



World Class Rugby Hits Stockport

In recent years, Sale Sharks have emerged as one of the top sides in the country with a reputation for playing fast entertaining rugby. VIRTUES The Chinese football league is only just a little over eight years old and therefore has much to learn from its international counterparts. So while the likes of Liverpool, Real Madrid etc, etc extol their on field virtues in the far East we have carved out our own little niche assisting the Chinese with their commercial, community and youth development systems. economy is in ruins. Train lines


buckle, traffic


Stockport County supporters claim to have more original songs than any other team in Great Britain – and it's hard to argue against them.

A Swaying Mass of Humanity, a booklet containing 100 County favourites spanning four decades was so popular that the fans took to the recording studio to release Songs of the Cheadle End, a unique CD featuring no less than 46 of the best Hatters hits.

Throughout the season Ian Lancashire will take us back in time to some memorable County games and some equally memorable County songs!

Today his Time Machine transports us to 1966 and a couple of trips to Luton Town's Kenilworth Road.

The GO GO GO COUNTY bandwagon was gathering momentum throughout the 1965-66 season and a massive



following travelled to Luton on May 7 1966.

The other Hatters won that particular Fourth Division clash 2-0 but the real Hatters didn't have long to wait to gain revenge.

On September 17 1966 a couple of goals from the great Frank Lord and a penalty from David Shawcross helped us to a 3-0 win.

The success kept County at the top of Division Four after our six opening games had yielded five wins and a draw. It was a position we'd maintain

throughout the season as well as the Blues stormed to the championship with three games still to play.
As you can imagine the 3-0 romp at Kenilworth Road created a party atmosphere on the terraces as the travelling Cheadle Enders bellowed out song after song.

One of the favourites on the day, to the tune of Dublin in the Green, was:

Oh his name is Johnny Price and he goes running down the wing,

And when he scores the crowd all roars and this is what they sing,
We all support the County we're loyal and we're true,
And we'll fight, fight, fight with all our might,
For the boys that play in blue.

We are the greatest supporters and we'll follow them home and away, And you'll here the shout



when the lads come out, Wherever the Hatters play!

The picture – look at the travelling fans behind the goal - from our 1965-66 clash at Kenilworth Road shows the inimitable Len White sliding for the ball watched in the background by none other than Matt Woods.

Woods would move to Edgeley Park during the summer to captain our championship heroes.

Another player to head north and switch hats and star in a title-winning side was former England star Derek Kevan.
Part of the deal saw Keith Allen, who'd scored an Edgeley Park hat trick against Luton the previous season, make the opposite journey.
Steve Sherlock is another to have played for both clubs. The full back made 245 appearances for County yet managed just two for Luton.

This afternoon County open

their 2003/04 home league campaign against the other Hatters, Luton Town who have made the long trip North from Bedfordshire. In the penultimate match of last season the two sides shared the spoils at Kenilworth Road, Steve Howard's second half effort putting Luton in front, only for Dave Challinor's first strike for County to ensure that both sides had to settle for a point. Despite that game being little over 3 months ago it will count little as a form guide as a lot of water has passed under a lot of bridges since then, County subsequently coming under the 'Cheshire Sport' umbrella, whilst it has been hard to keep up with exactly what has been going on at Kenilworth Road, suffice to say that the supporters must surely be hoping for a period of stability to ensue.

On the field Plymouth Argyle's final day victory over Wycombe Wanderers allied to Town's 2-1 defeat away at Swindon Town, saw the Pilgrims overtake Luton on goal difference, leaving Luton in a creditable ninth place finish, albeit 15 points adrift of a play off position. An extremely poor start to last season saw Luton fail to

pick up a single point from their first four league outings and concede 13 goals in the process. This worrying start to the campaign did not seem to affect confidence and late September saw Luton embark on a run of five straight victories. After this spectacular run tailed off their form became a little inconsistent, until another purple patch starting around Christmas gave genuine hope that a play off berth may be attainable. Sadly for Joe Kinnear the latter season form was very patchy and Town soon faded from the play-off picture. Whilst most teams boast a significantly greater points haul at home, this was not the case for Luton last season. Of their total of 65 points, 32 were picked up at home whilst 33 were attained on the road. At Kenilworth Road Luton ended the season with a won eight, drawn eight, lost seven record. The home maximums were recorded against Chesterfield (3-0), Swindon Town (3-0), Cheltenham Town (2-1), Cardiff City (2-0), Wycombe Wanderers (1-0), Northampton Town (3-2), Plymouth Argyle (1-0) and Huddersfield Town (3-0). Of their eight home draws last season, four games ended up without the scoreboard moving with encounters against Port Vale, Queens Park Rangers, Oldham Athletic and Tranmere Rovers all ending up goalless. The four other drawn fixtures saw both Wigan Athletic and County draw 1-1 at Kenilworth Road, while the visits of Notts County and Bristol City both ended up 2-2. Of their seven home defeats, the biggest drubbing came

