

Inside Forward

THE Town's enforced day off a week ago saw them slip a little in the playoff chase, but gave more time for injured men to recover, and for the first time in months manager Joe Kinnear had a squad of 22 potential firstteamers in training this week.

Emmerson Boyce, Alan Neilson, Chris Willmott, David Bayliss and Alan Kimble all returned to action on Wednesday in a reserve side which beat Colchester at Kenilworth Road. Adrian Forbes was rested, having begun his comeback in the Second Division game against Crewe.

"It's like signing a new player," said the boss as he welcomed Forbes back to the squad. The Town have been in much need of a winger this season, but now the manager has two, having signed Sammy Igoe on loan from Reading until the end of the season.

The deal suits both parties. While Joe was desperate for more width, Igoe, 27, is out of contract at the end of the season, and wants more regular first-team football than Reading have been offering recently. So the move offers him a shop window, with the Town boss considering a contract offer in the summer.

Some Town fans may remember Igoe as part of the Reading team that whipped us 4-0 in the Worthington Cup last season. Born in Staines, Igoe began his career as a YTS boy with Portsmouth and played 160 games for them before a £100,000 move to Reading three years ago. He has played 87 matches for the Royals, and helped them win promotion to the First Division last season.

Midfielder Moves Out

WHILE Igoe moved in, Lee Mansell has gone out on loan to Conference club Nuneaton Borough. His Town career had surprisingly gone on hold after an explosive debut a couple of years ago when he scored in an FA Cup replay at QPR.

He claimed a regular place in the first team, but found himself in the reserves as the Town began to rebuild following relegation to the Third Division two years ago. New arrivals who competed for midfield places included Kevin Nicholls, Paul Hughes, Adrian Forbes and Ahmet Brkovic. But Mansell is still only 20 – he was the coaches' choice as young player of the year in 2000/2001 – and Joe has stressed that the loan deal is purely to give him a higher level of football than he was getting in the reserves. He has not been offered to Nuneaton on a permanent basis, and is still training with the Town. He has another year left on his Kenilworth Road contract.

CARL Griffiths, fighting his way back to match fitness after injuries, was a loan transfer target for two clubs, and the manager was willing to let him move if he chose to. Rushden and Diamonds wanted the striker to boost their promotion bid from Division Three, while Exeter City made an approach as they looked for fresh talent to lift them out of bottom place.

"I left the decision to Griff, but he decided to stay with us," said the manager. "He is out of contract in the summer, and is keeping his options open."



Manager's View

I HOPE that you, like us, have come to Kenilworth Road today with your appetite for football renewed after our week off. We have lost a little ground in the promotion chase, but the break from routine has done us good, and today we are offered an excellent opportunity to close the gap on the team immediately above us.

We cannot afford to make a mess of it the way we did so spectacularly in our last game. We had to give credit to Crewe, because their football was excellent. The judgement I had to make was how much Crewe's success was down to our performance. To a large degree the damage was self-inflicted. Just about every player was below par, and we helped to make Crewe look good. It was ironic to remember that we had beaten them fair and square at their place earlier in the season, but could not reproduce that form on our own pitch.

Our thanks are due to supporters who showed great patience as they watched us leaking four goals at home. I know how you must have felt, and I promise we will strain every muscle to prevent anything like that happening again.

We were a little fortunate that results elsewhere on the day, especially Wigan's win at Queens Park Rangers, were not as damaging to us as they might have been, but after QPR and Tranmere won last week we are now in a situation where we have to win our next three games.

After today, we use up our game

hand Cheltenham Tuesday, and then face a real crunch at Loftus Road in a week's time.

Our players dug themselves into this hole with their performance against Crewe: now they have the chance to prove a point to themselves, and to you, by digging themselves out of it with a winning run. The battle for sixth place is not over yet, and although we have made it more difficult for ourselves, we are still in with a shout.

We are certainly in a much better position than half the clubs in this division, and as I have said before after the first month of the season supporters were worried about relegation, not thinking about promotion. Our players have proved that they are a capable bunch, and like everyone else in football, except perhaps for the super-stars at places like Arsenal and Manchester United, they are ambitious to play at a higher level.

