teamers out injured with two others, Jesse Pye and Roy Davies, included but barely fit. It came as no real surprise, therefore, when two goals in three minutes midway through the first half from Jimmy Glazzard and Roy Shiner killed off the game.

The Terriers won promotion at the end of that season at our expense but it was only two years before we joined them in the old Division One.

spell in 1955/56, when we took to our new home in the top flight like ducks to water, Huddersfield were one of our victims with Gordon Turner and Jim Adam scoring in a 2-0 win at Leeds Road. By the time of the return however, we were struggling and Huddersfield inflicted our sixth

straight defeat, stretching back to Christmas 1955, in winning 2-1 at Kenilworth Road.

Turner scored his normal goal, but Bill McGarry netted trice on a snowbound pitch to send the points back north. The Hatters managed to halt their slide the following week but Huddersfield were unable to maintain the momentum gained from their win and were relegated at the end of the season.

It was to be another four years before paths crossed again, this time in the old Division Two, and our first game following relegation was at Leeds Road. Sam During our early season bright Bartram, in his first match in charge, saw a satisfactory 1-1 draw with that man Turner scoring once more after latching on to a cross from debutant winger Stuart Imlach.

Turner was on the scoresheet yet again in the return, banging in the only goal of the game and taking away some of the glory from another debutant, Jim Fleming.

When the teams met at Kenilworth Road the following season, the Town had started off the campaign winning three games out of four and looked to have two more points in the bag when they went 3-1 ahead through goals from Tom McKechnie, Jack Lornie and a John Coddington own goal. Whether it was the heat or complacency I cannot remember, but we ended up losing 3-4 and effectively kissed our hopes of promotion goodbye...in August!

The return at Leeds Road that season, played in January, saw the Town pull off a shock 2-1 win, after a run of four successive defeats without scoring a goal. The Luton marksmen that afternoon

were McKechnie and Bob Morton but local boy Robin Chandler. making a rare appearance, certainly put himself about according to reports and was unlucky not to get on the scoresheet.

At the end of the following season we suffered relegation but one of our rare wins was against this afternoon's visitors. Both games were played within seven days of each other in March 1963 following the 'Big Freeze' and in the first, at Leeds Road, we went down 0-2 in a dismal game with Mike O'Grady setting up Derek Stokes for the first and worrying Luton centre-half Terry Kelly into an own goal.

A crowd of only 5,507 turned up at Kenilworth Road the following week to see a Luton side, showing four changes, go into a three goal lead with strikes from Fred Jardine, Turner (again) and Harry Walden. O'Grady engineered a Huddersfield fightback to 3-2 but the Town were fully deserving their first win for three months. On now to 1972/73 and just as the sixties saw the Hatters fall from grace the same can be said of Huddersfield in the seventies as they tumbled from Division One to Division Four in double guick time.

Huddersfield only lasted one season in the old Division Two and the Hatters helped them on their way with an early season 4-1 home win, with Vic Halom scoring after only 90 seconds, and a 2-1 victory at Leeds Road where all the goals could be put down to the snowy conditions.

A crowd of just 3,871 saw Geoff Hutt lob a frozen Keith Barber in the Luton goal before Barry Butlin took advantage of a poor backpass to equalise. This was followed by a David Lyon own goal when he slipped in trying to clear the ball.

Paths crossed for the final time in 1995/96 at the end of which we were relegated from Division One. The clash at Kenilworth Road on 23rd December 1995 marked the first game in charge for new manager Lennie Lawrence who took

over a side that was rock bot-

tom with only four wins from 22 league starts.

As is often the case the players were out to impress the new man and Dwight Marshall fired the Hatters into a half-time lead. The dismissal of Steve Davis for an alleged professional foul on Huddersfield striker Andy Booth was harsh but inspired the Terriers into a 2-1 lead before a glorious diving header from David Oldfield earned a point for the ten

By the time of the return, in March 1996 at the new McAlpine Stadium, the initial momentum gained by Lawrence's appointment had been lost and the Hatters were drifting down to Division Two. Huddersfield were aiming for the play-offs at the time but the Town made them fight all the way before a wonder strike from Rob Edwards with 15 minutes left secured all three points for the home side.

