Inside Forward

HOLDING runaway leaders Wigan to a draw on Saturday was a pretty decent result for the Town. Steve Howard headed his 17th goal of the season in the 57th minute, with Neil Roberts saving a point for the champions-elect with a quarter of an hour to go.

But the best result of the week was probably one 48 hours earlier, when an FA enquiry threw out four misconduct charges against Kevin Nicholls.

They followed the match against QPR in November, when Howard and Nicholls were sent off. The nine men held out for a draw remarkably comfortably, and at the end of the match there were claims and counter-claims about acrimonious exchanges involving players and the two benches.

At the hearing in Birmingham Nicholls was accused of taking too long to leave the field after his second yellow card, inciting the crowd, and becoming involved in altercations with opposing players, and with their manager.

The Town disputed the allegations as soon as they were made, and were angry that it took so long for the hearing to be organised. While they were confident that if justice were done the skipper would be exonerated, there was also a worry that the disciplinary hearing had wide-ranging powers to dish out fines or long suspensions.

They need not have worried. After hearing the Town's rebuttal of every allegation, the charges were found not to be proved.

The skipper said: "The most important thing about the decision was that it ended the risk of me having to serve a lengthy ban. It is very important at this time of the season that we have all our key players available."

Joe Kinnear, who attended the hearing with the player and Town Secretary Cherry Newbery, said: "There were no grounds for Nicholls to be punished further than the suspension he had already served for being sent off. I read the referee's report after the game, and there was no mention of other incidents that cropped up later. I believe the complaint came from other people, and there were other implications."



Manager's View

WE WOULD, naturally, like to to play them out of position, be a little nearer to the top six places in the league as we prepare for kick-off this must have 100 per cent evening, but we have a marvellous opportunity to close the gap, with two home games in the next five days. Both are against teams above us in the table, so we know we are facing two tough tests.

every reason to believe we are capable of a top six finish at the very least. We were well worth our point at Wigan on Saturday, and that was the second time we have matched the league leaders. It was also the second time we came close to beating them, and it was galling that we went to the JJB having had another look at how they saved the game at Kenilworth Road in October, with a very late far post header by their skipper, Jason De Vos. "Don't let it happen again," was the order to our defence. So what happened? Once more we took the lead, with an excellent goal by Steve Howard. And once more we let Wigan back into it - another far post cross, another header by De Vos, and this time a final header by another striker.

That peeved me, but otherwise I was very pleased with the way we coped with what is probably the best team in the division. And we did it despite having to shuffle our pack at the back again, because of injuries. We have had to bring

back players a little earlier than might be ideal, and we have had but they have responded.

At this stage of the season we commitment and effort as the first priority, and we are getting it. > Yet twice Luton Town have proved to be their match, and on each occasion we made them sweat until the last minute to take a point off us. And even when they got their equaliser with 15 minutes to go on Saturday we had the confidence and ability to ensure that they didn't get a sniff of a victory.

It maintains our good record against this division's better teams. Not one of the sides currently above us in the table has been able to beat us yet, and two more are coming to Kenilworth Road this week to try to change that. Oldham, tonight, and Crewe on Saturday, will be desperate

to stop us completing doubles against them, while we must see every match until the end of the season as a six-pointer.

We are approaching the final shake-down, and we are in with a chance of closing the gap. because we also still have to play Bristol City, QPR and Tranmere. That means that despite the four-point gap between us and the top six, we are to a great degree in charge of our own destiny.

We need to win six of our remaining nine games to be pretty sure of getting into the play-offs, and that must be our minimum target.

Our home results have been too patchy for my liking, but except for Blackpool the failures have been against teams from lower down the table. For some reason we seem to find it easier to deal with the better sides, so perhaps we should be glad that five of our last nine are against teams currently above us.



Captain's View

IT WAS a pretty happy bunch of players who came home from Wigan on Saturday, with our draw and other results in the Second Division keeping us well in the chase for a playoff place.

We could have been even happier, because while our second draw with the runaway league leaders has to be seen as a decent result, we also knew we might well have won the game.

There was not a lot of good football played, and I think that was inevitable in view of the importance of the game to both sides. But we felt we did a good professional job, against the team I expect to take the championship. The first priority, for Wigan as well as for us, was not to be beaten, and it turned out to be a good contest.