They want to test themselves in the First Division, and before we get too depressed by what Crewe did to us, it is worth remembering that we have put in some excellent performances in other games. The major flaw has been lack of consistency, particularly at home, but this week there has been a greater feeling of determination running through the squad. Failure in any of our remaining seven games is not an

The next eight days will go a long way to sorting out our prospects. I see no reason why we should not believe in our ability to collect nine points. If we do that we could well then be level with QPR, who are away to Cardiff today before meeting us next week. Needless to say, we feel we owe Rangers one after their lucky draw here in November! However, that match can wait.

The priority today is to wipe

out the motley Crewe memories, and put three more points in the bag. It is a must-win game. I would guess that Tranmere see it as a must-not-lose game, so the stakes are high for both sides, which should make for a good contest.


The squad from which the team will be selected will include Sammy Igoe, and I would like to welcome him to the club. He has already shown us in training that he is sharp and enthusiastic. He was one of several players I was chasing to strengthen the team, and I was delighted to secure his signature on loan forms on deadline day in the face of fierce competition from elsewhere. Various other approaches failed for a variety of reasons, but mainly because agents were asking for silly money and we were not going to wreck our wages policy.

And to return to the subject of the Crewe game, what a pleasure it was to see Adrian Forbes playing his first league game of the season. He has timed his return from injury perfectly, and after his long absence it was like having a new player in the squad. I had known for a long time that we needed more width and pace in the side, and the return of Forbsey and the signing of Igoe have given us an extra impetus just when it is most needed. Hopefully it will show in results if we end this season with a late winning run, as we did a year ago, another promotion is still within our grasp.

Keep the faith, and enjoy the game.

Captain's View

IT'S GOING to be hard to do it now, but while there is a chance of winning back a top six place we have to keep going, and, of course, we really have to win this afternoon. And whatever our future holds, I want to see us finish the season on a high, and with no more home points dropped.

I am sorry we didn't put on a better show for you against Crewe. We started brightly enough, and could have taken an early lead, and that has to be our aim this afternoon. But certainly we can't afford to be as poor as we were after that bright start.

Crewe were a good team but don't forget we beat them at their place, and on merit, so you have to guestion whether since then they have got a lot better or we have got worse. I will leave you to work that one out, but on the day we allowed the opposition to dictate too much of the play, and that is a mistake we must not make again today, because once more we are up against a side who want the points as much as we do.

We must also tighten up at the back: Crewe's first two goals were down to our defending as much as to their attacking, and if you give the opposition a two-goal start you are in trouble. We know we can do better defensively - in the three previous games, we had conceded only one goal, at Wigan, and to be successful club you must start your game plan with a determination to keep a clean sheet.

Saturday when we had no football, wishing we could get back in action quickly.

However, it gave me a chance to spend time with my family, and it was nice to spend Mother's Day with my mum. But on Saturday I was fretting about football, and "watching" games on teletext to see how results were going for the other teams involved in the Second Division play-off scramble. They weren't too kind and on Saturday night I went to the dogs at Walthamstow with my brother and my dad. I didn't win, so it was a bad day all round!

But the weekend with no football is a bonus is many ways for us, not least because it gave time for aches and pains to clear up. We have also had time to think about the lessons to be learned from recent games, and to get ourselves sorted out for the final month of the season.

It has been no secret that we have been crying out for a winger all season, so it was good to see Adrian Forbes back in the side for the Crewe game. We shouldn't expect too much from him, because he has played very little competitive football since his serious injury in the summer, but he has a tremendous attitude and enthusiasm, and like the rest of us wants the chance to play First Division football.

We were pleased to welcome Sammy Igoe, and from what we have seen in training he too can give us something extra I was champing at the bit last for the very important games

coming up. Today,

course, the requirement is simple: we must win this afternoon, to cut Tranmere's lead over us to three points. If they win they are nine points ahead of us, and it will be asking for a miracle for us to make up that gap in the six remaining matches. Miracles do happen in football, of course, but today we are focused on getting three points. A draw is not enough. It's a classic case of the old cliché about taking each game as it comes, but we are well aware that we need another win at Cheltenham on Tuesday, before another vital game at Loftus Road.

Our fate depends on what happens in the next eight days. On our day we can cope with anyone in this division. So we must make it our day in all our remaining games.

