



The Manager's Message

WHEN David Pleat asked me if I wanted to play for Luton Town nearly 18 years ago, he promised I would start two days later at Stamford Bridge, against Chelsea in the old First Division. Mick Harford had gone for knee surgery, and I was seen as a short-term replacement.

The boss was a real football man, and knew immediately what was important to me. I am sure he felt his powers of persuasion had worked again when I agreed to sign on the Thursday night at midnight in the Chiltern Hotel. Little did he know that I had made up my mind before I got on the train at Lime Street station in Liverpool earlier that

Six weeks ago I was faced with a similar situation after a phone call asking if I was interested in the manager's job. It took a similar amount of time to think about it - none.

I am a big believer in fate, and having lost my job a day earlier at Hartlepool, after guiding the club to Division Two, I had no hesitation whatsoever.

However, the weeks of chaos and uncertainty that followed were not foreseen, and there were times when I thought I'd jumped out of the frying pan straight into the fire.

It is, without doubt, the strength of feeling and unity shown by the supporters at that time that is the major factor in the club being in a stronger, if still precarious, position.

Things happen in football that are incomprehensible to football people, such as Joe and Mick being dismissed. There have always been people who think they know better, and there always will be, but the real danger comes when people with ulterior motives or big egos get involved. Most clubs have survived for a hundred years or more, and most will survive for another hundred or so, but for one reason, and one reason only: supporters.

I have been in football management for only a very short time, but it has been a real eye-opener. Far from becoming disillusioned however, it has made me more determined to be successful, and the one thing I can guarantee is that I will be as fully committed to the job of manager as I was as a player.

I was fortunate enough to play with some very good players in some very good sides during my career, and none more so than the Luton team of the mid-eighties. It was full of top class professionals, and as a 20-year-old alongside the likes of

Sealey, Steve Foster, Mal Donaghy, Peter Nicholas, Ricky Hill, Brian Stein and Mike Harford I couldn't have had a better education.



You don't forget times like that, and it was because of those memories that I found it easy to accept the job as manager.

The big bonus is that I have been able to bring back Mick this week, something I had in mind from day one, but it wasn't possible before.

Mick is everyone's favourite, a legend as a player, and also as a lad. If he is as much help to me this time as he was as a player, then I will be a happy man. But an important factor in his return was the assurance to both of us that Brian Stein stayed, and for that I am grateful to Mr Ward for his understanding.

The help I have received so far from Brian, and from John Moore, Marvin Johnson and Mark Ridgway, has made my first few weeks easier, and more enjoyable.

I would also like to thank the admin staff for their help and welcome during a difficult time, and also thank those outside the club who have sent good

We are nothing without players, however, and the way they have responded and applied themselves so far in the face of so much uncertainty is commendable.

We are all it in together, and hopefully all after the same objective. Strong characters are required, and the next few months will prove that we have some. Those with any doubts will be forced to fol-

Welcome to Brian Talbot and his staff, players and directors. For those who don't know, Rushden and Diamonds away on the final day of the season was my last game in charge of Hartlepool. It was the title decider, and went to the very last kick, and losing felt like the end of the world. But who knows - fate's a funny thing!

Enjoy the season, and get behind the lads.

The Club Captain's View

I ALWAYS look forward to the start of a new season, but today's kick-off is even more welcome than usual after the near-unbelievable events of the summer. I have never known anything like it and while receivership is not pleasant, it has at least seen the end of a regime that seemed to upset just about everyone connected with Luton Town.

Thankfully, John Gurney has gone, and now I want to look forward.

We were all desperately sorry for Joe Kinnear and Mick Harford when they were sacked, but while we were able to voice opinions we could do nothing to sway the decisions of the then owner of the club. I owe a lot to Joe Kinnear for what he has done for my career – he brought me here, which turned out to be an excellent move for me, and made me captain, which is an honour, especially for a young player.

