

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
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# The Big Kick-off:

### Luton Town 3 Rushden & Diamonds 1

A MATCH-winning display in the second half gave the Town the first-day points, with supporters giving the team tremendous backing to mark an occasion some of us feared might not come. We know there is still a lot of hard work, and perhaps some heartache, to come as the club fights to get out of receivership, but you could not ask for a better example than the one the players set on Saturday.

They conceded a 38th-minute goal to Jamaican international Onandi Lowe, on the day when Rushden were making their Second Division debut. The half-time demand on a day of searing heat was for a quick reply. Tony Thorpe provided it with the 150th goal of his career, following a clever pass by debut boy Courtney Pitt in the 50th minute. The 21-year-old midfielder, on loan from Portsmouth, is the only outfield player the Town are allowed to recruit. A goalkeeper is the only other exemption from the Football League embargo, but 18-year-old Robert Beckwith stood tall, with a couple of vital saves. "Silly Billy" Turley at the other end had a nightmare when Steve Howard harried him into conceding a corner after the keeper went walkabout to near the touchline. Howard clipped in the flag kick before the keeper could get back into his goal. He arrived just in time to see Tony Thorpe's header by-pass him, and after that 59th-minute goal the Town were in command, and stronger than the opposition as everyone sweltered in a temperature well over 100F in the blazing sunshine.

Matt Spring completed a very satisfying day in the final minute with a close-range header following excellent build-up work - sub Ahmet Brkovic crossed deep from the left, Howard headed the ball back across goal and Spring was never likely to miss.

"I am very, very pleased," said Mike Newell, after his first game as Town manager. "The lads put in a tremendous effort, particularly after going a goal down."

Rushden's Brian Talbot said: "Luton's equaliser was a very good goal, and it was even-stevens after that, except that we were punished for a horrendous mistake by the goalkeeper."

#### **Football Mourns A Prize-winning Gent**

A MINUTE'S silence will be observed before tonight's game, in memory of Ray Harford, the former Town manager who died on Saturday aged 58. He was the only boss to bring a major trophy to Kenilworth Road, thanks to a marvellous day at Wembley in April, 1988, when the Town beat Arsenal 3-2 in the final of the Littlewoods Cup. Mike Newell is one of many who remembers Ray with much respect and affection. Football nationwide has felt Ray's loss, not least at Blackburn, where he and Kenny Dalglish used Jack Walker's cash to transform the Rovers from a Second Division outfit to Premier League champions in five years. The Town are among many clubs who have expressed their shock at Ray's early death, and have sent condolences to his family.

#### **Gary Johnson** Manager

Gary signed schoolboy terms at Fulham but broke into professional football at Watford in 1973. He then moved on to Malmo in Sweden before returning to England at non-league level. He became player-manager of Town Newmarket



before moving on to Cambridge United as first team coach where he enjoyed three successive promotion seasons and twice reached the sixth round of the FA Cup. In 1993 he took over as manager and guided the moving on to Watford as Youth Academy Director, Gary was approached by the President of the Latvian FA, Guntis Indriksons, and this led to him being installed as Head Coach of the Latvian National Team and Technical Director to oversee the development of Latvian Football, 15. Steve Reed - Another product of the Yeovil before his move to Huish Park in June 2001. Since then it's been success all the way with first a 2-0 victory over Stevenage Borough to clinch the F.A. Umbro Trophy and then The Conference Championship by a record points margin.

#### Goalkeepers

- 1. Chris Weale This 20 years old local lad has progressed through from the South West County Youth side and has established himself as a firm favourite with the fans. A big confident youngster with great potential who has shown tremendous consistency this year since taking over the number 1 shirt.
- 13. Steve Collis The young goalkeeper began his career by progressing through the Youth Academy at Watford under Gary Johnson before moving on to Barnet who were then a Nationwide League side. He then moved to Nottingham Forest in the following summer. At the end of the 2000/01 season, Steve teamed up with Gary Johnson for a second time as he signed up for Yeovil Town for the start of the 2001/02 season.