Both teams will be up for it, and Tranmere, like Crewe, will be determined not to let us complete a double over them. We are equally determined, and we know that the fans want success as well. I thought that for the most part you were very patient as we threw away the Crewe game, and I have been told that a lot of supporters sat there in comparative silence because they enjoyed watching the good football Crewe played. I didn't, and we have no intention of letting any opposition do that to us again.

Treatment Room

HARD work by a lot of people has brought its reward in the treatment room, and I am pleased to see that for the final lap of the season the manager has almost a full squad to choose from. The only first team men currently unavailable are Dean Crowe and Steve Robinson.

Crowe sees the surgeon again on Monday, for a four-weekly check-up to see how his broken leg is mending. It seems to be going well so far. and we will know more after see Monday's X-ray pictures.

He is wearing an air-cast, which keeps the leg as immobile as old-fashioned but with

advantage that it can be taken off on occasion, for instance when he goes to bed. Crowe is working as well as he can under the circumstances, and looking forward to being able to join in pre-season training. Robinson is hoping to be back before the season ends, but is going through a very frustrating time as his lower back problem responds only slowly to treatment. He is having another consultation with the specialist to ensure we do everything possible to ensure his recovery is as speedy as possible.

The highlight of my week was to watch the reserves on Wednesday. Five players were returning for their first games after injuries, and they

all came through well, and with no adverse reactions.

We restricted Emmerson Boyce to 30 minutes, and he was so strong it was almost unbelievable. He has been in full training for a week, going flat out, and it was very encouraging to see how he coped with Wednesday's game, his first in six weeks.

Alan Neilson played half the match, and was a little stiff afterwards, but otherwise OK, and Alan Kimble, Chris Willmott and David Bayliss, all came through, and are also back in full training.

Carl Griffiths has been under treatment for a calf strain, but should be back in the training routine next week.


I am pleased to report that there

A NEW "signing" for the team off the field has just been completed, with Peter Davis moving from Oxford United to be the Town's new commercial manager, following the retirement of Linda Layton.



Ray Mathias holds the record for the most league and cup appearances for the club - 636. Mathias i o i n e d



Tranmere as a 16-year-old from local non-league side Ellesmere Port in December 1964 but had to wait four years before he finally made his debut. He then went on to give 16 years sterling service to the club. Mathias left Tranmere in 1986 to take charge of Wigan only to return three years later. He returned to Wigan in 1998 for a second spell at the helm before returning again a year later as reserve team boss - he was sacked despite leading Wigan to the Auto Windscreens Shield and the play-offs. Mathias became joint caretaker manager with Kevin Sheedy following the resignation of John Aldridge in March 2001 and put himself forward for the position on a permanent basis only to lose out to Dave Watson. Mathias however returned to the caretaker role following the dismissal of Watson in early August

GOALKEEPERS

1. JOHN ACHTERBERG

Tall Dutch goalkeeper signed on a two-year contract in September 1998 after impressing on an initial two-week trial. Achterberg joined Rovers on a Bosman-style free transfer as a replacement for Evertonbound Steve Simonsen and was thrown straight into the first team due to a groin injury to Danny Coyne. With a style not previously



seen at Prenton Park, but more commonplace amongst foreign goalkeepers, Achterberg has turned out to be a real bargain signing. A proficient custodian who possesses good handling skills and positional know-how. The departure of Coyne to Grimsby during the summer of 1999 gave Achterberg the chance to state his claim for the 'keeper's jersey. However, the following season saw a new rival emerge for the number one shirt in the form of Eire U18 'keeper Joe Murphy. Murphy's misfortune when he sustained a broken collarbone in December 1999 allowed Achterberg an unexpected opportunity to return to the first team and he grasped it with both hands.

13. RUSSELL HAWORTH

The goalkeeping saga at Prenton Park finally came to an end when Rovers signed England under 21 goalkeeper Russell Haworth from York City. The talented keeper was seen as 'a steal' in a depressed transfer market and was brought in to challenge regular keeper John Achterberg for the first team jersey. Made his debut for rovers in the FA cup replay defeat at Cardiff when Achterberg was sent off. Tipped as one for the future.

32. ERIC NIXON

Eric Nixon originally joined

loan from Tranmere on Manchester City before John King secured his signature on a permanent basis for a £60,000 fee in July 1988 and he went on to play a major role in the club's meteoric rise from the old fourth division to the first division. Eric left for Stockport County in August 1997 before moving to Wigan Athletic a year later but was re-signed by Tranmere prior to the 1999-00 season. Now the club's goalkeeping coach, he made two brief first team comeback at home to Barnsley in the fourth round of the Worthington Cup in 2000, and in the last away game of last season away to Cambridge United.