I was delighted to play against my old club, having missed the previous games in the league and FA Cup, but my first visit back to the JJB Stadium was not really a special occasion for me. My time at Wigan was nothing great, and I have never been in any doubt that I made the right choice when I decided to accept a move to Luton. And that career decision nearly two years ago will look even better when we move up another division.

I am now Luton through and through now, and we are all very determined to do everything possible to achieve a second successive promotion. We all feel that the four-point gap between us and the top six can be closed, and if it is to be a bit of a scrap, we are ready to battle for the cause. I would rather see us grind out a succession of 1-0 victories than play pretty football and lose points.

Having said that, I think our last two performances have been pretty good, and I was well pleased with the way we played in taking the points in our last home game. Huddersfield were desperate because of the threat of relegation, and they made us work hard for the win. But I felt we were the better footballing side, as we had been when we won at their place.

The good team performance against Huddersfield helped to set us up for the game at Wigan, and I was pleased to see Russ Perrett back in the team. I thought he was the man of the match on Saturday, and Wigan's equaliser was not down to him. We were annoyed about the goal because we had talked about the dangers of Wigan set pieces, and the way their skipper likes to get upfield for headers from free kicks. Jason De Vos did us at Kenilworth Road, and he was involved again in their goal on Saturday.

Supporters might wonder how we allowed it to happen again. One answer is that Wigan were very crafty at the free kick to the far post. Steve Howard always drops back to mark his man when centre-

halves go upfield at free

kicks. More often than not he will beat them in the air and make the clearance. On Saturday he was back in defence marking De Vos. but as the free kick was played in Wigan sent in Matt Jackson to baulk the big man. The ref didn't spot it, De Vos was left clear for his header, and it led to the equaliser. I was angry that having lost the first ball to De Vos, the marking went absent when we should have won the second ball when Neil Roberts turned it into our net. Bristol City were the only top team to take three points on Saturday, so our draw left us still in with a very good chance of making the top six.

It means that every game from now until the end of the season is massive. We are proud of the fact that no team above us has beaten us in the league this season. But that record is about to face a series of tough tests, starting this evening.

But if we are at our best again, we can put three more points in the bag tonight, and then, hopefully, three more on Saturday at the expense of Crewe, and that could make the league table in a week's time look even better than it does now. At this stage we are chasing sixth place. I would settle for that, but if we put together a decent winning run, we could finish even higher than that.

It was good to see David Bayliss back in the starting line-up for the first time this year. His hamstring cramped up a little in the closing minutes, but it was nothing serious.

Russ Perrett, of course, returned after a four-month absence as a sub at Mansfield, and then was able to start the games against Huddersfield and Wigan to prove his recovery is complete.

Sol Davis and Alan Kimble were unable to travel to the JJB Stadium after picking up slight hamstring injuries in training, but again they are not major problems.

There was some good news for Emmerson Boyce, who has been out of action for a month with a groin injury. He was examined by a consultant, and the verdict was that Boyce will not need surgery, and his current course of treatment will get him fit again. He is doing strengthening work, and should be able to resume training in a fortnight or so.

Neilson has nearly recovered from his calf injury, and Mark Ovendale is back in training after getting over

tonsillitis. Lars Hirschfeld had missed the Huddersfield game because of a virus infection which soon cleared up.

Aaron Skelton has suffered a minor setback after making his comeback with the reserves last Wednesday. He played 45 minutes, but suffered a localised tendonitis problem at the bottom of a hamstring, so he is back in the treatment room. Happily, it is not a major problem.



Blast From the Past

Meetings with tonight's visitors started in 1953 following the Latics promotion to the old Division Two. On the opening day of the 1953/54 season the Town entertained Oldham in front of a crowd of 22,822 and a John Downie hat-trick, on his debut, helped earn a point in an end to end 4-4 draw.


By the time of the return the Latics were finding goals less easy to come by and were propping up the rest of the table. Two goals from the Town's record scorer Gordon Turner, in a 2-1 victory, did not help their cause as Oldham drifted towards inevitable relegation.