#### **Defenders**

- 4. Terry Skiverton Joined in June 1999, London born Terry has had league experience with Chelsea and Wycombe before signing for Welling United at the beginning of the 1997/98 campaign. A tower of strength at the back, Terry was made Club Captain last season.
- 5. Colin Pluck A 22 year old central defender who also started his footballing career at Watford's Youth Academy. Colin was born on 6th September 1978 and has also played for Morton in the Scottish League, along with short spells for Stevenage Borough, Hayes and Dover Athletic last season.
- 2. Adam Lockwood Adam is nineteen-yearold right back/centre back who signed for Yeovil club to the quarterfinals of the league cup. After Town after impressing during a one-month loan from Reading Football Club. Adam is very comfortable in possession and good in the air. Since joining Yeovil has been pretty much a permanent fixture in the first team.

- 6. Darren Way Darren was an apprentice and professional with Norwich City. He joined Yeovil at start of 2000/2001 season. He is a tenacious, strong midfield player with an eye for goal. Won

8. Lee Johnson - A 20 vear old midfielder who started his career with Watford as a trainee, as part of their Youth Academy, under Gary Johnson. Lee was born in Newmarket on June 7th 1981 and was also on Brighton and Brentford's books. Another almost permanent fixture in the team

- 14. Roy O'Brien Comes from Cork City in Hardworking, versatile, midfielder/defender who is also very good in the Previous clubs include Dorchester, Bournemouth and Arsenal. Able to fill in anywhere across the back four or in midfield.
- 16. Andy Lindegaard Yeovil born, right sided midfielder/winger. Has great pace and crossing ability. Made his conference debut in the 3-0 win over Doncaster in the 1999/2000 season.
- 23. Jamie Gosling Jamie Gosling signed a one year contract for Yeovil Town to fulfil a boyhood dream of playing in the Football League. The midfielder was signed from Bath City on an appearance related fee and has shown up well in all of Yeovil Town's pre-season matches both abroad in Belgium and in the recent home matches against Preston and Wolves.

#### **Forwards**


- 19. Chris Giles Local lad Chris started in our Youth team where he received the Yeovil Town player of the year award. Last term he has made the starting line up more frequently and along with his substitute appearances he has started to notch up his Conference Goals tally.
- 7. Adam Stansfield Signed for Yeovil in November 2001 from Western League side Elmore. He spent four years at the Tiverton based

club and was top scorer for much of his time there. He spent time on loan at Exeter were he played in their mid-week reserve games before returning to Horsden Park at the weekends. Has already become a top scorer the season before last and a firm fan favourite. Broke his leg at the beginning of last season but has now returned to full match fitness.

- 20. Gavin Williams Signed from Hereford United at the end of 2001/2002 season for an undisclosed fee, Gavin Williams is an exciting twenty-one-year-old who can play anywhere up front, or in midfield.
- 3. Abdelhalim El Kholti French Moroccan born El Kholti joined the club on an extended trial after impressing manager Gary Johnson in a trial match. A tricky and quick midfield player Abdelhalim scored his first senior goal for the club in the 6-0 victory over Southport last season. He has had experience in the Swiss Premier League before joining Yeovil.
- 18. Kirk Jackson Kirk joined Yeovil in November 2002 from Stevenage Borough where he was a regular if not prolific scorer. Before his time at Stevenage Kirk was with Darlington where he scored on his debut in March 2001. Darlington signed him from Worksop Town, after he'd netted 40 times in his last season there, but with first team opportunities at a premium, he failed to settle.
- 9. Kevin Gall Forward. Kevin joined Yeovil Town from Bristol Rovers in early February after shining during a trial period at Huish Park. Kevin started his football career at Newcastle United before moving to Bristol Rovers. Kevin has won nine Welsh under 21 caps scoring on his debut against Azerbaijan. Kevin



made his Yeovil debut against Kettering and scored within 4 minutes of coming on. He has since forged a good goal scoring partnership with Kirk Jackson.