DEFENDERS

2. GRAHAM ALLEN

Bolton-born Graham Allen joined Rovers in part exchange as part of the Steve Simonsen deal having been unable to break through at Everton, where he had been since his YTS days. After making just six first team appearances at Goodison Park, the chance of a permanent move to Prenton Park and the opportunity of first team football was not one he was going to reject. Initially, signed on a onemonth loan, his move became permanent in September 1998 with Everton placing a £300,000 valuation on his head. A tall, composed defender, Allen has proven his versatility by turning out in both the right-back and centreback positions although he prefers the latter.

17. JAMES OLSEN

James Olsen will be hoping to emulate the success of Andy Parkinson and Gareth Roberts after making the short switch across the Mersey from Liverpool

in March 2001 for an undisclosed fee. After some impressive outings in the reserve team, Olsen made his Tranmere debut as a substitute against Nottingham Forest in May 2001 and he looked set to push Gareth Roberts hard for a regular place in the starting eleven during the 2000-01 season only to sustain a serious neck injury in the pre-season build-up.

5. KEVIN GRAY

Kevin Gray completed his move from Huddersfield Town last summer and was immediately named Club Captain by then boss Dave Watson. The 30 year old joined on a free transfer after calling an end to his eight year spell at the McAlpine.

Gray started his career at Mansfield Town in 1988 and was made captain at the tender age of 19, playing 170 games for the stags before signing for Huddersfield in July '94. The former Terrier signed a two year deal at Prenton Park.

26. SEAN CONNELLY

Long term target Connelly finally signed for Rovers before the Chesterfield game on 12th October. The



former Stockport County defender had been a target of Rovers when John Aldridge was in charge, but the defender chose Wolves, where Mathias finally signed him from. A cultured left back who is not afraid to run with the ball, the 32 year old will be an asset to the side this season.

3. GARETH ROBERTS

Wrexham-born Gareth Roberts

initially joined Tranmere on a twomonth trial during the summer of 1999 from Greek club Panionios. Having been released by Liverpool, the young defender was persuaded to move to Greece by Panionios boss Ronnie Whelan who paid just £50,000 for his services. He was rewarded with the experience of playing against Italian giants Lazio in the European Cup Winners Cup quarter-final, rubbing shoulders alongside the likes of Marcelo Salas. Roberto Mancini and Ivan De La Pena. Equally comfortable as a left-back or left wing-back, Roberts' tenacity in the tackle and solid defending impressed John Aldridge sufficiently to be offered a permanent deal.

6. IAN SHARPS

lan Sharps is yet another product of Tranmere's invaluable YTS scheme who has so far had to be contented with regular reserve team football. A tall centre-back who is strong in the air and difficult to shake off the ball as well as having vision and accurate distribution skills, he would undoubtedly have had further opportunities towards the end of the 1998-99 season if not for a groin injury. Sharps' potential marks him out as one for the future and he looks set to follow in a long line of talented centre-backs that have graced Prenton Park, season.

14. RICHARD HINDS

A graduate from Tranmere's successful youth scheme, this tall 20-year-old Yorkshireman made his league debut towards the end of the 1998-99 season at Grimsby. A surprise inclusion, his preferred position being at centre back, he started the game at right back and finished it at right-wing back! Hinds had an eleven-month wait

before his next first team chance, but he gras

chance, but he grasped the opportunity with both hands, despite being played in an unfamiliar midfield holding role. After winning a number of man of the match awards upon his return to the starting line-up, Hinds cemented his place in the Tranmere side and was rewarded with a new three-year contract in April 2000.

25. SHANE NICHOLSON

S h a n e Nicholson joined Rovers after being released from his contract with Sheffield United, ironically following



their signing of Steve Yates.

Predominantly a left sided defender, he has had spells at Stockport, Chesterfield, West Brom, Derby and Lincoln and has signed a two-ear contract with Tranmere.

Tranmere have been lacking quality on the left for some time and Watson acted quick to increase the number of left footers in his squad and Nicholson will provide excellent competition for Gareth Roberts.