It was good this week to hear that Mick is back. I know the fans love him, and the players have tremendous respect for him. We are still getting to know the new manager, but he has made a very good impression. And I like the way he wants us to play. I have heard fans talk about "the Luton style", and it has become clear that the gaffer believes in it as well. Over the past couple of seasons we used a more direct style. It served us well enough in getting out of the Third Division, but I think something more patient and thoughtful is needed if we are to progress further.

We were all disappointed that last season's effort to get into the play-offs failed, and at the end of the campaign I thought that we were not far short. I hoped that one or two players would come in to make

us very good bets for promotion this season.

That, of course, was before the club changed hands, and



now it seems to be a case of soldiering on with what we have. But I am still optimistic, and believe we can have a successful season on the pitch. We have had a decent pre-season, and we were pretty pleased with our performances against Crystal Palace and Spurs.

The new gaffer has done a good job so far, and we are taking on board his ideas and methods. We still have the core of the side that did well last season, and the pre-season games have shown that one or two good youngsters are knocking on the door of the first team dressing room. Kevin Foley and Parys Okai have been thrown into the side for pre-season games, and have shown their determination to succeed. It was good to see Lee Mansell involved again, but tough luck on him to collect an ankle injury against Spurs.

Our squad today is small by normal standards, but if we lack quantity I believe we have enough quality to do well. Potential problems, of course, will come if we are hit by injuries or suspensions.

But we are in good spirit. The summer's problems have brought us all together, and I include the fans in that. Thanks for coming back today – you can be our 12th man, and hopefully held us to get off to the perfect start.



EVACUATION PROCEDURE

IN THE event of any emergency in the stadium, Luton Town FC and the emergency services have agreed on an evacuation procedure which is designed to ensure the safe and controlled evacuation of the crowd, and to ensure their safe dispersal from the area, to allow the emergency services to carry out their tasks.

In the event of evacuation from all or part of the stadium, you will receive instructions over the public address system on how you should leave. In an evacuation of the main stand you will be instructed to use the pitch. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available. On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.



Brian Talbot - Manager

Former England international that served Ipswich and Arsenal with particular distinction, and also had playing spells with Watford, Stoke City, West Bromwich Albion and Aldershot. Played in three successive FA Cup Finals - in 1978 with Ipswich against Arsenal and with Arsenal in 1979 (Manchester United) and 1980 (West Ham United), finishing on the winning side twice. Also played in the 1980 European Cup-Winners' Cup Final against Valencia. Was Chairman of the Professional Footballers Association before beginning his management career with West Bromwich Albion and then Aldershot. Went abroad to try his luck with Hibernian in Malta. On his return to England, he took up another job with the PFA before Max Griggs persuaded him to be firstly a coach at Nene Park in 1997, and then take on the role of Manager. Was heavily linked with the vacant manager's job at Ipswich Town following the departure of George Burley last season, but quashed those rumours by agreeing a new verbal contract with Mr Griggs until 2006.

1. Billy Turley - Goalkeeper

Ever-reliable goalkeeper who played a major part in the club's Third Division championship success last season. Time and again, Billy pulled off vital saves and quickly established himself as one of the best goalkeepers in the Third Division. A very commanding presence in the penalty area, Billy missed just two league appearances. Saw off the challenge of Adam Sollitt for the No 1 spot and will certainly play a major role during the club's maiden year in the

Second Division. Signed from Northampton Town in June 1999, Billy signed a new contract with the club at the beginning of last season.

2. Marcus Bignot Defender/Midfielder

Signed a one-month deal in August 2002, which was subsequently extended in an attempt to prove to Brian Talbot that he was worthy of a longer contract. At the end of November 2002, the manager decided he was suitably convinced and Marcus put pen to paper on a deal to keep him at Nene Park until



the end of the 2003-2004 season. Left Queens Park Rangers at the end of the 2001-2002 after previous spells with Bristol Rovers, Crewe Alexandra and Kidderminster Harriers. A versatile player who can operate at right-back or in the midfield.