who hit four unanswered goals. The other visitors who secured all three points on their trip to Bedfordshire were Peterborough Utd (3-2), Barnsley (3-2), Mansfield Town (3-2), Colchester Utd (1-2), Blackpool (3-1) and Brentford (1-0). On their travels Luton amassed 33 points last term from a won 9, drawn 6 and lost 8 record. Their most emphatic away success coming in their penultimate away trip to Colchester Utd where a Steve Howard hat trick and goals from Carl Griffiths and a Kevin Nicholls penalty earned a 5-0 victory. Steve Howard bore the brunt of the goal scoring duties last season and ended the campaign with a creditable 23 goals in all competitions. Incredibly, seven of their eight other awayday successes came following visits to teams in the Granada TV and Yorkshire TV regions namely:- Huddersfield Town (1-0), County (3-2), Oldham Athletic (2-1), Crewe Alexandra (1-0), Tranmere Rovers (3-1), Barnsley (3-2) and Port Vale (2-1). The other win coming at Wycombe Wanderers by a 2-1 scoreline. Their six away draws in the 2002/03 campaign came at Cardiff

at the hands of Crewe Alexandra,

City (0-0), Brentford (0-0), Bristol City (1-1), Peterborough Utd (1-1), Cheltenham Town (2-2) and at champions Wigan Athletic (1-1). Their eight other away fixtures all ended in defeat, with subdued coach trips home defeats at Blackpool (2-5), Plymouth Argyle (1-2), Northampton Town (0-3), Chesterfield (1-2), Notts County (1-2), Mansfield Town (2-3), Queens Park Rangers (0-2) and Swindon Town (1-2). In Cup action, Luton had limited success last season. In the Worthington Cup, their fans must

surely have enjoyed their first round 2-1 success away to Watford. They were again drawn away in the second round this time to Premiership outfit Aston Villa. Luton exited the competition 3-0 but would take some consolation from the 20,833 gate. In the LDV they were also drawn away at the first two stages. In round one they eased through 2-0 at Woking, whilst the second round saw a trip to Stevenage where Town emerged victorious by the odd goal in seven. Their run in the competition ended at the next hurdle when they were surprisingly beaten at home 2-1 by Cambridge Utd, the winner being a 'golden' goal. In the FA Cup non



The 'other' Hatters arrive here at Edgeley Park this afternoon on the back of two good results which have kicked off their season in style.

And, a strange quirk is that both of Luton's opening couple of victories have come against two of last season's champions. Third Division title winners Rushden & Diamonds travelled to Kenilworth Road on the opening day and, despite being a goal down at the interval, a double strike from Tony Thorpe and a last minute goal scored by Matthew Spring gave Luton a 3-1 victory.

Then, on Tuesday night, Conference champions Yeovil Town made the journey to Bedfordshire but left the Carling Cup at the First Round stage as the home side ran out 4-1 winners. An own goal by Luton defender Emmerson Boyce cancelled out Kevin Foley's opener but further strikes by Thorpe, on-loan Courteney Pitt and Steve Howard eased the Hatters into Saturday's Second Round draw.





County first crossed swords at league level with this afternoon's opponents on the opening day of the 1937-38 season.

It was our first game back in the (old) Second Division and a bumper 19,077 watched us come out on top 2-1 thanks top goals from James Smailes and Bernard Oxley.

Luton gained revenge on New Year's Day 1938 when they won the reverse fixture by an incredible 6-4 scoreline! Whilst Luton have generally had the better of things at Kenilworth Road they had to wait 65 years to return home with all the points from Stockport.

That solitary success last came last season when they came from behind to win 3-2. Keith Allen, who later joined Luton in an exchange deal with Derek Kevan, scored a hat trick against his future club in a 4-1 win on September 10th, 1965.