Ten years were to pass before paths crossed again, this time in the old Division Three, but Turner was still displaying his predatory instincts and was on target in a 2-1 home defeat in November 1963. In the following campaign the Town secured an unlikely double over the Latics but it was not

enough to prevent relegation to Division Four.

After three years in the football basement the Hatters emerged a reborn side and their first opponents back in Division Three were the Latics. A great deal of money had been spent over the summer of 1968 and it was reputed that £90,000, a previously unheard of amount for a club like the Town, had been forked out on players and improvements to the ground. The new players, Brian Lewis, Mike Harrison and Laurie Sheffield all made their debuts in front of a Kenilworth Road crowd of 14,747 which included brand new supporter Eric Morecambe. The supporters did not have to wait long before finding out whether the new boys could maintain their pre-season form as, after only 17 minutes, Lewis was upended in the area with the resultant spot kick expertly converted by Harrison.

The return that season was an altogether different game with the Town gifted an own goal in the first minute with a wind assisted Alan Lawson effort. The remainder of the match was one way traffic as Oldham lay siege on the Luton goal but, despite their best efforts, an equaliser would not

With the Latics relegation at the end of that campaign it was to be six years before paths crossed

again, Oldham winning 3-2 at Kenilworth Road November 1975 for their first away victory in over 18 months. In the following season a late goal from loanee forward David Geddis earned a valuable 1-0 win at Luton as the Town secured their ninth consecutive victory as they made an end of season bid for promo-

The next significant meeting took place on the opening day of the 1978/79 season at the start of David Pleat's first full campaign in the Luton hot seat. By selling Paul Futcher to



the Latics in August 1968.

Goals galore in clashes with the Latics

effort to ring the changes at Kenilworth Road. In a mad summer of frantic transfer negotiations the upshot was that a bemused Kenilworth Road crowd of 8,043 turned out to see the Town line up with no fewer than seven new faces against the Latics.

By half-time the supporters were wondering whether Pleat knew what he was doing as the Latics had cruised into a comfortable 1-0 lead. What was said during the interval team talk has never been reported but the Town steamrollered Oldham in the second period, running in six goals without reply, with both Bob Hatton and David Moss netting twice on their debuts.

The next parting of the ways came at the end of the 1981/82 season as the Town walked away with he championship of the old Division Two. During that campaign Oldham became the first side to prevent the Town from winning on their travels following a 1-1 stalemate at Boundary Park.

Revenge was sweet, however, as the Hatters won 2-0 in the return with future Luton star Darron McDonough being dismissed for a nasty tackle on Lil Fuccillo and David Moss scoring direct from a

Oldham eventually won promotion to the top flight just as the Town were about to enjoy their final season at that level. The Latics were early season visitors to Kenilworth Road and were obviously hoping to build on their promising start to the campaign by beating a Hatters side that had only one win to show from seven

Luton manager David Pleat, back in charge for the second time, realised that a big 'Mick Harford type' centre forward was required and decided to invest in the best by signing Mick himself. The second coming of Harford was greeted by a rapturous home crowd but the game started in less than sparkling fashion with the Hatters forced to defend in depth against a Latics strikeforce of lan Marshall

and Graeme


It came as no real surprise when Marshall headed Oldham into the lead just after the interval, but the game began to turn with the introduction of fresh, young substitutes Paul Telfer and Kurt Nogan who were prepared to run at the Latics defence.

With five minutes to go, Nogan put over a low cross for Harford, who had got in front of his marker, to tap the ball in. The crowd went wild but the best was yet to come, for in injury time hesitancy in the Oldham defence was punished when Harford hit a sweet overhead kick into the roof of the net for an unlikely winner.

Since that dramatic finale, games between the two sides have been relatively low key affairs with the only highspots, before this season's dramatic win at Boundary Park, being Stuart Douglas netting on his debut in November 1995 and Andre Scarlett doing the same three years later.

Even so the smart Luton supporter of 26 years ago could have, in the meantime, bought a brand new home in Leighton Buzzard for £8,300. He or she would probably have paid off the mortgage by now!



ONE dramatmoment turned a game the Town needed to win to keep play-off hopes alive. After surviving for 50 min-









EVACUATION PROCEDURE

Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.