3. Paul Underwood - Defender and Captain.

Hugely talented left-back who has made the transition to League football with consummate ease. Led the club to the Third Division championship last season and was honoured for his contribution by picking up the Player of the Season accolade. Moved to Nene Park in the summer of 1997 from Enfield, and was a regular England semi-professional international during his non-league days.

4. Gary Mills - Midfielder

A product of Diamonds' youth policy, Gary enjoyed a marvellous campaign last season when he was rewarded with regular outings in Brian Talbot's midfield before a leg injury cut short his campaign. An undoubted talent, he had the honour of being included in the starting XI for the club's historic first Football League game. Gary will be looking to continue his good success from last season by securing a regular starting role in Diamonds' midfield.

5. Andrew Edwards - Defender

Signed on a free transfer from Peterborough United on transfer deadline day last season, putting pen to paper on a deal until the end of the 2003-2004 season. Andrew's experience will prove invaluable for the club's debut season in Division Two with the defender making over 400 league appearances during spells with Southend United, Birmingham City and Peterborough United. Was club captain at London Road for a number of years but a sending off at Port Vale midway through last season saw him struggle to regain his place in Barry Fry's plans. Andrew is only one of eight Peterborough players to have played over 300 games for the club.

6. Barry Hunter - Defender

The Northern Ireland international centre-half initially moved from Reading in September 2001 in a onemonth deal but that was soon extended to the end of the season. Played a vital role in the club's championship-winning season and has made the centraldefensive position his own since he arrived at Nene Park. One of the brightest members of the squad having followed up his appearance on TV's 'The Weakest Link' by appearing on 'Britain's Brainiest Footballer'. Two broken legs hampered his early career, and he was 24 when he moved to Wrexham from Crusaders in August 1993. Moved to Reading in July 1996. Made an instant impact in Berkshire and was soon named club captain, but missed the whole of the 1997/1998 season and the first half of the following campaign with a knee injury. By the end of the 1999-2000 season, he had returned to his previous form and become a regular in the Northern Ireland side. Endured a mixed start to the 2002-2003 season after being sent off three time in the opening 13 matches, but went on to win three awards at the club's end of season presentation evening.

7. Stuart Wardley - Midfielder

Midfielder who initially moved to Nene Park from

Queens Park Rangers on a month's loan in January 2002. That deal was subsequently extended by two more months before Stuart signed a two-year deal. Financial problems at Loftus Road meant Stuart had no future in West London, but he did his chances of a contract at Nene Park no harm at all when scoring on his home debut against Macclesfield Town. Played a pivotal role in Diamonds' midfield last season scoring a crucial goal against Carlisle United, which helped the club achieve promotion. Unfortunately, Stuart picked up a serious injury in the same game meaning he missed the remainder of the championship season.

8. Ritchie Hanlon - Midfielder

A former Peterborough United midfielder who endured a torrid time last season after picking up a medial ligament injury in a pre-season friendly encounter against Stamford. The resulting injury forced Ritchie out of action for the entire 2002-2003 season and although he made a handful of reserve games the season finished too quickly for him before he could make a first-team appearance. Ritchie is currently in his second spell at Nene Park and has quickly won over the supporters who questioned the wisdom of moving back for a second bite of the cherry. Began his career on the books of Chelsea before moving to Welling United.

9. Rodney Jack - Striker

A quick and nippy striker who can also play on either flank, Rodney verbally agreed to move to Nene Park in June 2003 before signing a contract at the club one-month later. Rodney started his career in England with Torquay United where he made over 90 appearances for the Devon club. A £650,000 move to Crewe fol-



lowed in 1998 where he spent five years at Gresty Road under the guidance of Dario Gradi. The striker made over 140 appearances at Crewe but decided not to except a new contract at Gresty Road and moved to Nene Park. Rodney is a St Vincent international.