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# The Manager's Message

AFTER a hectic couple of months, it was good to get the season started at last, and all the more enjoyable for everyone to kick off with a good win.

I was pleased with the way we played, especially in the very hot conditions. The lads put in a tremendous effort. For the first 15 or 20 minutes I didn't think we were in any danger, but then Rushden got into the game for a while. I would have liked a clean sheet, but at half time, despite the fact that we were losing, we felt pretty confident that we could get a result, and we deserved it for the way we played in the second half.


The equaliser was well made and taken, and the second goal was a bit of opportunism by Steve Howard and a lovely ball in from the corner. Tony Thorpe took those chances beautifully, and we were really pleased with the third goal - an excellent far post cross by Ahmet Brkovic, a header back by Steve Howard, and midfielder Matt Spring arriving right on cue in the six-yard box to head in.

I thought Courtney Pitt had a good game on his debut, and we welcome him to the club. He showed a belief in himself, and he has that priceless quality pace. We wish him well in his time here, however long it may be.

And I must also say thanks to all of you, the supporters, for your contribution - the welcome we received gave us a lift, as did your backing throughout the game. Keep it up, please! Because our small squad has been further depleted by injury to Lee Mansell the Football League gave us permission last week to sign one outfield player on loan, which was how we were able to get Courtney from Portsmouth. They also gave permission to sign a goalkeeper on contract. That is no reflection on Robert Beckwith, who did very well on Saturday. When you have an 18-year-old as your most senior goalkeeper, and a 17-year-old on the bench, it is a fact of life that you need a more experienced goalkeeper for the squad. We have been trying hard to recruit one, but too many agents seem to think they can hold us to ransom, and we were not having that.

We may have a small squad, but it has a lovely team spirit and they are a good bunch of lads. They did very well indeed on Saturday, but we will not be carried away by one result. Rushden were wellorganised and very enthusiastic as they enjoyed their first taste of

Second Division football. But without being disrespectful to them, they fielded almost the same side that had been in the Third Division last season, and I would not try to



judge on the evidence of just one match what is going to happen in the rest of this season. If we stick to our jobs properly, and don't have too many problems with injuries and suspensions, we have a pretty capable squad.

I would like us to do well in the cup competitions. and tonight's game should be very interesting. Once again we are meeting a newly-promoted side, and my congratulations to Yeovil Town, who have at last achieved their ambition of playing league football after trying for it over so many years. They will come here to enjoy themselves - they are the underdogs, with nothing to lose, and we must be on the ball to make progress. I welcome everyone from Yeovil, and hope we have an enjoyable match.

Finally, this evening, I finish on a very sad note, following the death of Ray Harford. He became assistant to John Moore when I was a player here, and then manager, and his guidance and expert coaching ability was invaluable to a 21-year-old ambitious young striker. After leaving Luton, my clubs included Blackburn, where we won the Premiership under the management team of Kenny Dalglish and Ray Harford. I owe a lot to Ray Harford, and was deeply

shocked and saddened to hear that he had died at 58. My heart goes out to his family. It puts football into context when you hear tragic news like that. I am sure you will all scrupulously observe minute's silence for Ray this evening. He was a great coach and manager, and a real gentleman.

# The Club Captain's View

IT WAS a great result on Saturday, and we were pleased on several counts. Winning is always first and foremost, but I thought we put in a good performance too, and it is always satisfying to know you have got your just reward. It was also a relief to put three points in the bag from the first game of the season, especially after what happened to us a year ago when we took a long time to get going.

The victory was earned by hard work and good play, and was all the more welcome because we had to come back from a goal down to achieve it.