MIDFIELDERS

4. MICKEY MELLON

Mickey Mellon rejoined Tranmere for his second spell with the club in March 2000 on a free transfer from Burnley after an initially signing as a loan player. The Paisley-born midfielder had spent two years at Turf Moor, helping the Clarets into the First Division. Mellon first signed for Tranmere in October 1997 for a £300,000 fee

of 2002.

Welcome To

Blackpool arrived at Prenton Park with the reputation of a goalscoring midfielder but it took him five months before he found the back of the net. With Tranmere strapped for cash, Rovers were in no position to turn down the offer of £350,000 from Burnley in January 1999, and he was sold - his Prenton Park career lasting just 14 months. Frustrated by a lack of first team opportunities at Turf Moor, he was handed a free transfer and he opted to return to Prenton Park. Mellon started his career as a trainee at Bristol City before a £75,000 move took him to West Brom in February 1993 where he spent nine months.

12. ANDY PARKINSON

Andy Parkinson made the short trip across the Mersey when he signed on a free-transfer from Premier League neighbours Liverpool in August 1996. The emergence of a certain Michael Owen, whom Parkinson played alongside in Liverpool's FA Youth Cup winning side of 1995, meant he was shown the door following the completion of his YTS apprenticeship. John Aldridge was convinced that with careful nurturing, Parkinson would blossom into a burgeoning talent, and he persuaded the slightly-built youngster that Tranmere was the stage upon which he would be given the chance to perform. Parkinson scored the winning goal on his home debut in January 1998 against Sunderland in a memorable FA Cup tie but could only add one more goal to his tally before the end of the season. His raw talent of the previous term matured into a more cultured style of play during the 1998-99 season, and he never contributed less than 100 percent effort in any game. With one season remaining on his contract. Parkinson voiced his desire to pursue his career

away from Prenton Park during the summer of 2001 but he eventually put his signature to a new two year deal.

7. JASON PRICE

The 24-year-old joined Rovers on November 8th and made his debut in the 2-1 win over QPR, following a successful three-month spell at Brentford and made an immediate impact.

He set up the winner for Stuart Barlow at Loftus Road, before scoring in the next consecutive five games, including braces against Brigg Town and Cambridge United

Tranmere were just one of several clubs to show an interest in the Welshman, but after meeting the manager, Price made the move up north.

10. ALAN NAVARRO

The tough tackling midfielder is a product of Liverpool's academy. He's a great passer of the ball and can play anywhere across the middle and also featured at right back while at Anfield.

34. GARY JONES

This is Gary's second spell at Prenton park as new boss Ray Mathias looked to inject a touch of the old Tranmere spirit back into the side. Signed on a free from Nottingham Forest after impressing in a loan spell, Jones has been a virtual ever present since. A tough tackling midfielder who will always weigh in with his share of the goals.

FORWARDS

11. STUART BARLOW

Stuart Barlow kicked off his career in Merseyside's non-league circuit with Sherwood Park before earning a dream transfer to Everton in June 1990 where he spent a total of five seasons. The wrench of leaving Everton in November 1995 was compensated by the fact that a £350,000 transfer to Oldham succeeded in re-igniting his career, illustrated by a scoring record of 31 goals from 93 appearances. Barlow's form at Boundary Park attracted the attentions of Wigan who swooped to sign him for a bargain £40,000 on transfer deadline day 1998. Wigan were celebrating 'steal of the century' as Barlow had a superb first full season, top scoring for the Latics with 26 goals and finishing second in the Division Two scoring

Wigan manager Ray Mathias, he also wrote his name into Wigan's history books as the scorer of the last ever goal at Springfield Park. A contract dispute with manager John Benson saw him fall out of favour and his form dipped before he returned in spectacular fashion to score in Wigan's thrilling 3-2 play-off final defeat to Gillingham. Wigan's failure to gain promotion didn't prevent Barlow from stepping up a Division during the summer when John Aldridge swooped to sign him on a Bosman transfer with the offer of a two-year deal and an option for a third year. Stuart's tremendous acceleration and ball control mark him out as a constant menace to defenders while his opportunist instincts have made him a hit with the Prenton Park faithful.