10. Duane Darby - Striker

A firm favourite with the Nene Park crowd, Duane rediscovered his scoring form last season by firing

14 goals. In the club's maiden season in the Football League, Duane struggled with injuries but formed a formidable partnership with strike partner Onandi Lowe last season (30 goals between them) and they became one of the most feared strike forces in the Third Division. Has had spells with Torquay United, Doncaster Rovers, Hull City

(for whom he scored six goals in an FA Cup replay against Whitby Town) and Notts County, from there he moved to Diamonds in the summer of 2000.

11. Andy Burgess Midfielder

Brian Talbot described Andy Burgess as a 'revelation' last season after the Diamonds manager moved the youngster into the heart of his midfield from a long spell on the left flank. Despite being struck with a serious injury at the start of the campaign, Andy bounced back into Diamonds' side in style when he made



the central midfield position his own with some breathtaking performances. He played a vital role in the club's run-in to the championship and formed a solid partnership with Stuart Wardley. Signed a new contract with the club at the end of last season, ending speculation that Andy might move to a 'bigger club'.

12. Stuart Gray - Midfield.

20

Son of Leeds United legend Eddie, and nephew of Frank, Stuart started the 2001/02, his first full season with Diamonds, hoping to demonstrate the form which had earned him previous spells with Celtic and Reading. However, a troubled Achilles injury meant a stop-start season for the midfielder although he was called upon for the club's play-off final defeat against Cheltenham. Stuart enjoyed a more productive campaign last season and chipped in with his fair amount of goals - seven. He is the club's penalty taker and normally operates on the left side of midfield. Signed a new contract with the club at the end of last season. Originally moved to

Nene Park on a short-term contract in March 2001 after being released by Reading. Won a Scottish Cup winners medal while at Celtic and also represented Scotland at under-21 level.

14. John Dempster - Defender

Another of the promising crop of Diamonds youngsters who made his senior bow in 2001-02, his debut coming as a substitute at Carlisle United in January 2002. A very promising centre-half who has had youth trials with Scotland. Scored his first ever league goal in the 3-1 defeat against Bournemouth and has been praised by central defender Barry Hunter for his maturity at the heart of the side's defence. Stayed on at school to complete his A-levels before joining the club on a full-time basis during the summer of 2001. Captained Northamptonshire under-18s to a County Cup final win against Birmingham at Molineux a couple of seasons ago.

15. Andy Sambrook - Defender

Right-back who joined Diamonds during the 2001/2002 pre-season, initially on a month-to-month deal, and went on to establish himself in Brian Talbot's first-team plans. Had first come to Brian's attention in 1997 when he represented England under-18s in a game at Nene Park before heading to America to study a degree in Business Management at Hartwick College, New York. Gillingham didn't extend his contract upon his return and when he moved to Diamonds, he was back-up for former defender Tarkan Mustafa. He went on to play 25 games that season but since the arrival of Marcus Bignot, the defender has seen his opportunities limited.

16. Robert Duffy - Striker

Young Welsh striker who made his senior debut for Diamonds in the Worthington Cup defeat at Crewe Alexandra in September 2001. A prolific scorer in the club's youth and reserve side, Robert demonstrates excellent control but his big strength is how well he uses his height. The striker scored both goals in the 2-2 draw at Kidderminster Harriers in the First Round of the F.A Cup, and opened the scoring in the subsequent replay. Was on schoolboy terms with Charlton Athletic before moving to Nene Park at the age of 16. Has represented Wales at under-17 level.

17. Stephen Gahan - Goalkeeper

A young Irish goalkeeper who was snapped up from Aston Villa. In his first season with Rushden &

Diamonds Football Club after impressing in a number of youth matches.

18. David Bell - Midfielder

David is one of a number of exciting prospects to have come through the ranks at Diamonds and enjoyed an incredible season during our championship-campaign. Burst onto the scene in the 2-2 draw against Wrexham and made such an impact that scouts from many Premiership clubs came flocking to Nene Park. Nicknamed the 'Wellingborough Wizard' (Wellingborough is the town he was born in), Bell played in the centre, left and right side of midfield and scored a memorable goal in a 4-1 win over Cambridge. David's performances took him to Middlesbrough on two occasions for trial spells. David signed a new contract at the club at the end of last season to end speculation about his future.