At the start of the 1952/53 season the Town decided to get a bit 'racy' with their programme by including a photo of a first team player on the cover for the first time.

For the visit of Huddersfield, Glasgow born and former Ranger, Charlie Watkins was featured and in the 'Club Notes' section it was mentioned that he was starting to build up a physiotherapy practice on the side. As is probably known Charlie continued to practice long after retirement from the professional game and was still turning out in charity games until only a few years ago!

Also in the 'Club Notes' section the importance of the clash with Huddersfield was emphasised. Third versus second with the Hatters havng played one game less made this a genuine 'four pointer'.

Much was written about the injury crisis at Kenilworth Road at this most important time of the season with a game at top side, Sheffield United, to come on the following Saturday but the general impression from reading


between the lines was that the squad would have to get on with it!

The Town stayed in third spot for the remainder of the campaign but went one place better two years later as they reached the top flight for the first time in their history.

County manager Billy Dearden put the best possible spin on his view. "I thought we deserved it, because we scored two magnificent goals," he said. The administrators had refused him permission to sign Jupp or anyone else, so he was well pleased with three points which kept his men clear of the pack at the bottom of the table.

Joe Kinnear was in subdued mood. Tranmere's win at Brentford enabled them to overtake the Town in the table again, although news that QPR had lost at Swindon gave the boss a bigger lift than his team's performance. "It was very disappointing," he said, and wondered if the rush of games in the previous couple of weeks had taken a toll.

"Whatever the reasons, we were second best," he added, "And I am disappointed at the manner in which we gave the goals away. We were well below par, with too many players looking jaded and tired.

"It was always looking like a 0-0. Good sides keep clean sheets and go away playing badly and getting a point. We needed someone to inspire us, but no-one could do that."







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Hatters Chatter

THE recent death of Gordon Dreyer closes a chapter in Luton Town history. The clever centrehalf was the last surviving member of the squad that almost won promotion to the old Division One in 1938/39. They were five points off the pace in the days when it was two points for a win, one for a

Roger Wash writes:

Regarded by many as one of the best-ever Town teams, they were attempting to go one better in 1939/40 and actually topped Division Two as war broke out. That ended many a blossoming career, including that of Gordon Dreyer who had fought so hard to make it to the

Born in Sunderland in 1914, Gordon was a close friend of the great Raich Carter, but whereas Carter had a glittering football career already mapped out, Drever had to start his professional life in the old Division Three (North) with Hartlepool.

Gordon recalled in later life that playing at that level required a good deal of fitness in order to avoid flying boots, with little protection being offered by ref-



erees in the days before video replays and match assessors in the stands. Washing on the train on the way back from an away match is also something that present day players do not have to put up with!

A transfer to Hull in 1935 turned out to be a disaster, and so it was back to Hartlepool before the club announced that it could not afford to pay its players over the summer months.

Gordon's girlfriend, later his

FOOTBALL CLUI wife, had moved with her

family from the North East to Luton in order to find work, and on a visit here to see her, the disillusioned footballer had a chance meeting with Hatters manager Ned Liddell, who had been at West Ham earlier, and had tried to sign the young stopper on amateur forms for the Hammers.

The upshot was the offer of a contract at Luton in 1937, and after 18 months in the reserves Dreyer finally made the first team centre-half position his own, only to see a hoped-for career at the top brought to an abrupt halt by Adolf Hitler.

Drever was called up for the Royal Navy, and spent a great part of the war in Australia. By the time hostilities came to an end he was the wrong side of 30, and after a few games for Bedford decided to hang up his boots.


There followed some scouting work for George Martin at Luton, and for his old pal Raich Carter, by then manager at Leeds, before spending 25 years at Vauxhall leading to a well deserved retirement in 1975.

THE PRICE of consecutive defeats at Nottingham and Mansfield was not as great as it might have been for the Town. The victory against Plymouth saw a climb of two places in the table, up to seventh, only for that rise to be cancelled out by the next two games.