15. IAIN HUME

lain Hume became the youngest ever player to appear in a Tranmere Rovers shirt when he made his debut as a substitute at Swindon Town in March 2000. At just 16 years and 167 days old and still registered on schoolboy forms, he beat a certain Dixie Dean's record by 192 days. A fast and energetic striker with masses of potential, Hume is already a Canadian U20 international and it will surely not be long before he makes his full first team debut.

9. SIMON

W i g a n Athletic. The 24-

year-old was formerly the Latics record signing, when he joined back in 1998 for £600,000 from Coventry City. He was signed by then Manager Ray Mathias, who is obviously assistant to Rovers boss to Dave Watson. Haworth spent two successful seasons partnering Stuart Barlow, while at Wigan, a partnership that will certainly be revived at Prenton Park. The Welshman began his career with his hometown club Cardiff City, where he scored 13 goals in just 40 starts. He stayed with the Bluebirds for two seasons before moving to Premiership side Coventry City for £500,000.

Chances were limited for the youngster with the Sky Blues, where he stayed for just one year before being snapped up by Wigan. Haworth's final record with the Latics stands at a total of 142 appearances, (19 as sub), and 58 goals and he remains equal third on the all time Latics League goal scorers list.

16. ALEX HAY

Birkenhead-born Alex Hay joined Tranmere's professional ranks in April 1999 after progressing through the youth system from the age of 12.

Unable to make an impact at Prenton Park, Hay was loaned out to non-league Altrincham in October 2000 in a bid to gain first team experience and he quickly hit the goal trail with the Robins. After two months with the Moss Lane outfit, Hay returned to Prenton Park and was suffered the misfortune of being struck down by injury.

During the 2001/02 season he finally broke into the first team making five appearances.

Blast From the Past

Allan Brown took over as manager at Kenilworth Road on November 5th 1966 he must have wondered what he was letting himself in for. The team was struggling at the wrong end of Division Four, after being in the top flight only six years before, and crowds were down to a post-War low.

His first game in charge saw the Town go down 0-1 at Port Vale and although Crewe were seen off at Kenilworth Road the following week, it was soon back to losing ways with successive defeats at Bradford City and Barrow.

For some peculiar reason the Town arranged mid-week home games on Thursday evenings around this period and a F.A.Cup replay against Exeter was no exception and although the

game was won 2-0, the victory came at a high price.

A crowd of 7,078 had turned up on a miserable evening to see a Hatters side that had forced a surprising 1-1 draw at St James' Park the previous Saturday and they were delighted to see the Town roar into an early 2-0 lead, through goals from Bruce Rioch and David Pleat.

Unfortunately, the game turned nasty in the second half. Exeter used the slippery surface as an excuse to 'mis-time' tackles with the result that the Town finished with ten men on the pitch, of which quite a few were walking wounded.

The upshot was that two days later a much weakened and bruised Luton team lined up at Sincil Bank, Lincoln for a basement battle which was

lost 1-8. When a team lying second from bottom of the table loses by such a score to the club propping up the rest then you know something needs to be done. Truly the lowest point in the club's history.

Allan Brown was given permission to enter the transfer market and went to Leicester immediately to pay out £7,000 for reserve centre-half Max Dougan who starred in the tough 3-2 home win over Chesterfield the following week. He then went to Peterborough and came back with ex-England centre-forward Derek Kevan who scored on his debut in a 1-1 draw at Halifax only the second away point of the campaign!

The two game unbeaten run was seen as a revival of epic propor-

pointless after a 0-1 defeat.

Although the Hatters were under to cosh in the first-half at a windy Prenton Park, the Tranmere goal did not come until the second period when ex-Hatter George Yardley took advantage of a slip by John Moore to slide the ball past a committed Tony Read in the Luton goal.

The Town pressed for an equaliser with Moore, trying to make up for his earlier error, going close with a couple of long range efforts. The home side managed to hold on, however, with the 6,806 crowd baying for the final whistle.

Whether the return game, to be played at Kenilworth Road the following day, would take place was in doubt right up until kick-

Luton area. Considering the doubts over whether the match would actually take place, an amazing crowd of 9,123 turned up to see the 'new look' Luton side and they were not to be disappointed as the clash got off to a sensational start.

The climb back starts

In the second minute Alan Slough received an ankle injury and was replaced by David Pleat but ten minutes later the Town were two goals to the good. Ray Whittaker netted a rare header from close range after a shot from Rioch was only partially cleared, while Kevan took advantage of another shot from Rioch, to slide the ball into the net from all of six inches. Luckily, both goals were scored at the Oak Road end, enabling me to see them.