19. Daniel Talbot - Defender/Midfielder

Young midfielder who has had to carry the usual pressure of being the son of the famous father. That pressure is intensified when the father is also manager, but Daniel has done well in the shadow of Brian at Nene Park. A competent left-sided player, be it in defence or midfield, who is continually learning his trade and when he has been given a chance at first-team level it has been solely on merit. Injuries prohibited him from making a regular challenge for first-team football. Was training with Arsenal from the age of ten, but felt the need to move away from Higbury to further his career and joined Diamonds in time for the start of the 2000-01 season.

20. Mark Peters - Defender

A highly reliable defender who was a rock at the heart of the Diamonds defence in 2001-2002. However, the former Mansfield defender was left out of Brian Talbot's first team plans last season towards the club's chase for the title following the arrival of Andrew Edwards. Started out with Manchester City he also served with Norwich City and Peterborough United. Mark has also represented Wales at youth, under-21 and B levels earlier in his career.

21. Owen Story - Midfielder/Striker

A talented youngster who is enjoying his first season with the seniors, following a successful spell in the youths. A scorer of eight goals for the youth-team, Owen made a number of starts in the reserve side and impressed manager Brian Talbot.

22. Paul Hall - Midfielder

Diamonds manager Brian Talbot pulled off a real coup when he persuaded Jamaican international Hall, who had represented his country in the 1998 World Cup finals, to drop two divisions from Walsall - and he got a free transfer into the bargain as well. The popular right midfielder proved a revelation and his form played no small part in the team's push for an end-of-season play-off berth. Paul claimed 11 goals in his first season with Diamonds and then went better the following year, chipping in with 16 goals, becoming the joint top goalscorer with his international team-mate Onandi Lowe. A regular for the Jamaican international side, Paul began his career with Torquay United before coming to prominence at Portsmouth. Had a brief spell with Coventry before moving to Walsall.

23. David Bell jnr - Defender/Midfielder.

A young midfielder who is beginning this season in his first year as a first-team professional. With his older cousin making a name for himself at the senior level, Bell jnr has his work cut out for him but has certainly got a bright future in the game.

24. Magnus Okounghae - Midfielder.

Another product of the club's improving youth system, Magnus is a tall midfielder who possesses plenty of strength. Another player who is experiencing his first taste of senior football, Magnus was named as a substitute in the club's home game against Cambridge last season. A regular for the youth team last season and is one for the future.

31. Onandi Lowe - Striker

An inspirational signing by Diamonds boss Brian Talbot, Jamaican international Onandi burst onto the Third Division scene towards the end of 2001. Initially signed on a three-month loan deal, Onandi finally secured a long-term contract after lengthy discussions between the club and the Major League Soccer organisation in America, which held his Kansas City Wizards registration. The deal, secured for an undisclosed club record fee, has been worth the wait. In his first season with the club, Onandi hit an incredible 20 goals in 29 appearances, including nine in five games. Without them the club wouldn't have reached the play-offs, if he had been there from August they may well have earned automatic promotion. And although he didn't better that tally last season, he was still the club's joint top goalscorer with 16 goals.



Blast From The Past

A decade ago, Town Luton supporters, for the first time in many years, enjoyed a relatively uneventful summer. The 1992/93 season had

ended with the Hatters, back in Division One after ten years in the top flight, narrowly avoiding further relegation at the death despite losing their final game at Southend and then needing to rely on others to also be beaten.

During the close season Phil Gray got his expected move to the north-east, where his family was based, with Sunderland paying out £800,000 for his services. Unfortunately, a fair slice of the fee had to be paid to Tottenham as a legacy of the original deal when he was purchased.

Also moving to Roker Park was goalkeeper Alec Chamberlain who had reached the end of his Luton contract which, because it was not to be renewed on at least equivalent terms, meant that he was on a technical free transfer. A pre-Bosman, Bosman if you like!

