Becks saves the da

LUTON'S injury jinx struck again on Saturday handing rookie goalkeeper Robert Beckwith a shock debut.

Manager Joe Kinnear was forced to throw the 18-year-old stopper into the firing line against Bristol City when Mark Ovendale aggravated an old hip injury in the pre-match warm-up.
And with no time for nerves

to get the better of him, Beckwith turned in an accomplished display against the promotion contenders.

Several top class saves, confident kicking and even a Bruce Grobbelaar-style drib-ble along his own goal line left his manager full of praise for the teenager after the 2-2 draw.

But the boss was less pleased with Peter Holmes and Alan Neilson, who gifted City their goals with two schoolboy mis-

takes.

If Luton's play-off hopes had still been alive, Kinnear would have undoubtedly staged his own version of the Easter crucifixion on the duo.

Ovendale's hip went again. I thought 'that's a great start to the day'. But it worked in our favour. The lad was a little bit apprehensive. He made one top class save in the second-half. He can look back on today and be very pleased with himself. He's done enough to stay in the side to the end of the season.

But with the promotion pressure lifted it took just 58 seconds for the Hatters to edge in front when striker Steve Howard headed home Matthew Spring's fine cross from the left past visiting keeper Steve

Beckwith didn't have to wait long to show off his shot-stopping credentials, plunging sharply to his left to keep out Lee Peacock's low seventh-

minute strike.
In a first-half of few chances, tackles went flying in as tempers threatened to boil over as they had in the corre-sponding fixture at Ashton

Gate in December, when Sol Davis saw red.

Scott Murray and Peacock were left writhing in a heap after strong challenges which left Robins' manager and former Luton favourite Danny Wilson fuming when they went

Wilson tuming when they went unpunished by Lancashire ref-eree Graham Salisbury. Luton ended up with four first-half bookings – for Matt-hew Spring, Chris Willmott, Kevin Nicholls and returning striker Carl Griffiths, who enjoyed an impressive belated

first game of the campaign. Bristol came out after the break in determined mood, forcing a succession of corners the first after Matthew Hill had sent a 30-yard thunderbolt arrowing towards the top right corner, only for Beckwith to spectacularly claw the ball to safety.

Having survived that scare, Luton had a strong appeal for a penalty turned down when Spring's poke towards goal appeared to strike a City arm.

Playing with far more fluency than in the disappointing loss at QPR, Luton appeared to be growing in confidence, sig nified by Spring's first-time 30 yarder which flew over.

Bristol almost grabbed a controversial equaliser on 56 minutes when the referee played on after Boyce appeared to be caught in the face by Peacock, leaving Beckwith to smother Christian Roberts'

close-range effort.

But with a frustrated City struggling to break down Luton's resilient defence, they were handed a route back into the game when midfielder Holmes wrestled back City substitute Aaron Brown to concede a soft penalty.

The spot-kick was put away just eight minutes left on the by veteran Brian Tinnion despite Beckwith getting a glove on the ball.

It was another defensive blunder just a minute later which saw the Hatters fall behind. A harmless-looking long ball was inexplicably left by Neilson and as he urged Beckwith to claim the ball, Peacock nipped in to head over the voungster

Defeat would have been harsh on Luton and they claimed a deserved point with clock. Griffiths' élever flick put Spring clear in the box but his angled shot was saved by Phillips. However, the ball ran to Boyce whose cross from the right was emphatically headed home by Howard.

There was still time for Bristol to waste a golden chance to claim maximum points. Substitute Peter Beadle, who

scored a 96-minute equaliser in the December encounter, was put through on 86 minutes but dragged his shot wide.