And three years later 13,246 packed Edgeley Park to watch us win a Third Division game 2-0 with Fred Goodwin and Bill Atkins on the scoresheet. The game saw former Everton idol Alex Young make his County debut following his record £15,000 move from Glentoran. The most important County-Luton game was an FA Cup third-round tie on January 4th 1958.

The Bedfordshire side – then flying high in the (old) First Division - arrived at Edgeley Park as red-hot favourites. But they were sent packing on the wrong end of a 3-0 hammering with Bill Holden scoring twice and Arnold Jackson adding the other. The game is also remembered for County wearing the famous Wolves' old gold strip as the

I spent the entire journey down to Wycombe last week trying to get the blasted theme tune to Playhouse Disney out of my head. Anyone with children under five and access to Sky's Kid's channels will know exactly what I am talking about. Before leaving for the club last Friday morning I provided my 4 year old with some breakfast and sat her down in front of this annoying programme. Within minutes I found myself glued to little Alex and Big Dave as they leapt around their colourful set and burst into song.

I can remember the words right now but I won't bore you with them. As it turned out I would probably have preferred watching the omnibus edition of Playhouse Disney (not that there is such a thing) than sitting in the numerous traffic jams that we endured on our way to the team hotel.

When we eventually did arrive, we were greeted by about three million screaming kids. It would appear that the team hotel is a firm favourite for those wishing to visit Legoland. Twenty-four hours later Legoland seemed a preferable option to the action that unfolded at Wycombe.

Thankfully the kids were packed off to bed early and we were left to discuss our potential for the opening match in the comfort of the hotel bar. Having decided that we were going to win, and comfortably, we headed off into the yuppie land of Windsor in search of a cool beer and an appropriate eatery.

We nipped into the slug and lettuce, which reminds me of the starters I normally eat in China, and

enjoyed a cold beer in the unusually empty bar. The heat it would seem was a tad too much for the Windsor folk who all appeared to have disappeared.

There was a rumble and some of the party thought that a storm was about to break but there was no reason for concern, it was simply my stomach telling me and everyone else in a five mile radius that it was time to eat.

We were nearly too late, thanks to my Rolex watch purchased from a highly reputable dealer in a Bazaar in Turkey. To be fair I had had this watch for six years and it keeps perfect time for at least one second per day but what can you expect for £3.50 and a kebab.

Thankfully the Spice Route where we had chosen to eat were not too fussy about the time and we were soon sat down perusing the menu. If you are ever in Windsor and fancy a curry then this is the place. It is without doubt one of the finest Indian restaurants ever to open its doors although this is also reflected in the price.

This is the only curry house that I have visited that serves White Chicken Tikka, which is exactly the same as the red chicken Tikka but not red. Not only does it taste fantastic but you don't get a big red ring round your gob either.


children worked in the town's thriving hat industry. And it was the world-famous Christys Company, based on Hillgate, which led the way in the mechanisation of the British hatting industry. Indeed, in 1883 – the year of County's formation - Christys, with around 1,500 workers had established itself as the largest hatting factory in Europe. In addition to Christys there were another 30 major hat manufacturers in the town, many of international repute, and small hatters' workshops throughout the surrounding areas.

Barely a street was without its hat works, hat shop or planking cellar, or one of the many ancillary trades that had developed to supply the industry.

When discussions began in the late 1990s about developing a museum to celebrate Britain's hat making achievements, location was never an issue. Opened to celebrate the millennium the UK's ONLY hat museum is, of course, based on the A6 close to Mersey Square in Stockport.

And such is its popularity it was voted Britain's Best Small Visitor Attraction last year. So Luton fans, we don't mind you borrowing our nickname iust remember that we are the original Hatters!

Traditional Hatters Mild is a popular drink throughout the town Stockport also has its very own Hatters Mild. Local firm Frederic Robinson Ltd. introduced the drink due to the 'Hatters' name being synonymous with Stockport for over 200 vears because of the town's former hat making industry. Their beer mats also reaffirm the point that County have derived their nickname from the industry and that Robinson's own horsemen wear traditional bowler hats when showing their

familiar shire horses.

John and Graham were like brothers and as John put it "I have lost a member of my family."

Hopefully Grahams support for the club will live on through his wife Sandra who never misses a match at Edgeley Park. Our thoughts are with Sandra, her family and all of their friends at this sad time. The club will of course give Sandra the same support that Graham always gave the club.