The only signing of note was Scott Houghton on a free from Tottenham. Hitchin born, Houghton had been on the books at White Hart Lane since he was thirteen and although never a regular there had saved his best performance when coming on as sub against the Town during two years before.

The new season opened with a visit from near neighbours Watford who, like the Town, were also attempting to regain their former glories of a few years before. A crowd of 9,149 turned up on a blazing, hot day to see American goalkeeper Juergen Sommer make his debut in goal for the Town while Houghton could only make the

Leading the line for the Hatters was ex-England and Chelsea striker Kerry Dixon who was on loan from Southampton as he had been at the back end of the previous season. Luton manager, David Pleat, was hoping that the deal could be made permanent but with no money to spend it would test his legendary powers of persuasion to convince the Saints to let a player who had cost them £600,000 only a year before, go for free.

Dixon, Luton born, and whose father played for the Hatters made no secret of his desire to move to Kenilworth Road but the matter was out of his

The match got off to a frantic start with Dixon going close on three occasions in the opening five minutes. Good work from young Hornets goalkeeper, Simon Sheppard, kept him out before play switched to the other end where Sommer bravely denied Paul Furlong who was through on

Watford were then forced into two substitutions in quick succession with Darren Bazeley and Richard Johnson leaving the field after a clash with Dixon and a thigh strain respectively but worse was to follow when Barry Ashby was dismissed in the 37th minute.

Ashby had launched himself into a knee high tackle on little David Preece and referee Paul Alcock had little option but to immediately brandish the red card leaving the Hornets to battle

through the heat one man short.

As so often happens the ten men fought like twelve and made it difficult for the Town although Dixon saw his clever curling shot just tipped over the bar by Sheppard as the half-time whistle was about to sound.

The Hatters started the second period with a flourish and after Marvin Johnson went close the deadlock was broken on 51 minutes when Paul Telfer calmly side footed home a low cross from Scott Oakes.

Soon after, Watford showed further indiscipline when Jason Drysdale was ordered off for using his elbow on Jason Rees but if Luton supporters thought the floodgates were about to open they needed to think again.

Lacking the experience to hold the ball, play it around and drag out the opposition the Town players made hard work of picking off Watford who fought like tigers to ensure that they were not overrun.

With ten minutes to go Sommer had to leave the field with blood streaming from a gashed evebrow after a clash of heads with Ken Charlery but

just as his replacement, Andy Petterson, had taken his place the Town seemed to have made the game safe with a second goal. Showing all his know-how, Dixon expertly curled in a shot into the top corner from the edge of the area much to the relief of the majority of the crowd.

Watford refused to lie down, however, and a soft goal by Furlong with three minutes to go left the nerves jangling but when the final whistle sounded it was realised that this was the Town's first win on the opening day for nine years!



The clash with Watford was therefore the Town's first league game using the squad numbering system which we all now know and love. Watford, incidentally, had declined to take up the option presumably because 'Hessenthaler' (a non playing substitute on the day) would have cost too much!

Hatters On The Road



Two squads in the under-11 and under-13 age groups competed against six-a-side teams from other council areas in Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire, with Team Luton winning both tournaments, defeating teams from South Beds in the finals.

The younger squad were on fire in front of goal, scoring 19 goals without reply and winning the final through a penalty shoot-out. Stand-in keeper Kelly Moss was the heroine, saving three spot kicks. The under-13s were far more conservative, winning most of their matches 1-0, including the final after a semi-final shoot-out sucess.

Hatters Away



HAVING been drawn at home in the Carling Cup, in which we play Yeovil Town on Tuesday, we begin our away fixtures with a trip to Stockport County for a league game on Saturday. As in past seasons, two reliable coach services are on offer, and one of them is spreading its

wings to cater for fans who live some distance away from Luton.

For many years the Bobbers Travel Club has put on services for fans living in outlying villages in the North of the county, as detailed in the panel below.