It was a bad goal to give away from our point of view, and we went in at half time believing we were a little unlucky to be trailing. We had looked very bright in the first half-hour or so, but give credit to Rushden for having a real go at us.

Having just won promotion they must have fancied their chances, especially after all they had heard about our problems off the field during the summer. But I think you could see we were all working together, and for each other, and I don't think Rushden can have any complaints after the way we took control in the second half.

It's a team game, so I don't often pick out individuals for praise or criticism, but well done Thorpey for taking his goals so well, Steve Howard for being so quick to make the second, and Ahmet Brkovic for getting off the bench and hitting the pinpoint cross which led to our third goal. Kevin Foley has also impressed us with the way he has grabbed his chance – it was a very satisfactory full debut for

I also want to say well done and welcome to Courtney Pitt, who made his debut for us in midfield. His pass to set up the first goal was a gem, and his performance was all the more remarkable when you remember that none of us had ever met him before. He hadn't been able to train with us - he was introduced to us at 1.30. Throwing in a new player at 90 minutes' notice can be a bit of a gamble, but that one certainly came off. I hope he enjoys his time with us, and if he maintains Saturday's form everyone will be delighted. We could also do with a few goalkeeping clangers by opponents like the one that led to

us taking the lead for the first time! But it showed, for a start, the value of hard work. It looked like a lost cause when Steve Howard chased after the ball



towards the corner flag. But it was worth the effort, and as it led to a goal it perhaps proves that in football there is no such thing as a lost cause.

With one goalkeeper suffering embarrassment, we were all pleased for young Rob Beckwith. Rushden caught us on the break a couple of times, but he made good saves, which were invaluable. If we had been three down at half time we might have struggled a bit.

Long before the end a lot of players were struggling to cope with the uncomfortable conditions. I can't remember ever playing in hotter weather, and we did well to keep going. I felt we handled it better than Rushden. We certainly finished stronger than they did

And while lots of people are entitled to take credit for

Saturday's result, we do not under-estimate the part supporters played. It was goose pimply to hear the roar

was goose pimply to hear the roar that greeted us, and the fans kept up the atmosphere throughout

the game. We realised at half time, when we were losing, that the supporters were still behind us, and if you can keep that sort of noise level going at every match, we will be all right.

It's a different challenge this evening, but once more we are facing a newly-promoted side, and Yeovil will be up for it. They won 3-1 at Rochdale in their first-ever league game on Saturday, so we are not likely to under-estimate them.

We all fancy a decent cup run, and I know the club needs the money, so with hard work, perhaps a little luck, and your continued support we can set off on one this evening.

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

### **Blast From** The Past

In welcoming Yeovil to Kenilworth Road tonight for their first ever League Cup tie it is worth recalling that the last time we played 'new boys' to the Football League in the competition we managed to fight

our way through to the quarter-finals for the first time in our history.

Wigan Athletic came to Kenilworth Road in August 1978 without a league win to their name following their election from the Northern Premier League that summer. They had, however, beaten Tranmere in the first round of the League Cup, after a replay, and were looking forward to a crack at the 'big boys' who entered the competition at the second round stage.

The Town had started the season with a 6-1 home win over Oldham and, probably mindful of this, Wigan decided that defence was the best policy and hope for a scoreless draw. Wigan's tactics bored the pants off the Kenilworth Road crowd of 6,618 but they proved very effective until Brian Stein finally broke the deadlock just after the hour mark with a low shot.

Even so, there was always the danger that Wigan could catch the Town on the break and the crowd therefore let out a collective sigh of relief when Stein doubled the lead with four minutes to go, heading home a David Moss corner. The corner count by the end of the match was 11-0 in the Town's favour!

Another Division Four side, Crewe, were the visitors in the next round and they also opted for defence in depth in

order to frustrate the Luton supporters. This time the Town frequently found a way past a packed defence but were constantly thwarted by Crewe goalkeeper Caswell who pulled off a series of brilliant saves throughout the first half.