As the fog partially lifted, the Town continued to force the pace and the margin in our favour could and should have been a

deal wider. What we

did not know at the time was that this was the start of four years of unprecedented success which saw us climb to the old Division Two. Perhaps the chap who wrote to 'Soccer Star' knew something all along!


As you approach Oxford, turn right at the Headington roundabout, and follow the signs to Cheltenham on the A40. As you get near Cheltenham, beyond Charlton Kings, you pass a set of traffic lights where the road from Cirencester joins from the left. Go straight on at that junction and at the next lights turn right, into Hales Road, After a mile and a half watch out for Whaddon Road, which is a left turn opposite a small parade of shops, just past Oakley GCHQ. Turn into Whaddon Road, carry


straight on over a miniroundabout, and within a few minutes you will see the ground on your right. Mileage: About 100.

By Car to Loftus Road

There are various routes to Loftus Road if you want to drive. The shortest in miles, through Watford and Harrow to Shepherds Bush is rarely the quickest. Our man uses the motorways - south on the M1, then the M25 west towards Heathrow, before turning left on the M40 towards west London. This becomes the A40, which is subject to heavy traffic congestion at all times of the day. Fourteen miles after leaving the M25 go off the A40 where it is signposted to Harlesden A404. At the T junction turn right, signposted to Shepherds Bush, and you will see the big BBC White City complex beside the road. Take a right after passing the BBC, into South Africa Road and the ground is ahead of you, on the left. Give yourself plenty of time to find a parking spot - it's not easy!

Action Replay

TOWN'S first real spanking of the season could hardly have come at a worse time as promotion hopes took a knock. Crewe put on a stupendous display of quick, passing football, and were well worth the result they needed to regain second place in the table.

A major question after a drubbing like this is whether it was a case of Crewe being very, very good, or the Town being awful. Joe Kinnear's verdict was that the Town's display was unacceptable, so poor it would have made any opposition look world class.

A sobering thought for both clubs is that the Crewe side was not a lot different from their team of a year ago – and that outfit was found wanting in the First Division, and relegated.

And there is a puzzle for Town fans. At Gresty Road on a wet night in October the Town had been full value for a 1-0 victory, and time and again this season they have proved to be at least the equals of the best sides in the Second Division. But they have also been mastered by some of the worst.

On this occasion we could take some consolation from knowing that we had seen the Town humiliated by a very good team indeed. Dean Ashton, who scored twice, hit a post with a free kick, and helped create Crewe's other goals in the spring sunshine

Luton Town 0 Crewe Alex 4 (HT 0-2)

proved to be almost unplayable. "Crewe want a million for him, and we made him look worth £8million," said Joe.

He made his players report in for Sunday duty, mainly to watch the match video and be embarrassed by what they saw.

The defence was caught all over the place when Ashton collected a long ball and carefully fired in the opening goal after only six minutes, and he found space in the box again 16 minutes later to shoot another goal after a corner was half-cleared. David Vaughan, a quick and clever left winger, had hit a post between those efforts, but the goal he deserved came at a crucial time, four minutes into the second half to complete the demolition of the Town's confidence. He then finished off a nice day out for Crewe by laying on a tap-in for Rodney Jack with 12 minutes to go. Crewe were rarely in trouble

Crewe were rarely in trouble at the back, because their midfield cut off regular service to Tony Thorpe and Steve Howard, and the Town's attacking threats were minimal. In the first half Howard had a shot blocked on the line by well-organised defenders and Matt Spring saw a volley tipped over the bar. After Crewe's third goal Howard set up Thorpe, who wriggled

clear of his markers but was denied by a spreading save. Otherwise, it was murder for the Town and their fans. The only pleasure was to enjoy the quality of the football played by the opposition – and that is not a delight we want to sample too often.

Crewe manager Dario Gradi said: "That was our best 90 minutes of the season, and it was most satisfying to do it against Luton because I know they are a good team. It is some achievement to come here and win 4-0, but I believe we were worth it.

"Luton found it hard to mark us, and deal with our runs, and I thought our football was too good for them. We had players who could do things with the ball that theirs couldn't."









EVACUATION PROCEDURE