Now Town on Tour, part of the Luton Town Supporters Club, has decided to experiment with a service for fans who live in the Milton Keynes, Leighton Buzzard and Houghton Regis areas. If the response is good, the change will become permanent.

For the trip to Stockport, Town on Tour will set off from Bletchley at 9am, picking up at Stoke Hammond, Leighton Buzzard and Houghton Regis, before leaving Luton at 10. There will be another pick-up at Milton Keynes Coachway at around 10.20. Fares are £15 for LTSC members, £13 LTSC under-16s and senior citizens, and £17 for others.

The Bobbers service begins at Cranfield at 8.30am, departing from Luton an hour later, and fares are £14.50, £12 for concessions.

DIY Travellers

IF THE M6 is running smoothly you can drive to Stockport comfortably in three hours. To avoid the most infamous traffic jam stretches of M6, use the M1 up to junction 23a, and then take the A50 to cut across to join the M6 near Stoke. Leave M6 at junction 19, turning right onto the



A556 towards Manchester. After four miles, at a large roundabout at Bowdon, take the M56 towards Manchester and after nearly seven miles join the M60, signposted to Stockport. Leave M60 at junction 1, to head towards Stockport town centre, and then at a roundabout follow the signs towards Cheadle. Go straight on at one set of traffic lights, and turn right at the next, onto the A560, and after a further mile turn left by the Farmer's Arms, into Edgeley Road, and another mile takes you to the ground.

in force around the stadium as part of the planning consent allowing its use for football. If you want to park near the ground, forget it. Use the park and ride scheme instead. Better still, travel by coach, with Town on Tour or the Bobbers.






Return of a Legend

MICK Harford, distraught when he was sacked by the previous regime two months ago, strode back into Kenilworth Road with a beaming smile this week, brought back by the receiver to be Director of Football and first team coach.

The announcement came on Wednesday when receiver Barry Ward gave his first press conference since being appointed last month. He has installed Cherry Newbery as Chief Executive as well as club secretary.

Mr Ward disclosed that he was put into the club by Hatters Holdings, who were owed £11million by a club losing £3million a year. They were unwilling to continue funding those losses.

The sale of the club has left John Gurney with the controlling shareholding "through his overseas companies" and at the High Court earlier this week he had decided not to challenge the position of Mr Ward. Mr Gurney has not been seen at the club since Mr Ward's appointment on July 14.

Money-saving measures have already been taken, including the club's withdrawal from the Pontins Holidays Combination Reserve League. Consideration was given to withdrawing from the under-17 Football League Youth Alliance, but we are happy to report that this has not happened.

There is an ongoing review of costs, including players' wages. As we went to press the players were meeting to consider their response to proposed wage reductions.

The club is up for sale again, and there has been interest shown following advertising in the national press. Mr Ward thinks that there could be up to half a dozen serious prospects. Mick Harford's appointment – it is the fourth time he has "signed" for Luton Town, including twice as a player – would be self-financing, because of his ability to attract sponsorships and other commercial initiatives.

Mike Newell confirmed that he had wanted to bring back Mick from the moment he became manager. "It is the best possible appointment for the club, and for me," said the boss.



Mick said he was thrilled to be back. "I have been in limbo for the past two months, and that isn't very nice. I was offered my job back after Joe and I were sacked, but no way was I coming back while John Gurney was here. But I wanted to return – I love this club, and it is very special to me. I have lived here for 25 years, and know a lot of people. I believe I can bring in new sponsorships and other commercial activities, and that is part of my job.

"I also have a special feeling for the fans, who have been brilliant in the summer. They kept the club alive by starving Gurney of money, and they deserve every credit for that."

It is obvious that Luton Town is facing real problems at the start of the season, but there was an item of good news about the Football League's transfer embargo, which has been in place since Mr Gurney was in charge. As the only keepers on the books are both inexperienced teenagers, the manager has been given dispensation to sign another goalkeeper, and he can also sign one other player for a month on loan in view of the injury to Lee Mansell. Mr Newell was on the case as we went to press.