The floodgates finally opened early in the second period when the Town scored twice in three minutes. Firstly, Ricky Hill thundered in a 25 yarder followed quickly by a far post header from the wily Bob Hatton.

After that two goal salvo the Hatters took their foot off the pedal somewhat and were punished when Mal Donaghy upended Steven Wilshaw in the box and Paul Bowles converted from the spot. Stung by this the Town players regrouped and prevented Crewe from netting an unlikely equaliser without much trouble.

Our reward for this win was a stab at one of top teams with a trip to Aston Villa bringing on mild cup fever through the streets of the town. Villa were sitting comfortably in midtable in the old Division One and were building up a side that was to win the championship in a couple of years

A crowd of 32,727, including a fair few from Luton, gathered to see the Town take the game to their illustrious opponents from the opening whistle. Villa dangerman, Andy Gray, caused a scare for the Luton defence with a shot which was well saved by Milija Aleksic but was then carried from a the field with a knee injury following a clash with Mal Donaghy.

With their talisman off the pitch Villa were, quite honestly, a shambles and could not get to grips with the Luton midfield of Hill, Alan West and Lil Fuccillo. Luton supporters could smell an upset and as the game wore on the crowd started to get on the backs of the Villa team which played into the Town's hands.

Hatton had a goal disallowed for offside while Moss was

denied a blatant penalty by a lenient referee who awarded an indirect free-kick in the area for obstruction.

The goal the Town deserved finally came in the 66th minute when Fuccillo burst through from midfield and slid a perfect pass through to Hatton, bisecting Villa's twin centre-halves. Hatton hit the ball first time into the corner of the net to send the Luton contingent delirious.

Villa then became frantic and disjointed and opted for thumping the ball into the area where Chris Turner, having his best game for the club, won everything.

With the closing seconds ticking away West went on a 50 yard run down the left wing before sending over a cross to Moss on the opposite side. Moss touched the ball back into the middle leaving Stein with a simple opportunity to make the game safe. A famous night!

Manager David Pleat did not know whether to be pleased or upset at this, the Town's first away win since he took charge ten months earlier, but he told the players in no uncertain terms that he expected performances like this more often in run of the mill league games.

The Hatters were now through to the quarter-finals for the first time and they faced another difficult tie away at Leeds who were sitting in a similar position to Villa in Division

Leeds were not the power they once were but still boasted a team crammed full of internationals and household names. We were not frightened after the performance given at Villa and joined in the crowd of 28,177 at a noisy and unwelcoming Elland Road.

Leeds treated the Luton side with respect and with the

Town clamping down on the mid-field pair of Tony Currie and Brian Flynn the first half was 'cat and mouse' with clear cut chances few and far between.

Just as the Town players thought that they would go off for the interval with the game scoreless a long, hopeful cross from Leeds defender Paul Hart eluded everyone leaving Trevor Cherry to steal in at the far post to score with ease. Leeds obviously received a talking to at half-time and stepped up a couple of gears from the re-start and immediately scored again with Carl Harris clipping the ball back from the by-line to Currie who curled in a brilliant shot which beat Jake Findlay in the Luton goal all ends up.

Leeds were in full flow now and their pace and power was too much for the Town and it came as no surprise when Eddie Gray extended the lead on the hour although the Town players protested that Findlay had been held down as the Scottish international fizzed the ball into the net.

Luton had their chances with both Fuccillo and Stein missing simple opportunities but it was never going to be their night as proved when Paul Price was harshly penalised for allegedly holding back Ray Hankin in the box leaving Frank Gray to stroke the ball home from the spot.

The Town did gain a consolation with Stein netting in the 88th minute but it was too little too late and as the Luton supporters waited for two hours to get out of the car park they had plenty of time to mull over the Wembley dream that was now at an end!

The previous week's question was a simpler one on the Theory of Relativity





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


